MCC Omaha serves the Nebraska AIDS Project and the community with the Food Pantry. Since July 1, 2009, we have given out groceries to over 200 households and served well over 400 individuals. Each pantry contains enough food for the household for three days and contains such items as meat, canned vegetables, cereal, pasta, canned fruit, snacks, and desserts.

In 2009 we have seen a big increase in requests from NAP for food pantries. Comparing Jan-June to July-today, we have seen an increase of 18% in the number of households and an increase of 35% in the household sizes.



As the Social Acceptance of Homosexuality Increases, Revenue at Local Lesbian Bar Decreases

Remember the Virginia Slim slogan.."You've come along way baby!"?...Well, that we have. Not only have we ventured out of the closet, we have taken off the closet doors. Today, we can

pretty much be who we are without the fear and stigma attached to being gay or lesbian. We can cross the bridge and get married in Iowa, we can be open at our employment, and for the most part, no longer do we have to hide who we are or who we love to please society. We have fought for equality for many years, and slowly but surely, we are getting it. But the question is...who is reaping the rewards?

There was a time when going out for the evening with our partner, meant we were limited to going downtown to either the gay or lesbian bar. Here, we could be ourselves and not have to worry about being judged and not "fitting in." Now, we have

> discovered that we can interlace within the straight population and frequent straight bars, without any discrimination attached. We may still be the minority, but overall, no one seems to care if we are gay, lesbian, black or white. The common denominator, during this period of reduced economic activity, is that "our gay dollars are just as green as anyone else's."

> As a result, here at Connections, "Omaha's One and Only Lesbian Bar", we are experiencing a substantial decrease in traffic and revenue. Over the past 6 months our sales have dropped at least 40% during the week nights, and an additional 30% on the weekends. Keeping our doors open has been a challenge. As much as we strive for equal rights, we are seeing the ramifications, and the light at the end of the tunnel appears dimmer than we had hoped for.





OUR HAPPY HOMES

They say that we LGBTers just LOVE our homes. Is this true? Well, whether we love our home or hate it, I would like to share some ideas with you about how to create a home that brings you happiness. For most of us, we spend more time and money on our home than we do on anything else; but do we end up with homes we really love? Here are some ideas for your consideration:



On some level, our homes reflect who we are and who we want to be: Ask yourself: what kind of environment do you want to live in? What sorts of "things" do you like around you? Do you want something chic and sleek or comfortable and low maintenance? Your home is a place where you get to "play" with stuff like paint, furniture and accessories. Give yourself permission to get creative with it. If you like to mix midcentury modern with Italian baroque, why not? Why not decorate and design your home to express, amuse and please yourself?

Is your house never good enough? Are you constantly spending money on it? Decorating or remodeling your home when you're unhappy is like standing in front of the refrigerator, opening the door and saying, "Okay food, make me feel better." Neither food nor home decorating can make us happy. Plus, if you watch all those home decorating/remodeling shows, you've probably noticed that the media's image of the "ideal" home changes. Continually. Since there is always cool new home décor available, how do we know when to buy and when to chill?

Homes can be places of great amusement, comfort and inspiration. Or they can be "STATUS TRAPS" with all the pressures of "never quite good enough". Many a client has lamented to me that they and their partner spent thousands of dollars on a home renovation project because of a seemingly harmless conversation that went something like this: "You know, ----- and -----'s house looks so good. They just redid their kitchen/ bathroom/doghouse and it looks fabulous...we should do something like that too. Our place is a dump compared to theirs."

A nice home reminds me of that line from the L'Oreal commercial: "Because I'm worth it!" Of course you deserve a nice home filled with beautiful objects...but racking up a debt that will cause you months (or years) of worry isn't what you deserve, is it? Many relationships are pushed to the edge over home remodeling projects; it's a huge relationship stressor. Money plays a big part in this.

Many people think that you need to have a lot of money to be creative in your home. Sure, money helps if you want a new kitchen, but if you're simply bored or want to change things around, moving the furniture, the pictures, the lamps or your "objets d'arte" around is free and can be a lot of fun. Don't depend on bags of money to make your home the way you want it. We all know people with tons of money whose homes are no fun to hang out in (no names, please).

Is your house depressed? An always-messy house may reflect depression. "I just don't care" can be about casual living or about giving up because it all seems too much. If you can't find things and don't have clean clothes or a pleasant place to eat, sleep or hang out, then your home isn't working for you, it's working against you. This isn't about having a "fashionable" home, it's about having a home you enjoy. If you hate to decorate or think you're missing that gene, consider hiring someone to help you...or, if money is tight, ask a friend whose taste you admire. On the other hand, if you don't care about your home and it's chaotic and disorganized, you may be depressed. Talk with a good friend, mentor or counselor. A casual home is a lifestyle choice; a chaotic and dirty home, however, is a problem. Get some help with it.

Luckily, there is no single LGBT "style" for your home, your clothes or yourself: you can be super butch and decorate with leather and denim or you can fill your home with challis (look it up) and fluffy pillows. The most important thing about designing and decorating your home is to be in touch with your motivation for changing things. For example, if you're clear that you want to change your home to achieve a certain result, then go for it. But, your home is fine and you're comparing your home with other people's places and finding yours lacking, then maybe your lesson is to trust yourself, your taste and your preferences. The only RIGHT way to decorate is to do what makes you happy...regardless of what the magazines say. Try this on as your new mantra (cross-legged posture optional): COM-PARISON WITH OTHERS IS BAD. BEING INSPIRED BY OTHERS TO DO MY OWN THING IS GOOD.







Alabama School Reverses Decision

RUSSELLVILLE, AL – The American Civil Liberties Union today applauded Franklin County School System officials for reversing their decision barring a lesbian student from attending the school prom with her girlfriend.

The School System's about-face, permitting 17-year-old Tharptown High School junior Cynthia Stewart to bring her girlfriend to the upcoming March 25 prom, came after the ACLU sent a letter to the school on November 10 demanding that their initial decision be reversed.

"All I wanted all along was to be myself and have a fun night at prom like any other student," said Stewart. "Prom's going to be amazing, and I can't wait to walk in that door with my girl-friend on my arm."

Stewart, a member of the prom planning committee, who personally raised over \$200 for the event and created the theme her classmates chose for it, was told by her principal earlier this month that she would not be allowed to bring her girlfriend to the dance.

Stewart's aunt and guardian, Kathy Baker, approached ACLU of Alabama board member and local attorney Henry F. Sherrod III for assistance after the school board turned down her appeal of the principal's decision. Some teachers announced in classes that prom was being canceled altogether as a way to avoid hav-

ing to let Cynthia bring her date.

"It's unfortunate that we had to step in to remind this school of its constitutional obligations to its students, but we're pleased that they're finally doing the right thing," said Sherrod. "Schools should treat all students equally, and not have a separate set of rules for lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender students."

In its letter to Franklin County School System officials, the ACLU cited cases both in Alabama state court and federal court guaranteeing students' First Amendment right to bring same-sex dates to school dances.

"School's everywhere would do well to take note of this school's decision to obey Federal law and not discriminate against students who want to bring same-sex dates to school dances," said Christine P. Sun, Senior Counsel with the ACLU national Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender Project, who represents Stewart along with Sherrod. "By standing up for herself, Cynthia Stewart has stood up for LGBT students all over the country."

The Washington, D.C., council has voted 11 to 2 to legalize same-sex marriage in the district.

The council will have to take a second vote in two weeks before the bill goes to Mayor Adrian M. Fenty.

Fenty has previously pledged to sign the bill, after which Congress will have 30 legislative days in which it can intervene before the bill becomes law.

Marion Barry and Yvette Alexander were the only two council members to vote against the bill.

No N.Y. Marriage Vote on Tuesday

True to its unpredictable nature, the New York state senate quashed high expectations for a marriage equality vote on Tuesday night, announcing via Twitter that it would adjourn until Wednesday at 10 a.m.

Prior to the announcement, senators had been scheduled to reconvene for an extraordinary session at 9 p.m. on Tuesday. Many marriage equality advocates suspected a vote on the bill would occur late on Tuesday, after senators passed the \$2.8 billion deficit reduction plan.

Now it appears the next likely time for the vote to happen is Wednesday morning, after the budget issue is addressed. LGBT leaders including New York City council speaker Christine Quinn headed to Albany, the state capital, on Tuesday to push senators to pass marriage equality. Earlier Tuesday even-

ing, Quinn told NBC's New York Nonstop that she believed the vote, when it occurs, would be "close," but that she remained "optimistic" about its passage with bipartisan support.

A spokesperson for New York state senator Tom Duane, the lead sponsor of the marriage equality bill, declined to comment to Advocate.com on the tim-

ing of the vote. Duane has previously maintained that he has the votes to pass the bill.

The marriage equality bill passed the assembly in May.

Portugal may be close to becoming the next country with marriage equality for its citizens, according to reports.

Portuguese prime minister José Sócrates campaigned to bring gay marriage to his country, a heavily Catholic nation. Sources tell the BBC that the prime minister, reelected in September, is currently examining how to officially legalize gay marriage under his new government.

According to the report, the new Socialist government may pass gay marriage or civil partnerships into law as soon as January. The country currently allows "de facto unions," similar to common-law marriages, legally recognizing couples who have lived together for at least two years. Neighboring Spain legalized same-sex marriage in 2005 under President José Luis Rodríguez Zapatero, with 66% of the public favoring the decision, despite outcry from Roman Catholic leaders.


