14th YEAR OF PUBLICATION MAY BE LAST FOR NEW VOICE

I have often said to people that I am incredibly naive — I always assume that people are honest and that they will do what they say they will do. Despite many, many experiences to the contrary, I still make those assumptions. And once again my naivete has resulted in disappointment.

Over the last several months I have written several columns about the need for new people to step forward and take over the many tasks needed to keep *The New Voice* going. We've had some folks do some typing and write some articles, and I've had several calls and talked with several people — including three who assured me that they intended to take my job and take over the publication.

Well, perhaps it's my personality. Perhaps it's my method of orienting people to what is needed on the magazine. Or perhaps it's just an overwhelming job, but none of those volunteers have lasted more than two weeks. Some who expressed interest never got beyond the phone call or leaving a note at the Resource Center. Others never made it past the initial orientation.

I met with two men who wanted to do typing and wanted to make all sorts of changes in our old computer so they could use it more efficiently. I gave each of them a dozen or so "filler" articles to shorten, type, and return to me by the deadline. One never came back, never called, never returned the articles. I ran into the other one at the bar about 1 1/2 weeks after deadline. Well, he'd only got one done and he still needed to work on the

others and could he still get them to me? My answer was simple. "No. This was a test — you missed the deadline and now it's too late. We've already gone to press."

Another young man came in and when I asked what he wanted to do with *The New Voice*, he informed me he wanted my job. He had lots of good ideas and seemed eager and determined. The next week I actually found him busily typing articles when I arrived at the Resource Center. I reviewed his autobiographical editorial, made a couple suggestions about spots where the transition seemed awkward and encouraged him to continue his work. I haven't seen nor heard from him since. I still have the article on the hard drive at the Resource Center — without revisions and only half done.

Several people want to do proofing for the magazine — until they find out that the rough drafts have to be proofed and corrections made on the disc and the final copy returned within 24 - 48 hours. Others want to do photographs, but never turn in any prints. Others agree to write articles but don't follow through.

Okay, okay — I know that I'm just being bitchy, but the truth is that I am really pretty discouraged at the moment. I had been convinced that people would step forward and work as hard as we have to keep *The New Voice* going. Doesn't look like it's going to happen.

And it may well be that the time for *The New Voice* has passed. Maybe it is time for the "for-

profit" newspaper to take over — after all, they don't have to depend on volunteers — they can pay reporters for their work — we just have to depend on the goodness of the reporters' hearts. Seriously, *The Buzz Journal* is doing a good job. Their advertising rates are significantly higher than ours and they don't yet print a real calendar of events, but you can live with those things. They do have energetic reporters who go out and work for their money. I haven't tried putting in articles announcing upcoming events, so I don't know if I can count on them helping publicize my shows or not. But, as I said, all-in-all they are doing a fine job and may be able to take over the job of being the GLBT publication for Nebraska.

The bottom line to all this whining that I've been doing is that the Steering Committee of *The New Voice* will be meeting to make a final decision within the next month, but as it looks right now, the February 1998 issue of *The New Voice* may be the last one. With that in mind, we are going to begin doing subscriptions at a rate of \$2 per month through February, and we will be adjusting ad contracts accordingly. We are assembling and will be donating a complete set of *The New Voice of Nebraska* to the Douglas County Historical Society and will be getting archival material ready for the Resource Center.

Of course, there is still time for someone to come forward and take on the job of continuing a volunteer publication in the community. But the rest of the story is up to you...

Sandy Vopalka -- 15 Years as Activist in Nebraska

Dear Editor,

It is time for me to start a new chapter in my life, and in doing so it is also time to say goodbye. Yes, I am leaving the state of Nebraska. I have been a part of the lesbian/gay/bi/trans community for almost 16 years now.

I have been reflecting on the past 15 years of my life. Years in which I have been able to be an active member of the community, which I will always call home. Yes, in my heart, Lincoln will always be home.

I came here one wintry day in December 1982. I came running away from the end of my first lesbian relationship. I got to Lincoln and, within a very short time, I knew I had found a place where I could live my life as an open lesbian.

I remember The Office Lounge, The Sanctuary, The Alternative in Lincoln and going to the Stage Door in Omaha. Yes, all of these bars are gone and only one of them is still the site of a gay/lesbian bar today.

I have worked with many of the organizations and groups in Lincoln and a few in Omaha: The Coalition, PFLAG, Wesleyan Student Group, *The New Voice*, NAP, LLL, Womyn's Journal Advocate, and SAGE just to name a few.

I served on boards, took photos, and helped organize.

I have seen the impact AIDS has had on our community and all the work many of us have done over the past 10+ years. I have lost some of my closest friends to this disease and many others to cancer and even suicide.

I have seen the good things too. Groups and the *New Voice* surviving over 10 years. I have made some of the greatest friends in my life during the chapter of my life. I have had my share of relationships during this time, but I made friendships which will last a lifetime.

I am moving to be closer to my family and help them at this time. I am looking forward to finding the PhD program which is right for me. Also, I plan to have a book published within the next few years.

PERSONAL COACHING: DECIDING TO WIN

"If you always do what you've always done, then you'll always have what you've always had." This anonymous quote sadly sums up the way most of us live out our lives, day-by-day putting one foot in front of the other, hoping that by some divine intervention, our lives tomorrow will be miraculously improved, even though we're doing nothing today to change the way we live.

What if we could learn to live our lives differently? — More productively? What if we began to live every day with excellence, accomplishing our goals and achieving the successes we have hoped for? What if we made the decision to DECIDE TO WIN.

During the past several years a new profession known as *personal coaching* has been developing all across the country. While the greatest growth is being experienced on the coasts, it is also being observed in other progressive cities and, yes, even in Nebraska.

What is *personal coaching*? Who does it? What are the benefits of hiring a *personal coach*? How do I find a *coach* and what credentials should I look for?

First, let me discuss what *personal coaching* is as well as what it is not. When you hear the word *coach*, what images come to mind? Perhaps you think of a football or softball coach. Maybe you think of a voice coach who provides professional guidance to vocal greats such as Pavarotti. Or, maybe you're thinking of the person in your office who was assigned to train you when you first became employed with your company. While each of these images is distinctly different, they have many underlying similarities. The bottom line is that *coaches coach*. Whether their area(s) of expertise involve sporting events, music, or business, *coaches* are in the business and profession of transferring their own expertise in a particular area to enhance the abilities of others. *Coaching* will provide options and strategies for you to meet challenges head-on. You will shift from "busy-ness" to business, from working hard to working smart, and from occasionally meeting goals to a concerted focus on reaching all of your goals.

O.K. Now we have an image of what *coaching* is. Now let's look at what *coaching* is not. It is not therapy. *Personal coaches* work with people who are already performing adequately in most or all areas of their lives. It is not intended to deal with traumas of the past or present. It is not a means of dealing with issues which require temporary or ongoing treatment, therapy or counseling. Instead, it is a symbiotic relationship between a *coach* with a particular area of expertise who mentors an individual towards a clearly defined goal during a specified period of time.

For example, let's say you're a salesperson who wants to increase your sales. You would select a *personal coach* with proven expertise in sales who could act as your paid, professional mentor as you meet a personally selected goal. The *coach* would assist you in defining your goal, assessing the potential pitfalls and realistic nature and time frame of your goal, while providing you with ongoing encouragement, feedback, and guidance along the way.

Another example might be someone who wants to open his or her own business. The

entrepreneurial spirit is calling, yet the fear of the unknown is keeping this person from making the leap. A *personal coach* with expertise in this area could assist this person in formulating a business plan, presenting it to potential financiers, assessing the difficulties that might arise, and provide guidance and assistance through each step toward meeting this goal.

Other examples might be more short-term in nature. For example, an executive may be considering relocating to another city. We all know how difficult such a transition can be. Having someone to bounce ideas off of, and to discuss the various fears with, and to assist in making sure all of the necessary steps are properly laid out would be of substantial benefit in making a smooth transition. In this case, the *coach* could continue the coaching process by telephone even after the move takes place to ensure continuity until the relocation is complete. This type of *coaching* may require only a few sessions before, during, or after the actual move.

In other words, *personal coaching* draws from many allied professions such as counseling, career counseling, sociology, psychology, business, and education, but has a particular focus...to align the *coach's* education, experience and expertise in a particular subject area with the goal as of a particular client. For this reason, it is important to find a *coach* who possesses the type of background required to provide professional *coaching* services specific to the needs of the client. This is one profession where the client does not fit the *coach* — it's the other way around.

There are *coaches* who specialize in planning elaborate weddings or vacations, or who work only with clients making a career shift, or who coach only sales personnel into higher commissions, etc. The key is in finding a *coach* with whom you feel comfortable, and in making certain the *coach* you select has the necessary experience and education to adequately assist you in meeting the goal(s) you have established.

You should expect your *coach* to have a commitment to excellence, to listen, to be friendly, encouraging, compassionate and knowledgeable in his/her area(s) of expertise. You should also expect your *coach* to delay the coaching process until other therapeutic issues such as chemical addictions, gambling addictions, significant relationship dysfunction or other counseling-related issues are resolved via the assistance of a qualified therapist.

So, you're telling yourself... "This sounds great. How do I find a *coach* in Omaha?" One way would be to search the Internet for web pages advertising *coaches* in this area, or you might call Coach University in New York where many *coaches* have been trained. Another way is through word-of-mouth. No matter how you find your *coach*, you need to feel good about the person you've chosen. Interview the candidates about their education, experience, and expertise. Ask them to give you references and don't be afraid to ask them for documentation of their credentials. After all, you're paying them for their knowledge. Be sure they're able to provide what you're paying for. It is possible to work with a *coach* via long-distance or Internet, and in these

situations you might select a *coach* advertising in gay publications in one of the major cities on either coast; however, my preference is to work with clients face-to-face.

I am aware of one other *personal coach* besides myself with a practice in Omaha. Her name is Ruth Bailey and she can be reached at (402) 344-3944. Individuals interested in speaking with me about my *personal coaching* practice, or who have questions about the *coaching* profession in general can reach me at (402) 571-0929. Your first consultation is free.

Remember, "If you always do what you've always done, then you'll always have what you've always had." You really can **Decide to Win**.

While it is encouraging to read support of Mike Orr in "Editorial Comments" in July issue it is discouraging to read "we may not have even thought about doing something... until someone tells us we can't. Then we just have to show them we can and will do it." If this were true we would be doing as Gay and Steve call for. We would be out of the closet and putting up a fight for our rights instead of ding all the weird things the gay world does. These alienate the public from whom we need support.

The NV form and support organizations are indispensable for controversies like these. Let's all make them work in hope of reaching better understanding among ourselves. Thanks to NV for doing such a great job recently.

Sometimes, I walk down to my local Oasco drug store and stand in the "Back to School" aisle, and get intoxicated with all the new smells. I know what you are thinking, and yes, I really do need to get a life.

The "Literate Poofler gets regular mail" department: A few months ago, I broke down and actually subscribed to a magazine that **did not** have anything to do with comic books (I know, I know, but we all must take baby steps at first)! I decided to have one of the newer gay and lesbian magazines, *OUT*, delivered to my home. Since then, I have been swamped with all of the sorts of stuff (I guess I am on a mailing list now, so I can say I am an actual part of society). One of the mailings was from a company called TLA Video, which offers a selection of all sorts of gay/lesbian/bisexual/ and transgendered films, and not the really naughty ones that you have to hide from your mother (and any potential boyfriends) either. This is a great film. I first saw it when I was living in New Orleans (and rented it from a Tower Video store), and I don't know if you can find it here; but I bet if enough people asked for it, maybe even Blockbuster would get it. So put on your protest sandals the next time you are looking for something to watch! (*Editor's Note: Sorry, Brian. No protest this time. Carla and I first found The Naked Civil Servant at Blockbusters on Saddle Creek about 4 years ago.*) I also decided to take a big risk this month, and try to make one of my lifelong dreams come true. I never knew my childhood love-affair of comic books and muscle-clad heroes with flowing capes and far-fetched powers would bring me to your corner of the medium. You have given me faith in my own tale; I can appreciate each chapter that made me what I am. Thank you again, Brian.

Ettner, Hormones; and Dr. Eugene Shrang, S.R.S.



CORETTA SCOTT KING TO RECEIVE AWARD

Human Rights activist Coretta Scott King will be honored by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force for her efforts on behalf of lesbians, gay men, bisexuals and transgendered persons in the struggle for civil and human rights.

King, founder of the Martin Luther King Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change in Atlanta, will receive the "Honoring Our Allies" award from NGLTF at a ceremony on September 15 in Washington, D.C.

She is, of course, the widow of Martin Luther King, Jr.

Mrs. King has been outspoken on lesbian and gay issues for years and has appeared at press conferences and pride rallies throughout the country.

She has often spoken of the lesbians and gay men who were involved in the civil rights movement all throughout its history, notably Bayard Rustin, the organizer of the famous 1963 March on Washington, at which Dr. King gave his famous "I Have a Dream" speech.

Most recently, she has spoken in support of legislation in Congress that would make it illegal to fire someone on the basis of sexual orientation. That legislation is still pending in Congress.

BLACK LEADERSHIP FORUM

BOARD MEMBER DIES

The National Black Lesbian and Gay Leadership Forum is mourning the loss of board member Joan Fountain, who passed away last July 21.

Her life will be celebrated at the Forum's 1998 Conference in Washington, D.C. A meeting room will be dedicated in her name.

Joan was the author of the book *Nothing Bad Happens, Ever*, in which she describes her life as an incest survivor who lost 250 pounds and overcame addictions to become a successful professional trainer and top business consultant.

As a consultant, she provided consultation and training to The Westinghouse Corporation, American Airlines, GTE, AT&T, and other Fortune 500 corporations. A popular keynote speaker, Joan appeared as the guest of national syndicated television talk show hosts Oprah Winfrey, Phil Donahue, Faith Daniels, Sally Jesse Rafael, and Montel Williams.

"Our thoughts and prayers are with Joan's partner Joy Barnes, a Board member on the forum, and with Joan's family," said Stephen Oxendine, Chairman of the National Board of Directors. "Joan epitomized the spirit of courage. She inspired many of us with her strength, energy and tenacity. She will be greatly missed."

"NOW" IS NOW TRANSGENDER INCLUSIVE

After three years of ongoing debate, and a final four days of intense dialogue, the National Organization for Women has passed a transgender inclusion resolution at its national conference.

"This was a landmark resolution whose time has clearly come... It's not just the resolution, but the acknowledgment that the transgender community is today's cutting edge. Transgender people are now doing the pioneering work in exposing artificial constructs of gender and breaking down the stereotypes and barriers which divide us all," said NOW Action Vice President and longtime activist Rosemary Dempsey.

The resolution states that NOW encourages education and dialogue within its organization and others on gender and sex stereotypes including those who are transgendered and transsexual.

DAMRON DOES EUROPE

For almost 34 years, gay and lesbian travelers have depended on Damron travel guides for, what it calls, the most comprehensive and up-to-date information in North America.

AFTER CUNANAN, FIVE SERIAL MURDERERS STILL AT LARGE

While the threat of Andrew Cunanan went away at the end of July, many wonder if law enforcement will step up efforts to find five serial killers of gay men and transgender people still at large in the United States.

In Atlanta, at least six male-to-female transgender people have been shot dead since 1987. Since 1991, six gay men have been murdered and dismembered in the New York area. In Denver, four gay men have been stabbed to death. In Virginia, nine African-American male-to-female transgender people have been found dead.

"OUT" AND ABOUT ON TV

The Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation says that the new 1997 fall television lineup includes a record, 30 lesbian, gay and bisexual characters.

This 23% increase, compared to the historic 1996 fall lineup, is the result of three characters introduced during the 96-97 year and four new characters this fall.

The four new roles include actor Bill Broctrup, who also played gay characters on Steven Bochco's *NYPD Blue* and *Public Morals*. He will portray a receptionist on ABC's *Total Security*.

On NBC, Veronica's Closet, starring Kirstie Alley, will introduce Joshua, played by Wallace Langham. While closeted during the season opener, sources tell GLAAD that he will soon bust out.

Head Over Heels on UPN will feature recurring Ellen actor Patrick Bristow as Ian, a celibate bisexual.

And on Fox's 413 Hope Street, Karime Prince will portray Melvin, a flamboyantly fierce HIV-positive black gay youth.

"Television has been at the forefront of reflecting the lives of the community over the years," said Chastity Bono, GLAAD Entertainment Media Director. "This increase is simply a reflection of characters signaling America's increasing appreciation of the lesbian, gay and bisexual community as part of their lives."

413 Hope Street's Melvin is only the second gay character of color currently on primetime TV. He will share that distinction with Michael Boatman's "Carter" character on the ABC sitcom *Spin City*.





Bare Images Productions under the direction of Amy Marie Meek produced a premier pageant with the 1997 International Ms. Leather Competition. This is the third year that Bare Images has produced the prestigious IMsL contest and each year is smoother and more enjoyable than the last.

Beginning with the well choreographed opening number, which featured all eleven competitors along with eight former IMsL titleholders, through the contestant speeches and the fantasies, the workshops, the judging, and all the related events, IMsL went like a smooth oiled machine.

Hundreds of contestants, spectators and shoppers crowded the luxurious Honalei Hotel in San Diego as the competition for the title of International Ms. Leather began with individual interviews by the panel of judges, which included American Leatherwoman 1997 Leslie Anderson, International Ms. Deaf Leather Cool Cat, International Mr. Leather 1997 Kevin Cwayna, Chief Judge of IML Thom Dombkowski, Sadist Stephanie Locke, Founder of International Ms. Leather Dr. Gayle Rubin, Daddy of the Year Alan Selby, and from SKINTWO Online Lisa Sherman.

The eleven contestants came from across the country to compete: From San Diego, Bobbi lei d'courage, Ms. San Diego Leatherwoman 1997; Schelli Dillmann, Ms. Baltimore Eagle 1997; Beth Downey, Ms. Golden Gate Leather 1997-98; Sharon Kleinman, Ms. Santa Clara Country

Leather 1997; Diva Marie, Ms. New Mexico Leather 1997; Karen Matroni, Ms. Florida Leather and Ms. Florida Olympus Leather 1997; Mistress Kendra McClain, Ms. Leather Pride Indiana 1996; Tammy Resnick, Ms. Pittsburgh Leather; Victoria Rose, Ms. Alameda County Leather; Lisa Weiszmilller, Ms. Fallen Angels Leather '97; and Genelle Moore of Lincoln, Nebraska, who had never competed for a leather title before.

The credentials of the women competing for the title were impressive and they brought incredibly creative fantasies to the stage. One contestant presented a Xena: Warrior Princess Fantasy while another did a surrealistic fantasy of seduction by a faceless, formless spirit. Another contestant played the role of Samson seduced by Delilah while another portrayed a cat burglar with victims who were less than intimidated. A very creative fantasy featured the contestant as the master musician playing exotic music on living, breathing instruments. By contrast Genelle's fantasy was simple and straight forward — an adolescent late for class rebelling against the teacher's threats and being transformed into the dominant person in the relationship. The simple plot was choreographed to perfection, with Genelle's control of her muscular body making each move into a leather ballet. When the blade of a switchblade flashed into view, there was a barely audible gasp from the audience who were then held entranced as Genelle passed the blade before their eyes. Genelle's commanding

stage presence was incredible but she won the hearts of the judges and the audience with her smile of utter delight as she acted out her fantasy. She was not trying to impress or intimidate — she was having fun! And at the end of the evening, Genelle proved that she had won over the judges as she took her place on the center platform at IMsL 1997. First runner-up was Lisa Weiszmilller, second runner-up was Diva Marie.

After the competition, Genelle talked about her decision to compete for an international title when she had never competed before. Genelle told of her older brother, Ron Moore, who, in 1982, was the first African American to be named International Mr. Leather. Ron had lived in Lincoln for much of his life and was a founding member of Metropolitan Community Church of Omaha, but had then moved to Denver where he was a vital force in the Leather community. Ron returned to Lincoln when his health began to fail, and had lived with Genelle until the time of his death last year. Genelle has felt Ron's spirit with her since his death and knew that he would be with her as she competed. With winning the title of International Genelle Moore and Ron Moore have carved out a place in our leather history as the only brother and sister to have ever won international leather titles.

Genelle and her partner Kathy reside in Lincoln, where they are members of the Female Leather Exchange (FLEX) and Kathy is the lead singer of the popular band Alias Jane.



GI GROUP MEETS WITH LOCAL PAPER

"Working With The Media"

Our local gay community reached a new milestone last month in a closed-door meeting with staff of the *GI Independent*. Todd Ruhter and I spent over an hour discussing the Independent's past and future coverage of gay issues with the Independent's news editor Jeff Funk and gay-friendly Renee Ricketts-Hansen. I would not presume to speak for Jeff, but I assume that the meeting was not as enjoyable for him as it was for Todd and me but I commend him for surviving his first crash course in gay education. Although he was visibly nervous when Todd and I first entered his office (I knew we shouldn't have dressed in drag) he relaxed after he realized we weren't going to physically harm him or make his life miserable. Renee, on the other hand, had already graduated from the Jill and Todd School for Straighties and so was not as impressionable. With a little work Jeff may be our next proud graduate.

This meeting was the result of a long-term dialogue that began months ago with the Ellen Degeneres media parade which, yes, even arrived in Grand Island. Various local gays including myself had collaborated anonymously with Renee for an article about why we choose not to come out.

The series of articles that ran created more waves than I would have guessed considering none of the participants were identified by anything more revealing than "blond dyke" or "skinny fag." While various letters-to-the-editor sparred amongst themselves, Renee and I continued discussing the issue of coverage of local gay life when so many of us wish to remain hidden. With the arrival of Pride Day, the need for a direct dialogue with the editors became evident when the Independent suggested to us that a few lines on the CLUB NOTES page would be the most appropriate coverage of the most significant event of the gay calendar....Thus the meeting.

The phrase that had been repeated to us by Renee about the problem of anonymity in a newspaper article was "making people real." One of our goals was to explain why many of us feel the need for anonymity and that to make us seem "real" the paper would have to bring the reality of our unique situations to the public. The fear of harassment or rejection by people in our daily life upon coming out is very, very real whether or not these negative reactions would be an actual result. Jeff was receptive to what we had

to say but also explained why, despite our unique position, we would not be able to proceed much further until someone was willing to come out publicly.

While we educated him on the daily realities of gay life in small town Nebraska, he educated us about the realities of running a newspaper in the same place. If the Independent were to continue covering gay issues in the same fashion, someone will eventually challenge the Independent on the credibility of its anonymous sources. It is not just a matter of the Independent needing the name of some unlucky gay to prostitute themselves for the purpose of the media only. As long as we continue to remain anonymous, we allow those people who "disagree" or "disapprove" of our so-called lifestyle choice to criticize without having to answer to anyone. It is much easier to attack a vague unknown (gay people) than it is to attack Jill Liske, Neighbor and friend, or Todd Ruhter, waiter and cousin. (Gee, they seem like such nice people!)

To become a greater part of mainstream Grand Island is the next step for the local gay community. If we continue to segregate ourselves from mainstream society, voluntarily or not, we can only expect the discrimination that we face every day to continue.

Becoming part of the mainstream entails being involved with the media in the same manner as any other group of people with special interests is. All four of us agreed that at some point someone is going to have to take the leap of faith and stand up publicly for the gay community.

Given that this discussion actually occurred is momentous in itself. We suspect that it is the first open meeting between gays and their local newspaper to be initiated in the state of Nebraska including Lincoln and Omaha. The meeting was extremely productive in fostering understanding and respect between the parties involved. We have begun a sort of partnership that has the potential to be mutually beneficial.

We continue to speak with Independent staff regularly. GI has not seen the last of gay news in the paper. Regardless of any other actuality, at the minimum the mainstream will have to face its fears and insecurities about us.

**CO-FOUNDER OF
RIGHT WING GROUP
APOLOGIZES**

A co-founder of Focus on the Family, the largest right wing organization in the United States, has apologized to women, people of color, gay men and lesbians, and non-Christians for the misleading the hateful words that are now the hallmark of the organization he helped to create.

"I apologize to lesbian and gay Americans who are demeaned and dehumanized on a regular basis by the false, irresponsible and inflammatory rhetoric of James Dobson's anti-gay radio and print materials," said Gil Alexander-Moegerle, one of seven founders of Focus on the Family. He also urged fair-minded Americans to, "report the truth about the threat that Dobson and other religious extremists pose to the American tradition... and the separation of church and state."

"Gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgendered people have long been a favorite target of Focus on the Family," said Kerry Lobel, executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force. "Their politically charged rhetoric has become more forceful as James Dobson has increased the organization's reach and influence."

Alexander-Moegerle made his statement at the Gay and Lesbian PrideCenter in Colorado Springs. While at Focus on the Family, Alexander-Moegerle was the executive producer of "Focus" radio and editor of "Focus" magazine. In addition to the apology, he called upon Dobson to step down from political activism. Of Dobson's political activities and continued misuse of his position, Alexander-Moegerle said, "That is un-American and un-Christian."

"James Dobson's entrepreneurial spirit and personal political agenda has turned racism, sexism, and homophobia into a profitable business," said Lobel.

Focus on the Family, founded in 1977, has grown to have 30 state affiliates, doing grassroots political organizing on pro-life, anti-gay and anti-sex education issues.

It has also become a Christian media empire with magazines reaching more than three million readers, a daily radio program reaching more than five million people on 3,000 stations worldwide. It also has television programs and books.

The organization has sponsored a number of organizing projects outside its organizational umbrella, including Promise Keepers. Its annual budget exceeds \$110-million.



IOWA BARESKINS ANNUAL MEETING

In accordance with the bylaws, a general membership meeting was held on June 18 at 8pm above the Blazing Saddle in Des Moines. Members had the option of voting in person or by absentee ballot.

The purpose was twofold - a new Steering Committee was elected and amendments were made to the bylaws.

Newly elected committeemen are Mark O., - Treasurer, Neal B. - Events and Housing, and Paul J. - Membership. returning to the committee were Al R. - Newsletter and Archives, and Martin B. - General Publicity.

Four bylaws amendments were proposed and adopted. The fiscal year was changed from January 1 - December 31 to July 1 - June 30 in order to correspond with the membership year.

The Steering Committee was reduced in size from six to five members with the further provision that the office is assumed upon election.

The Treasurer is now required to "submit to the general membership at least quarterly a report of money received and expenses along with the current balance on hand." Financial reporting had become a problem area.

Finally, term limits of three years were imposed for each of the Steering Committee positions. The intent is to involve new people in leadership and produce a more active club.


