COMING OF AGE

Wow! Ineverthought that sitting down to write a column for the magazine could be such a positive experience. I feel GREAT! And I guess I have good reason

for feeling that way.

With this issue, The New Voice of Ne-braska is EIGHT YEARS OLD! For a publication put out strictly by volunteers, that is pretty astounding. Publications in the Gay/Lesbian Community come and go so fast that the Gay Yellow Pages will no longer list any publications except "those with recognized readership."

Very few publications survive the ups and downs that the New Voice has experienced. Very few could withstand the impact of having someone walk off with the entire treasury. Very few could come back from a point when just 2 or 3 people were putting out the entire magazine and a steering committee meeting consisted of two people meeting on a downtown street corner in Lincoln. Not many could survive having the editor fall ill and resign just one month after accepting the position, leaving a staff who had at the most one or two months of experience at putting a magazine together. The New Voice of Nebraska survived these trials and is stronger and better than ever before.

In February, 1988, (the first issue after

I became editor) an article appeared that outlined the financial picture when the New Voice moved to Omaha. In the summer of 1987, the Imperial Court raised \$1,400 for the New Voice which went to pay off outstanding bills. When the New Voice moved to Omaha in January, 1988, there were still \$1,200 in outstanding debts and printing and production costs of about \$800 per month.

Today it is a much different picture. The New Voice of Nebraska is completely out of debt. We are able to pay our bills on time each month and actually have a small

cash reserve.

The New Voice is looking more professional than at any time in the past. We no longer do 'paste-up' by hand but have professional layout and typesetting done by International Minute Press. Bob Ewing at Printing Plus continues to do a super job of producing a quality finished product. Both of these businesses are strong contributors to the success of the maga-

We have more feature writers than ever before and are constantly receiving new submissions. We still need reporters, artists, and photographers for local events, but we are seeing growth in that area.

Eight years of publication, over three years in Omaha, and we're doing GREAT! Thanks, Iowa and Nebraska. You're the ones who've made it possible.

ACT-UP NEBRASKA FORMING

The first organizational meeting of AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power-Nebraska was held February 16th. ACT-UP Nebraska is part of an international and nationwide network. The group will be the state chapter grass-roots, democratic, militant direct action organization, dedicated to challenging the gross inadequacies of the governmental and private sector responses to AIDS, Homophobia and all forms of discrimination, and to creating AIDS policies by non-violent public protest.

public protest.

ACT-UP Nebraska has been drawn together as a group by our awareness that society and government have not perceived and responded to the epidemic of AIDS in an appropriate way. Misinformation, mistreatment, and misunderstanding abounds regarding this disease and persons affected by it. We believe our society and government has perceived AIDS to be an illness of gay men and have based their response on prevalent homophobic and discriminatory attitudes and therefore we will also take issue with homophobia and promote the civil rights of all people. We will identify, define, and respond to issues that deny Per-

sons with AIDS, ARC, or HIV of their rights, including but not limited to: housing, employment, availability of treatments, and access to public areas and events.

We insist that each person has a right to determine their own path towards healing. We do not endorse any course for treatment or lifestyle. Our purpose is to respond to issues that are identified and defined by the group in a manner that is direct and visible.

We will state our positions in a potent, powerful manner; including non-violent civil disobedience, if such an action is supported by members of the group. We believe all of us who live are equal, valuable members of our culture and membership is open to anyone who supports our cause.

ACT-UP Nebraska welcomes people of all sexual orientations, categories and classes of disenfranchisements who support our cause. We expect to form chapters throughout the state of Nebraska including Omaha, UNO, UNL, and western Nebraska. We will network with existing groups, such as the Coalition for Gay and Lesbian Civil Rights and Queer Nation Nebraska, when necessary.

of ACT-UP Nebraska may include, but are not limited to, boycotting homophobic and AIDS phobic companies and products, challenging governmental, private, religious, educational, correctional and social service agencies, letters and phone calls to fulfill our purposes, the dispensation of condoms in public and educational materials on safer sex, pickets and demonstrations, and supporting other groups with causes within our purview.



GAY/LESBIAN INFO LINE IN OMAHA

Thanks to a grant from the Imperial Court of Nebraska, ANGLE, Inc. is able to establish a Gay/Lesbian Information Line in Omaha. This service will begin April 1, 1991, and will operate utilizing the Voice Mail Services of U.S. West Communications.

This service comes as the result of requests by persons new to Omaha or just newly coming out who have had difficulty finding information on organizations and activities. The Gay/Lesbian Information Line will be listed in both the white and yellow pages of the U.S. West phone book as well as being publicized within the Gay/Lesbian community.

Callers will leave their name and phone number with the confidential Voice Mail service. A volunteer member of ANGLE, Inc. will return the phone call that same day and will have available information on community businesses, organizations, and current activities. Individuals in need of professional counseling will be referred to the Personal Crisis Service for assistance and referral.

This Information Line is not a dating service. ANGLE volunteers will not meet personally with callers nor will they arrange meetings between individuals. Callers wanting to meet others will be referred to various community organizations.

Surveys have been sent to as many community organizations and businesses as possible, requesting information which can be used with the Information Line. If your business or organization did not receive a survey, please contact ANGLE, Inc. at 556-9907.

The Tri-City HIV/AIDS Coalition has put together a resource list of professional people who are willing to work with people affected by the disease. They also coordinate information on support services for not only the infected person, but also their family, lover, friends, etc. These are very sensitive people working for a united front in the battle with AIDS and those misinformed on the subject of HIV and AIDS. The next meeting for the Coalition will take place Monday, April 22nd, in Hastings. You are welcome to attend. For the exact location of the meeting, call the Empty Closet, (308) 234-6500.

In Kearney the word is slowly starting to creep around of a new support group for gays, lesbians, bisexuals and sensitive others. In the Kearney area, check out your local cable channel 25. The K.S.C. TV Bulletin Board lists "The Empty Closet". There's also a public service announcement on the college radio station, 91 KICK (91 FM). The Kearney Daily Hub lists the Support Group in the Saturday "Calendar" section and the Tuesday "Program" section of the paper. KOLN/ KGIN TV will be carrying a listing for us on the Thursday public service section called the "Calendar of Events". The Kearney State College Newspaper, The Antelope, ran an article about The Empty Closet Support Group on January 31st. They promise to have other articles concerning gay/lesbian issues in the next few weeks. We are also listed weekly in the "Loper Scene" section of the Antelope.

Besides the speaking panel for the workshop held in Kearney on January 10th, the Empty Closet had a booth for the K.S.C. Health Fair February 12th. Hastings College also asked us to come and speak to a group February 22nd. We are open to speaking to a wide range of groups and letting them see and hear from the vocal 10% of the population. We try to include some handout material for people to look at later. If you know of a

school or group that would be open to a speaker or panel please tell them about us or contact us at (308) 234-6500. Also, if you have spoken to groups before concerning the gay/lesbian community and can help, in or out of town, with panels, please call.

We hope to sponsor some sort of a workshop or lecture at K.S.C. in May. Nothing is definite at this time but we are starting to make the proper contacts to ensure a successful event. Keep watching the news

for future stories on this subject.

The Empty Closet Group meets every Thursday now. One week we offer a Rap session for lesbians, gays, and bisexuals at 8pm. The next week we offer a Popcorn Night. This is a night which varies somewhat from time to time with educational and entertainment happenings. In general, it is a night that starts with a Potluck, Brown Bag, or other social food function around 6:45pm, then moves into the main portion of the night that may include movie videos, lectures, or fun and games. The meeting place is never listed in any publication for the sake of anonymity and general privacy. To find out the specifics for a certain Thursday night's events, give us a call. The Popcorn Night is a time when we try to encourage not only lesbian, gay, and bisexuals to attend, but also any other supportive friends. MCC SPLIT

DES MOINES - In a move that can strengthen and diversify the Gay and Lesbian Christian 'presence' in Des Moines, a new church group called Faith Fellowship has been formed. Created by differing needs and perspectives, Faith Fellowship has emerged from its parent, Church of the Holy Spirit MCC. The birth of a second predominantly Gay and Lesbian Christian Church in Des Moines has had both its moments of pain and opportunities for healing.

Differing perspectives on 'visibility' vs. 'safe place' needs, language differences and economics have been given as the reasons

for the second church.

Faith Fellowship met for the first time at 2pm on Sunday, December 9th. They are renting space at the Church of Grace and Hope at 5554 N.E. 1st Street in Des Moines. In a showing of 'good faith' and 'friendship,' the Reverend June Norris (Pastor of the Church of the Holy Spirit MCC) attended with the Reverend Bonnie Daniel (Mid-Central District Coordinator of the UFMCC). It is unclear at this time if Faith Fellowship will join the UFMCC denomination. Persons who are planning to join the new church have been encouraged to have their membership transferred as soon as possible to 'affirm their choice' and expedite operational changes.







■ OPENLY GAY CANDIDATE FOR KC CITY COUNCIL

For the first time in Kansas City's history, an openly Gay candidate is seeking election to the City Council. Jon D. Barnett filed sufficient signatures on January 15, adding his name to the slate of 6 candidates running from the 2nd District At-large. The city is portioned into six districts, each of which are represented by two council seats; one "indistrict" which is voted on by district residents, and one "at-large" on which the entire city votes.

Barnett made the decision to run after being approached by the Greater Kansas City Greens, a local organization akin to the European Green Party. They have spent more than a year developing a comprehensive platform addressing the environment, grassroots democracy, decentralization, so-

cial justice and non-violence.

Barnett has developed extensive position papers on a broad range of issues including Human Rights and Hate Crimes, Response to AIDS and HIV Disease, Campaign Reform, Recycling, and Mass Transportation. His positions are very compatible with the Green's platform, and he said, "after reading their platform, it was clear to me that I could comfortably run as a Green candidate."

Barnett, a small business owner and longtime community activist, is also co-director of the Human Rights Project, a local coalition of organizations and individuals founded over a year ago to work for the passage of a proposed Gay-rights ordinance for Kansas City. Although that ordinance was sent back to a Council committee where it died, a city resolution was ultimately passed which states the city's stance of non-discrimination against city employees based on sexual orientation. Simultaneous legislation amended the city's civil rights law to include HIV disease as an example of a handicap, and therefore a protected status.

In addition to his work with the Human Rights Project, Barnett has been involved with several local AIDS service providers, the Choice Coalition of Greater Kansas City, the NAMES Project Quilt, and Harmony in a World of Difference, a local organization working for racial and cultural harmony.

"I see myself as a grassroots organizer, and work hard to build coalitions and consensus. The City Council should represent the diversity of our city, and I would like to be a part of that representation," said Barnett.

The city's primary election was February 26. The two top vote-getters in each race will have a run-off general election on March 26.

"THE VOICE" WOMEN'S TREATMENT PROGRAM

In June of 1989, Eppley Treatment Center changed their traditional approach of treating chemical dependency and bulimia in that a gender separate inpatient unit was created. It became clear that while addicted men and women share similar problems, they also have different issues quite specific and distinct to their gender. A male oriented model was replaced with a more feminist model in that the basic premise of the women's unit is to empower women by providing them with a safe non-shaming environment to explore their addictions and bulimia and the impact it has had on their lives

Without men in the group therapy process, the women are able to gain valuable personal information about themselves. This information is usually a result of their interactions, shared experiences, connections, and eventually their relationships with each other.

Addiction has an impact on every area of a woman's life: her work, her relationships, her family life and her emotional, mental, physical, sexual, and spiritual life. Often the women discover that the solutions are not held by men but by the women themselves. What occurs in a female group therapy setting is that women discover those solutions through and with each other. They do this with support and nurturing, and through their shared experiences of being women, and the mutual pain they share of addiction.

1991 INTERNATIONAL AIDS CANDLELIGHT MEMORIAL



CARING IN TIME OF WAR

We've gone to war in the Persian Gulf. Well, that's not news to anyone if you've caught so much as one newscast since last August. I won't presume to debate whether or not the allied troops were truly justified in their actions; that's probably more a matter of personal opinion. That debate will rage on for ages, the same way people still voice opinions about our involvement in Vietnam. Yet these facts remain: we are there, and we are fighting.

What does that mean to the gays and lesbians in the armed services? I can only imagine. Being stationed in a land so far from home probably makes them feel more isolated than ever before. In a time when a person can be drummed out for simply being what he or she is, our brothers and sisters face obstacles in their daily lives in Saudi Arabia that we can barely begin to under-

stand.

What does this mean for lovers who are left stateside when the partner goes off to war? Fear, separation, loneliness, anxiety over what might happen. And anger. I say anger because the armed services will acknowledge someone's wife or husband, but

not their lovers. In the services' eyes, the lovers are nonexistent, not worthy of the courtesies afforded legally married spouses. Even the soldiers' families may refuse to acknowledge that the lover left behind has a right to feel the same loss they do.

I must admit, I am a poor one to write this article. I have no family member in the Gulf. My lover is still safely at home with me. I cannot begin to fathom what it is like to have your lover taken away for perhaps a year or more. Still, I felt compelled to write some-

thing

Heaven knows, I've got a long history of doling out advice even when it's not asked for. I won't presume to tell anyone whose lover is over there how to get through the trying times. But I wish to address those whose lives are not so directly touched by the war, and I hope I don't overstep any bounds in the process.

If there is anything I can say about the war in the Persian gulf it is this: give them all your support. Not only the troops stationed there, but also the lovers left behind. For those of us stateside, it is little enough we can do to let them know we care about what

happens to them.


Keep correspondence with the gays and lesbians in the military, so far from home. Based on my own correspondence with one person, I hear that letters are a real morale booster. They are in a place so foreign to anything we have here (a different landscape a different culture), that hearing from friends or family is the only sense of 'roots' they have.

And please remember the lovers left behind. Keep close contact with them as well Doubtless they are experiencing a vast range of emotions, from depression to anger. They may need some time alone at various points to sort things out for themselves, and they should have their privacy. But it wouldn't hurt to remind them that it's okay to call you whenever they want. The lovers need support as surely as the troops overseas do. In short, just be the best friend you can be.

When the war first started, I heard Henry Kissinger predict it would last only about two weeks. We've gone beyond that and no one knows when it will end. But until it does, let's be as mindful of our sisters and brothers

as we can.

COMMENTARY: AND WHAT'S WRONG WITH BEING ANGRY?

My friend James and I were leaving New York's Lesbian and gay Community Center a few months ago. A large crowd milled around in the street. Several people were there screaming and crying out their anger at what they had heard at a community forum. We had all listened to some incredible things from the city's mayor, the man who had called himself our friend. Almost every campaign promise of the previous year had been broken. I turned to James and was surprised by his reaction to all this. "Why aregay people so angry?" he asked. Angrily I said to him, "Apparently you didn't hear that people are dying. People are homeless. People are being beaten in the street by thugs every night!" Well, that didn't help because he still doesn't understand why people are so angry. He still doesn't understand why I'm angry. He was confused by what he heard in the street. "Why doesn't everybody just sit down and talk things out?" was what he wanted to know. I wanted to know what was wrong with him. To me, if you'reable to sit by and listen to the kind of political bullshit we had just heard and not get angry, well, you have to be emotionally stunted. Maybe he is. A lot of people seem to be these days.

Those who are angry (not just upset, mad, or perturbed, but really pissed-off) and those who seem to avoid their anger don't want to understand each other at all. I get complaints from lots of people about my anger. "You can't talk from anger," they say. "They'll never understand or listen if we're yelling at them," others say. Or, "How can you have dialogue when you're so angry?"

Give me a break.

Anger has never been easy to deal with, but the time comes when we all must. That doesn't mean controlling it. As incredible as it seems, when we talk about oppression.

doesn't mean controlling it. As incredible as it seems, when we talk about oppression, injustice and unfairness, we try not to get angry. We try to keep "cool heads" and "our wits about us." Most importantly we keep our places, stay in our right roles and don't overstep our bounds. Dialogue has these rules, you see. People aren't ready for anger because when we're angry the rules no longer apply. One thing anger does is put a sudden and complete stop to systems which artifi-Cially restrict what we can think, do, say, or act on. Angry people are dangerous people if you get in their way because angry people want to make changes. Angry people will go to extremes. But since when has calling for justice not been a dangerous act?

In a recent article in *The Times*, John Pareles writes that many people have a hard time dealing with the anger expressed in a lot of rapp music, "when pop singers get earnest,

the message is likely to be about compassion and charity rather than anger, resistance or placing blame. Not so with rapp music." And not so with the newest wave of gay and lesbian activists, who aren't interested in compassion. Aren't interested in charity. They are interested in anger, resistance and placing blame. It's the anger they want heard. Anger, they think, is legitimate in and of itself. Forget compassion. Drop this charity crap. I'm angry! Earnestly angry.

Who has permission to be angry? It's okay for people who have been oppressed, physically attacked, ignored by their elected representatives and discriminated against for years. Unless, of course, they're gay or lesbian. When Queer Nation is out being angry they're called, by others who would rather have dialogue and communication, "Fascist Nation." The name Fascist Nation doesn't come just from straights. You hear "Fascist Nation" today from gays and lesbians too. Gays and lesbians who are as afraid to deal with our anger as they are with their own. For years every time gays and lesbians have grabbed the tiniest bit of power and control, in any situation, they've been called the gay Mafia or queer storm troopers.

I don't know what gays and lesbians are supposed to be if not angry, but heterosexist society thinks that emotions are obviously something we should not have. At least not publicly. Remember the reaction to Black anger during the civil rights movement? People referred to angry Blacks derogatorily as tribal warriors, not thinking these people had the right to be angry and show it. Instead, they were as out of control as natives in a Tarzan movie. That's recognized today as a phobic reaction and racist. Remember too, the way angry women were once called "unladylike" or "strident," "shrill bitches" by people we would immediately recognize today as sexist, just as someday the fear of gay and lesbian anger, which is often thought of as proof we are out of control, infantile or at least a group of spoiled adolescents, will be seen as the reactions of neurotic homophobes. Until then they think our emotions are to be closeted. We aren't to be any more publicly angry than we are to be publicly loving (when we hold hands in public it's again because we are emotionally and sexually out of control, infantile or acting out adolescents after nothing more than the shock effect our flaunting brings about). Heterosexual society will tolerate us as long as we are innocuous. Sedate.

But our anger is not to be mislabeled and misappropriated by others. Anger denied is depression, and suppressing our anger is one of the ways heterosexism has been able to control so many of us for so long. At a recent Queer Nation action against a church/cult which claimed to "convert" homosexuals to heterosexuals, we saw bigots controlling gays and lesbians by denying, disqualifying

and suppressing their anger. We were told that anyone who was angry was not ready to speak. Not allowing you to be angry is one of the techniques used by any good brainwasher. Every time a gay or lesbian would begin to speak in this church about their anger at the way society treated them the subject was changed to love. Jesus' love. The church's love. "Don't be angry," they were told. "If you're angry, you can't be open to our love." Scary!

But don't be confused; you can be fooled into thinking anger is the opposite of love. That they're opposite ends of the emotional spectrum. Anger isn't nor has it ever been, the opposite of love. Being angry isn't sinful as they would like you to believe. Anger is something important that we must nurture and learn to use. Theologian Beverly Harrison says that, "anger is a signal that all is not well in our relationship with others." It's a mode of connectedness, not something that separates us. To be sure, anger doesn't necessarily lead to right action. I've seen my angry coconspirators in Queer Nation do some awfully stupid things when they're angry. Angry people do a lot of stupid things. But as Harrison says, "We must never lose touch with the fact that all serious human moral activity, especially action for social change, takes its bearing from the rising power of human anger." Anger breaks down those artificial walls of rules and properness that separate us from one another. Anger is closer to love than the absence of feeling we sense in many around us. Anger forces us to react to each other authentically, immediately. It's the job of those we are angry with to correctly choose how to react to our anger; by changing, acting, or maybe simply listening. But to deny the validity of anger itself as a means of communicating a serious wrong is to oppress our relationships with each other. Anger denied subverts community. Anger acknowledged and nurtured will give us our first glimpse of the power necessary to exercise our deserved freedoms.

Heterosexists don't know what to do with angry queers. We upset their stereotype of the wimpy faggot who can be kicked around. And then there is always the promise from heterosexuals that as long as we aren't angry, as long as we want to talk, dialogue, converse levelheadedly, we can avoid being kicked. Right? They can try to deny us our basic human rights. They can deny us our civil rights. They can try to deny us our dignity. But they are not going to deny me my right to be angry! And let's not deny that right to each other.

THE BOOK REPORT SIDE BY SIDE

The late 1960s were a tumultuous time. There was Vietnam and many protests. There was the sexual revolution. There were shootings at Kent State. There was a small riot in Greenwich Village's Stonewall Inn that launched a different kind of revolution. Certainly, coming of age in these times couldn't have been easy.

The story's two main characters are Patricia and Sarah. They were neighbors as toddlers, then schoolmates and playmates. Well, until one of their mothers found out what they were playing. Their parents forced a separation on them, but neither one could

quite forget the other. Eventually they found each other again in New York.

Each chapter is written in the first person voice, alternating both Patricia and Sharon as they take turns telling the story from their separate points of view. That can sometimes be a tricky writing device, but in this book it is quite effective. Miller has managed to create a separate voice for each of the girls so I never got lost as to who was narrating. This also allows us an inside look into their similarities and differences.

While we don't get a 'firsthand' view of what the Stonewall riots were like, we do get a good idea of what life in general was like in the Village during those years, and what the underlying politics were. We also get a good reminder of how lost a very young gay person can feel while trying to find an invisible society that is afraid of the legal ramifications

of helping a minor.

Unfortunately, I felt the story's real conflict and climax happened early on, when the girls were separated by their parents and fought to find each other again. The effects of their relationship on their respective families was what held me most enthralled. My interest waned a bit toward the end as the families fell out of the action and the two young women took up living together. Luckily, though, after they were reunited, all the loose ends were tied up nicely and the resolution of the story was satisfying.

MASTURBATION — AND COMMON SENSE!

Or, we might subtitle: things nobody told me!

We are considering a very personal matter, obviously. But let's not confuse feelings of embarrassment with shame. Indeed, if we could talk more openly about it, masturbation would bring less embarrassment. So, let's talk - with common sense.

The very term used calls for clearer thought than many of us encountered in our early days. It is not 'self-abuse' or 'selfpollution' as some dictionaries put it. This realization first came to me when I considered that the male organ receives the same stimulation and ejaculation in intercourse in marriage (acceptable) as in masturbation (not acceptable?). How could one be 'abusive' and the other not? A better term, and one which I have used in seminars, is more accurate: "sexual release."

In men and boys, there is a biological need that is born, not of the imagination

alone, but of the build-up of fluids in the body. Most of us remember many times when we could not study or read or think normally until we had a release. Common sense rejects the notion that this is abuse or polluting. As to the other familiar terms they seem innocuous and merely personal

There is no negative effect upon the body In fact, we usually relax, rest, sleep, and think better, and return to a more lighthearted spirit. How pitiful, then, to be told in childhood, as many of us were, that "if you play with it, it will turn black — or drop of — or...". What a load of guilt and fear is laid upon that boy! And the reasonable conclusion, too, that if masturbation will cause my penis to turn black, won't intercourse with woman (even my wife) do the same? How about common sense?

With this honest look at self-sexual release, it seems necessary to point out at least two more matters for the time being. One, it is not the same as 'onanism' (as even one dictionary wrongly interprets it). Onan, in the Bible, was not masturbating. According to the laws of the Israelites, when a man died childless, a brother was to take the widow sexually and give her children who were to bear the dead brother's name, and continue that man's family line. In Onan's case, he took the widow, copulated with her, but spent his sperm upon the ground, in violation of the law. His sin was disobedience to God, and 'using' the widow, not masturbation. In fact, the Holy Bible does not mention sexual self release at all; our Creator seems to 'take it for granted' that boys and men need release, married or not. So guilt is irrelevant. Would that there were some way of making this known to young boys. Almost all who have been in my seminars have expressed some feelings of guilt, and were grateful to be shown common sense in the matter.

Lastly, for now, masturbation is neithera heterosexual nor homosexual issue. But they seem equally shy about talking about it. In the present fearful situation, it would seem beneficial if all men could discuss and share in this, so as to 'free-up' themselves and one another, and perhaps find methods that will produce deeper satisfaction. Perhaps some one could start a local group for this pur-

Final word: if I am to continue writing in this area in The New Voice, I'd like to have some response from other readers, maybe with suggestions, support, and even questions. How about it?

★ INSURANCE COMPANY RECOGNIZES DOMESTIC **PARTNERS**

Firemen's Insurance Company of Washington, D.C., one of America's oldest business firms, has become the first insurance company in the nation to file a Homeowners policy that recognizes domestic partners. By redefining who is insured, the new endorsement extends to domestic partners the automatic coverage rights enjoyed by spouses and relatives of Homeowners policyholders.

Firemen's offers Homeowners coverage to apartment renters and the owners of dwellings and condos in D.C. and the states

of Maryland and Virginia.

According to Carl Blundell, CPCU, a company underwriting manager who created the new endorsement, "this Homeowners policy change will extend automatic coverage to anyone with whom an insured has a close, committed personal relationship that involves sharing household responsibilities and owning property together. Automatic coverage applies after an insured has established such a relationship and lived with their domestic partner continuously for at least 6 months.

Dick Andrews, president of Firemen's Insurance, advises that Firemen's, unlike other insurance companies, will no longer require that the name of an insured's domestic partner be disclosed and appear on the Homeowners policy in order for the partner to be included for coverage. "Because our new endorsement eliminates the need for such notification, unmarried insureds and their domestic partners will have the privacy choices and coverage rights enjoyed by

married couples."

* LESBIANS AND GAYS REGISTER RELATIONSHIPS ON VALENTINE'S DAY

An unprecedented celebration of San Francisco's new Domestic Partners ordinance, which allows Lesbian, Gay, and Unmarried couples to register their loving committed relationships with the City, began on Valentine's Day, February 14th, 1991.

Couples registered their relationships at City Hall throughout the day, receiving Domestic Partners certificates from the Marriage License Bureau. At 4pm., an hourlong program of speakers and music ceremonies began in the City Hall rotunda to celebrate the loving relationships of Lesbians/Gays and the important victory of Proposition K which made this all possible.

★ 1990: WATERSHED YEAR FOR SODOMY LAWREPEAL

Lesbian and gay activists at the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) are marking 1990 as a watershed year for legislative and legal battles to repeal and reform

Three major state court challenges - in Kentucky, Michigan, and Texas - received significant lower court boosts last year and reflect the growing momentum for sodomy law reform since the anti-gay Bowers v. Hardwick Supreme Court ruling in 1986, said Sue Hyde, outgoing NGLTF Privacy Project director.

In Kentucky and Michigan, judges last summer struck from the books those states' sodomy laws. The cases were brought by lesbian and gay people who argued that the sodomy laws violate their rights to privacy as recognized under state constitutions. Appeals of both lower court rulings are likely to be filed.

In Texas, a Travis County district court judge on December 10 struck down the Texas homosexual-specific sodomy law with the simple sentence, "I declare this law uncon-

Five Texas lesbian and gay activists had filed suit to challenge the Texas law, commonly called 21.06. The lower court decision in the case, Morales et al, may be appealed by the newly elected Texas Attorney General, Dan Morales. Morales is thought to be friendly to the gay and lesbian community.

During the recent gubernatorial campaign, Texas governor-elect Ann Richards won her race with overwhelming support from lesbians and gay men. Richards repeatedly called for repeal of 21.06 in her campaign speeches. Attorney General-elect Morales, having been less direct than Richards, is expected to mount a friendly appeal.

Laurie Eiserloh of the Texas Lesbian/ Gay Rights Lobby said, "We want an appeal by the state. Without a ruling from our highest court, Morales will have limited value. We will again file a bill to repeal 21.06 in the '91 legislative session, in the event our optimism about the appeal proves wrong."

A more ominous note was sounded in Maryland last year when that state's Supreme Court disqualified heterosexual Marylanders from prosecution under the state's felony sodomy statute. The ruling left in place "sodomy and perverted practices" as it applies to sex in private between consenting homosexual adults. The ruling, however, provoked cries of outrage and protest from Maryland's strong and wellorganized lesbian and gay community, who have vowed a renewed legislative repeal

"Overall, 1990 was the most productive year of repeal and reform work for the gay community," said former NGLTF Privacy Project director Sue Hyde. "Notwithstan ing the Maryland setback, I cannot think more uplifting note on which to end thew than with a Texas victory. The momentum the stare level, spurred by the crushing temporary defeat of Hardwick, is now solic in our direction."

ALL-WOMEN'S ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION

Veteran arctic explorer Ann Bancroft announced that she and four other women will begin a four-month, 1,700-mile ski trek across Antarctica in October, 1991.

The American Women's Trans-Antarctic Expedition (AWE) will make history as the first all-women's expedition to traverse the continent, and will put Bancroft in position to become the first woman to reach both the North and South Poles on foot. The grueling crossing will be made without motorized vehicles or dog sleds.

"I couldn't have made this trip six years ago," said Bancroft, who journeyed to the North Pole on the 1986 Steger International Polar Expedition. "But now I have experience in handling extreme conditions, and I feel up to the challenge of tackling the world's last frontier."

Joining Bancroft will be veteran mountaineers Sue Giller, 43, of Boulder, CO; Kellie Erwin-Rhoads, 33, of Pocatello, ID; Lucy Smith, 39, of Lander, WY; and a fifth team member to be confirmed by the end of the year. All currently are in training for the expedition.

In addition to the physical challenges presented by the expedition, Bancroft said team members hope their actions will send a clear message of self-empowerment. "We want to encourage people everywhere, especially women, to take on new challenges, regardless of their age or condition," Bancroft said. "I hope we'll demonstrate that people can do whatever they set their minds to.

Bancroft's team will traverse terrain previously challenged only via snow tractor by British adventurer Vivian Fuchs' team in 1957-58. The women will travel by ski, pulling 200-pound sleds loaded with food and supplies. Extra provisions will be dropped at three locations along the route.

During the trek, team members will contend with temperatures ranging down to 50 below zero, along with winds of up to 100 miles-per-hour. In addition, the ice-covered terrain is riddled with deep crevasses, requiring constant vigilance in the monotonous white landscape.

The effects of such conditions also will be the subject of an intensive medical research effort to be conducted before, during, and after the expedition. Bancroft said the trek presents a unique opportunity to fill wide gaps in existing physiological and psychological research on women under extreme conditions.




