As a child I recall playing the game "Hide and Seek." What sticks in my mind is the disappointment of the game. If I were found first it meant I was no good at hiding. A greater disappointment was to have the "seeker" abandon the search, and call out "come out, come out wherever you are!" What a lack of diligence!

In October there is "National Coming Out Day" October 11, encouraging gay men and lesbians to come out of hiding in their closets. I have attempted to hide my sexual preference in a closet. Like others, I wanted a prince to be riding his white charger seeking to find me, and his kiss would awaken my sexual fantasies and make them a reality. Sadly enough there was no one outside my closet seeking me as I was hiding. No one yelled for me to "come out, come out wherever you are". There are gays and lesbians looking for someone to love; however, few are willing to rummage through dark closets to find someone and then lead them out. Many gays and lesbians move to San Francisco or New York where more people are out. When we look at the population of our cities in the midwest, and as we realize there is one in ten that are gay and lesbian, we wonder where they are hiding. In playing "Hide and Seek", I learned that there was no shame in my coming out of hiding. Some kids came out screaming. Some gays and lesbians come out screaming. If you are hiding, you may believe you must come out in cross-dress, leather, 501's (with the crotch sandpapered) or some other stereotype. 'Tis not so!

"Hide and Seek" is a child's game. Concealing your sexual nature is far more serious. Come Out, Come Out Wherever You Are! Be as beautiful as you are intended to be!

WHY NO COVERAGE OF THE GAY KILLING?

We at the New Voice join with other Nebraskans to mourn the death of that young man who died as the result of a gay bashing. His death was needless--the result of blatant prejudice. The killing, the arrests, the vigil held at the State Capitol are all news worthy events and should be front page news.

Unfortunately, we have received no input from the Lincoln community regarding these events. I could reprint what was in the Omaha World Herald but those stories do not reflect the impact on the gay community. I could send a reporter down to Lincoln to do interviews--but we have no reporters. I could write about the Hate Crimes legislation but I am not able to do the research necessary. I would publish articles about this important incident if I received any. This incident only reflects how badly the New Voice needs reporters. We cannot cover even local events with only the members of the steering committee to call upon. We need the help and

input of our readers. We need you to become reporters and part of the staff of the New Voice.

To the Editor:

The Nebraska AIDS Project (NAP) will soon complete four and a half years of service. Hundreds of people have been involved with the organization in one way or another. NAP has struggled from a beginning effort when a volunteer Creighton University student started it to now when there is a professional staff and a team of volunteers exceeding 100. Tens of thousands of hours of service have been given by people who work with NAP's hotline, test site, buddy program, practical support system, support group program, interfaith network, and emergency assistance program. Others have assisted with the development of training manuals and training sessions.

Financial and in-kind support has come in a wide variety of ways - from individuals, foundations, corporations, and organizations. Sometimes it has been spectacular, related, perhaps, to a major event. Often it has been silent with no fanfare or expectation of recognition. Always, however, whether large or small, such support is appreciated. organized "Fantasy '89" and the Two Wheelers of Omaha (T.W.O.) and its membership who assisted them by providing organizational backup and manpower. It was a huge undertaking which attracted participation and support from across America.

Similarly, NAP thanks ICON, the Omaha Meatpackers, their memberships and the gay community for their support over the Memorial Day, July 4th, and Labor Day weekends. Efforts such as these help bring attention to the seriousness of AIDS in Nebraska and to the urgent need to maintain and even expand NAP's services. Indeed, without the continuous and early help of organizations like T.W.O, ICON, and others as well as the bars in Lincoln, Grand Island and Omaha, the Nebraska AIDS Project could not be where it is today in its development.

NAP's mission is statewide. It relies upon volunteer and financial support from both the straight and gay communities. AIDS is no respecter of persons and all of us are affected in one way or another by this

Recently, NAP has been supported by the efforts of many individuals and organizations in the gay community who generously contributed time, talent, and resources.

Although there is always danger in making lists and failing to recognize someone, a few should be acknowledged who have done much.

NAP is particularly grateful to Dustin Logan and Bob Ewing who produced and disease. My personal thanks go to all who help NAP try to educate and serve. As with any young organization, there is still much to do and much to learn, but by working together we do and will continue to make progress.

I have spoken to other people about this idea, and they have communicated to me that they enjoy the friendship and new openness between men and women of our community. The ability to relate to men and women gives them broader scope, and they find it quite inspirational.

The Emperor also has a mixed Royal Family. We had decided early in our campaign to promote unity, love and compassion for the community as a whole.

We have enough problems just dealing with a straight society without having segregation within our own family. We need each other's support and love.

Another issue I would like to touch on at this time is the problem of trying to get women to participate in community activities. We have had a very hard time getting the women involved in many different activities. For example, last year we had a bowling league. We had a total of six women in the whole league of sixteen teams. This year we set a goal to make a special effort to get more women involved in our league. We advertised, word of mouth, flyers, posters, etc. We did get about eight more women to commit. They never showed for the meeting in August of this year. We even had the bowling alley open a booth at the Labor Day picnic. We only had four women commit.

With this problem of not being able to get the women involved in activities such as these, it is very difficult to build a relationship, to be open to communicate, and to speak for the women in this community when they don't share their ideas and thoughts with anyone.

I want to open the door for this communication to start rolling. I am here for the women as a spokesperson to relate the ideas and thoughts you have to the Court, so that we may deal with these things and help whenever we can. We need the people to talk to us. Let us know what your needs are. We need to know if someone is in trouble, That's what were are here for, for all of you.

Once again NAP has turned its back on people who support and raise monies for them. NAP is more than willing to take our monies and our time as volunteers at the test site, as long as it comes in the back door and is not acknowledged.

If that is the case, then there are other organizations working to combat AIDS that

will accept our support without being embarrassed by its source in our segment of community. We would not want to give support where it's not wanted or appreciated.



THE SECOND MOST IMPORTANT ROOM IN THE HOUSE

Well girls, here it is October, the month which contains, among other things, Halloween. Lief claims that on Halloween he turns into a pumpkin Of course I immediately thought of pumpkin soup, or in particular,

Soup In A Pumpkin (serves 4)

- 1 well-shaped pumpkin, about 5 pounds 1 cup grated cheese (mozzarella or Gruyere is best)
- 1 cup cooked ham, chopped up
- 2 cups toasted croutons
- 2 cups cream
- 1/8 tsp nutmeg
- salt and pepper to taste

Remove the top from the pumpkin. Scoop out seeds and stringy portion. Score the inside of the pumpkin with a knife. Fill the pumpkin shell with layers of cheese, ham, and croutons. Mix together the cream and seasonings, pour into the pumpkin, adding more cream if necessary to fill pumpkin. Cover with aluminum foil and place in a baking dish. Put in a 325 degree oven and bake 1 1/2 to 2 hours, stirring several times. To serve, carefully remove pumpkin from oven, remove foil, place pumpkin on a serving dish, top with the pumpkin lid.

Another favorite of Lief's is a comchowder with zucchini in it. Zucchini-Corn Chowder (serves 6) 3 ears of fresh com 6 strips of bacon I pound zucchini or summer squash,

- sliced
- 1 cup onions, minced
- 3/4 cups green pepper, minced
- I clove of garlic, crushed
- I cup water
- 1 1/2 tsp salt1/4 tsp basil
- 1/4 tsp tarragon

2 cups milk, or better 1 cup milk and 1 cup cream 2 eggs, lightly beaten salt and pepper to taste



WHAT IS T.W.O.? AN INTERVIEW WITH TONY ZAMUDIO

As I've mentioned in other articles, I've always been awed by the Two Wheelers of Omaha when they appear in full dress Black Leather uniforms accented by gleaming steel rivets and chains. What with the recent excitement of Fantasy '89 and the upcoming Mr, Gay Nebraska contest, I figured it was time to find out more about T.W.O.

My first question to Tony Zamudio, president of the organization, was simple, "What is T.W.O.? Tell me about them."

Tony replied that "T.W.O. is a social group that brings together men and women with similar interests in leather and motorcycles, and doing benefits for charity." Tony went on to explain that while T.W.O. is an all male group there is a companion organization called Two Wheelers Auxiliary Troupe (T.W.A.T.) for women interested in leather. For those interested in joining either group, they should first talk to a club member or pick

up an application at the Diamond Bar. Newcomers are encouraged to first become an "associate member" while seeing if there is a real interest as evidenced by attending and being willing to help at meetings, functions, and fund raisers. There is a \$5 patch fee and \$10 annual dues. Only a few associates go on to join the 9 full members of T.W.O. and the founding member of T.W.A.T.

T.W.O. does not appear at public functions like the Pride Parade in order to protect the anonymity of its members and their employment. The club sponsors several events each year beginning with the Annual Pig-Out Buffet at the Diamond Bar on New Year's Eve. This free buffet is T.W.O.'s way of saying thanks to the Diamond Bar and its patrons for their support. Each June the club holds their Anniversary Celebration and Run. This years run is tentatively scheduled for the weekend of June 8 - 10. The only fund raisers for the club treasury are Mr. Gay Sharon Van Butsel

Nebraska and the Traditional Day Before Labor Day Picnic which was poorly attended this year. The members of T.W.O. were discouraged by the poor showing of support the community despite publicity in the New Voice and sending the T.W.O. newsletter to all local organizations. Tony contrasted this event to the attendance at Fantasy '89 which he felt was well attended because it brought out those not really into leather but there because it was the thing to do that weekend.

of MCC-Omaha, Kelly from Panic, and
Payton from western Nebraska. A high
point of the evening will be the awarding
of the checks for the proceeds from
Fantasy '89 to the three recipient organizations, Nebraska AIDS Project, Metropolitan Community Church of Omaha,
and the New Voice of Nebraska. Mr. Gay
Nebraska is a title wholly owned by the
Two Wheelers of Omaha.

The winner will be required to conduct at least one fund raiser for a recognized charitable organization in Nebraska. He is also required to appear at the four sanctioned club functions and to appear at Mr. Gay Iowa. This will be the first year Mr. Gay Nebraska has been held outside of the Diamond Bar and a large turnout is expected. Lincoln should be well represented since there are two candidates from Lincoln.

The Two Wheelers have been invited to hold a "Black Night" (a Leather and Levi night in a non-leather bar) at the Panic in Lincoln on October 12. (Are you paying attention, Lincoln?)

In closing, Tony noted that no full member of T.W.O. is ever allowed to compete or to be a judge in Mr. Gay Nebraska. T.W.O. also has a policy that when members perform in fund raisers, all tips go to the charity rather than to the performers.

FRATERNITY ALLEGEDLY RESPONSIBLE FOR ANTI-GAY NEWSLETTER

In July, evidence surfaced that the Triangle Fraternity at UNL may have had some responsibility for the mock CO-LAGE newsletter distributed in March, According to a July 13, 1989 "Daily Nebraskan," "In the summer edition of the Triangle fraternity's newsletter, editor Bryce Glenn issued an apology to Triangle members writing. The SPCA (Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Avocadoes) in no way represents the views of the Nebraska Chapter of Triangle and is, in fact, largely the efforts of a single brother."

While it appears that the editor had no

concrete evidence that a fraternity member produced the newsletter, the printing of the apology is evidence of some involvement. A similar newsletter was produced in 1985 that ridiculed persons of color, sex and sexual orientation by an underground fraternity. The mock COLAGE newsletter put out by the SPCA set forth the creation of a COLAGE college course in sodomy, androgyny and stereotypical courses in how to be a homosexual. The newsletter did not say who produced it and the newsletter represents freedom of speech. The UNL Administration will not take action on this basis. If you would like to protest this

AIDS QUILT SET FOR IOWA DISPLAY

People from across the midwest are expected to view a portion of the NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt when it comes to the Waterloo-Cedar Falls area November 4-5. The NAMES Project of San Francisco will send eighteen 24 x 24 foot patches of the quilt, or over 560 individual panels. The display will fill the floor and walls of the Central Intermediate School gum (formerly the Waterloo Central High School in Waterloo, Iowa) and have an emphasis on Iowa and midwestern panels.

Local organizers expect many more panels from across the state made by friends and family members who have lost a loved one to AIDS. These will also be displayed in Waterloo before being sent to San Francisco to be added to the national quilt. NAMES Project founder and Executive Directory Cleve Jones is scheduled to visit Waterloo and Cedar Falls October 31 - November 2. He will

speak on the humanitarian aspects of AIDS at the University of Northern Iowa



and a variety of community functions. He will also talk about the international impact of the quilt, which has been nominated for this year's Nobel Peace Prize. An estimated \$10,000 will be needed for the two-day display and related events. Grants and foundation gifts are

expected to cover a majority of the expenses, and it is hoped that contributions from individuals, businesses and civic groups will cover the balance. John Deere & Co. has contributed \$500 to start the fund. The Hawkeye Chapter American Red Cross, 2530 University Avenue, Waterloo, Iowa 50701 has established a "NAMES Project Quilt" account to accept donations. Between 200 and 300 volunteers are being recruited and trained to help with opening and closing ceremonies, preparing the facility, clean-up, onsite information, and emotional support. Persons interested in working as a volunteer may call Marty Ziemer at 319/235-7154. Organizers hope that the quilt and other activities will have a positive educational and emotional effect on residents who have been opposed to a local AIDS hospice. The county-owned duplex for persons with AIDS is being established in nearby Evansdale and has stirred controversy and threats. V





For the first time, the California Court of Appeal has ruled that discrimination against employees with AIDS is illegal in California. The Court upheld an earlier decision won by National Gay Rights Advocates and the Employment Law Center against Raytheon Corporation for discriminating against an employee with AIDS.

Ignoring the opinions of its own medical staff, Raytheon refused to allow John Chadbourne, a quality control analyst, to work after he was diagnosed with AIDS. Chadbourne died of complications from AIDS in January of 1985.

In February of 1987, NGRA won a landmark victory when California's Fair Employment and Housing Commission ruled that AIDS is a handicap, thus making it illegal for employers to discriminate against persons with the illness.

After appealing this decision, Raytheon was ordered by the Santa Barbara Superior Court to pay back wages to Chadbourne's estate, all attorney's fees, and to initiate an AIDS-in-the-workplace training program for all employees. ▼

LEARNING ABOUT LEATHER

Prior to Fantasy '89 my leather experience had been limited to staring in awe when the Two Wheelers of Omaha appeared in full regalia at public functions and furtively reading a Mercury Mail Order Catalog which came to the New Voice post office box. (I'm still not sure what all those things are used for.)

Suddenly there I was, surrounded by good-looking men and women who proclaim their sexuality with every move they make, and I was expected to interview them. As I considered the prospect of walking up to these total strangers and asking for an interview I realized that insecurities don't die, they just come back to haunt you.

As you'd probably guess, I found that these guests were friendly, cooperative, and like almost all performers, happy to talk about themselves and their accomplishments. I also found that the title holders were indeed a diverse group, bound together by their love for the leather community and their respect for each other.

FANTASY TO A COMMITTEE OF THE PARTY OF THE P

Jan Lyon, the title holder for the National Leather Association, spoke of how she was working to set an example of community involvement and outreach. On stage at the Max she gave a consciousness raising message in keeping with her goals. However, at Registration at the Diamond, it was Jan who had her friends amuse themselves by tearing holes in her Fantasy tee shirt so it was obvious that no brassiere

confined her generous breasts.

Chuck Higgins, the title holder from Arkansas, on stage presented an intensely sexual image that seemed not in keeping with his profession as a candy manufacturer. On stage he seemed threatening and dominant. In person, he was warm and genuine, quick to laugh and to share a friendly hug.

JoLanne Tierney performed one of the

hottest numbers at the Max in a blatantly erotic solo dance number that took her from stage to the top of the bar. Off stage she spoke of her desire to unite the gay and

lesbian community, to get men and women together despite their differences. She was also very clear that she was not into S&M like many of the leather people. Instead she hoped to show that leather does not equate S&M.

Mike Sorrentino, Mr. Gauntlet, came to Fantasy to
promote his project called
Curing the Incurable. He
hopes to raise enough money
to produce a video of the 200300 people who have cured
themselves of AIDS. These
people have utilized holistic
health practices, visualization,
meditation, and relaxation, to
become well again. Mike
hopes to bring this informa-

tion before the public so that more people can be cured. Linda Vickery, Ms. Southeast Leather, showed another side of leather as she modeled a brightly colored wardrobe of leather fashions which she Sharon Van Butsel

designs herself. Dressed in a bright blue leather mini skirt she climbed comfortably into a 7 foot tall contraption of wood, chains, and leather designed to restrain and confine the submissive partner in a



leather "scene". She swung at the ends of the chains and demonstrated how easily she could change position and maintain control. The weekend was a whirl of events and people. Dustin, Bob, the Fantasy staff, and the members of T.W.O. were everywhere. Susie Shepherd, International Ms. Leather, enchanted the audience with her flamboyance and her imagination. Her coming out story, which will appear next month, was a fascinating journey into the development of a total person.

Guy Baldwin, International Mr. Leather, dominated the weekend with lectures, performances, and the power of his personality. He spoke several times of the need for our community to respect diversity and avoid being cookie cutter clones. My interview with Guy will appear in the November issue. When the weekend was over, I had taken roll after roll of pictures, helped put up a circus tent, stared at leather and bare flesh, tried to figure out what all the devices on display were for, and watched performer after performer. I was impressed by the talent of the performers We have much to learn from these men and women in leather. V

WHY SHOULD 1?

October, once more, brings us National Coming Out Day. The leaders of our nation-wide gay community originated NCOD for the purpose of showing the rest of America, and even the rest of the world, how many of us gay and lesbian people there are. The whole idea is to set aside one day - just one day - where every gay person will do something which shows someone that we are what we are. That might take the form of outright telling someone else, "By the way, did you know that I'm gay?" Or perhaps it could be something as simple as writing a check to support the National Gay Rights Advocates, and actually writing the organization's full name on the blank rather than writing "NGRA." which is fairly "safe" and noncommittal.

It is the hope of our leaders that if the rest of our society realizes that there are more of us than they thought (more of us in the family, in the workplace, in church, in school, etc.), then they will probably realize that they've already known someone gay for a long time. With luck, this simple revelation will make others step back, think a moment, and say "Yeah, I've known Joe for about five years, but I never knew he was gay. He's a good guy. Maybe gays aren't as bad as other people say." This could be an important step toward relieving the antigay sentiments that foster violence. Okay, that's one obvious reason why coming out is a good thing. It is an effort with a high and noble cause. It is a chance to do something which will benefit others as well as yourself in the long run. This is what National Coming Out Day is all about: making our lives better. That's what the first March On Washington was all about three years ago.

Unfortunately, the wheels of progress turn slowly. Most people have yet to reap any benefits from the march or NCOD. But, like our Pride Day parades, if we keep coming back year after year, eventually it will sink in to the rest of our society. All we have to do is keep up the good fight.

A lot of folks, however, don't like to join in to make the world a better place. They need something more personal to gain from their efforts. Therefore, another answer is needed for the question "Why should I come out to anybody on this special day?" Well, here's a suggested answer. You're probably all familiar with this scenario: you are speaking with a person whom you know fairly well and the conversation becomes a little more, well, personal. You start talking about the most important people in your lives (and I don't mean Mom or Dad). Your throat tightens. This other person doesn't know because you haven't told him, so do you dare speak lovingly about your lover? Butterflies start doing the cha-cha in your stomach. How do you mention this person who is everything in the world to

you without being too "incriminating?" Worse yet, it really isn't fair to your lover to have to take a position of lesser importance in your life, the figurative back-seat, when you talk to people who "don't know." Whenever you assign such a position to your lover in order to protect the great secret, it is something which might gnaw away at your conscience and produce guilt. Nobody needs any more of that. How can you avoid this? Well, if you are really out and living openly, that's not even a problem anymore. National Coming Out Day is the perfect opportunity to rid yourself of that dilemma. If everyone knows all about you, then you have no secret to protect and you won't have to agonize over downplaying your lover's importance in your life,

There is strength in numbers. I think our national leaders have the right idea. If we can show the rest of our society how many of us gays and lesbians have always been around, then perhaps others will find they have less to fear than their ignorance led them to believe. Maybe we can break down some of those damaging stereotypes. And it will take a lot of us, working in concert, to accomplish that goal. I wear glasses, but they are not rose-colored. I know it is not possible for everyone to come out. Many people risk losing jobs, housing, family, or other forms of support that they simply aren't ready yet to do without. I do not encourage anyone to harm their self-esteem or their livelihood by coming out this year if they're not ready, but perhaps by next year...? ▼





National Spotlight

GEORGIA HETEROSEXUAL SODOMY CONVICTION CHALLENGED; CASE MAY FUEL LEGISLATIVE REPEAL EFFORT

Georgia attorneys are challenging the conviction and jailing of an Atlanta-area man on charges resulting from private and consensual sodomy with his wife.

James Mosely was accused by his wife, from whom he was being divorced, of rape and aggravated oral and anal sodomy. A jury found him innocent on all counts of coerced sex, but convicted him of sodomy because Mosely testified that he had engaged in consensual oral sex with his wife. Clayton County Superior Court Judge William Ison instructed the jury that Mosely's admission gave them the option of considering the consensual sodomy charge. The jury returned with a verdict of guilty and Ison sentenced

Mosely to five years in jail. Mosely, eligible for parole after two years, has served 17 months.

Mosely's case has received extensive coverage in the non-gay press in Atlanta and around the state. Georgia Attorney General Michael Bowers, who argued to uphold the sodomy law in Bowers v. Hardwick, has said that "the law would have serious constitutional problems were it to be applied to a married couple." In the wake of the Mosely case, Georgia gay and lesbian activists are considering a legislative repeal strategy to strike the law from the books.

Sue Hyde, director of the National Gay

and Lesbian Task Force Privacy Project, will work with Georgia activists on the repeal campaign. "We should always take advantage of opportunities for repeal of sodomy laws," said Hyde. "Judge Ison, due to his bizarre preoccupation with the private consensual sexual behavior of adult Georgians, has presented us with the possibility of outright repeal. This development tastes particularly sweet because Georgia is the site of the Hardwick case in which the U.S. Supreme Court declared gay men and lesbians have no right to privacy." W

The weekend events included a rally, a number of speakers, workshops, a major parade, and...the experience of the Ouilt. Friday night, we entered the huge Field House at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. People were streaming into the facility. There were a number of carefully-folded sections on the Field House floor. Spectators were being asked to stay off the area (for the time being) and sat in the bleachers.

One by one, a number of speakers—some locally famous, some just "ordinary" people, some gay, some straight—began reading the names—names of people who had succumbed to infections resulting from the AIDS virus. Most names I did not know...some, such as Liberace and Rock Hudson, were well-known to everyone. Sometimes the speaker's voice cracked. Some announced, at the end of their list of names, "....and my lover" and the name of the person. That, to me, was most striking, because it was so personal to the reader.

Part-way through the reading of the names, eight volunteers solemnly walked into the Field House, and towards one of the sections of the Ouilt. First walking several times around a section, they then took their places and began the slow--it seemed painfully slow, but that was perhaps appropriate--process of unfolding the section. It was a very orchestrated, carefully-planned procedure, ending with that section being lifted up into the air as you would raise a sheet being put on a bed, then slowly lowered to its place on the floor. Finally, the volunteers would walk to the next section, and begin again the procedure.

As several of the sections were "unveiled", spectators were invited to move onto the floor themselves and see the Quilt sections closeup. Names were still being read over the P.A. system. I was transfixed. So many names, so many panels in the sections, so many sections of the Quilt--and this was only a small section of the entire quilt! The panels themselves were sewn with love and commitment. Most were colorful and gave some indication of the life of the person memorialized. Some would make you laugh, and all would make you think. And the whole time, there was very, very little talking by anyone on the floor. Just looking, walking, hand-holding, many tears. Here it is, nearly 5 months later, and I still think about that experience.

H H S REPORT CALLS FOR ACTION AGAINST LESBIAN/ GAY YOUTH SUICIDE

A report just released by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Task Force on Youth Suicide acknowledges that lesbian and gay youth are at increased risk for suicide.

The report, completed in January, 1989, identifies risk factors for youth suicide, reviews prevention and intervention activities, and defines strategies for the future.

"According to research discussed in the HHS report, suicide is the leading cause of death among lesbian, gay, and other sexual minority youth," said Kevin Berrill, Director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force's Anti-Violence Project. "The increased risk of suicide facing these youth is linked to growing up in a society that teaches them to hide and to hate themselves. We welcome this report and hope it will lead to action that will save lives."

In a section focusing on prevention and interventions, the report stated that "mental health and youth service agencies can provide acceptance and support for young homosexuals, train their personnel on gay issues, and provide appropriate gay adult role models; schools can protect gay youth from abuse from their peers and provide accurate information about homosexuality in health curricula; families should accept their child and work toward educating themselves about the development and nature of homosexuality."

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



October 11, 1989, National Coming Out Day (NCOD) is a day for each of us and each of our organizations to take our next step in the continuing process of Coming Out. A call to action, NCOD is designed to encourage lesbians and gays - and their families and friends - to enlarge the circle in which they are "out" about their sexuality and who they really are.

October 11, 1988 was designated as the first National Coming Out Day as a way to commemorate, or better yet, continue the 1987 National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights. NCOD is intended to be an individualistic, positive, affirming and pro-active statement by lesbians and gays everywhere.

Realizing we are all in different stages of the "coming out" process and respecting that right, there are a number of things one might do to enlarge the circle in which one is "out." The following are some suggestions for thought in making your "next step:"

- ▼ Tell someone you are gay/lesbian. (brother, sister, parent, friend,boss, favorite aunt/uncle)
- ▼ Join and actively support, as well as participate in, a local, state or national gay/lesbian organization.
- ▼ Read a book about coming out and leave the "plain brown cover sleeve" off.
- ▼ Put a lesbian/gay bumper sticker on your vehicle.
- ▼ Write a letter to yourself about how you feel about being lesbian/gay and mail it to someone you
 want to come out to.
- ▼ Write a letter to an elected representative, local, state or federal, regarding lesbian/gay concerns and sign your real name.
- ▼ Hang a lesbian/gay poster at your work (NCOD poster?)
- ▼ Wear a pink triangle the next time you go out and tell the truth when asked what it means.
- ▼ Don't "de-dyke" the house or apartment when family or "other" friends come for a visit.
- ▼ Hug your spouse or friends in public.
- ▼ Subscribe to a gay/lesbian publication. (New Voice of Nebraska?)
- ▼ Write lesbian/gay money on all your cash.
- ▼ Patronize a gay/lesbian owned business.
- ▼ Take a lesbian or gay person to lunch and don't guard your conversation or affection.
- ▼ Greet a gay/lesbian person you're acquainted with in the mall, on the street or in the hallway at work.
- ▼ Be informed about lesbian/gay concerns such as domestic partnership legislation, anti-lesbian/gay violence, victimization and defamation. Participate in boycott and protests confronting these issues.
- ▼ Send a PFLAG (Parents and Friends of Gays and Lesbians) pamphlet to your parents and join together.

Being visible and honest about who you are is most important in breaking down stereotypes and barriers facing gays and lesbians everywhere. This October 11th, take your next step, celebrate your being, confront all homophobia and most importantly, be proud of the gay or lesbian person you are.
