Polis to Obama: Repeal DOMA

By Michelle Garcia U.S. representative Jared Polis urged the Obama administration to explain its recent decision to uphold a federal ban on same-sex marriage and the Justice Department brief filed on June 12 defending the law.

"I was shocked and disappointed to learn that President Obama chose to defend DOMA in federal court, especially given his campaign promise to call for a full repeal of DOMA," Polis



said in a statement on Tuesday. "My sadness turned to outrage when I read the Justice Department's brief that not only defended this hurtful law but seemed to embrace it. Comparing my loving relationship with my partner, Marlon, to incest was unconscionable coming from a president who has called for change."

The Department of Justice filed the brief on behalf of the Obama administration defending the 1996 Defense of Marriage Act from a federal lawsuit filed by a couple married in California.

Despite his request, Polis said no one from the administration has replied. Polis, a Colorado Democrat, said that similar moves by the administration will risk alienating LGBT voters.

"President Obama needs to honor his promise to repeal this law and end its needlessly divisive and harmful impact on our nation," he added. "I again call on him to work with us in Congress to help pass legislation, ending this hateful and divisive law."

Berry: Hate Crimes May Pass Next Week

John Berry, the highest ranking LGBT official in the Obama administration, announced at Washington D.C.'s Capital Pride Festival Sunday that the Obama administration hopes to secure passage of Hate Crimes this coming week and that President Obama is soon to announce an initiative pertaining to providing federal LGBT employees with benefits equivalent to those provided to their heterosexual counterparts. He also said the ad-



ministration fully intends to pass an employment nondiscrimination bill, repeal "don't ask, don't tell" and overturn the Defense of Marriage Act "before the sun sets on this administration."

Before Berry, who is director of the Office of Personnel Management overseeing 1.9 million federal workers, made the announcement, he spoke to The Advocate exclusively, saying that he wanted to "download" a few thoughts about the administration's intentions vis-à-vis LGBT issues.

The backstage exchange took place in a brief window before Berry took the stage at Capital Pride and seemed to be prompted by growing discontent in the community following the Justice Department's decision to defend the Defense of Marriage



Act. Berry also denied reports that any sort of "deal" had been cut by White House officials regarding LGBT legislation and when it would be accomplished.

Obama to Extend Benefits to Federal Workers' Partners

An Obama administration official has confirmed to The Advocate that President Barack Obama will be signing a presidential memorandum Wednesday to provide benefits to same-sex partners of federal employees.

The White House press office declined to detail which benefits would be included, but people familiar with the legal obstacles posed by the 1996 Defense of Marriage Act, said health benefits are not likely to be a part of the package. The Lieberman-Baldwin Domestic Partnership Benefits and Obligations Act, a bicameral bill that was introduced last month, will still need to be passed by Congress in order for full benefits to be extended to domestic partners of federal workers.

"Our analysis has been that it will take an act of Congress for the full suite of benefits such as health benefits and retirement benefits to be provided for same-sex couples and families," said Leonard Hirsch, president of Federal Globe: Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender Employees of the Federal Government. According to Hirsch, the executive branch has the authority to extend certain other benefits through departments and agencies, such as providing relocation costs for partners of federal employees.

Hirsch welcomed the announcement and added that his organization would gladly help with implementing the new policy. "We look forward to working closely with the administration to put this in place as quickly as possible," he said.

The signing is scheduled for 5:45 p.m. in the Oval Office, and the president is scheduled to make brief remarks.

The 125 cans of food will be donated to the Metropolitan Community Church of Omaha's food pantry, which provides services to the Nebraska AIDS Project and the community.

The theme for this year's dance, "What Happens in Vegas," was carried out with many creative decorations that transformed First United Methodist Church's Cary Hall, the entryway into the hall and room 112 into a casino-like atmosphere. Thanks go to Rob Race and to Patrick Heese for their leadership, ideas and hard work on the prom decorations. Guests enjoyed refreshments, including a three-tiered wedding cake. VIP guests Kay Mahony, Tim Mahony, Kathy England, Dave England, Betty Dorr and Bob Dorr joined Jody Huckaby and enjoyed true VIP treatment while watching prom revelers. Attendees received a poker chip with the theme, date and prom logo on it.

Another highlight of the prom was performances by Imperial Court of Nebraska (ICON) members Princess Royale Macy Riley XXVIII, Princess Royale Teagan XXVII and Holly Day. The audience loved the show and Macy Riley ended on a high note by presenting Proud Horizons and the Pride Prom with a donation of \$2,250. Macy and ICON have been contributors since the inception of the prom. They raise money, mostly in dollar increments, all year long. The prom organizers and the kids deeply appreciate the hard work and generosity of all the wonderful ICON performers.

Music was provided again this year by DJ Jim Kaup and profes-

sional photos, in the Vegas-style chapel of love, were taken by KVM Photographers. Additionally, six off-duty Omaha police officers generously gave up their Saturday nights to make sure the prom was safe for all.

The Tom Mahony Pride Prom is named after Tom Mahony, who, with his wife Kay, stood with their son Tim, as he testified before the Omaha school board regarding harassment he received at school. Following the testimony, the board voted nearly unanimously to add sexual orientation to the student code of conduct. Tom passed away a few years ago; to honor the Mahony family, the prom committee permanently named the prom after Tom.

The Pride Prom committee is all volunteers and includes representatives from Proud Horizons, PFLAG Omaha, GLSEN Omaha, ICON, the metropolitan Omaha gay straight alliances, UNO's Gender and Sexual Orientation Student Agency and other community groups. A Guide to Infinite Sexual Possibilities

This is the subtitle to the eyeopening and paradigm-bending book, "The Ethical Slut", by D. Easton and C. Liszt. Another title I considered for this column is: "Emotional Monogamy in Non-Monogamous Relationships", but that's too many words. Many of my coupled clients, colleagues and friends are examining traditional heterosexual marriage-based relationships and finding them lacking. Other people, however, think that the idea of "emotional monogamy and sexual nonmonogamy" is just a cop-out, a



way to rationalize not being faithful to your partner.

While this is a controversial issue, it's a great opportunity for us LGBTers to be social pioneers and make our own way. For many of us, the model of a traditional monogamous "marriage" isn't a good fit, no matter how many movies or TV shows tell us that a "faithful" marriage is the only way to go. To tell the truth: it's not working very well for the hetero folks, is it? When half of straight marriages result in divorce, this is a hardly a wonderful role model for us to emulate. Here are some typical problems with long-term monogamy:

 Is it realistic to only have sex with one person for the rest of your life?

Incompatible sexual desires, e.g., you're both tops; one
of you likes anal sex and the other doesn't; you like wild, animal-like sex and he likes it tender and gentle

Incompatible libidos: you want to do it once a day — minimum — and she's happy with once a month When looking at alternatives to long-term monogamy, let's not idealize open relationships either. After all, how many open relationships are happy and healthy? In fact, isn't it more difficult to have a good open relationship than a "closed" one? After all, in a closed relationship you have only one other person to work out your intimate difficulties and disagreements with. If you open up your relationship to other people, you may have two, three, four or more people to learn to get along with, communicate with, understand, get to know, etc. While "infinite sexual possibilities" sounds great in theory, how the hell do you pull this off with grace and sanity?

So let's say you and your partner want to remain emotionally faithful but want to sexually open up your relationship. This is likely to bring major changes to all aspects of your relationship. I recommend that you both sit down and figure out what you each mean by "emotionally faithful" and to figure out how sexually opening up your relationship is likely to change it. If you were my clients, I'd have some questions for you:

 What is your intention for your relationship? Why are you two still together, anyway? Is it to have fun, share great sex, deepen an emotional connection, see if you can be life partners?

What would be the purpose of an open relationship?
 Of monogamy? What are the pros and cons of each?

 What role does sex play in your relationship? Do you see yourself as a monogamous person (or not)?

What does "emotional monogamy" mean to you and



your partner? If this is important to you, how can remain emotionally committed to each other while having sex with other

eople?

In my years of counseling LGBT couples, I've seen many long-term emotionally monogamous relationships that are sexually "open" or periodically go through "open" periods. In a long-term relationship, sex over time often becomes predictable, Depending on the value that the partners place on sex, this may or may not be a problem. Some people like consistency and the comfort of consistency in bed (e.g., I know what you like and you know what turns me on) while others thrive on change and creativity. You needn't give up monogamy to be spontaneous and creative (in fact, I encourage you not to) but an open sexual relationship can be stimulating and invigorating for a long-term committed relationship. There are, however, many challenges to making it work for all people involved.

Feelings of jealousy and insecurity

Possibly falling in love (or lust) with someone else

 Feeling scared and disoriented as the formerly predictable structure of your relationship changes

 Confusion about how to structure this brave new world you're jumping into

Your relationship may not be solid to begin with and opening it up actually makes it worse

Less sexual intimacy may lead to less emotional intimacy so you end up feeling more like housemates than lovers

Monogamy or open relationship? The joys of Infinite sexual possibilities or the security of one person for the rest of your life? These are questions with no right answer, save the one

that every couple comes up with. If you and your partner are considering opening up your relationship, by all means: discuss it, consider my questions, and make your decision. And one more thing: relax! Nothing is irreversible. You can always shift as your relationship changes over time. Your relationship can be as fluid as you like: today you may regularly want a new man in your bed. Next month/year, you may want to make love to the same woman every night. You get to call the shots. If you want emotional monogamy with physical nonmonogamy, talk about it with your partner: be brave, bring the subject up with tact and respect and see what you both come up with.



are only confusing the state's residents.

A Brown University study published two weeks ago said 60% of the state's citizens supported same-sex marriage. A poll conducted by Marriage Equality Rhode Island said the number is 49%.

Rhode Island, the only state in New England that has not legalized same-sex marriage, is searching for the correct popular opinion as NOM, Brown University, and Equality Rhode Island all defend their polling as being the most accurate.

In the Providence Journal poll, a majority of Rhode Islanders larger than any reported in favor or opposition -- 74% -- said they would rather see the question go on a ballot than allow the state's general assembly to decide. Meanwhile, only 2% saw the issue as "one of the most important" facing the state.

Ocean State Muddied on Equality





With his help, we chose Shoofly Winery's Shiraz-Grenache, Loredona's Pinot Grigio, Black Ridge Reserves Cabernet Sauvignon, Brownstone Winery's Chardonnay, and Cartlidge and Brown's Pinot Noir. The favorite wine was Shoofly's Shiraz-Grenache."

What did the money raised go towards for the RCMC? "The funds from this wine tasting went towards our general fund, which allows the chorus to maintain daily operations that includes, but not limited to, the purchase of music, and to assist in paying for the upcoming expenses of our next concert, Silver, in June."

Besides the wines, there was also hors'doeurves and desserts. Burleigh shares that "we had a nice variety of crackers, meats and cheeses, including a cheese tray donated by Hy-Vee, a nice fruit selection, a wonderful bacon appetizer made by one of our committee members that received many compliments, cheesecakes donated by Old Chicago, and a fabulous punch that many raved about, which was made by one of our chorus members."

Since the RCMC is in the business of entertainment, they had entertainment at this event. "There was an excellent jazz trio who performed throughout the evening and is looking for venues to showcase their talents. Also, The Rivers Edge performed who is the outreach group of The River City Mixed Chorus. We had two soloists sing "To Love Somebody", "Careless Whisper", and a group song called, "Bring Down the Walls". One of the residents of Tudor Arms, where the event was held, heard the music and came down to join in the fun. She was so pleased by the performances that she gave us \$20.00 for one glass of wine!"

With all that was described at



the event at a very low cost, how was the outcome? "We had a total of 57 advance tickets and 12 tickets that were sold at the gate for a total of 69 people in attendance. We are very thankful to our supporters that purchased wine and the beautiful trivets that were available for purchase at the event. Our goal is to sell 200 tickets at next year's wine tasting!" The crowd make-up? "The great thing about the attendees is that it was very eclectic just like The River City Mixed Chorus. We had men and women, gay and straight, single and partnered who were in their 20's, those who are holding onto their 20's to those who are embracing their 70's. It was a great evening for all who attended."

So then, is this a new type of fundraiser or first time of doing this fundraiser for RCMC? Brian confirms that it is. "Yes, this was our first year hosting a wine tasting. One of our chorus members lives in the building where the event was held. He wanted to host a fund raiser for the chorus in his building's courtyard and knew that a wine tasting would be the perfect fit for the natural surroundings. The attendees had an evening of beautiful weather, drinking good wine, eating good food in a


