For those of you who are not familiar with the Imperial Court and what it does. The Imperial Court System is an international group of "courts" like our own, all of which have the basic function of raising money to help groups and causes in the G/L B/T community. The first "Court" began in Portland, Oregon, over 35 years ago, but 25 years ago, Empress Jose the First and her Emperor

founded the Imperial Court System and guided it in its formative years. The Emperor passed away years ago, but his "widow" continues to lead and direct the Imperial Court System. The Widow Norton, Empress Jose the 1st, is in her 70's but still travels across the country visiting various courts and helping maintain the goals and ideals of the original court. As a matter of fact, Jose will be in Omaha for a "State Visit" during September. The Imperial Court of Nebraska, like all the

Imperial Courts, is a world of make-believe with an Emperor and Empress and Royal Households working with a Board of Governors or a Privy Council to conduct the business of their "realm." Each Emperor and Empress serves for one year and then steps down so a new Emperor and Empress can be crowned. This crowning of the Emperor and Empress chosen by the membership takes place at Coronation - a grand, gala affair that is all pomp and circumstance, whimsy and fantasy. This event is the culmination of the Emperor and Empress' reign - a time when they are honored by the court and by the community and a time when they recognize those who have served them well during their reign. Monarchs and other members of various Courts will travel across the country to spend a weekend of fun and frolic as they recognize a fellow Emperor or Empress at the various Coronations

Here in Nebraska, the Imperial Court was founded 16 years ago to "advance gay society." My impression is that the Court originally provided a place for gay men and female impersonators to dress in their finest and be themselves in a safe environment. In addition, the members of the Court adopted various causes, including the Jerry Lewis Telethon and MDA, and began to raise money for these causes. With the emergence of the AIDS epidemic, the fundraising efforts of the Imperial Court turned to AIDS related causes. Over the 16 years it has been in existence, the Imperial Court of Nebraska has donated approximately \$200,000 to various organizations, and has scored many other firsts including the first Pride Parade in Omaha, the original gay bowling league, and the first community picture.

All of this history is really just to get to this point in time when the Court has marked another first — naming a lesbian to hold the position of Princess Royale. The first Prince Royale was a woman but the Princess Royale position and the position of Empress had always been held by female impersonators. So this year, Phoenix, with her commitment to diversity, broke with tradition and carefully pinned a crown on my head and named me Princess Royale at the Investiture of the Imperial Court on July 28. Royal also (to the best of my knowledge) scored a first as he named Leatherman Jim Gau to serve

as his Prince Royale.

Jim and I will work closely together during this coming year and will work closely with our mousirchs. I have already held one fundraising show at DC's (Womyn Take Center Stage — a show featuring all women performers that raised \$600 for the American Cancer Society to be used for Womyn's Cancer Research.) And Jim and I have scheduled several other events — a Chili Cook-Off in November, an old-fashioned "Prom" in February, and an Easter Bonnet Contest on Easter Sunday. It is going to be a busy, busy year but also a very fon year. Phoenix and Royal are great to work with and I am thrilled to be working hand in hand with Jim Gau. I think he is one of the most taliented men that I know and I love working with him.

Oh, by the way, last month David Lee from Lincoln asked for my comments about the Imperial Court. I think I've probably said enough, but to sum it all up — I think the Imperial Court is a wonderful community service organization that devotes itself to raising money that it can give away to other groups. Last year we mised over \$13,000 and our goal this year is to give out over \$20,000 in grants to various organizations. I am proud to be part of an organization that works only to help others. As for the "problems" Mr. Lee alluded to, I don't think the Imperial Court has any more problems than any other organization — we just don't keep them a secret — we let the whole world know what's going on, whether it's good or whether it's bad.

My thanks to Phoenix for asking me and to the Board for approving ber selection. Your most Imperial Majesty, I will try to serve you well.

REMEMBERING LINDA WIERZBICKI

I have been doing a lot of reminiscing lately, and at several moments, I reminisced on people, At this time, one person in particular comes to mind. This year is the 10th anniversary of her death. It was on August 1, 1986; a special person had tragically lost her life to the hands of another human being.

Ms. Linda Wierzbicki, a local actress and teacher, was murdered outside her apartment building in a robbery attempt. Linda was more than a teacher or actress to those who knew her at a personal level. When I met Linda, we were doing a fund raiser for the "Dr. Sanguanary" telethon for muscular dystrophy. I knew then that she was special. She was a very special and loving person who gave a lot of herself.

I personally appreciated her sense of humor. She always had us laughing. My fondest memory was when she sang. She sang with a strong but subtle voice. We loved her for her live performance of Billy Joel's "Piano Man." She had her own version and did it as a theatrical skit.

The day a friend informed me of her death still lingers in my mind. I didn't believe him till I saw it in the newspaper. According to the paper, Linda had just finished performing in "A Streetcar Named Desire" at the Norton Theater. She was found "stabbed to death." A friend had gotten concerned and went to check on her. She was killed in her apartment complex parking lot. As time passed Courtney Starks was arrested, convicted and sentenced to life for Linda's slaying.

Others and I were cheated by this man. No more friend to socialize with, no more "rolling in the aisle" to "Piano Man," no more morals and knowledge to pass on to her students. I went to as many of his trials as I could. I wanted to see him get punished. To tell the truth, I hoped to tell him how he cheated me out of a friend.

To Linda-you were more than a friend. You were also a sister. You never let feelings stand in the way of humanity - whether it be friendship or relationship. Those of us who knew you shall not forget you. We have felt a huge loss to humanity. May your spirit live on in all of us.

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WHY NOTHING ON PROBLEMS AT MOTHERHOUSE

Dear Editor New Voice:

By now it should be obvious that the Franciscan Community of Divine Mercy, Inc. and its organizer, Brother Andrew Mary Francis, are complete frauds. On August 15, 1996 the Trustee sold the Franciscan Motherhouse to pay the mortgage arrearages held by the former landowner. Bring to a close a sad chapter of the local Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender (GLBT) communities' history.

Hopefully the GLBT community will learn the importance of credibility from these events. An incredible amount of deliberate blindness by numerous members of our community enabled Mr. Dick McCollough to

continue, far longer than usual, his deception.

Shysters exist everywhere. It's impossible to protect oneself from fraud at all times. However, Mr. McCollough skillfully played the Omaha market, often with the witless support from our community. Outsiders would not fall for McCollough's endless explanations that our community

believed.

Within two weeks after being hired as an attorney for the Franciscan Community, I realized serious problems existed. Yet, not one hint of the existence of these problems appeared in the New Voice or the newsletter of the Metropolitan Community Church. (My principle source of community information.) Even though NAP and local hospitals ceased making referrals to the Franciscan Motherhouse several months prior to my involvement with it.

Obviously fear of lawsuits, bad publicity, and the reluctance to publish erroneous claims factor heavily in their decisions over what to print. The lack of publication concerns me not. I can deal with frauds like McCollough.

My concern relates to the number of people who disbelieved or failed to act in response to warnings issued by others including myself. It's ironic that some people heard stories from former board members, organizers, volunteers, and guests of the Franciscan Motherhouse, and still failed to

All those I warned knew me as an attorney, and knew me personally for the last two years. Yet some continued to listen and accept the phony excuses of Dick McCollough. Many others with much longer histories of working with the local GLBT community testified in a similar manner to no avail. I suspect they also felt (gnored and felt their efforts trivialized. This demonstrates a serious weakness in our community. Too many of us follow the code "If It's Gay, It's Good." When an individual states "I support gay issues." We bestow instant credibility upon the speaker. We don't investigate the speaker's background, prior behavior, or current affiliation. We fail to question the excuses made. Sadly, we often ignore criticisms raised by others of our community who dare contradict the

Fundamentally this shows the depths of our internalized homophobia and our reaction to it. Many deeply fear that lies and deceptions are inherent in the "non-straight" community. We use forced trust, acceptance, with occasional denial to overcome these irrational fears. These aspects are often necessary for many of us to initiate our first contacts with the GLBT community. However, to continue to present these aspects to those who take advantage of us, be it friends, partners, organizations, or businesses,

shows internalized homophobia that needs addressed

Only by understanding deeply the sources of our fears and our reactions to them will we ever, individually and as a community, develop and grow. To clue us into our development we need to listen to those of uswho invested years in our community, who invested the resources to become professionals, and who worked hard to be upstanding members of society. But, this does not entail blind obedience to "our betters." Individually we must develop rational conclusions based upon our personal knowledge of the events and the level of trust and credibility demonstrated by others. Until then we are but sheep, easily herded to be sheared or slaughtered.

I would like to express some concerns regarding the article entitled "HIV and The Omaha Gay Community" in the August issue of The New Voice. First of all, I express my condolences to this anonymous PLWA for any hurts he has experienced due to his HIV status. However, I must also say that your one-sided view of your situation left me a little upset.

I think the thing that bothered me most about your diatribe is that you blatantly accuse people in the gay community as being unable to accept you because of you have AIDS. Have you ever considered that maybe you ostracize yourself? Has it ever occurred to you that some people try to get close to you and maybe you have barriers built around yourself and no one can get through

Please don't get me wrong, I know, as do most gay and lesbian individuals, what it means to be ostracized. We have all been there by coming out. I know too from interacting with different individuals with AIDS that they are oftentimes wedged out of the gay community because of fear or ignorance. On the flip side of that, however, I am someone who is HIV-negative and was misled or misunderstood in a relationship with a PWA and I got dumped. I fell for this person because he happens to be someone with exemplary character whom I greatly respect. This person accepted responsibility for his actions and lived accordingly. I never once was concerned about being at risk of contraction from him However, there were barriers he placed because of his life situation. As a result, I lost someone I considered a good friend and potential lover. have been shut out of maintaining a friendship. Perhaps you are doing the same in an inadvertent fashion. Think about it.

On a final note, if you are meeting people that turn tail and run when they find out your HIV status, remember that informed, mature individuals with solid character and integrity will not run away. Perhaps you are meeting a bunch of dregs who are not worthy of your time. If they are that shallow that they run away, you are better than that and they are certainly not worth it. Try to find some people of higher quality.


to cities around the world, from hotspots to hometowns.

Or maybe you're just a bit like I used to be: most of my life I probably never gave it much thought. Then, I began to do something very disconcerting — I aged. And the more I aged, the more I run into folks with great losses in their lives. It was evident they NEEDED and DEPENDED UPON support from others.

Then it began happening in my own life. My Dad was buried alive in a landslide and crushed but lived. A few years of pain later, he died. Then Mother died. How could the years have sped by so fast! How could I he left alone and feeling so rootless!? As in most instances of parental death, I too was surrounded by numerous kin and the load of my loss and grief was not quite so bitter. Had those kin not been around, I might have had

to seek an outside support group.

I also share with you, however, that the loss of parents in some lives may be no seeming big loss since no real bonds existed except the genetic tie. It would logically seem to me that maybe the AMOUNT of pain created from the loss of parent may be equal to the amount of communication and closeness achieved prior to the parents death. Thus it might be realized that some need no support as their alienation from parents left them unable to feel the pain of loss and they actually had nothing to lose except a genetic tie.

The pain of loss of a parent is VERY DIFFERENT from the loss of your lifemate! It goes to say therefore: the divorce pain is also on this same frequency. However, it also allows into lives some very different feelings like anger, hatred, vengeance, etc. THIS group may be more in need of a support group than those who have been separated FOREVER from their mate.

Then, there are those of us who are presently caring for or who have cared for a loved one dying from AIDS... and what would I have done without that support group around me during those days and the days following my Patrick's death? I don't even want to think about what I'd have done without them. Our beautiful neighbors with knocks at our door to see if we were OK and then gifting us with culinary delights. What a beautiful support group June and Betty became to me! Bit I guess this is what being neighbors is supposed to be all about anyway, isn't it?

So how about my workplace? This is what coworkers are all about too, isn't it. Well, from my manger on down the line, there was empathy and concern for my well-being during those difficult days. It felt good because I was the only gay in the place (at that time!) and many of my coworkers had never know an out-of-the-closet gay prior. Through my time of trial and grief I became a tool in their lives to allow them to become a support group for a home!! Like wow! If there are to be any so-called "stars in our crown" when one gets to heaven, I truly believe these folks will be getting star status. What a support group they turned out to be! And they did it probably without even realizing how important they were to me.

Then there is also the organized support groups and at that time, although it was a fledgling, the AIDS Foundation locally provided Patrick with his rent money; without which we would have both probably ended up on the streets!

Although it would seem logical to rely on family and relatives as a support group during times of trial, we must remember these folks may be going through as much trauma as Pat and I were because of his AIDS. We must remember these folks who really do love us deep down inside and sometimes it takes a while for loved ones to feel strong enough themselves to even provide a support when our lifemate is dying. I guess what I'm trying to say is, rather than judging relatives too quickly when they don't respond immediately, give them time to pull their act of love together. In some cases it may be similar to giving a man enough rope to hang himself, but if this is the truth, then it's good to know.

In our case, we were hundreds of miles from our relatives. It took them time to even fly up to see us as money didn't grow on their yard trees! One by one, they made their trip to let us know we were their loved ones. Also we certainly thank God for Ma Bell and the P.O. during times of trial as they provide the avenues where loved ones can call and write their love and concern. All told, it becomes a terrific time of growth when our straight relatives may bond with us in deeper ties than we may have dreamed possible previously.

What it all boils down to is this: we are all needy and especially so when a mate is dying. We NEED support and — in so many small and wonderful ways. We receive it from neighbors, co-workers, organized support groups, our family and relatives, and, those very special folks we

have chosen to call "friends.

Maybe you've never thought of yourself as being a support group of one, but it would seem to me that for those of who are survivors, it would be a logical step to be a good neighbor, coworker, family member or friend to anyone around us who may be needing a support group at the moment. If they are straight and you are openly gay/lesbian, I do think it would be pretty difficult for them to vote you into ignominy. I know it may be difficult but the truth is that we are truly angels in disguise...IF WE SO CHOOSE to be!! And that's the straight poop from the Poop Sheet!

PROTECTION IN THE WORKPLACE

A report by the Human Rights Campaign says although corporate America is making progress toward fairness for gay/esbian workers, there is a pressing need for federal protection from discrimination in hiring, firing, promotion and compensation. "The State of the Workplace for Gay and Lesbian Americans," looks at the proliferation of non-discrimination policies covering gays, domestic partner benefits and gay/lesbian employee groups in America. 6-48 employers have non-discrimination policies that include sexual orientation, including more than half of the Fortune 500. Only nine states, California, Connecticut, Hawaii, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Jersey, Rhode Island, Vermont and Wisconsin — and the District of Columbia—have comprehensive laws prohibiting discrimination based on sexual orientation.

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VOTING AGAINST CLINTON

I will be voting for Bob Dole in November. I will do so not because I think Dole is such a good guy on gay issues — though at least he is struggling with them — but because I think Clinton deserves to be punished for his treatment of gays. Indeed Clinton has been uniquely and distinctively evil in this regard.

He is uniquely evil in his role as President of the United States and leader of the First World. When he puts his imprimaturs on antigay legislation, he impresses the whole of Western Civilization's condemnation upon gays. No senator, no televangelist, no pundit can do that.

Only the President can.

Clinton has been distinctively evil, because the antigay legislation be has been calling into being attacks gays' very dignity and moral agency, not just our interests and happiness. When Clinton's apologists say that the President has simply been "disappointing" on gay issues, they misrepresent the range of values involved in the President's actions. I'm disappointed when I fail to win the lottery or when my taxes or the price of milk goes up. I'm disappointed when my happiness and interests are not advanced in ways I reasonably hope they might be.

Clinton's actions are worse in kind. In signing Don't-Ask-Don't-Tell into federal law and in craving to sign the so-called Defense of Marriage Act, Clinton has degraded and humiliated gays. Don't-Ask-Don't Tell institutionalizes the degradation of gays in the very instrument by which the country takes the measure of citizenship.

The policy's specific form is that of a shaming ritual by which society designates things, like excrement or pus, as loathsome and abject, as the unmentionable, the unspeakably gross. The policy enshrines the view that within the public sphere, gays are less than human, gays are scum.

DOMA does the same for the private sphere.

Marriage is the institutionalized ideal governing the realm of body and bedroom, hearth and home. In barring gays from marriage and military service, Clinton tells the world that there is no proper place for gays either in the public sphere of citizenship or the private sphere of family life. Clinton's actions establish gays as exiles in their own country.

In protesting Clinton at the ballot box, one does two things. First, by placing one's interests imminently at risk for the sake of what is right, one advances one's dignity, the very value Clinton

would deny gays.

In this way, one acts like Martin Luther King, Jr. and other civil disobedients who put themselves at risk of arrest in order to let their human worth shine forth as a moral witness to what is right.

Second, protest votes aim at the future — the next election, and the one after that. Protest votes tell political parties, "We will not be taken for granted. You have to do better at fielding candidates." Remember that the problem with being taken for granted by someone is not that his enemies will write you off, but that he will. This is what Clinton has done to gays. After getting the endorsement of the Human Rights Campaign, Clinton turns right around and tells the country how eager he is to sign DOMA "to strengthen American families."

For a protest vote to work as moral witness, one needs to tell people what one is doing—friends, political organizations, exit-poll takers. Doing so will require courage. For in general gays have debased themselves for so long at the altar of the Democratic Party that they have lost any sense of themselves and their values. The Human Rights Campaign has groveled under the Democratic table for crumbs so long that it has become a dog.

David Mixner says he is going to vote for Clinton even though he compares his doing so to a battered wife returning to the husband she knows will batter and humiliate her again. Something is obviously wrong here. We can do

better than this.

Still, in lifting our consciousness, rising up from these debased stations, and voting in protest, gays will appear as traitors in some quarters and be dismissed as crazy in others. But that is only because so many gays have been snookered for so long by smiling devils speaking the words we wanted to hear when words were the only thing on the political menu.

Now is the perfect time for gay protest votes on the Tederal level. Substantial national legislative reform on gay issues is a generation off. It will take that long for the cultural transformations now underway around gay issues to sook into the interstices of national politics. As a guide, remember that the federal Civil Rights Act, twenty-two years in the making, passed in 1964 only after it had the support of 85% of all Americans and over 50% of every sector and demographic category in America.

In protest vote, one looks to the future, but must be willing to live with what one's vote might effect in the present. Gays can live with Dole. He is no more conservative than George Bush. And George Bush was better on gay issues than Clinton has been. He wrote antigay legislation out of existence — when in 1990 he signed a bill lifting the ban on gay immigration — while Clinton hasn't seen a piece of antigay legislation he couldn't embrace.

If you want to belp bold gays' dignity and pride in trust, then vote for Dole. Or vote Libertarian — they support gay marriage. Or simply skip voting for president. But if you wish to participate in your own degradation — to kiss the rod that beats you, to prepare the mud in which your face will be ground yet still again — then, yes, by all means vote for Bill Clinton.

MLB PITCHER ENRAGES CROWD

During the third annual "Until There's a Cure" day, an event hosted by the San Francisco Giants to raise money for and increase awareness of the fight against AIDS, Giants pitcher Mark Dewey disappointed and enraged many fans and viewers with a series of antics.

Dewey, a fundamentalist Christian who strongly believes that homosexuality and safe sex. "fly directly in the face of Scripture," refused to walk on the field with his teammates to show solidarity with the fight against AIDS and during the game, wore his red AIDS awareness ribbon sideways, which made the looped ribbon resemble the Christian fish symbol.

Additionally, on souvenir permants players were signing for the food bank, Dewey included

a biblical verse next to his name.

While Dewey is entitled to his beliefs, the Gay and Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation believes he chose an entirely inappropriate forum in which to express them.

In making a spectacle of his own beliefs about homosexuality, he detracted from the overall message of the event — that AIDS is an epidemic that touches all communities, regardless of sexual orientation.

The Giants organization did nothing to stop him and has remained silent in the ensuing controversy.

WHAT KEMP MEANS TO GAYS

Now that Bob Dole has picked Jack Kemp as his running mate in the Presidential election, the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force has released its opinion on what Jack Kemp means to gay Americans.

Dole's selection as Kemp as his running mate is one more attempt to pacify the Christian Coalition and the ultra right-wing Council for

National Policy

Kemp is a Trojan Horse candidate. While he appears to be a mainstream conservative who offers the ticket a focus on conservative economic policies, Kemp is in fact an extremist out of step with mainstream America.

Over the last 15 years, Kemp has been part of the leadership of the hard right, whose agenda is

antithetical to democracy

His voting record brands him as a rightwinger on issues as abortion, discrimination against gays, lesbians, bisexuals and transgenders, and people living with HIV and AIDS.

Even Kemp's arguably moderate views on affirmative action and immigration can be called moderate only in the context of the Republican extremism that surrounds him.

We must judge this ticket by its platform, its

record and its leaders.

The GOP convention platform provides a

ciue: A Pat Buchanan inspired platform that scapegoats poor people, people of color and immorants.

The platform re-writes the GOP's checkered history related to AIDS and AIDS funding by falsely claiming its traditional support for funding for AIDS research and prevention.

It was this GOP that placed serious limits on the efforts of AIDS educators to speak plainly

about sex and sexuality.

This is a platform that, while it claims to support equal opportunity for all, continues to perpetuate discrimination against the gay community in the areas of same-gender marriage and service in the military.

Leadership of the Republican Party is so far to the right that it is chilling. The convention's speaker line-up included some of the right-wing's most notorious spokespeople: militia advocate Helen Chenowith, anti-gay and AIDS-phobic Congressman Robert Doman, and Christian

Coalition leader Ralph Reed.

Jack Kemp is the Trojan Horse and America is Troy. Let's not open the gate of the country for

the Trojan Horse to enter.

We must keep ourselves defended from the forces of the Right.

USA TODAY "GAY COUPLES SHORT-CHANGED"

USA Today's Money section included "Unmarried Couples Face Financial Planning Obstacles", which details challenges unmarried couples — specifically lesbian and gay couples — face trying to protect themselves in a legal system that does not recognize them. Without the safeguards of legal marriage, same-sex couples have to go through many hoops to preserve the right to inherit one another's property, visit one another in the bospital, make decisions about burial and uphold child custody, among others. Many tax breaks and other marriage benefits are impossible for same-sex couples to access.

Financial planners from companies, including American Express, discuss ways the business is ahead of the government in recognizing same-sex couples' financial and legal needs. Since one in four families in the U. S. resemble the so-called traditional nuclear family, financial planning companies realized the reality of changing demographics and responded to those needs. American Express financial planner Sherry Bierman points out, "They're the same products everyone needs, life insurance, annuities, mutual funds, savings certificates... It's not a moral issue. It's a practical issue."

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REP. GUNDERSON CALLS IT QUITS

Rep. Steve Gunderson, a Republican from Wisconsin, says he will not seek re-election, claiming a conservative group had planned to attack him on the campaign trail.

Gunderson, who until recently was the only openly gay Republican Congressman, says House Speaker Newt Gingrich had alerted him that the group called "Free Congress Foundation" was planning to launch a full assault against him — making an issue of his sexual orientation.

Gunderson also claimed that the group was going to make claims about his health and AIDS.

Gunderson said, "Speaker Gingrich made it clear that he would support me if I chose to run. He wanted me to understand the circumstances that were developing before us. I have been informed that these people were prepared to do whatever was necessary not only to defeat me, but to destroy me personally. I have been informed that these people were going to make allegations regarding my health status and AIDS. I have been informed they were going to engage in other elements of character assassination. Let me make it perfectly clear, I am not sick. Rob is not sick. I do not have AIDS. He does not have AIDS. I would go so far as to put my health condition up against literally anybody's in this room. Unfortunately, this is about more than

The 45 year old Congressman says he was willing to fight the negative campaigning, but he did not want to put his friends and family through that kind of turmoil. He added despite Gingrich's support, the House Speaker urged him not to run.

ABBY & MISS MANNERS GIVE SAGE ADVICE

Abigail Van Buren (Dear Abby) and Judith Martin (Miss Manners) both gave nods to lesbians and gays in recent articles. Several months ago, a woman wrote to Abby using the name of Michael Deibele, a practical joking male friend who wanted to come out as a devoted baton twirler. Abby's advice at the time had been to ignore the taunts and keep on twirling. Since then, Michael (who is straight) received numerous homophobic crank calls and the attention of the national media for his "hobby", so the woman wrote back to clear up a joke that went awry. Abby's response is articulate and precise: Not all people who engage in activities thought to be cross-gender are lesbian or gay, and she condemned the "outdated public perception that certain activities are 'masculine' or 'feminine'." She continued "homosexuals are represented in every profession, sport, and hobby, whether they choose to disclose it or not.

In Miss Manners, a gay man complained about difficulty finding an appropriate label for the man he "had chosen to spend his life with... "Love' seems to imply the basis for our relationship is sex." Friend' doesn't work; we are more than friends. "Partner' draws puzzled looks. "Significant other," nobody likes. "Domestic partner' sounds like 'roommate'." When gay marriages are legal, they plan to wed. Miss Manners eloquently replied acknowledging the traditional stage of the relationship. "So you're engaged. "There is a standard term, fiance, for people who plan to marry, whether or not they eventually succeed." In doing so, Miss Manners suggests same sex couples should enjoy the same cultural standards that cogendered couples do, including engagement and marriage.

CONGRESSMAN COMES OUT

Representative Jim Kolbe, a Republican from Arizona, has come out of the closet while facing mounting pressure from lesbian and gay journalists and activists. Since the House passage of the "Defense of Marriage Act", a renewed trend in gay media has emerged which encourages gay politicians to come out of the closet. A July 21 airing of the "Gay Show" on New York's WBAI-FM reported that Koibe and another Republican Congressman, Jim McCreary of Louisiana, were closeted gays. On July 26, the Gay & Lesbian Alliance Against Defamation and the National Gay & Lesbian Task Force placed "A Call to Conscience," a full-page ad in the Washington Blade Without naming names, the ad called closeted gays and lesbians in Congress to "end your silence and defend your community in this time of unprecedented hostility.

Additionally, Kolbe discovered that the Advocate, a national lesbian and gay magazine, would be running a story on him in its August 20 issue. "I'm not bitter about this," said Kolbe in an interview with Arizona Daily Star. "I'm the same person I was yesterday, and I'll legislate just the same way. This should be as irrelevant as the fact that I am blue-eyed, right handed and balding."

Kolbe says he voted for the Defense of Marriage act because he believes it is an issue of states' rights. The bill would allow individual states to reject recognition of same-sex marriages performed in other states.

Log Cabin Republicans, a gay organization, applauded Congressman Kolbe for coming out. The organization rated Kolbe sixth among all House Republicans with a 92 rating.

GAY MEN OF COLOR HIV/AIDS INSTITUTE

The 7th Annual Gay Men of Color HIV/ AIDS Institute will be held August 30 - September 2, 1996 in Miami Beach, Florida.

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
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PRESIDENT CLINTON INTERVIEW WITH GAY/LESBIAN PRESS

He never followed through on his promise to open the military's doors to gays and lesbians. He signed The Defense of Marriage Act. He allowed the Supreme Court to stay out of Colorado's Amendment 2 fight, and he fired Jocelyn Elders. Despite these disappointments, Clinton and his administration have done more than any other to help gay and lesbian Americans. How committed to gay and lesbian causes will he be in a second term?

With election '96 around the corner, Clinton gives "The Advocate" his first and only interview with a gay and lesbian publication since he was elected president. In fact, he is the only president ever to grant a gay magazine an in-depth interview. After almost four years in the line of fire, Clinton agreed to discuss a range of sexually-charged subjects that most politicians try hard to avoid. The following are excerpts from "The Advocate" cover interview with President Clinton, conducted by Washington Correspondent J. Jennings Moss:

What do you say to those gay voters who invested so much emotionally in your candidacy but have felt let down?

We have truly accomplished a great deal during my administration. We have also learned a lot about what we can do—and how to get it done. My administration has taken more steps than any previous in bringing the gay and lesbian communities to the table. I am proud of my record, and it is a record to build on.

I remain dedicated to ending discrimination and to protecting the civil rights of every citizen in our society. I am proud that my administration has more openly gay and lesbian individuals serving in appointed positions than in any previous administration, and their impact, both in expertise and in efforts to advocate for the concerns of gay men and lesbians, is significant.... I am the first president ever to endorse a gay and lesbian civil rights bill, the Employment Non-Discrimination Act. We have opened the door for qualified gays and lesbians to receive top security clearance. I pledge to you that I will continue striving for greater education and compassion, working not simply to tolerate our differences but also to celebrate them.

What gay or lesbian person has had the biggest impact on your life?

Bruce Lehman, Roberta Achtenberg, Richard Socarides, and Bob Hattoy, to name a few, have all made valuable contributions. Uve worked closely with congressmen Barney Frank and Gerry Studds and with Elizabeth Birch of the Human Rights Campaign. Uve had a long friendship with David Mixner, whose advice has meant a great deal to me over the years.

If you had the chance to start over, only this time knowing the extent of the opposition to opening the military's doors to gays and lesbians, how would you approach the issue? What lessons did you learn from the fight?

It's fair to say that I have thought a lot about this and that there are some things I think I should have done differently. I now believe that we needed to build a broader consensus on this important issue before moving forward. Sometimes change comes best when it is achieved through incremental steps.

Why do you oppose same-sex marriage? Is there a chance you could reconsider?

I remain opposed to same-sex marriage. I believe marriage is an institution for the union of a man and a woman. This has been my long-standing position, and it is not being reviewed or reconsidered. I also strongly believe that the issues related to gays and lesbians should not be used to tear our communities apart.

You spoke out against the spate of antigay initiatives that were popular in past elections, yet your administration decided to sit out of the Supreme Court fight on the issue. How can you justify speaking out in one instance and then staying silent in another?

I've never stayed silent on this issue. I have continually stated my belief that those who would legalize discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation or any other grounds are gravely mistaken about the values that make our nation strong. The essential right to equality must not be denied by a ballot initiative or otherwise.

What will a second Clinton term do to fight the war on AIDS?

First and foremost, we must continue the search for a cure and a vaccine. At the same time, we will continue the search for better treatments for people living with AIDS. No president can guarantee success in science, but we must marshal all our resources, public and private, toward this effort. I will continue to stand up to efforts to dismantle this program by the Republican majority in Congress. This program is a lifetime of support for millions of Americans, including many people living with AIDS.

TALKING ABOUT SEX

I was lucky enough to be snogging with a real cutie a few weeks ago. We'd flirted on and off since 1984, and he eventually invited me home for a private rodeo. We smooched, got naked, smooched, rolled around, and smooched some more. After a bit he settled into the butt-wiggling, face-in-the-pillow posture that says "saddle up and ride."

I got the hint and rummaged through the drawers in the bedside tables. I found tissues, cough drops, magazines, an address book, and some interesting Polaroids. I didn't find what I needed, so I asked "Where do you keep your rubbers and lube?"

My little stud pony said the cupboards were bare. Fortunately, I learned to "be prepared" in the scouts, and dug down into my backpack for my emergency baggy of sex supplies. Bronco boy was still bucking and kicking as I bit the tip off the little lube packet and goosed him the slippery stuff.

Those little one-use lube packs aren't cheap (about 75¢ for 1/3 ounce at most adult bookstores), but they sure come in handy. I was surprised that my friend wasn't better stocked for gentleman callers, but I'm glad I had my kit along. I always saddle up when I ride, and I keep my tack in order.

In case I've lost you, we're talking about personal lubricants for anal intercourse here. One day a 4-oz bottle of lube splooged all

One day a 4-oz bottle of lube splooged all over the bottom of my knapsack, so now I keep "single serving" size lubes in a baggy. I've gotten them for free in safe-sex kits given away by AIDS organizations, I've picked them up at baths, and I've purchased them at drug stores, bookstores,

and through mail order.

Mini-lubes come in little plastic "pillows" and in foil envelopes. Like ketchup for fries, it seems to take both hands and teeth and then the whole thing rips open and splatters you. And be careful you don't roll over onto a half-empty packet. Still, there are worse problems in life than squirting lubes.

I usually keep my own supplies along anyway, because I like to know which products are slipping between me and my beau-du-jour. Many lubes (and condoms) contain Nonoxynol-9. Nono-9 is a spermicide with no proof HIV protection. What is proven is that it irritates my delicate parts (and many of my friend's too). "Excuse me dear, can I read the ingredients on your rubbers?" Might douse the flames of passion, so I pack my own saddle bags instead.

There are dozens of tubes available now. Walgreens drugstore on Castro Street (San Francisco) has an entire aisle of lubes and condoms. Everything from half-ounce tubes to the 42-ounce econo-size jumbo pump. They had gels, liquids, creams, lotions, potions, sprays, and

more. Something for everybody.

I use "regular weight" water-based liquid lubes like I-D (Westridge Labs, 1-800-646-2096), Wet (also comes in "light formula"), Astroglide (Biofilm Inc. 1-80)-848-9900) and Kimono Aqua Lube. There are flavored lubes available for oral activities, but they get sticky very quickly if not kept wet with saliva. Keep them away from your butt or you'll end up stuck like Winnie-the-Pooh in Rabbit's hole. Oil-based lubes—Vaseline, Crisco, baby oil, petroleum jelly, axie grease,

bear fit—are not made to be used with condoms. They can eat through a rubber as fast as you can put one on (and they can shorten the life of rubber adult "toys" (oo).

At home use a 4-ounce or 8-ounce bottle that can be opened with one hand. I remember one dome-topped and very phallic bottle that was impossible to open once your hands got slippery. Now I look for "press here to open" tops so I can hold the rubber in one hand and squeeze a little blob of lube into the tip of it (or sometimes I need a little more lube and one hand is busy doing something else...) Lubing the inside and outside of the condom belps me slip inside the condom while the condom and I slip inside of him. Or vice versa. And slipping around keeps me riding harory.

Well, when I timed out in the stirrups my
buckly got his turn to be the cowpoke, too, so it
was good thing I was well provisioned. He may

carry my insurance with me, in the backpack or

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BARNEY FRANK TO ANALYZE PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION AT 9TH ANNUAL CREATING CHANGE CONFERENCE

Barney Frank, the outspoken Democratic Congressman from Massachusetts, will kick off the 9th annual Creating Change Conference, regaling attendees with his views of the 1996 Presidential election. Frank's keynote address opens the conference on Thursday evening, November 7, 1996.

The preeminent national gathering of gay lesbian/bisexual/transgender activists returns this year to its birthplace of Washington, D.C. Preconference institutes and trainings will be held November 6 and 7, with the core conference running November 7-10, 1996.

All events during this 9th annual national gathering sponsored by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force (NGLTF) will be held at the Radisson Plaza Hotel at Mark Center in

Alexandria, Virginia.

This year's conference features the 1st Annual Vito Russo Memorial Lecture on Art and Politics, to be delivered Friday, November 8 by author and poet June Jordan. Jordan is a prolific writer and social critic whose greatest strength is her ability to live what she believes.

The late Vito Russo, a 1989 Creating Change keynote speaker, wrote the critically acclaimed study of cinema "The Celluloid Closet".

Veteran organizer Carmen Vasquez, currently the director of public policy at the New York City Gay and Leshian Community Services Center, will deliver a keynote address on Saturday, November 9. Vasquez, a self-described Butch-Puerto Rican-Socialist, is co-director of Promote the Vote, a national voter registration and mobilization project of the country's 65 community centers.

Five all-day pre-conference institutes are scheduled prior to the core workshops and roundtables of the conference. On Wednesday, November 6, two institutes will run simultaneously: the annual "People of Color Organizing Institute," and "Race is the Issue. An Institute for White Activists."

On Thursday, November 7, the three simultaneous institutes scheduled are "Finding Common Ground: Building Alliances Across Race, Class and Gender Lines," "Youth Organizing Institute," and "Community Centers Laying the Foundations to Create Change."

Two special all-day tutorials are offered: Fundraising Training with Kim Klein on Thursday, November 7 and Board/Leadership Development with Karl Mathiasen on Friday.

November 8.

Participants at these special trainings are expected to attend them for the entire day. Registration for these trainings is not included in the conference registration fee, a separate fee will be charged and lunch is included.

A Strategy Meeting for Statewide Organizations will be held on Thursday, November 7. This day-long gathering is by, for, and about the people and groups that toil in the state legislatures, building networks across their state, county by county and town by town.

A panel of inside-the-Beltway pros will lead off the morning on Friday, November 8 with a pithy discussion of The Next Presidential Administration.

The current discussions of same-gender marriage, the status of ENDA and federal hate crimes law and the outcome of Colorado's Amendment 2 provide much grist for this mill.

Subject matter includes freedom to marry, media, sex and gender identity, organizational development, antiviolence, workplace organizing, speakers bureaus, leadership skills, sodomy laws, and current hot topics and trends in the movement.

President Bill Clinton and First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton have agreed to serve as Co-Chairs of the Honorary Host Committee for the display of the entire AIDS Memorial Quilt in Washington, D.C., which will occur October 11-13, 1996. This is the first time a U.S. president has served in such a capacity for a display of the

entire Quilt.

The Honorary Host Committee for the display includes notable American figures from the worlds of entertainment and the arts, politics, sports, religion, and AIDS research. Among those participating are: U.S. Senators Barbara Boxer, Dianne Feinstein, Orrin Hatch, and Edward Kennedy, U.S. Representatives Nancy Pelosi, Gerry Studds, Steve Gunderson, and Barney Frank; actors Ted Danson and Mary Steenbergen; ice skater Rudy Galindo; philanthropist James Hormel; TV producer Norman Lear, actress Judith Light: Olympic diving champion Greg Louganis: Harvard AIDS Institute leader Jonathan Mann, M.D., M.P.H., country-western singer Kathy Mattea; former "New Republic" editor Andrew Sullivan; entertainer Lily Tomlin; AIDS researcher Paul Volberding, M.D.; The Most Rev. Edmond L. Browning, Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church; and the Rev. Cecil Williams of Glide Memorial Church in San Francisco. We are deeply honored that President and

Mrs. Clinton are participating in this historic event," said Michael Berg, President of the NAMES Project Foundation Board of Directors

"The leadership they demonstrate through their

affiliation with this display of the entire AIDS

Memorial Quilt sends a message to our nation that the U.S. government has a strong, central role in helping us reach that time when the last panel will be made for this Quilt."

Since its last showing in Washington in 1992, the AIDS Memorial Quilt has doubled in size to include 40,000 individual memorial panels. More than 10,000 volunteers will participate in the three-day display, and an estimated 750,000 visitors are expected—50,000 of whom will be school aged children. UFMCC AIDS Ministry has instituted an AIDS Action Alert program via e-mail. Periodically, UFMCC AIDS Ministry receives action alerts from the AIDS Action Council, the U.S. AIDS National Interfaith Network, the U.S. National Minority AIDS Council, and a variety of political action groups and community based organizations. These action alerts are now being directly forwarded to all persons on the AIDS Action Alert e-mail list.

UFMCC AIDS Ministry also sends other articles of interest to those in HIV/AIDS Ministry over the Internet, and responds to requests for help and resources directly by e-mail.

If you are currently receiving these alerts, and have an e-mail address, please send your request your e-mail address UFMCCHQ@AOL.com, and write "Attn: UFMCC AIDS Ministry" in the subject line.
Out of respect for the international diversity

of the UFMCC, there are currently two AIDS Action Alert lists: one for U.S. residents regarding U.S. legislative issues, the other for those outside the U.S. Many of the action alerts received at UFMCC Headquarters concern issues particular to the United States legislative process, but we welcome action alerts regarding relevant issues from other countries and regions of the world.

HOME TESTING FOR HIV QUESTIONED

Nebraska AIDS Project raises concerns

A new test for the AIDS virus recently went on sale in the United States after being approved by the Food and Drug Administration. Home Access Health Corporation of Illinois became the second company to win FDA approval of the test kits that lets people take a blood sample at home, mail it to a laboratory, and learn by telephone if they have HIV, the virus that causes AIDS.

Johnson and Johnson's Home HIV test was introduced in Texas and Florida and is now available in most of the country through a toll-free number, said Jeffrey Leebaw, a company spokesperson. He said the test would be available in drugstores nationwide by September 1.

The Home Access Express test also began selling nationwide recently via a toll-free number. It promises results in three business days. Later this year the company will offer regular Home Access tests in drugstores that offer results in one week. To conduct the test, a person pricks a finger and places drops of blood on a test card and mails it in a prepaid, protective envelope to a laboratory. The sample has a personal identification number.

To get the results, the person calls a toll-free number and gives the identification number People with positive or inconclusive results get the news from counselors who can refer them for long-term counseling and medical treatment. Negative results will be given by a recording although the caller can request a counselor at any time.

The State of Nebraska Department of Health, Communicable Disease section commented, "At this time, the legal ramifications have not yet been determined, and are being discussed."

Rich Santee, Volunteer Coordinator for the Nebraska AIDS Project, recently told bothine operators who are receiving calls about Home Testing that HIV Educators are concerned for a number of reasons. "No telephone counseling can begin to replace a live counselor," he said. "Whether a person tests negative of positive, that person needs a friendly face and an understanding counselor to discuss the results."

Santee further indicated that he feared people would buy the kit and test themselves without reading all the literature. "Will the person understand the Window Period? Will someone be participating in a risk exposure on Saturday night and then take the test on Sunday, not understanding that they need to wait until their body manufactures the antibodies for the virus?"

Santee indicated that other concerns include the availability of such tests to people who cannot afford the \$50 fee, whether or not risk reduction counseling will be a part of the automated telephone message, and the lack of information for demographic reporting.

People are encouraged to call the Nebraska AIDS Hotline for additional information about Home Testing.

AN ACCOUNT OF GALA FESTIVAL V - or "Can't You Just Tell a Queen Choreographed This?"

July 6-13, the Gay And Lesbian Association of Choruses (GALA) hosted the largest gay and lesbian performing arts festival in history! Festival V attracted nearly 6000 delegates to Tampa. Florida, from GALA member choruses throughout the United States, Canada, and Europe.

In addition to the obvious attraction of 6000 beautiful creative people (with fabulous accessories), Festival V featured twinkling celebrities (M.C. Harvey Fierstein, keynote speaker, Maya Angelou...) chic entertainment (Betty, The Flirtations, The Rhythm Method.) and impressive parties (Men Wet & Women Celebrating parties, Black & White Ball, G&L night at the local amusement park...) But the central activity of every GALA festival is concert performance.

Eighty-six choruses and thirty-four small ensembles performed during the week by invitation, including Omaha's own River City Mixed Chorus. Representing RCMC onstage at Festival V were 33 singing delegates plus Director John Bennett, Pianist Ron Guthrie and Interpreter for the Deaf, Christine Peek-Blankman.

The River City Chorus performed to much acclaim, and were further honored with a grant award to commission new work from a local composer (in collaboration with Harmony: A Colorado Chorale). Those are just the facts, ma'mn...now, to convey the feeling of the event here are GLIMPSES OF GALA FESTIVAL V

Sificon Valley Gay Men's Chorus, (Computer Capital of the U.S., from their intro): "We've got the hardware for you!"

Female conductor of a mixed chorus, wearing a strapless dress: "When I amounced to the chorus I would retire this dress after the Festival, a bitch fight broke out among the tenors."

Member of Quintessential, Women Singing A Capella (7 women without accompaniment) from Falls Church, Virginia. "I took an informal survey which challenges some of the stereotypes about lesbians. Between us, we have only two tattoos and one truck.."

Fro Homo Voci of Seattle, Washington - 16 mixed gender singers (lyrics by composer David Maddux directed toward the Far Right). "Get on the clue-bus. This isn't my lifestyle, it's my life!"

Male conductor of the Atlanta Women's Chorus, Atlanta, Georgia "Can't you just tell a queen choreographed this? This final song is dedicated to the lesbians in the audience. And to all you men — if you don't have lesbians in your life, get some. They're wonderful!"

About the small ensemble from Berlin, Germany: "Manner-Minne" performed in European cabaret style. They were about 17 men, dressed in leather and T-shirts, who began with "I'm Just Wild About. Johnny: "They crooned in both English and German about "Johnny," the elusive trick who steals your heart and eventually disappears. Make way for Carmen! The Manner men closed with a counter-tenor performing the famous fan-wielding ana, as the chorus swooned over every scornful gesture...

Finally, about RCMC's technical rehearsal (day before concert!) "Volunteers whose headphones had microphones attached — dykes with mikes — turned heads as they shooed us through the corndors between theaters. We stood on the risers of each stage for light and sound checks and even sang a tad."




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ICON NAMES ROYAL **FAMILIES FOR REIGN 16**

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
