Economic Woes Encourage Rise of Hate Groups

The number of hate groups in the United States is on the rise, a trend that some see as directly correlated to the failing economy.

The number of hate groups in the United States is on the rise, a trend that some see as directly correlated to the failing economy. There are now at least 888 known hate groups in the country, according to a report by the Southern Poverty Law Center.



Jim Cavanaugh of the Anti-Defamation League told The Washington Post that "the Internet, immigration and the economic crisis -- that is the molten mixture for these guys."

As the world delves deeper into uncertain economic times, veteran investigators in the United States have started to pay more attention to supremacists and radicals who harm certain minority groups to make a point, the Post reported Monday. In addition to fiscal troubles, rising immigration and the reality of a black man in the White House may be enough to push some extremists over the edge.

As the number of hate groups increases, the number of hate crimes committed against gays and lesbians has also seen a rise in the past year. FBI figures show that such attacks increased by 6% from 2006 to 2007, while the number for all hate crimes had dropped slightly (1% in the same time period). Race-based incidents made up a majority of the 7,624 hate crimes reported in 2007.

While federal investigators have been able to intercept plans for violent acts, one infamous group is heading to Washington, D.C. to protest the inauguration of President Obama. The antigay Westboro Baptist Church, which the Southern Poverty Law Center deems a hate group, will no doubt make headlines during its protest of Obama, who supports many gay-related causes and is pro-choice. Diane's Story

The case may be the first time that gays or lesbians took the police to court, according to BBC News. It is estimated that 500,000 gays live in Uganda, a nation of 31 million. Ugandan Judge Cites Rights for Lesbians

Two Ugandan women were awarded \$7,000 Monday after a judge ruled their rights were infringed upon when they were arrested for being suspected lesbians in 2005.

According to lesbian and bisexual rights organization Freedom and Roam Uganda, or FARUG, Yvonne Oyoo and Victor Juliet Mukasa had been waiting for 17 months for a verdict.

Oyoo was awarded \$5,000 by Uganda High Court justice Stella Arach-Amoko for "arbitrary torture." Police sexually assaulted Oyoo, who was a guest in Mukasa's home when police raided it in 2005. Mukasa, a leader in Ugandan human rights activism, was awarded \$2,000.

"It will be the first case of its kind in Uganda where LGBTs are the ones suing the government," Mukasa said to New Internationalist magazine in 2007. "I am suing because of the constant

27,000 Urge Mormons to Support Civil Unions in Utah

More than 27,000 letters have been sent to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints headquarters in Salt Lake City urging the church to publicly support gay rights bills Utah legislators are expected to consider in 2009.

The letters were sent from gays and their allies across the country, mostly through the Human Rights Campaign, according to KCPW radio in Salt Lake.

"I think it's important that we emphasize that this is a respectful request," Jerry Rapier of HRC told KCPW. "We want to share people's concerns and feelings directly with the church and its leaders."

The sudden focus on Utah's politics comes after LDS, or Mormon, leaders became ardent proponents of passing California's ban on same-sex marriage in November. A church elder said

the LDS does not support marriage equality but instead would be fine with domestic partnerships or civil unions.

Rapier said the letter-writing campaign was not an "attack," but instead an



attempt for the church to make good on that statement. "It's simply an invitation to be a little more clear with the language," he said, adding, "Really, the first step is just asking for a direct statement from the church -- something clear, concise, and to the point, that leaves no room for misinterpretation."

The letters were hand-delivered to Temple Square on Monday, he said, because thousands of e-mails don't make it through the church's filter. Church spokesman Scott Trotter said the LDS did not filter the e-mails, but the volume caused its e-mail filter to label them as spam. (Michelle Garcia, Advocate.com)

The Sacramento Bee is reporting that a coalition of labor unions will file a brief with the California supreme court in support of overturning Prop. 8, the ballot measure that banned same-sex marriage in the state.

The Sacramento Bee is reporting that a coalition of labor unions will file a brief with the California supreme court in support of overturning Prop. 8, the ballot measure that banned same-sex marriage in the state.

More than 50 labor unions signed onto the brief, including heavy hitters like the California Federation of Teachers, the California Nurses Association, and the Screen Actors Guild.

The labor unions say they represent a combined 2 million people.

"If a simple majority of voters can take away one fundamental right, it can take away another," the unions argue in the brief. "If it can deprive one class of citizens of their rights, it can deprive another class too. Today it is gays and lesbians who are singled out. Tomorrow it could be trade unionists."

The labor unions are arguing that Prop. 8 is not a "constitutional amendment" but rather a "constitutional revision." A revision would requite a two-thirds vote of the legislature to get on the ballot. (Advocate.com)

Gay Man to Direct the Office of Personnel Management

John Berry is to be named director of the Office of Personnel Management by President-elect Barack Obama, making a gay man the president's top adviser on personnel matters for federal

employees. John Berry will be named director of the Office of Personnel Management by Presidentelect Barack Obama, according to The Washington Post. Berry served as assistant



secretary of the Interior during the Clinton administration and has been director of the Smithsonian's National Zoological Park since 2005.

LGBT leaders had hoped Berry would be tapped as secretary of the Interior, but D.C. insiders say his duties at the Office of Personnel Management will directly affect LGBT people because it has jurisdiction over the treatment of millions of federal employees.

"OPM is the federal government's human resources department," said Denis Dison, spokesman for the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, which has been presenting qualified LGBT candidates to the Obama transition team. "Its director is the president's top adviser on personnel matters. Having an out gay man in that position is more than symbolic, it's a statement about how important workplace equality is to this president."

The office is generally responsible for recruiting job applicants, filling vacancies at federal agencies, developing performance review processes, administering benefits, and overseeing non-discrimination policies.

Though Beltway LGBT leaders had been pushing for an openly gay cabinet appointee, they were enthusiastic about Berry's appointment and said it was the most prominent position to be held by an openly gay person in the federal government. "The selection of John Berry to head the Office of Personnel Management, making him the highest-ranking openly gay official ever, is a meaningful step forward for the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender community," said Human Rights Campaign president Joe Solmonese.

Before becoming director of the National Zoological Park, Berry was executive director of the National Fish and Wildlife Association from 2000 to 2005. He is also no stranger to Capitol Hill, having served as legislative director for Rep. Steny Hoyer, a Maryland Democrat, from 1985 until 1994. (Kerry Eleveld, Advocate.com)

Indiana Conservatives Revisit Anti-Gay Marriage Amendment

Indiana lawmakers who oppose same-sex marriage said Monday they would launch another effort to ban such unions with a constitutional amendment, reports The Indianapolis Star.

Dave Cheatham, a Democrat, and Rep. Eric Turner, a Republican, said they would both sponsor measures with identical language in the house, and GOP senator Marlin Stutzman said he would sponsor legislation in the senate.

But prospects of the initiative passing both chambers this session seemed dismal. Democratic house speaker Patrick Bauer suggested that a constitutional ban was not necessary since Indiana already has a law prohibiting gay marriage.

Bauer said judges had been upholding that law and that proponents of the amendment "must have living proof that that law's not being followed ... we certainly don't want to waste the public's time when we have the critical duties that we have."

Though both chambers of the state legislature passed a constitutional ban in 2005 while under Republican control, state rules dictate that an amendment must pass two separately elected legislatures before being put to a statewide referendum. The measure stalled when Democrats took control of the House in 2006.

According the Star, the proposed amendment reads: "Only a marriage between one (1) man and one (1) woman shall be valid or recognized as marriage in Indiana. A legal status identical or substantially similar to that of marriage for unmarried individuals shall not be valid or recognized." (Advocate.com)

Obama Once Supported Same-Sex Marriage

Through Barack Obama's 2008 presidential campaign, the now -president-elect has been vocal about his support for civil unions instead of same-sex marriage.

However, Obama went on the record during his 1996 run for the Illinois senate as being in support of such unions. On a candidate questionnaire for the Chicago gay newspaper Outlines, he said, "I favor legalizing same-sex marriages, and would fight efforts to prohibit such marriages."

According to the Windy City Times (which Outlines bought and merged with in 2000, taking over the name), Obama did not use of the phrase "civil unions" in the questionnaire. Obama also said he would favor a civil rights bill for gays and lesbians, a hike in funding for AIDS services, and adoption by gay and lesbian parents.

Though Obama did not campaign in California to defeat Proposition 8, which banned marriage equality in the state, he did come out against the referendum before the election in November.

Obama is currently meeting resistance from some over his choice in allowing evangelical pastor Rick Warren to perform his inauguration's invocation. Warren, whose Saddleback Church is based in Lake Forest, Calif., was a staunch supporter of Proposition 8. (Advocate.com)

Nine Men Convicted of Homosexual Acts in Senegal

Nine men in Senegal, including a prominent gay rights activist, have been convicted of homosexual acts and sentenced to eight years in prison.

Nine men in Senegal, including a prominent gay rights activist, have been convicted of homosexual acts and sentenced to eight years in prison, the Associated Press reports.

Diadji Diuof, a well-known Senegalese activist who heads an organization providing HIV prevention and other services, was among the nine men arrested in December during a raid on his apartment. Just weeks before, Senegal played host to an international AIDS conference -- LGBT participants were visible throughout the conference.

Senegal is one of 38 African countries that criminalize homosexual acts. Joel Nana, Africa research and policy coordinator with the International Gay and Lesbian Human Rights Commission in Cape Town, notes that South Africa caused a stir in 2006 when it became the first African country to legalize samesex marriage.

The nine men were convicted of and sentenced for unnatural acts and criminal conspiracy, Nana told AP.

"This is the first case that we've heard of in Senegal where people actually got sentenced," he said, calling the punishment long and harsh.

"It is a strong message of hatred, a strong message of division when we know it is critical at this point to address HIV in these communities," he said. (Advocate.com)

Obama Press Secretary Pledges Repeal of "Don't Ask, Don't Tell"

Press secretary Robert Gibbs has given the clearest indication yet that President-elect Barack Obama intends to repeal "don't ask, don't tell."

In a video on the campaign's transition website, Gibbs answers a question posed by a constituent about whether the Obama administration will scrap the ban on gays serving openly in military with a single word: "Yes."

More specifically, about 4:20 into the 5-minute video, Gibbs repeats the question, "Thaddeus from Lansing, Mich., asks, 'Is the new administration going to get rid of the 'don't ask, don't tell' policy?"



Bishop Gene Robinson to Deliver Prayer at Inauguration's Opening Ceremony The Right Reverend Gene Robinson, the first openly gay person to be ordained a bishop in the Episcopal Church, has been asked by President-elect Barack Obama's inaugural committee to deliver the invocation at the inauguration's opening ceremony, which is being held at the Lincoln Memorial on Sunday, January 18, and will be the first event attended by the president-elect.

Robinson, whose endorsement of Obama before the New Hampshire primary was considered a big coup for the campaign, has been critical of the controversial selection of Reverend Rick Warren to deliver the invocation at the president-elect's swearing-in ceremony on the National Mall on January 20. When Robinson heard the news about Warren, who has likened being gay to incest and statutory rape, he said "it was like a slap in the face,"

But after the invitation was extended to him, Robinson told New Hampshire's Concord Monitor that his inclusion in the opening event would be incredibly affirming to gay people.

"It's important for any minority to see themselves represented in some way," Robinson said. "Whether it be a racial minority, an ethnic minority, or, in our case, a sexual minority -- just seeing someone like you up front matters."



A spokesman for the inaugural committee told the Monitor that Robinson was given the opportunity to participate in the opening ceremony because of his contribution to the religious community and his efforts on behalf of Obama during the campaign. Robinson also revealed recently that President-elect Obama sought out his counsel and reflections on what it was like to be "a first."

LGBT leaders were quick to trumpet the addition to the ceremony. "Bishop Robinson models what prayer should be -- spiritual reflection put into action for justice," said Human Rights Campaign president Joe Solmonese. "It is encouraging that the president-elect has chosen this spiritual hero for all Americans to lead the nation in prayer at the Lincoln Memorial inaugural concert." (Kerry Eleveld, Advocate.com)

Conventional wisdom has long posited that if a politician supports gay rights, he or she will face a tough reelection battle. But according to a new study, officeholders who support samesex marriage and oppose homophobic bills often keep their jobs

Conventional wisdom has long posited that if a politician supports gay rights, he or she will face a tough reelection battle. But according to a new study, officeholders who support samesex marriage and oppose homophobic bills often keep their jobs.

The marriage equality group Freedom to Marry sponsored the study, which included election results from 21 states since 2005. A review of all these votes shows that politicians supporting marriage equality and opposing constitutional amendments banning gay marriage are often reelected.

Freedom to Marry says more than 1,100 state legislators who voted to support the freedom to marry were reelected, regardless of their political party or if they changed their vote from opposing to supporting marriage equality.

"The American people deserve leaders who aren't afraid to lead," Evan Wolfson, Freedom to Marry's executive director, said in a release. "For politicians, standing up for marriage equality is not touching a third rail; rather, it is a track to reelection -- and, happily, the path toward inclusion that America is traveling."

Wolfson said this study should prove to legislators that they need not back down on supporting the freedom to marry and opposing antigay measures like California's Proposition 8. (Neal Broverman, Advocate.com)

Fred Hochberg to Be Named Head of Export-Import Bank

Fred Hochberg will be named by incoming president Barack Obama as the director of the Export-Import Bank.

Fred Hochberg, the gay man who headed the Small Business Administration under President Bill Clinton, will be named by incoming President Barack Obama as the director of the Export-Import Bank, ABC News reports. Hochberg, a longtime figure in both Democratic and gay politics, had been buzzed about as a possible replacement for Bill Richardson at the Commerce Department, but his appointment to the bank means that Obama's cabinet will remain without a single gay member.

Hochberg was deputy administrator and then acting administrator of the SBA. More recently he was the dean of the Milano School of Management at the New School in New York City.

He supported Hillary Clinton in last year's Democratic primary.

The Export-Import Bank, according to ABC News, is the federal government's export credit arm and finances sales of goods exported from the U.S.

Hochberg will be the bank's first openly gay director.

The Human Rights Campaign, where Hochberg has been on the board and is currently a member of the group's public policy committee, hailed the expected appointment. "Fred is one of the most highly qualified and experienced public servants in our community, and the fact that President-elect Obama has tapped him for such an important economic position speaks well for the LGBT community," HRC president Joe Solmonese said in a statement. "This business combination will unite a powerful broadband video solution with an iconic brand and a leading URL in the LGBT community," said Paul Colichman, CEO of Regent Entertainment Media. "We are extremely excited about the opportunity to leverage this exceptional collection of assets to expand our audience, grow our revenues, and increase stockholder value." (Advocate.com)

Pepsi Targeted for AFA Boycott

The American Family Association has identified yet another target in its waging of the culture war -- PepsiCo.

The American Family Association has identified yet another target in its waging of the culture war -- PepsiCo. The right-wing organization has asked members to boycott PepsiCo after

the company donated a combined \$1 million to the Human Rights Campaign and Parents, Families, and Friends of Lesbians and Gays.



The AFA says it sent

two letters to PepsiCo after the donations were made public in October.

"We were indeed surprised by PepsiCo's support of the homosexual group," the AFA's Donald E. Wildmon wrote in October about the \$500,000 donation to PFLAG. "It would appear to us that PepsiCo would not involve itself in a political and culture war, especially supporting an organization seeking to redefine marriage and family."

The letter went on to ask PepsiCo chair Indra K. Nooyi to "remain neutral in this culture war, neither supporting nor opposing the homosexual agenda."

PepsiCo responded in November that the donation made to PFLAG focuses on designing sup-



portive workplace environments. "The initiative seeks to promote further understanding and equality in the places where people spend much of their time at work," PepsiCo spokesman Paul Boykas wrote in a letter the AFA deemed "condescending."

"Among the values promoted by the PepsiCo Foundation is ensuring a work environment that is respectful where associates are valued for their contributions," the letter went on to say. "I hope this clarifies this grant by the PepsiCo Foundation."

AFA wrote in a letter to its members that PepsiCo "refuses to give money to any pro-family organization that opposes the homosexual agenda."

Further adding fuel to the fire, the AFA adds that "most every homosexual organization we know of is overwhelmingly proabortion." (Michelle Garcia, Advocate.com)

Oh, how I love Nebraska When the snow's up to your butt You take a breath of winter And your nose gets frozen shut.



Business is Brisk at Seattle Gay Bars Threatened With Ricin

Business was brisk this weekend at gay bars in Seattle despite the ricin threat that surfaced last week. Eleven bars in the city's Capitol Hill neighborhood received letters warning of attacks with the poison, but instead of keeping people away, the threat turned them out, CNN reports.

On Friday night hundreds of people joined a pub crawl organized to support the targeted bars, which posted signs advising patrons to not leave their drinks unattended. "We are not going to be terrorized," one of the crawl's organizers, Alison Luying told CNN. Added Chris Daw, a bartender at C.C. Attle's: "People are like, 'Come on out. If you don't drink, a terrorist wins.""

Police are investigating the letters but have no evidence that the person behind them can actually deliver on the threat, according to CNN. (Advocate.com)
