Dear Sharon.

The October 1988 issue was dedicated to, among other topics, National Coming Out Day. Your publication is always supportive of community events such as this which endeavor to strengthen the self image and self esteem of the gay and Lesbian community.

Coming out is not easy. It is a road filled with many small steps. While I am not near the end of my own journey, I can look back with amazement at how far I have traveled. And yes, I gaze ahead with anxiety at what is yet to be.

I would like to suggest that The New Voice take a step down its own coming out road. How does an openly gay publication travel further down the coming out road? The October issue carried four articles that dealt with coming out I call your attention to pages 14 & 15 in particular. Page 14 was a full page feature on Coming Out. Page 15 carried an ad for subscriptions to The New Voice "MAILED DISCREETLY IN A PLAIN BROWN ENVELOPE."

Being a fellow traveler on the road of acceptance I understand the need for plain envelopes, and with homophobia rampant in our society, continued discretion is probably appropriate. The step I suggest is the removal of the demeaning phrase from the subscription ad.

Your publication and its efforts on behalf of our community are deserving of pride and respect. While it may seem a small and insignificant step, I suggest that there are enough people in society who will tell us we are of little or no worth, we need not reinforce this attitude ourselves.

I wish to thank you and all the other volunteers for your outstanding efforts on behalf of this community. Please be assured that you have my warmest regards and best wishes.

We feel that by removing the word "discreetly" we make this a simple statement of fact rather than implying that there is something shameful in our publication. We thank you for your letter and for your concern and we wish to congratulate you on your successful coming out journey. We are proud to call you our friend.





Subscription Too Steep?

To the Steering Committee:

As a subscriber to this magazine, i'm beginning to worry about the subscription price. Nineteen dollars is getting a little steep, I think.

I would venture to say that most of your subscribers are subscribers because they don't have an opportunity to go to the bars monthly to pick up the most recent copies. If I understand correctly, the production costs are covered mainly by advertisers' fees and subscriptions. But should the subscribers have to carry a large portion of the production cost when people fortunate enough to live near the bars can get the magazine free? At nineteen dollars for twelve issues, a subscriber is paying about \$1.58 per issue, simple because he or she cannot always get to the bars to pick up a free copy.

Subscribers are subscribers because they want to receive all the Issues during the year. They want to read the magazine and keep up on current events. But if the cost continues to rise, I worry that too many subscribers will not want to pay that much for only 12 issues, And if the magazine loses subscribers, then who will uphold the cost of production?

Would it not be more equitable to begin charging a modest fee in the bars? Perhaps 50 cents per issue. That does not seem to me too steep a price per issue, and it would certainly help to more evenly distribute the burden of bearing the production costs.

I realize that this is a non-profit magazine intended as a service to our community. But our community stretches farther than Lincoln and Omaha where the bars are. I fear that if enough subscribers find the cost prohibitive, they will not renew their subscriptions and the magazine will not be able to keep up with production costs and, thus, will have to fold. None of us wants that.


Rules for Being Human

Christmas Memories

is a storybook
time, a time of
sleighbells,
snowflakes,

starry eyed children. Children laugh as they tear open presents. Families congregate around tables overflowing with food prepared by Grandma's loving hands. Old friends gather to sing Christmas Carols, drink egg nog and kiss under the mistletoe. All of us share these joyful memories, don't we?

My earliest Christmas memory is just such a storybook memory. I was about 3 1/2 and I remember walking into the living room to find a doll seated in a child size rocking chair under the Christmas tree. The picture in my mind is of me standing in the doorway, with hands to my mouth in astonishment and feeling a smile encompass my entire body. (If the idea of a smile encompassing the entire body seems farfetched, I invite you to watch a small child laugh. Their face smiles, their arms wrap against their chest, and, if they are barefoot, you'll see that even their toes curl up.)

I have other joyful childhood memories of Christmas. I remember the "bubble lights" that adorned our tree every year. I remember the midnight cantata at church when my father's bass voice rumbled through the church as the choir sang #6 Three Kings of Orient Are. As a young adult I remember laughing with my brother and sister-in-law as we finished cooking Christmas dinner after mom sampled his vodka punch and had a gall bladder attack that put her to bed for the rest of the day.

However, I also remember the Christmas when my husband had to be rushed back to the hospital in severe pain from the spreading cancer that killed him just three weeks later. I remember the Christmas when as my children's Christmas presents were purchased at the Goodwill Store. I remember the lonely Christmas when it seemed there would never be anyone special in my life. And I remember with joy the first Christmas Carla and I spent together.

All of us have Christmas memories that are just this sort of mixture of joy and pain. All of life is just such a mixture, but today my thoughts and my heart go out to those who are experiencing pain and ioneliness this Christmas. My mind turns to the young man we saw sitting outside the emergency shelter waiting for them to start serving the evening meal; to the 14 year old who just found out she is pregnant, and to the old woman who sat alone in her hospital room all weekend calling for her son who never came to visit.

My thoughts also turn to the PWA who will spend Christmas Day alone in his or her apartment; and the young woman whose family forbid her to bring her lover to their home; and to the elderly Lesbian woman whose

wheelchair keeps her from going out in the ice and snow, and to the young man waiting

confirmation of his positive HIV test.

If you, like myself, are enjoying the good things that this Christmas season has to offer, I ask you to help make Christmas memories more joyful for each of these persons. Take a wish and make it become reality. Is there room at your dinner table for one more guest? Is there room in your car to take someone to midnight services at church? Is there money in your pocket to buy one small, special present for a person who otherwise might have none? Are there ornaments enough on your tree to help decorate a tree for a shut in?

The opportunities are limited only by our own imagination and your willingness. Make a new Christmas memory for yourself by helping someone else have a joyous Christmas.



The Dinosaur Threat

Seems like you can't watch a Phil Donahue or Oprah show on the topic of homosexuality without some member of the audience standing up and adamantly demanding to know, "But what about the human race? If everybody's gay, then won't the human race become extinct?"

I've heard it so many times, I've finally reached the point where about all I can do is roll my eyes at the people who inevitably pose that question. That may also be your reaction. Okay, let's all agree that it's a ludicrous proposal. The human race becoming extinct after the kind of population explosion the world has seen? Come on. But these questioners are serious, so I think they deserve a serious treatment and a serious answer. Besides, it's a question born of homophobia, and that is a very serious matter indeed.

First of all, let's look at what prompts them to pose the question. It's a matter of an uninformed, naive assumption, if people are gay, then they don't have heterosexual sex, and consequently they can't produce children. And if children aren't produced to take our places when we die, the population will dwindle until become an endangered humans That's logical. It's also species. the completely inaccurats, and inaccuracy should be explained to anybody expounding this theory.

Point number one: not all people are gay. There are plenty of heterosexuals around who can willingly and happily carry on the species. A very conservative estimate shows only ten percent of all humans to be homosexual. Even if it were twenty percent, that would still leave eighty percent of our species to do the reproducing. That ought to be sufficient to prevent extinction, don't you think?

Point number two: being gay and leablan does not necessarily mean you're incapable of being a parent. We have quite a few gay fathers and leablan mothers in our ranks. Many men and women were involved in heterosexual marriages, for a variety

of reasons, before admitting their same-sex nature and coming out. Gay couples may also feel a desire to adopt or to be foster parents, if only the states' legislatures will allow them. Lesbian couples have been known to seek measures such as artificial insemination in order to have a child of their own. (I think it was Donahue who did an entire show on the issue of lesbians who want to become mothers.)

Point number three: this fear of extinction may come about because if appears there are "more and more" homosexuals. Logically, if there are more homosexuals, then there must be fewer heterosexuals who will produce children. I propose that there are not necessarily more homosexuals these days than there ever used to be, only that in the wake of the New York Stonewall Incident we are becoming more visible. Some twenty years ago (often not even that long ago!), gays hid their orientation. Since sexuality is not something visible, such as skin color, it was something that could be concealed by conforming to certain ways of acting. And it was necessary to hide. Gay bars were raided and the patrons arrested. Our books were censored and banned. And, years ago, it was not acceptable for women to be strong and independent. But then the gays and lesblans got tired of being oppressed, and along came the gay rights movement. Now homosexuals are saying it is important for the cause of gay rights to be visible, to let our legislators and oppressors know how many of us there are. So it may not be that there are actually more of us, just that more of us feel free to finally come out of the closet.

Another census will be taken soon. (By the way, in the interest of showing the government how many of us are voting gays, the National Gay Rights Advocates urge all of us to honestly Identify our living arrangements on the census survey. If our elected officials see our large numbers, maybe they'll start paying more attention to us.) I believe the census will show definitely that the human race is not in danger of running the same course as the dinosaurs. I'd say chances are good that it will still show heavy overcrowding in our cities. Maybe those numbers will reassure those who question the luture of our species. And maybe, just maybe,

these people will finally see that there is one less reason supporting their homophobia.

The Book Report

Lesbian Nuns: Breaking Silence

Here's one this month that's a non-fiction book. This collection of almost fifty personal accounts by women who were once Catholic nuns, and a few who still are, tells stories of inner struggles and courage.

"Breaking silence" refers, of course, to these women telling their truths of love between women in the convents, despite the official denunciation of the Church. But it also refers to a period of time called Silence during which members of the convent must not speak and should spend their time in prayer. Some nuns found it unendurable keeping themselves from speaking to those they loved even during this restricted period. Breaking Silence was an infraction of convent rules that had to be confessed to the Mother Superior.

As they entered a convent, postulates and novices were warned against developing "particular friendships." However, the meaning of this term was never fully explained, so many of the girls were never sure just what it was they were supposed to avoid. Perhaps the superiors thought they might plant a seed of an idea if they went into too much detail. If any two novices or nuns were observed developing a closed friendship, the Mother Superior felt it her duty to see the two women stayed separated.

The Women writing these stories cover not only the emergence of their

affectional and sexual feelings, but also issues of racial, class, and cultural differences within the convent cloister. They speak of their reasons for entering: love of God, the only chance for further education which they otherwise couldn't afford, the chance to live and work in an environment filled mainly with other women, and the influence of a nun teacher in their adolescent school days. Some of their reasons for leaving: the self-discovery of their sexuality, the feeling that the Church was still actively suppressing and oppressing women, and some were asked to leave after they were caught in a "particular friendship."

It surprised me to see a common theme of anger emerge from the majority of their stories. Anger seemed sometimes directed at families, or at some convent rules and the policies of church leaders. They also wrote of the difficulty some of them had readjusting to life in the secular world.

All the stories are told in the first person voice, as befits a personal account. That gives a better feel for the struggle each woman had with her identity. There are some elements in these accounts we can all recognize as our own experiences, too: feelings of being different, of being discriminated against, and good feelings of working in an all-woman environment and helping others. This is a good, interesting book to pick up if you've only got fifteen minutes a day for reading or want to pollsh off a chapter as you hop into bed for the night.

The Second Most Important Room in the House

Well girls, here it is December, and hopefully we have got most of our holiday shopping finished. Around here it is time to start thinking about a New Year's Eve celebration.

I called my friend, Dot Matrix, who works in the computer department and she and I are going to host a small gathering to start the New Year off in style. We're inviting all the friends we met during the year. Luke Warme, Chuck Wagon, Barb Wire, Sharon Sharalike, Chester Drawers, Ertha Quake, and, of course, Dee Cupp.

Here's an interesting variation of the perennial favorite called SPICED POPCORN.

Combine the following ingredients and melt over a low fire; if you have a fireplace, place these in a fireproof pot and melt next to the hearth.

- 6 Tbl butter (3/4 of a stick)
- 3 Tbl minced green onion tops
- 2 Tbl sesame seeds

Salt (to taste)

Pop about 1/2 cup pop corn and when corn is finished popping, pour butter sauce over. Serve warm.

Get some interesting crackers and make an ALMOND PATE.

1 - 8 oz package of ripe Brie, rind discarded, then brought to room temperature

3/4 cup (1 1/2 sticks) butter, room temperature

1/2 cup slivered almonds, toasted

2 Tbl dry Sherry

1/4 tsp dried thyme

Whip all ingredients together. Spoon into cheese crock, cover and chill. Chill at least 8 hours, or as long as a few days. To serve, let stand at room temperature for about one hour. Serve with those cutesy crackers.

Champagne, on any occasion whether festive or not, is always appropriate; but there are times when an alternative is preferred. So instead

of the usual bubbly, try some GLOGG. This makes 8 servings so you will probably want to triple or quadruple this.

3/4 cup raisins

- 1 Tbl whole cardamom
- 2 Tsp whole cloves
- 1 cinnamon stick
- 1 1/2 cups water
- 1 fifth (750 ml) table wine; red, white, or rose

1/2 cup sugar

1/4 cup blanched almonds

Rinse and drain raisins; peel and crush cardamom. Combine 1/2 cup raisins, the spices and water in a saucepan. Simmer 30 minutes and strain. To this strained mixture, add the wine and sugar; heat thoroughly until the sugar is dissolved, stirring now and then. Serve in preheated mugs with almonds and raisins in each cup.

Note: While any color of table wine may be used, the most popular version of GLOGG is made with red wine.

A different drink/food is a SPICED APPLE BOWL

Mix together 1/4 cup sugar and 1/4 tsp cinnamon. Coat 12 small apples in light corn syrup (you'll need about 3 Tbi), then roll them in the sugar/cinnamon mixture. Put coated apples in a baking dish and bake for 15 minutes at 400 degrees.

While the apples are baking, mix together the following ingredients and heat slowly:

- 3 cups dry white wine
- 1 1/2 cups apple cider
- 1/4 tsp nutmeg
- 1 twist of lemon peel

To serve: place an apple in a preheated mug. Fill mug with the warm punch.

I hope your holldays are a happy time for you and yours and we'll see you next year.


So in this time of need at MCC I'm doing all I can to support the church, i pray regularly. I participate actively and I tithe, I urge you to do the same. God will bless you.

Sister Lit began as a mail order operation, but has now opened a retail store at 2814 West Street. 

NATIONAL SPOTLIGHT



The Smithsonian's National Museum of American History will acquire several commemorative panels collected by the NAMES Project for its AIDS Memorial Quilt.

The acquisition will take place over a period of time in an effort to document the diversity of those who have dies from Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome. The quilt panels will be added to the collection of the Division of Medical Sciences.

Museum Director Roger G. Kennedy, in speaking about the acquisition, said, "The AIDS Memorial Quitt is significant not only as a symbol of those who have died, but also as one aspect of the country's response to that loss."

The quilt currently consists of nearly 9,000 panels. Each of the 3-foot by 6-foot panels -- many created by family groups and friends -- is distinctive in its design, reflecting the personality and interests of the AIDS victim memorialized in the panel.

Since 1981, when the first cases of AIDS were reported, more than 40,000 Americans have died from the effects of the virus, according to the U.S. Surgeon General's Report. By the end of 1991, that figure is expected to increase to 179,000 deaths from an estimated 270,000 cases.

During the coming year, the museum's Division of Medical Sciences, in cooperation with the NAMES Project, will identify and select a number of panels -- based on design, message and gender and age of the individual depicted. The selected panels will join other objects, graphics and educational materials in the collections documenting the medical and social history of AIDS.

Lesbian Conference Planned

Washington, D.C. -- The first meeting to organize a comprehensive national conference by, for and about lesbians, was held here September 24 & 25. The conference is tentatively scheduled for late 1989, early 1990.

The conference envisioned as the first of its kind, is conceived as a broad-based coalition effort to set a lesbian agenda for social, economic, and political change, to increase lesbian visibility and to acknowledge lesbian diversity and common ground.

Regional planning meetings on the national lesbian conference are being organized throughout the country in the months ahead. The first national steering committee meeting with representatives chosen by each region at the regional planning meetings is scheduled for the weekend of March 4-5, 1989 in Raleigh-Durham, N.C.

Gay Rights Attorney Named to Commission

San Francisco -- San Francisco Mayor Art Agnos appointed Leonard Graff, a nationally prominent gay rights attorney to the city's Human Rights Commission. The primary function of the Human Rights Commission is to plan, develop and implement legislative mandates for the administration of human rights programs.

"I'm greatly honored to serve my city," said Graff. "Lesbians and gay men form part of the rich diversity of citizenship that is one of San Francisco;s greatest assets. I'm andous to get to work developing strategles for protecting human rights that will carry us through the next decade."

Jean O'Leary, NGRA Executive Director praised Agnos for his appointment of Graff, "We are pleased that the Mayor has looked to the resources of the gay community for this Commission appointment. Leonard Graff has extraordinary talents and brings a valuable perspective and expertise to the Commission."

Graff has been active in the gay rights movement since 1972. He was the first openly gay attorney to practice law in Washington, D.C. and he also taught at Southeastern University. In 1982 Graff took over as NGRA's Legal Director, greatly expanding the littigation program, and achieving precedent setting gay rights victories in the courts.

Dignity Opposes Mandatory Testing

Dignity/USA, the Roman Catholic organization for lesbians, gay men and their friends, has issued a statement opposing the mandatory testing and possible discrimination against HIV positive candidates seeking admission to seminaries and religious communities.

James Bussen, national president of Dignity/USA, after consulting with professionals in AIDS education and persons with AIDS, called for religious orders, congregations and seminaries to:

realize that an HIV antibody positive test result is not a valid nor conclusive test which determines that a potential candidate will develop AIDS related complex or AIDS.

realize that the test is not definitive and to deny a candidate possible admission to a community or seminary based on this information would be negligent.

realize that testing of potential candidates opens a "Pandora's Box" on the issue of confidentiality regarding who will have access to the test information and the many ways it

could affect a potential candidate's life regardless whether one eventually enters training or not.

realize that religious communities/
seminaries can adopt individual open-ended policies, not "blanket policies" regarding candidates; and that a team composed of the religious community/seminary leadership, the vocation director, the candidate and his/her personal physician as well as an AIDS professional could better evaluate the person's ability to meet the rigorous demands of life in a religious community or seminary program than could an HIV antibody test by itself.

encourage mutual honesty and dialogue between the candidate and the religious community/seminary regarding possible risk behaviors and to utilize counseling techniques when necessary.

establish consistent health guidelines for all high risk profiles, ie. candidates who smoke cigarettes, candidates who have a family history of cancer and high blood-pressure.

Election Produces Mixed Results

results for the gay/lesblan community, according to the National Gay and Lesblan Task Force. The most significant victory was the defeat of Proposition 102 in California, the Dannemeyer AIDS Initiative that would eliminated anonymous HIV testing and imposed mandatory reporting of HIV positive individuals. The greatest disappointments were in Oregon, where a state executive order banning sexual orientation discrimination was overturned in a referendum. and in Connecticut, where AIDS and gay civil rights supporter Lowell Welcker was defeated in his bid for reelection to the Senate.

irrespective of those results, however, Jeffrey Levi, NGLTF's executive director, observed that "this election marks the end of an era of neglect by the President of the nation's most compelling public health Issue. While we do not fully agree with President-elect George Bush on many of his positions on AIDS, Bush has been more engaged on this issue than President Reagan. actively supports antidiscrimination protections for persons with HIV infection, and has had an open ear to those working on AIDS in the Public Health Service."

Commenting on the defeat of Proposition 102 and its impact on national politics, Levi observed, "This is a great victory for public health. It is a statement by the people of california that they will not be browbeaten into accepting expensive and ineffective 'quick fixes' to the AIDS problem. It proves that education of a population can work in changing attitudes and increasing understanding about AIDS. We hope this defeat of William Dannemeyer -on the heels of three-to-one votes against his repressive proposals in the House of Representatives last month -- will return debate to a more reasonable level in California and in the nation's capital. We also believe that defeat of this measure will stop a steamroller effect of copy cat propositions around the country."

NGLTF noted with regret passage of the other California AIDS initiative,

This year's election brought mixed Proposition 96, which, among other things, allows court-ordered testing of persons accused of certain crimes. Observed public information director Urvashi Vald, "While not as farreaching as 102. It attacks the basic civil libertles of those most vulnerable in our society -- persons accused of crimes. Had this required testing of those convicted of sexual assault, etc., this might have been an understandable -- though not necessarily appropriate -- approach. However, in permitting testing of those merely accused of certain crimes, the measure undermines the fundamental American principle of innocent until proven guilty -- and provides a motivation for false accusations of crimes, it poses a substantial threat to the accused's opportunity to receive a fair, impartial trial, particularly in jury cases."

> The vote to repeal the Oregon executive order on sexual orientation discrimination was the source of great disappointment -- "to gays and lesbians and all those concerned with civil liberties," Levi said. "On the anniversary of Kristalinacht, it is particularly sad that the people of Oregon would turn their backs on any minority group that has suffered discrimination." The contrasting vote in the Presidential election --Oregonlans supported Governor Dukakis -- showed, Levi said, "that progressive views in other areas does not always translate into support for gay/lesblan clvll rights."

The returning 101st Congress will look quite similar to the 100th, with one major exception. "The loss of Lowell Weicker -- our strongest advocate and spokesperson in the United States Senate -- will be a tremendous one," commented Levi. "Welcker stood alone at times in fighting uncompromisingly for those who were not represented in the Senate -- all minorities, not just gays and leablans. His role in increasing funding for AIDS, most recently in the extension of federal funding of AZT, cannot be overestimated."

With the election over, Levi said, "some of the most challenging work is ahead of us. A new administration is being constructed -- and we plan to be in on the ground floor in helping advise and counsel the transition teams about AIDS and civil rights issues."

"We anticipate continued discussion and access to the Public Service in administration." Levi continued, "just as we have had access within the Department of Health and Human Services in the Reagan administration. The change we anticipale is greater receptiveness at the political level -assuming the budget cutters at the Office of Management and Budget are not given the upper hand in health policy debates."

Safer Sex for Women "DAM IT, JANET"

Suale Sexpert Reports:

When I bring up safe sex to most lesblans, they make a face like someone just pushed a bowl of cold spinach in front of them. I have a very different point of view about safe sex: I see it as an introduction to sexual variation that will last long after the aids epidemic. After all, if you learn a new way to become aroused and get off like you never dreamed of before, you're not exactly going to turn in your nouveau methods just because someone comes out with a vaccine.

Some safe sex we'v'e been doing all along is "safe' tribadism, using vibrators, bondage etc.

I would like to get to the heart of the least understood safe sex practices: condoms, rubber gloves and the elusive dental dams.

Condoms are the biggest convenience item since disposable dixle cups. Anyone who has ever shared a dildo or vibrator knows how easy it is to pass a yeast infection, let alone herpes or aids, Usually we get out of bed and wash our toys between uses. But with condoms, you just keep them on the night table next to your lubricant, and roll one right on your own rubber ducky. When you switch the toy into another orifice, you simply strip off that condom and slide on another one. No muss, no fuss, no getting out of bed, no boiling dildoes In your spagnetti pot.


