New California Law Protecting Gay, Transgender Students Meets Resistance

A recent amendment to California's education code has outraged many conservatives, who say the new laws push a gay agenda in public schools, according to a story in The Washington Times.

The law, SB 777, signed by Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger in October to take effect in January, forbids any activity in school that "promotes a discriminatory bias" on the basis of sexual orientation or gender.

In recent weeks, preachers, parents, conservative lawyers, and advocacy groups have launched protest campaigns, which have included pulling children out of school, circulating a petition, and even filing a lawsuit.

The law's opponents argue that the amendment would allow students to decide their own gender, creating potential "havoc" in school locker rooms and bathrooms.

"If this is not repealed, the next step is to get out of California itself -- it's like Sodom and Gomorrah," minister Vincent Xavier told the Times.

Proponents, though, say the law only clarifies and streamlines -- and doesn't expand -- existing protections for students.

"There has been no change in California law, none at all," state senator Sheila Kuehl, the Democrat who authored the original bill, told the Times. (The Advocate)


Hungary Legalizes Civil Partnerships

Hungary's parliament voted 185–154 (with nine abstentions) Monday to pass a law allowing same-sex couples to register their civil partnerships. Registered couples will have access to the same rights as married straight couples with respect to inheritance, taxes, and other financial matters, Reuters reported. They will not, however, be allowed to adopt children.

While none of the former communist states allow same-sex marriage, the Czech Republic and Slovenia allow same-sex partnerships to be registered.

The law is slated to take effect in January 2009. (The Advocate)

Holiday Stress Levels Higher for Lesbians Than Straight Women

Lesbians tend to be more stressed and depressed during the holidays than straight women, according to a survey conducted by market research firm Harris Interactive and Witeck-Combs Communications.

The survey found that 80% of lesbian adults felt more stress around the holidays, compared with 64% of heterosexual women. And while 51% of lesbians said they tend to feel more depressed around the holidays, only 36% of straight women did.

"Estrangement from family, marginalization within and isolation from society, separation from children (sometimes due to custody battles), and inadequate access to culturally sensitive health care practitioners are all factors that can adversely affect mood during a season so identified with family activities and belonging," Linda Spooner, a Washington, D.C., physician, said in a press release.

Smoking is also a greater problem for lesbians, according to the survey. Twenty-five percent of lesbians said they smoked, compared with 19% of heterosexual women.

Half of the straight women polled said they would try to quit smoking in the next year, while only 23% of lesbians said they would try to stop. (The Advocate)

Florida Could Vote to Ban Same-Sex Marriage

Voters may decide next year whether Florida will become the 28th state to place a constitutional ban on same-sex marriage. Sponsors of the proposed ban claim they have gathered the required 611,009 signatures necessary for a referendum vote, but Florida's Division of Elections website shows the group is 253 signatures short of its goal, the Associated Press reported Friday. An election official has yet to formally verify the signatures.

Florida currently prohibits same-sex marriage, but John Stemberger, an Orlando attorney heading the group opposed to marriage equality, said a constitutional ban would prevent judges from overturning the law.

"We believe kids need a mom and a dad, very simply," Stemberger told the AP. "Moms and dads bring something different to the table. Dads are not optional."

Opponents of the measure are worried that the amendment could supersede some Florida cities' existing domesticpartnership laws, thereby affecting unmarried heterosexual couples as well.

"It's government saying this is the only sanctioned relationship that you can have," said Stephen Gaskill, spokesman for Florida Red and Blue, an opposition group. (The Advocate)



Gay Pride

The Stonewall riots were a series of violent conflicts between New York City police officers and groups of gay and

transgender people that began during the early morning of June 28, 1969, and lasted several days. Also called the Stonewall Rebellion or simply Stonewall, the clash was a watershed for the worldwide gay rights movement, as gay/lesbian and transgender people had never before acted together in such large numbers to forcibly resist police harassment directed towards their community.

This was a "hair pin drop" heard around the world. Gay men and lesbians all over stood up for themselves and became a voice heard, and all they wanted was equality and fairness. To be treated as an equal human being with the same rights as others. Though we have many of those rights and have come a long way in the eyes of the world and among straight people, even to the point of being accepted by many. We have not shown ourselves, each other, and those who still oppose us the love needed to finally be accepted as normal.

Now ever since the 1960's and 70's we as gay men and lesbian women have no longer acted together but just the opposite. We tear each other apart almost daily with our gossip, trash talking, and hatred. We go so far as to hold a pride event commemorating the Stonewall riots only to hold such an event that most of the men and women in their teens in the 60's who knew of the oppression at Stonewall don't even attend. Better vet when these older people complain we take a hostile view of their comments and never try to understand what they are really saying. Is our pride event nothing more than a Sunday show at the Max just put out on the streets of Omaha? Shouldn't it become more than a parade event and drag shows? Why not be proud of whom we are and set aside out petty bickering for at least one day and again act in unity as those did who were alive during Stonewall? Yes, we love hot young bodies. We love goodlooking people, but that is not what pride is about. It's about gavs and lesbians acting together and in unity. It's about putting aside our opinions and inner fighting and coming together to show the world that we as lesbians and gay men can be accepted as normal and should have the same rights as others. It's not about half-naked men in a parade, drag queens lip singing, or multi color flags flying in the air.

It's about unity and love of a community that is not always accepted because of their sexual preferences and the lifestyle they lead.

Understand that when one of us complains about Omaha's pride event they aren't speaking against homosexuality they are speaking about the pride's intentions and meaning. Most of the older ones who knew of Stonewalls unfairness and who lived in the shadows of society hiding who they truly were only complain because they don't feel represented by the younger generation who hold pageants, shows, and a parade who never knew what it's like to be humiliated by public authorities just because of their sexual preferences. We who are young today don't know what it was like to go into a gay bar every night in fear that police would raid that bar, and not for illegal drugs or alcohol but because we loved those of the same sex.

When I first started going out to drag shows I was made fun of by gay men. Most people would tease me and make fun of me and comment they didn't know I was into that. Of course they always included the phrase, "there's nothing wrong with it it's just not my thing". I simply responded with my opinion that I think it's totally weird but I also know most drag queens are my friends and they are some of the nicest people in Omaha. Yes, I still don't get it, but I don't have to. I just have to support my friends and community which I do every Sunday. You'll often hear my Xena warrior princess cheer during the shows. I do this cheer so my friends will know I'm there and that I support them.

Do I have a problem with the gay pride celebration in Omaha? No not at all, but I do have a problem when we as a community take offense to it.

I also have a problem with us who are younger when we forget what it truly is about; unity, equality, and freedom to be ourselves. So many who attend and probably some who help with it just look at it as a day of fun, parades, drag shows, beer and



music. It is so much more. Those who are 60 and over remember when we couldn't do what we do in June.

They remember when even going out and being in groups was to live in fear that authorities would break in and arrest them. We who are younger should sit down with those in their 60's and listen to their stories. We have come a long way, but we have forgotten our roots. Let's not be angry towards the "religious right" or those who hate us. Let's reach out to them and be sensitive to them that maybe just one day we will all be part of the day we celebrate as pride. It is a day when we as lesbians and gay men remember back to a time when it was illegal to simply be ourselves. How we celebrate might seem odd to some older gav men and straight people, but let's not let our freedom become a barrier separating us into groups. Let's use our freedom with sensitivity and try and bring us back into that spirit of Stonewall and show those who disagree with us love that they may see we are not so different. I have heard a great lie and seen it in action; that the best way to fight hate is with more hate. Let us be better than those negative opinions and those who dislike us and rise up to be those who are strong and know opinions aren't going to stop us. To be offended by the comments made against us is a sign of weakness. Let those who are stronger live by the scruples of those who are weaker and take no offense to what is said or done, and help those who aren't so strong take no offense. Barriers in the gay community aren't any better than making a barrier between us and the straight community. For those who don't like us we'll keep reaching out to them.

Celebrate Pride, Unity, Equality, and Freedom. Do it in a spirit of togetherness remembering those who fought so long ago for the freedoms we have now with love towards ourselves, our community, and those who disagree with our lifestyle!



Core Members (Big Brothers) will sponsor volunteers (Little Brothers) to assist with all activities carried out by the group. If you are an individual who wants to take an active role in creating something positive within your identifiable population, now is the time to get involved. We will begin building this dynamic and much needed program from the ground up starting in January of 2008.

This new group will operate under the existing philosophy as the original MPower Group. "A program that encourages all gay/bi-sexual men to work together to build a healthy community in which they can thrive, formulate optimistic social connections and support safer sex; using gay-positive and sex-positive approaches.

One of the focus groups that will be starting in January will be a bi-weekly support group for the HIV-Negative Gay Man. As AIDS prevention strategies focus more on psychosocial pressures of gay men who are HIV-negative, group work with this population has proved to be a healing solution to the on-going psychological toll of the AIDS pandemic. In an environment in which the link between sex and survival has been turned upside down, groups of these men offer invaluable forums for normalizing fears, clarifying values, disseminating information, and building a community of concern that mitigates overwhelming feelings of loss and isolation that might otherwise lead to selfdestructive behaviors. Of particular importance with this focus group will be stage specific interventions. Recognizing how to utilize an integrative approach may give the group leaders the best opportunity for exploring the multi-issue concerns related to both staying uninfected and maintaining psychological wellbeing. To be very frank, the group will talk about sex, relationships and concerns about your confidence in staying negative.

As MPower Program Coordinator, I firmly believe that only by celebrating the normality and healthiness of gay men's needs for social, emotional and sexual connections with each other can we begin to help men not place themselves or others at risk of becoming infected. When gay men deeply feel good about themselves, good about what they do sexually and good about their partners, there is a hope and possibility that they will choose not to behave in ways that will continue to transmit HIV. Unsafe sexual behaviors are possibly an expression of low self-esteem or occur solely under the influence of alcohol or party-and-play drugs.

Facilitators of this group will be Jessyca Vandercoy, PLMHP Comprehensive Risk Counseling Coordinator and Gary Winingham, MPower Program Coordinator from Nebraska AIDS Project. MPower's "thought provoking" "safe-sex" questions of the month:

Do you know the four body fluids that transmit the HIV virus?

What are the three materials that condoms are made of?

Answers:

The only four body fluids that transmit the HIV virus are blood, semen, vaginal fluid and breast milk.

The three materials that condoms are made of are latex, polyurethane and animal membrane (sheep or lamb skin). Animal membrane condoms are worthless at stopping the spread of STDs and HIV. They only *help* prevent pregnancy. If someone is allergic to latex they need to use polyurethane condoms. These are twice as strong as latex, retain more heat, slip less, can be made extremely thin and have no smell or taste. They are more costly and less flexible than latex condoms and may require more water-based lube. Only water-based lubricants should be used with all condoms.
