

Jerry Peck had been working on the magazine when the Lincoln staff decided it was burned out and would unable to continue — they announced a 3 month deadline. Terry Sweeney, myself, and Jerry Peck decided Nebraska needed a community magazine — a second meeting was called an as of this issue it truly is "History".

Over a year ago, burnout started with the current staff — a plea was sent out — help, we will train you, something the Omaha volunteers didn't have — no serious reply, no commitment.

The decision was made to terminate the magazine — not an easy decision. Since that time a few, very few individuals offered to help. The current staff decided that the quality we had brought *The New Voice* to must not be compromised — again a conclusion to the magazine.

This is the last time — apologies to Larry Wiseblood on behalf of this community for not being able to continue his vision.

We printed resource lists and calendars that were as complete and as accurate as we could make them. We praised and supported groups and events throughout the community. And we offered new writers and new artists and new poets a place where they could develop their skills.

Yes, I am proud of what we did with *The New Voice*, and I do not let it go easily. However, the time has come to close the door, and I do so with love and best wishes.

Thanks go to Sharon McCartney, who has continued her dedication to the magazine even though she moved hundreds of miles away.

Thanks (and a personal apology for the roller coaster ride) to Brian Bengtson for his dedicated service to the magazine for four years.

I offer special thanks to Pat and Terry for inviting me to join *The New Voice*. They opened the door for me.

Some people don't realize the love and dedication that the *New Voice* staff has had over the years. As for me, I have done barely a fraction of the work that Dick, Sharon, Pat & Terry have done. Their hard work will be realized once *The New Voice* is no longer waiting for us in the mailbox, at our favorite bar or bookstore — wherever we pick it up.

My admiration for Sharon grew tremendously

a year ago. After deciding that she could no longer be editor, she set a deadline of one year for someone to come forward and take over.

Think about that. One year is a long time. Although volunteering can be a joy, it's also hard work. Sharon could have bailed out at any time, but she didn't miss a beat. Neither did the other staff members who were burned out too. Despite the burnout, *The New Voice* was published every month.

I've always been bothered by the way society in general uses the word "community" (the "gay community", the "black community", the "religious community", etc.). It inevitably leads to a "community leader" who inevitably speaks for the community. There is rarely a consensus in any "community" when it comes to any number of issues. I bring this up because I think a publication like the *New Voice* is the best place to find a "community". A true community is made up of people who share a common trait, but who also think individually. We're not robots. It's been satisfying to see so many different views expressed in the *New Voice* over the years. It shows the "gay community" as diverse as any other.

It's sad to see *The New Voice* go away. In a way, it's like the upcoming departure of Seinfeld. It's been a good run and it's a good time to end. To whoever takes the baton and runs with the next publication, please be as responsible and fair as the *New Voice* has grown to be in its 14-year history.

—Personal Note: Sharon graciously asked me if I would consider dusting off my keyboard and writing something for this landmark issue. I could not say no. I had been taking some time off from my usual writings to focus on other projects, and I fear I may have gotten a bit rusty.”

If no one has told you yet, you are holding a piece of history. No, I am not talking about my stuff (my ego may be big, but even I have limits.) I am referring to this magazine.

I don't think anyone outside of our community would have predicted that the *New Voice* would have lasted this long. When I was living in New Orleans, the locals had a hard time believing that we had more than one bar here (if they believed that gays and lesbians existed in Omaha at all, that is); let alone our own printed material.

When *The New Voice of Nebraska* first started, I was still in high school, struggling with my newfound sexual identity, and hiding my school clothes from my mother every morning (before the snickering and innuendoes start flying, I will explain). Back then, I was a struggling punk-rock wannabe and my mother was "not having any of this nonsense," so I had to wear two layers of clothes and carry a backpack to stuff the "acceptable" crap in.) I was so scared that people would find out that the name-calling I had to suffer did have some basis in fact. I was haunted by the crazed vision that I was the only gay man in Omaha, Nebraska. I lived in the suburbs and my view of the world was very limited. I wonder how different my teen years would have been if I knew about this magazine. I wonder how many lives have been changed and enriched since its inception.

The printed word can be one of the most powerful tools in our society. It can inform, entertain, incite, reward, reveal, and unite a community just by its existence. All we know about the societies that have gone before us is from the words they have left behind, whether on parchment, scroll, cave wall, or temple. I wonder what people of the future would think our little "community within a community" after reading these collected words. I wonder if they would understand.

This magazine has been with us throughout most of the AIDS epidemic. All of our pride marches have been covered (since it took a while for the other newspapers to come around), along

with all the other sorts of pageantry and spectacle that we have created for ourselves. We have said goodbye to many special people. We have watched other magazines come and go, and wished that we could have done more to help.

The New Voice of Nebraska has been the unifying voice in our community for over ten years. It has watched "Family businesses open and close, seen groups form and disband, and has covered it all. It will be missed.

On that note, I will end with a couple of poems for old time's sake. Recently, I have started speaking in high schools as part of NAP's Public Speakers Bureau. It has been a very strange experience; sometimes uplifting, sometimes scary, but I always come away from these talks with something new. Last Friday (January 9), I spent the day at Burke High School. During each of these classes, someone would ask a question about the NAMES Project Quilt. I am taking that as a sign (along with a request to print one of my older pieces) and presenting something very appropriate, and I am sharing a new piece, just to show that I haven't lost my touch.

Thank you Sharon, Carla, Dick, Pat, Terry, and Kevin for being the constant in our changing community. I don't envy whoever will try to fill your shoes. They will have a tough standard to live up to. Life is about change, and as the old gardener would say, "Even the old oak sprouts new branches."

Take care of yourselves.

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THE NEW VOICE – A PART OF NEBRASKA'S HISTORY

With this issue, *The New Voice of Nebraska* passes into the dim mists of history. For fourteen years, *The New Voice* has reported on the growth of Nebraska and Iowa's gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgendered, and sensitive community.

I started out to do a timeline of important events in the history of the GLBT community in our area, but I found that it was an overwhelming task. However, in the process I learned many things about our history and it made me more determined than ever to preserve as much history as is possible. It is my dream that our Rainbow Outreach Center will someday house a GLBT museum which will catalog the emergence of gay society and the development of the GLBT community. I hope that there are others out there who share the same dream.

The process of collecting information did make me more aware of some basic truths:

1) *The New Voice* was not the first gay publication in Nebraska, and it will not be the last.

2) Over the years the GLBT community has diversified. It is no longer enough to be bound together by our sexual orientation. We now gather into "interest" groups such as FrontRunners, Heartland Gay Rodeo Association, Wild Kingdom Bears, Lesbian Centered, Leather Engineers of Omaha, and on and on.

3) There is more to do in the gay community than ever before, thanks to the development of these interest groups.

4) People continue to make the same mistakes over and over again. We just don't do a good job of learning from the past. And we do insist on re-inventing the wheel every few years.

5) Nothing lasts forever and nothing is indispensable. *The New Voice* may pass into history, but any void it leaves behind will be filled by some other publication (maybe a web-site this time). Now, I did find some historical items of interest (to me, at least). For example:

1950 — The Diamond Bar welcomes gay customers. Owner Jimmy Sescher invited 3 gay men who were harassed outside another bar to come to his bar and to invite their friends. This was the first known "gay bar" in Nebraska.

November 1970 — United Ministries in Higher Education at the University of Nebraska in Lincoln hosts the first Coffeehouse for the gay/lesbian community. Coffeehouses continued until the late 1970's.

1970's — Omaha Meatpackers forms as a Leather and Levi Club, later focusing on fundraising for AIDS related causes.

— *Lincoln Gay News* and *Capitol Times*, Publications focusing on the gay community, begin and last a few issues before closing.

1973 — Metropolitan Community Church Evangelistic Team comes to Omaha to lay the groundwork for a local congregation. MCC begins to meet, first in private homes, then in First Unitarian Church.

1974 — First Metropolitan Community Church of Nebraska is chartered; name is later changed to Metropolitan Community Church of Omaha.

— *The Gayly Nebraskan* listed several groups in Nebraska. The Lincoln Gay Action Group (Lin-Gag) and the University Gay Action Group (Un-Gag) sponsored several activities including the Gay Rap Line, rap groups, a coffeehouse, and publication of the *Gayly Nebraskan*.

June 1978 The first Gay Pride Week was held in Lincoln and included a Gay Pride Beer Bust. Hosted by Jay and Karen, the event included volleyball and dancing. A Coffeehouse celebrat-

ing Gay Pride was held in the Lower Level of the UNL Student Union.

1979 — The Hollywood opened, advertising as a "mixed" discotheque.

— GAIN (Gay Awareness in Iowa & Nebraska) published Omaha's first major publication.

— Lincoln League of Lesbians, founded in 1979, was active for many years, sponsoring cultural events, picnics, potlucks, workshops, speaking engagements, discussion and support groups.

1981 — Imperial Court of Nebraska was formed.

1984 — Gay/Lesbian Information and Support Line began operating in Lincoln on March 1, continuing in operation for 10 years.

— P-FLAG was a small group of about a dozen families when *The New Voice* began publication.

March 1984 — Larry Wiseblood and friends publish the first issue of *The New Voice of Lincoln*. The name was changed to *The New Voice of Nebraska* within just a few months. Larry uses a pseudonym "Larry Weiss" at first.

— Mid-City Chorus formed in Omaha. An initial group of 12 performed at the Chesterfield as part of a benefit for MCC and then sang at the Good Friday Services at MCC.

1984 — Gay Rights National Lobby (GRNL) saluted the Imperial Court of Nebraska for its support of AIDS activities.

— The Imperial Court of Nebraska held Coronation at the Joslyn Museum in conjunction with "Gay Pride Week" — Velvet and Gary West were elected Emperor and Empress of the Imperial Court. A recorded turnout of more than 450 people attended coronation and cast votes for the monarchs. — Jo Jo Morrison is named as Duchess to the royal family of Empress 4 Velvet. Food for Thought and Toys for Tots began as annual project of the Imperial Court.

— Lincoln-Lancaster Drug Project formed an outpatient group for gay men and lesbian women. Randy Todd was the organizer of this program which is still active today.

— *The New Voice* was subject of article in the *Lincoln Star* which was picked up by the Associated Press and put out on the wire services. This led to coverage from the *Lincoln Journal*, the *Omaha World-Herald*, and several radio stations.

— *The New Voice* wins a lawsuit filed by the publisher of *The Voice News of Southern Lancaster County*, a small weekly newspaper published in Hickman, NE. Judge Jeffrey Cheuvront denied an injunction filed by *The Village Voice* to prevent *The New Voice* from using a name so similar to that of the *Village Voice*. In his ruling, Judge Cheuvront stated that no evidence of confusion between the two publications had been presented.

September 1984 — River City Mixed Chorus formed, following footsteps of Mid-City Chorus.

— Nebraska Regional Gay Lesbian Classic Bowling Tournament held at King Louis Rose Bowl with a \$10,000 purse.

— The MAX opens.

July 1985 — Imperial Court of Nebraska organizes the first Gay Pride parade in Nebraska (June 19, 1985) The World-Herald reported about 60 people marching and about 400 spectators.

— AIDS Risk Reduction pamphlets were distributed as an insert of *The New Voice*. UNMC offered a Comprehensive Care program under the direction of Dr. Johnathan Goldsmith and offered "HTLV-3 Testing".

August 1985 — Representatives of the Coalition met with W. Don Nelson, chief of staff for

Governor Bob Kerrey to discuss the role of state Health Department in coordinating AIDS education.

Don Flowers and Kevin Houdesheldt of the Imperial Court met with Mayor Mike Boyle to seek public funding for AIDS research. They were also interviewed on KETV.

— The "Coordinating Committee" held its initial meeting at the MAX. Represented at the meeting were the Imperial Court of Nebraska, The River City Mixed Chorus, the Metropolitan Community Church of Omaha, the "Omaha" Volleyball team, and *The New Voice of Nebraska*. This group hopes to help avoid scheduling conflicts. This group later became the "Bars and Organizations of Omaha (BOO)", and still later "Achieving New Gay/Lesbian Endeavors (ANGLE)"

— Omaha AIDS Project was formed to be an umbrella organization for AIDS work.

1986 — A reader writes a letter of complaint about the December 1985 cover "Mr. Noel", calling it tasteless and an insult to those of us who still recognize Christmas as a deeply significant, religious holiday. The original charcoal "Mr. Noel" the work of local artist Sam Orwen is part of the *New Voice* Legacy.

— 2nd annual Nebraska Gay Pride celebration included an Art Show and Sale, the world premier of the play "Straight to the Point", a Pride concert, a Volleyball tournament, a gay film festival, the Coronation of the Imperial Court of Nebraska, The 2nd annual pride parade, and a picnic and coffeehouse reunion in Lincoln.

— John Ziegler, principal clarinetist for the Omaha Symphony and musical director for the River City Mixed Chorus died of AIDS. His death was the first to be publicly reported.

Nebraska AIDS Project held an awards dinner at which individuals from 6 local organizations were recognized for their help in establishing and maintaining the Nebraska AIDS Project.

January 1987 — Larry Wiseblood steps down as Editor of *The New Voice*. Sandy Vopalka becomes the first woman to edit *The New Voice*. February 1987 — The first ever article written by Sharon Van Butsel appears in *The New Voice*. It deals with the end of a relationship and is entitled "A House Meant for Two".

November 1987 — Sandy Vopalka steps down as editor. Jerry Peck assumes position of editor and *New Voice* moves to Omaha.

December 1987 — The first issue to be published in Omaha.

January 1988 — Jerry Peck resigns as Editor. Sharon Van Butsel assumes position.

April 1988 — Treasurer Larry Adams disappears along with all the money in *The New Voice* treasury.

May 1988 — Dick Brown joins the staff of *The New Voice*.

And so we moved into the "current decade" of *The New Voice*. During the next ten years the number of GLBT organizations would triple; bars and businesses would come and go; the Leather Community would establish a strong, public foothold in Nebraska; the Transgender community would reach out to the GLB community and would develop a unification that is unique in cities across the region; and we would lose many of our historic leaders and others would emerge to take their place.

The cataloging of the history of Nebraska's GLBT community will continue as I move into retirement. But for now, I bid you a fond farewell. Until next time.

ICON RESPONDS: LET'S SET THE RECORD STRAIGHT

The 1993 Executive Board of the Imperial Court, Carla P., Gary W., and auditor, Duane S., respond:

The previous letter questions why the Imperial Court would elect as president someone who was "allegedly responsible for the loss of thousands of dollars." In order to put to rest the gossip and innuendoes which have been circulating throughout the community, we will once again put forth the facts of the matter.

During the time when our current president, Joe Reed, was treasurer of the organization (1993), the Imperial Court did not have locked money bags nor night deposit. They borrowed a simple metal box from ANGLE and, following Coronation 13, the money received was put into this box and sent with the Treasurer to keep until it could be deposited. While this box was locked in Joe's apartment, someone living in the building entered the apartment and removed funds from the box, leaving a large part of the money intact, apparently in hope that the theft would not be discovered. The identity of this person became known when he attempted to enter the apartment a second time. When the theft was discovered, Joe informed the executive board and also confronted the individual who had been found attempting to enter the apartment with his suspicions that he might have taken the money. The man admitted he had taken the money and asked that he be allowed to repay the money. The members of the Executive Board and two independent observers met with the man, and had him sign a statement admitting that he had taken the money. Later that night, the man disappeared.

The executive board turned the matter over to the police and gave them the statement he had signed. Unfortunately, the man was never found and never brought to justice.

The Board of Governors then filed a suit in small claims court, claiming that Joe should repay the money since it was in his possession when it was stolen. The judge in small claims court entered a judgment against Joe based on the erroneous assumption that he was a "fiduciary" treasurer and so responsible for all funds. Joe appealed this decision, but did make payments toward the judgment as he was ordered to do.

When the Executive Board met with an attorney regarding the appeal, they learned that the judgment in small claims court was in error because the ICON treasurer was not a "fiduciary" position. The attorney advised the Executive Board that the appeal would be upheld and that attempts to fight it would result in legal and court fees that would be more than the amount taken. The attorney advised that ICON attempt to settle out of court before the matter went to trial. The Executive Board and Joe Reed agreed to let the matter drop and let the payments that had been made be regarded as payment in full for the judgment which had been issued.

The matter was closed four years ago, and those who were involved with the Imperial Court at the time are well aware that Joe Reed was the victim of a crime. It is unfortunate that the community still prefers to listen to gossip and innuendoes instead of talking directly to those involved and getting accurate information.


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POSITIVE INFLUENCE

SUGGESTIONS ABOUT WHERE TO GET INFO

Dear Friends!

I understand that Sharon Van Bussel and Carla Petersen have been keeping *The New Voice* going these past ten years, but I also understand that Terry Sweeney and Pat Phalen were the visionaries before that.

Is there NO one to take over *The New Voice* now? Do you think that *New Voice* is no longer useful?

I myself might try to help if I had any idea as to how. I've been a student of desktop publishing, page layout, etc. (used PageMaker on a Macintosh, for example) as a student 1994-95 (also used PhotoShop, scanners, Adobe Illustrator), but I have not yet had to rely on those skills, nor have I been able to use them much since 1995. Computer hardware and software was more than I could afford.

So, while I probably wouldn't make a good editor, there must be someone who would! Where else in the region can we find anything like *New Voice*?

I guess you COULD argue that the *Advocate* now comes out of Illinois, but that's only the distribution center: the magazine is put together in Los Angeles.

There was *R.F.D.* (sort of a Rural Page Digest) that was published quarterly in Tennessee (I think).


Looking through *Gayellow Pages* and/or *Damron Address Book*, I wonder what I'll find for the area. Nothing in Iowa: The *Parachute* publication and maybe *Personally Speaking* (contact service, apparently) each in Wichita, KS MIGHT, if combined, offer the kind of info for southern Kansas that *New Voice* provided for s.e. Nebraska; Kentucky had *Kentucky Word* and *The Letter*, each from Louisville, I think, don't know if those still exist; I guess the best regional

resource now will be *Lesbian and Gay News Telegraph*, out of St. Louis, MO, with a satellite in K.C., MO; I contacted *Times of the Heartland*, in Omaha, NE, but never got any response, so I think that must have closed; and while Ohio has *Gaybeat* and *Gay People's Chronicle*, those seem to have a narrow focus: mostly Columbus and Cleveland; Oklahoma has *Gayly Oklahoman*, from Oklahoma City. A few other resources might include *Liberty Press*, Wichita, KS; Indianapolis, IN, is a source for various publications: *Indiana Word*, *Kentucky Word*, *Ohio Word*. *RFD* (Box 68, Liberty, TN 37095), and *Query*, out of Nashville, TN complete the list of Midwest-Ohio basin resources I know. If YOU would publish that list, it might help your readers. If YOU know of resources (and phone numbers, addresses, e-mail, web sites, etc.) please let us know!



My first introduction to *The New Voice* was, of course, by picking it up at one of the bars in Omaha many years ago. And then there were all the last minute ad changes, ads that would not turn out well because of the copy provided, meetings, and agendas that would change at the last minute, etc. But we have always enjoyed producing *The New Voice*.

In fact, *The New Voice*, was a Godsend to us. We had only been in business for one year when Jerry stopped by that day. And with the help of *The New Voice* we have prospered for 11 years. Also because *The New Voice of Nebraska* believed in doing business with a gay owned printing company, we were able to help almost every GLBT organization in the state of Nebraska. Whether it was through financial donations, free or discounted printing, it was because you supported Printing Plus with your business that we were able to help so many others. As I've stated on numerous occasions, we as a gay community are so willing to fly across the country to march on Washington for our rights, but so unwilling to drive across town to support a gay or lesbian owned business. To you and those who have made that drive, we thank you.

PATRICK SPEAKS OUT

I'm a 14 year old gay boy. I've known I was gay since as far back as I can remember. I'm writing to tell others it's not easy to come out.

Ever since I've known, I've been scared. I was always afraid because I was different. My brother is one of the athletic types. My mom is a teacher. My dad is a professional and grew up in our small town, and my sister is a blond Jan Brady.

I'm currently in a treatment center because my family isn't too fond of me. I knew if I came out it would be havoc for me, considering my family is 9th century Catholic and my small town.

I came out to my family in January of '97 at 13 years old. I came out to my town after my birthday last summer. I was terrified both times.

I feel that wanting to be in Drag is even worse. My boyfriends haven't been too supportive ei-

ther.

I guess I'm writing to say in the past year I've been to 8 different treatment places, because if you don't come out to somebody, you're just going to get worse. I've been to the point of suicide, because it's not easy in life to be gay. Also, if you're going to come out, have a good support group. To help others isn't easy, too. I've been trying to and I guess that's why I'm writing.

Just PLEASE don't go to length like I did! It only makes things worse.

Editor's Note: Patrick, we appreciate your courage and your determination to help other young people who are facing decisions about coming out.

Patrick's article has been edited to remove any identifying information. Even though Patrick

has chosen to come out at a very young age, I feel we must still protect his privacy.

As you read this article, please remember that Patrick is only one of the hundreds of youth in our area who face this decision every day. It is our responsibility as adults to help make the road easier for these young people. I encourage you to support our local groups (P-FLAG, Proud Horizons, Gal.O, GLSEN, Positively OUT, and all the other groups who focus on the needs of youth.)

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
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YOU CAN HELP WITH EX-GAY AND EX-EX-GAY RESEARCH

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COMMUNITY REPRESENTATIVES ON THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE IMPERIAL COURT OF NEBRASKA

Applications are now available for Emperor or Empress of the Imperial Court of Nebraska. Application forms are available at the Rainbow Outreach Center, Metropolitan Community Church, at your favorite bar, or by mail from the Imperial Court of Nebraska.

General Requirements for the Board of Governors: Membership on the Board of Governors is limited to Monarchs and Prince/Princess Royales of the Imperial Court of Nebraska, with the exception of 4 seats reserved for Community Representatives elected by the membership of ICON through a secret ballot. Board members may be re-elected to an unlimited number of terms. All Board members must sign an agreement to adhere to the Code of Conduct and must abide by regulations regarding attendance, participation, and properties as set forth in the By-Laws. All members are subject to removal for just cause.

Applying to be a Community Representative: Persons applying to be a Community Representative may not have served as Emperor, Empress, Prince Royale or Princess Royale of the Imperial Court of Nebraska.

Applicants must be a current member of ICON. Individuals who are not presently members may enclose the current \$15 membership fee with their application. All Reign 17 memberships expire after the Memorial Day Picnic and must be renewed at that time. Fees for Reign 18 memberships have not been set.

Applicants must be of legal drinking age in Nebraska; must have no outstanding warrants or criminal actions pending against them; and must have no outstanding checks with any organization, or establishment.

All applications must be on the Official Form and must be mailed to the Imperial Court of Nebraska with a postmark on or before March 30, 1998.

During the period between April 6 and the regular June Board Meeting, the applicant must attend 75% of all meetings of the Board of Governors and must attend 75% of all ICON shows, events, and functions. All applicants must attend and assist with the Memorial Day Picnic.

All applicants must serve on at least one committee to be assigned by the Board of Governors, and must attend at least 75% of all meetings of any committee to which assigned. The applicant is responsible for notifying the Secretary or an Executive Board member of their presence at any meeting, show, event, or function.

Before any candidate will be listed on the official Ballot, the Board will verify that the applicant has met all requirements. Elections are by a "yes/no" vote, with at least 51% "yes" votes required for election.

Those receiving the highest percentage of "yes" votes will be declared the winners. In the event of a tie, the final selection will be made by the Board of Governors.

The two highest vote getters will be seated for two year terms. Announcement of the winners will be made during Coronation.

- 1) Applicants must be a Reign 17 member of ICON. Memberships are available from the Treasurer, Carla Petersen, by calling 556-9907, or by mail. At present, memberships are \$15 and expire after the Memorial Day Picnic. Memberships must be renewed at that time. The cost for Reign 18 memberships for candidates has not been set.
- 2) Applications must be on an official application form and must be mailed to the Board with a postmark on or prior to April 13.
- 3) Applicants must be of legal drinking age in Nebraska; must have no outstanding warrants or criminal actions pending against them; and must have no outstanding checks with any GLBT business, organization, or establishment.
- 4) Applicants must have served successfully as a Monarch or member of a Royal Family of a recognized Court in the Imperial Court system; have served successfully on the Board of Governors of ICON, or have attended at least three (3) meetings of the Imperial Court of Nebraska.
- 5) All applications to be a candidate for the position of Emperor or Empress of ICON shall be accompanied by the following:
 - a Letter of Intent/Statement of Goals of the Candidate
 - \$50 NON-REFUNDABLE Application Fee

COMMUNITY MOURNS LOSS OF LEADER

Jerry Dike Suffers Fatal Heart Attack

Jerry Dike, pictured above with his life partner, Jim Morford, was a highly visible leader in the GLBT community during the past three years. With his partner, Jim Morford, Jerry was a volunteer and committee chair at Metropolitan Community Church of Omaha and was on the Board of Directors of the Rainbow Outreach GLBT Resource Center. He died of a massive heart attack on January 13. I was honored to be asked to write and deliver the eulogy at his funeral. The text of the eulogy follows.

Gerald Breeden Dike was born November 24, 1943 in Milford, Nebraska and he died on January 13, 1998. He is survived by his spouse, his life-partner for nearly 25 years, Mr. Jim Morford, by his foster son, Patrick Riley, by his mother Julia Dike; his brothers, Jack and Robert; and his sister-in-law, Annette. He was preceded in death by his adoptive parents, Helen and Forrest Breeden, his father Marvin Dike, and his brother, Edward.

Such a very few words to describe the life of our friend, Jerry Dike, but within those words lies the essence of Jerry Dike.

Jerry was born November 24, 1943 — born and given up for adoption, placed with a Catholic orphanage. But even then Jerry's warm personality and ability to relate to people was evident. When his adoptive parents, Helen and Forrest Breeden, came to the orphanage they brought clothes for a tiny baby which the orphanage had planned to place with them, but while they were there the Mother Superior said, "I have another baby I'd like you to see — he is so lovable." And with a winning smile, Jerry stole the heart of his adoptive parents and they journeyed back to the store to exchange the baby clothes they had purchased for ones which would fit this healthy, husky baby.

Jerry graduated from Scottsbluff High School, then getting an associate's degree which allowed him to teach elementary school. In the early 1970's, Jerry quit teaching long enough to enroll in the bachelor's degree program at Chadron College. And during his senior year there, Jerry and his adoptive parents took a vacation which would change Jerry's life forever.

On the way home from an extended trip, the Breedens stopped in Omaha to visit old friends. On August 10, 1973 Jerry decided he was bored and went out for a drink at the Diamond. He put some coins in the juke box, punched up Roberta Flack's "The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face," and turned to watch a handsome man walk in. It was the first time Jerry ever saw the face which would share his life for the next 25 years.

Jim Morford remembers that he wasn't looking for a relationship when he stopped at the Diamond — he really didn't want to be bothered

with anything but a drink with some friends — but Jerry was determined to impress this man. By the 50th time that "The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face" played on the jukebox, other patrons were glaring at Jerry, but Jim had weakened and agreed to go out.

The next day Jerry found his way to Jim's home in Council Bluffs to leave a note before he went back to Scottsbluff. The two talked for a while and then began a long distance relationship of letters, calls, and trips across the length of Nebraska. By November, Jim moved to Scottsbluff while Jerry finished his senior year. Jim says that he protested at first, thinking it more sensible to wait until Jerry knew where he would be teaching after he graduated, but Jerry prevailed, convincing Jim that he should go ahead and move to Scottsbluff since the teaching assignment wouldn't be anywhere near Council Bluffs. Of course, as fate would have it, right after graduation, Jerry came home and announced that his first teaching assignment would be, of all places, in Council Bluffs.

After three years back in Council Bluffs, Jim and Jerry moved to Portland, Oregon, seeking a milder climate and to be near Jim's father. While teaching and running their antique business, Jim and Jerry made friend after friend. Over the years dozens of people who were down on their luck or in need of a warm, supportive environment found their way to Jim and Jerry's home — some staying a few hours, others staying a few years. Among these people was the man who they would call their foster son, Patrick Riley. He stopped to ask about work so he could get some cigarettes and a square meal and ended up as part of their family.

In fact, Jim and Jerry introduced Patrick to his wife, Iris, at the local Moose Lodge; hosted Patrick and Iris' wedding in their back yard; and even joined them for a 7 week honeymoon tour of the United States; rejoicing with them when their son, Andrew was born nine months later.

Jerry was active with the Moose for 35 years, both as a member and as an officer, helping with their many projects, including the regular Bingo sessions. It was at a Bingo session at the Moose that Jerry would meet a very special little person. Pam Davis and her brother Gary Slack became a part of Jim and Jerry's family, building a relationship that would last across two decades.

During all of this time, Jerry's family was a special part of his life. Both his adoptive family and the birth family he had never known. Indeed, this love was so strong that in 1978, Jerry embarked on the search to find his birth family. Jerry was fortunate that the Mother Superior in that orphanage had given his adoptive parents his original birth certificate and it did not take long to trace his family through church records and helpful officials. Jerry was able to be re-united with his parents, Marvin and Julia and with three brothers; Edward, Robert, and Jack and he remained in regular contact with them throughout the years, eventually having his name legally changed to his birth name of Dike.

Jerry and Jim returned to Council Bluffs in 1989, after Jerry retired from teaching, in order to be closer to their families. They became active in Council Bluffs Eagles and became well-known figures throughout the city. They were noted for their warmth and hospitality. Indeed, their Christmas parties were noted for the food and

friendship (along with Jerry's infamous Tom and Jerries!)

In February of 1995, Jim and Jerry began to seek a spiritual home, coming to Metropolitan Community Church of Omaha, arriving for the very first visit on a Saturday morning, right in the middle of a women's support group meeting. They were greeted warmly and encouraged to come back for church services the next day. They did come back for services and after the service, Jerry turned to Jim and said, "As far as I'm concerned, I'm home."

And MCC did become home for both Jim and Jerry, offering them friendship, opportunities to use their many talents, and the chance to grow spiritually. Jerry maintained an active role at MCC, serving as usher, acolyte, fellowship committee, Chairing the Christian Social Action Committee, and directing two one-act plays as fundraisers for the church.

But it was a Christian Weekend Retreat called EXCEL that opened the door for Jerry spiritually. During this weekend Exercise in Christian Living, Jerry found a formula that he put into practice: Pray, Study, Act! Jerry was an active participant in EXCEL of the Midlands, EXCEL of Three Corners, and was a founding member of the Couples EXCEL of the Ark, only the second such EXCEL experience to be developed. Jerry was such an EXCEL enthusiast that his friend Peg commented, "Right now he's probably organizing an EXCEL of the ANGELS!"

Jerry's enthusiasm did not end with MCC. He became interested in the development of a resource center in Omaha for the GLBT community and joined the steering committee which laid the groundwork for the center located at 1719 Leavenworth. He went on to be an active member of the Board of Directors of the Rainbow Outreach Center, seeking to help others as he had done all his life.

While teaching in Portland, Jerry served for seven years on the Public School In-School Scouting program and created and implemented a Drug Awareness Program in the elementary school where he taught. Friends have said that Jerry loved people and would never intentionally hurt anyone. Jerry was never a rich man, but he would share all that he had with someone in need.

Jerry was a collector — a collector of things (hobnail glassware, giraffes, Rod McKuen songs and books, all sorts of music; and he loved flowers — wildflowers, garden flowers, just flowers!) And he loved the theater, whether acting, directing, or just attending.

Jerry loved people and he loved life. He loved beauty and he loved freedom. And this is the final legacy that Gerald Breeden Dike has left behind — an example of love and compassion that serves as a role model for us all. And a memory of arms that wrapped themselves around you and held you close until the troubles and trials of the world were only a distant memory.

Goodbye Jerry. Until we meet again.

BISEXUAL BANTER

I recently went to a BiNet meeting. I went as a bi-friendly gay woman. The people there were all, predictably, bisexual, and all very friendly. They made me feel very welcome. I was initially concerned that they wouldn't accept me into their group as a gay woman. They all laughed at this and expressed to me the difficulties they have had been accepted into the gay-lesbian community as bisexuals.

We had a very interesting conversation about the theories of bisexuality and homosexuality in general. Everybody agreed that everyone in the world is basically bisexual, but that everyone leans more one way or the other toward homosexuality or heterosexuality. A couple of the men agreed that they leaned more toward heterosexuality. A couple of the women claimed they leaned more toward homosexuality and one woman claimed she was dead center.

We discussed the ways in which you might tell whether you are gay. I suggested that if a woman found that another woman made her heart flutter and her clit twitch, then she knew she was gay. Another person asked, "Well, what if a man finds that women make his heart flutter and that guys make his cock hard?" We all agreed that he would then be bisexual.

We all discussed the possible reasons why gays/lesbians have difficulty accepting bisexuals as a legitimate group. We decided, for example,

it was just as threatening to a lesbian woman to suggest that she might be attracted to a man as it would be to suggest to the typical straight man that he might be attracted to a man. Any claim to the contrary of your chosen orientation is a threat to your established sexual identity.

We couldn't agree on whether sexuality is choice or chance, nurture or nature. For the same reason, we couldn't agree on whether there is a genetic basis for sexual orientation. We toyed with the idea of whether there is a separate gene for bisexuality as well as for hetero and homosexuality.

All in all, we couldn't come up with many answers but it was good to have a dialogue about these topics. These are all things I had been thinking about for a long time but had never had much of a chance to discuss.

It's too bad the group wasn't larger. We all wondered why there weren't more participants in the BiNet meeting. We came upon the conclusion that bisexual people are reluctant to admit their leanings and prefer to stay under the protective veneer of straightness. "I'm still attracted to women/men; therefore I'm OK," syndrome.

I encourage everyone who has bisexual leanings or thinks they might, to come to the monthly BiNet meetings. You might make a few like-minded friends and learn a few things about yourself too.

We didn't feel like going home and we weren't interested in making the trip across the bridge to the Harmony as some of the crowd was doing, so we decided to check out this new place we've been hearing about — The Generator.

The Generator is strictly an after-hours club, open for dancing on Friday and Saturday nights from 12:30 a.m. until 4:00 a.m. You may remember The Generator as the former home of Fusion, or if you think back even further, as the home of The Magic Theater. It is still the same long, narrow building that it was then, but the new owners have stripped it of all the extraneous things. There are only a handful of tables and chairs and there are some raised platforms to sit or lounge on. The walls are painted flat black, accented with galvanized sheet metal, and lighted by the flash of strobes or laser lights. The dance floor takes up most of the available area, and with good reason. When the music starts, the excellent sound system surrounds you with a driving beat that almost compels you to start dancing.

This is an after hours club, so there is no alcohol and no drugs are allowed. Patrons must be over 18. Obviously, there is a strong draw for the younger age group, but there was a good mix of ages the night we were there.

There is some discussion underway about having a "coffee-house" on the second floor for those of us who want a quieter place to talk during the wee hours. And there is discussion about making the Generator available for private parties.

I encourage you to check out the Generator. The music is hot; the light show is great; the drinks (non-alcoholic, of course) are reasonably priced; and the staff is welcoming. It's a good choice when the music comes to an end before you're ready to quit dancing.

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
