Brokeback Mountain to be Turned into a Play for the First Time

Brokeback Mountain is to be adapted as a play for the first time, with production currently in development.



News of the new version of Annie Proulx's

story coincides with the 10 year anniversary of the hit film, which starred Heath Ledger and Jake Gyllenhaal.

Producer Tom O'Connel made the announcement today that he had acquired the stage rights to the story. It will be staged in London in 2016.

The film famously won three awards at the 2005 Oscars – but was overlooked for Best Picture in favor of Crash. It has previously been turned into an opera.

O'Connell said, 'I am honored to bring Annie Proulx's beloved story to the stage as a new play that celebrates her compelling writing and will bring a new perspective on this heart-warming tale of an unbreakable bond.'

He added: 'I've been extremely lucky in my career to produce plays which challenge, inspire and educate as much as they entertain; the struggles that the characters of Brokeback Mountain go through are still present in the world today, making the piece as relevant as ever. I am very much looking forward to working alongside Annie with a first-class creative team to bring Jack and Ennis' story to new audiences.'

But there is no guarantee – the same producers and promoters tried to revive classic British gay play Beautiful Thing this year but ran out of money. The show was cancelled before it hit the West End and the company behind it went bust, leaving debts behind it.

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ACLU asks Nebraska to list **Both Same-Sex Spouses on Birth Certificates**

Miles Wagner is nearing 2 months old and still doesn't have a birth certificate.

On the day he was born, Aug. 4, the Nebraska Office of Vital Records and Statistics told hospital officials they couldn't issue his parents, Nicole and Brooke Wagner, a birth certificate because the department didn't have forms for same-sex cou-

About a month later, the department thought it had a solution, Nicole Wagner said.

Nicole, the birth mother, would be on the certificate as "mother," and Brooke would be listed as a "friend."

The couple felt discriminated against. Nicole called it "a slap in the face." Brooke said it was a step backward.

"It was almost embarrassing to think that that was a fix," Brooke said. "Like they didn't take our relationship and our marriage as serious as we do."

In defense of the Wagners and all same-sex couples, the Nebraska chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union asked a Nebraska federal judge on Thursday to issue an injunction ordering the state to list both same-sex spouses as parents on birth certificates of children born to same-sex couples.

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
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The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services has refused to "provide married same-sex couples birth certificates for their children on the same terms and conditions as married different-sex couples," the ACLU wrote in court records.

Since the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in late June that same-sex couples could marry, at least two same-sex couples in Nebras-ka — including the Wagners — have been unable to list both of their names on the birth certificates of their newborns.

In the high court's ruling, the ACLU said, birth certificates were listed as one of the many marital protections that must be provided equally to married same-sex couples.

On Thursday, the Nebraska Office of Vital Records and Statistics confirmed the birth certificate form is still the same as it was before the same-sex marriage opinion.

"We continue to evaluate the impact of the Supreme Court decision on programs within our agency," Leah Bucco-White, a spokeswoman for DHHS, wrote in an email.

When a child is born to a married same-sex couple, the DHHS in Nebraska will list on the birth certificate the name of only the spouse who gave birth. The ACLU is arguing that both spouses, regardless of which is the biological parent, should be listed on birth certificates.

Jessica and Kathleen Kallstrom-Schreckengost had a baby in early 2014 in New York, where each was named on the birth certificate. The couple moved to Omaha last September to be closer to Kathleen's family, but they were hesitant about growing their family in Nebraska. They wanted to be sure both names were on the birth certificate to ensure their child's protection.

Jessica said they could drive to Iowa, but options are limited, especially if the pregnancy might have complications. After all, she said, they live in Nebraska and deserve a Nebraska birth certificate.

"I think the current administration here ... is very reluctant to recognize same-sex families," Jessica said. "A birth certificate is a very tangible way of saying this child belongs to this family. They're dragging their heels as long as they can."

The ACLU of Nebraska said the state's actions are unequal and clearly violate the Supreme Court's mandate that requires marriage to be available to same-sex couples "on the same terms and conditions as opposite-sex couples."

Danielle Conrad, executive director of the ACLU of Nebraska, said, "While many of the protections that only marriage can provide are being granted to same-sex couples, we will continue our work until all of the protections are available to same-sex couples and their families.

"Children born to married same-sex couples should not be denied the security of having a birth certificate that lists both of their parents."

The Nebraska Attorney General's Office is reviewing the ACLU's request, said spokeswoman Suzanne Gage. The office declined to comment further.

The push to put both Nicole and Brooke Wagner's names on the birth certificate is tiring and frustrating, they said. But when Miles was born, all of the legality issues faded away.

"It didn't take away from the moment or falling in love with him," Nicole said. "We want to fight for what's right and don't want other couples to go through this."

Matt Damon Clarifies Comments On Actors And The Closet, Tells Ellen He Was Quoted Out Of Context


Matt Damon wants everyone to know he does not believe out gay actors should go back into the closet, nor did he ever say so.

That's one of the things the actor wanted to make clear while taping an interview with Ellen DeGeneres on her syndicated talk show Monday. DeGeneres — who invited Damon on her show to promote his new film, The Martian — asked him to address how his comments to the UK newspaper, The Guardian, which she said were "twisted around." He says they were taken

wildly out of context.

"I was just trying to say actors are more effective when they're a mystery," said Damon. "And someone picked it up and said I said 'Gay actors should get back in the closet.' Which is like, it's stupid." The audience joined the actor in laughing at that misinterpretation; DeGeneres stayed cool and paid rapt attention.

"It's painful when things get said that you don't believe," Damon told DeGeneres. "You know what I mean? And then it gets represented that that's what you believe. Because in the blogosphere, there's no penalty for just taking the ball and running with it."

As The Advocate reported, Damon told U.K. newspaper The Guardian that out actors "take a hit for being out," specifically mentioning Rupert Everett, whose career sputtered after breaking out in the 1990s with My Best Friend's Wedding. Though he seems sympathetic toward Everett, Damon thinks an aura of mystery makes actors more believable.

"I think it must be really hard for actors to be out publicly. But in terms of actors, I think you're a better actor the less people know about you, period. And sexuality is a huge part of that. Whether you're straight or gay, people shouldn't know anything about your sexuality because that's one of the mysteries that you should be able to play."

The controversy may have received more play than usual as it came on the heels of another contentious statement from Damon, for which he half-heartedly apologized.

As Mashable reported, producer Effie Brown, a black woman, made a comment on the season premiere of Project Greenlight that casting diversity was an important factor in choosing a director for the HBO show's project; Damon shot back that picking the best candidate for the sake of the show — and the film they would be making within it — was the top priority.

DeGeneres ended the brief conversation about the controversy by appearing to accept Damon's clarification, adding, "And it shocks me that you and Ben are not gay," she added as a final tension-breaker. "But. If you want to deny it and keep the mystery in your marriage"

Philadelphia Mayor Steps Up for LGBT Rights During Papal Visit

Philadelphia's Mayor Michael Nutter said he didn't get the chance to make good on his promise to personally ask Pope Francis to "end judgment" of LGBT people iduring the pope's visit to his city.

But according to the website for the Philadelphia Inquirer, he told reporters he was sure the pope heard his speech Saturday at Independence Hall, where the mayor raised the issue shortly before the pontiff spoke.

"In America, everyone has rights," Nutter said Saturday.

In that speech, Nutter cited the mentorship of a one-term Philadelphia city councilman who was

gay, and helped launch Nutter's political career. John Anderson contracted AIDS and died in 1983. And then he addressed those in the crowd who are lesbian, gay and bisexual, who he said "continue to fight for equality."

"Keep fighting for your rights. It's a collective fight. And there are many others fighting with you."

Nutter made no mention of transgender citizens, who Pope Francis has likened to nuclear weapons and the Vatican has announced cannot serve as godparents to Roman Catholic children being baptized.

Nutter, a practicing Catholic who is openly pro-choice and advocates for LGBT rights, was named by Archbishop Charles Caput of Philadelphia honorary co-chairman of the World Meeting of Families, which was the primary reason for the pope's visit.

A statement from the mayor on Friday included a letter Nutter said he sent Pope Francis, in which he pressed the pope to re-





consider the Church's treatment of LGBT Catholics.

"We encourage ending the systematic and institutionalized discrimination against LGBT people through the message of love, hope, and acceptance. For the many LGBT individuals who seek the Lord and have good will, we ask that you end judgment of these individuals by those within the Church through teaching and pastoral practice currently in place."

That statement earned Nutter, and Chaput, criticism from conservative Catholic websites which accused the mayor of pushing the "gay agenda." One website went so far as to demand

the archbishop remove Nutter and other "pro gay-marriage members from the leadership team," but those cries fell on deaf ears.

Despite not getting to personally speak to Pope Francis about LGBT rights, Nutter told the Inquirer the visit was "wildly successful, completely successful."

Putin Says He 'Definitely' Condemns Law Criminalizing Homosexuality

Russian President Vladimir Putin denied that his country discriminates against gays and lesbians, in an interview with 60 Minutes.

Putin told CBS News anchor Charlie Rose said he didn't see "anything undemocratic" about his country's ban on what Russia calls "gay propaganda."



Russia enacted a law banning "propaganda of nontraditional (Continued on page 6)



sexual relations" in 2013, basically prohibiting any positive treatment of LGBT issues in forums accessible to minors. And ever since, the group Human Rights Watch has documented an increase in antigay violence and harassment in Russia that it calls a "license to harm."

"I believe we should leave kids in peace," Putin told Rose in the interview, portions of which were broadcast last night. "We should give them a chance to grow and help them to realize who they are and decide for themselves ... do they consider themselves a man or a woman? A female? A male? Do they want to live in a normal natural marriage or a nontraditional marriage?"

Putin's implication that gay and lesbian people are a danger to children is an oft-cited concern among members of his ruling United Russia party, most notably arising when Putin warned LGBT Olympic spectators and athletes to "leave children alone" in the run-up to the 2014 Winter Olympics in Sochi, Russia.

Putin also defended Russian laws preventing gays and lesbians from adopting children, telling Rose that some gays and lesbians agreed with them.

"The problem of sexual minorities in Russia had been deliberately exaggerated on the outside for political reasons, I believe, without any good basis," Putin said.

The Russian president explained that in some ways, his country was ahead of the United States when it comes to discrimination. Putin cited the fact that some states still have laws on the books criminalizing homosexuality, despite rulings by the Supreme Court, specifically the 2003 decision in Lawrence v. Texas, striking down all remaining sodomy laws.

"It's well known that in four states in America, homosexual orientation is a crime, whether it's good or bad we don't know. We know there is the ruling of the Supreme Court, but this problem has not completely disappeared, it's not completely removed from American legislation, but we don't have that," Putin said. (Specifically, however, the laws ban gay sex, not orientation, and have been rendered unenforceable by the Lawrence decision.)

Putin's interview followed an announcement by the Kremlin that he would meet with singer Sir Elton John, as The Advocate reported, with the president agreeing to discuss any issue, including LGBT rights. But it also followed an action by Putin to honor a Russian lawmaker well-known for his efforts to ban "gay propaganda" and prosecute Western pop culture stars who support LGBT rights, like John.

Vitaly Milonov is the St. Petersburg politician who received a medal of the order "For Service to the Fatherland" in the second degree, according to the U.K. newspaper The Guardian. He's also a key architect of Russia's nationwide ban on so-called gay propaganda, as he drafted and passed local legislation first, which became the framework for the national law. The announcement said Milonov was recognized for his "active lawmaking efforts and many years of honest work," including relentless antigay campaigning.

Zimbabwe's President Tells U.N.: 'We Are Not Gays!'

President Robert Mugabe of Zimbabwe took to the floor of the United Nations on Monday to speak out against LGBT rights. Complaining about "double standards," the African leader declared his country's dedication to "human rights" while denigrating efforts to raise awareness about the abuse of LGBT people in his nation.

"Respecting and upholding human rights is the obligation of all states, and is enshrined in the United Nations charter," Mugabe told the gathered delegates. Then he played the victim card:

"Nowhere does the charter abrogate the right to some to sit in judgment over others, in carrying out this universal obligation. In that regard, we reject the politicization of this important issue and the application of double standards to victimize those who dare think and act independently of the self-anointed prefects of our time."

"We equally reject attempts to prescribe "new rights" that are





contrary to our values, norms, traditions, and beliefs," he continued, before barking, "We are not gays!"

LGBT people face constant persecution in Zimbabwe and is often used as a whipping post for the country's economic issues. Mugabe has often railed against LGBT rights, once saying gays and lesbians are "worse than pigs and dogs."

The United States and other Western countries have threatened to cut aid to African nations that continue to arrest or physically abuse their LGBT citizens. In 2011, a member of Zimbabwe's parliament was jailed for alleging that Mugabe's homophobia hides his own homosexuality.

Mugabe has held firm to his anti-LGBT stance, insisting that LGBT people will never have civil rights in Zimbabwe, no matter the financial consequences.

"We say no to gay rights," he said before the country adopted a new constitution. "We will not listen to those advocating for their rights in the new constitution. We say no to gays! We will not listen to those advocating the inclusion of their rights in the constitution."

The Empowered Bottom: A New Kind of Sexual Revolution

How PrEP has changed the dynamic of gay sex, making tops and bottoms finally equal.



Until recently, condoms were considered the only viable option for safer sex practices among gay and bisexual men. When it was discovered that HIV was a sexually transmitted disease, condoms became the zeitgeist of safe-sex culture. Although this tool kept many gay and bisexual men HIV-negative through the worst of the epidemic, the use of condoms to prevent HIV created, or further perpetuated, rather, an inequality among gay men in their sexual relationships. Even within the gay community, the receiving partner in intercourse was looked upon as subservient and less than.

In other words...the tops had all the power.

Sure, many gay men often identify as versatile when questioned about sexual positioning. Even so, most usually have a general proclivity to one position or the other. Generally, some people are good at topping while others make for better bottoms. Yet, when it comes to mutual respect, sexual health, and protection, tops and bottoms aren't, or weren't always, treated as though they were created equally.

"I've definitely felt belittled for identifying as a bottom. As if being a bottom meant being something 'less' in our community," said Joshua Collins, a PrEP user from Phoenix, Arizona. "I also feel like we have certain expectations of someone who identifies as a top and expect them to take control in sex. I've definitely felt like the top was more in control within the sexual dynamic."

A top is also physically in control of wearing a condom. A bottom can only negotiate the use of a condom. You might think that this doesn't necessarily create an inequity. After all, a bottom can walk away from a sexual encounter just as easily as a top. But in the throes of passion when the clothes are off and there are mere inches between "everything-but" and full-on penetration, the power is greatly weighted in favor of the top.

As the bottom partner, my HIV status was always contingent on someone else's decisions," said Damon Jacobs, founder of the popular Facebook group, PrEP Facts. "I had to rely on the top to make sure the condom was used or didn't fall off or didn't fall in or didn't break or didn't 'magically disappear' as condoms sometimes do."

A gay or bisexual man who primarily tops is less at-risk for HIV infection. But this is not the inequality that condoms create. A top who engages in condomless sex isn't held nearly as responsible as a bottom often is when it comes to safe sex, yet it is the one who must physically wear the condom in question. The relationship between gay men, condoms, and HIV can be directly paralleled with that of birth control, heterosexual sex, and pregnancy. And PrEP is to the empowered bottom the same way that birth control is to the empowered woman, including the slut shaming that both parties have often experienced as a result of their choice to take control of their health.

"PrEP is the first opportunity bottoms have ever had to be in full control of our HIV status," said Jacobs. "It allows both partners, in either sexual position, to be 100 percent responsible for their pleasure and protection."

Colton Ferrell is a young PrEP user from Austin, Texas. He didn't think too much about the inequality of his preference for bottoming until he found himself in his own sexual quandary.

"So, I never really thought of there being an imbalance dependent upon sexual position, until one time recently when the guy and I discussed using a condom," said Ferrell. "We agreed to use the condom, he grabbed the condom wrapper, I laid down on my stomach, and we had — not so enjoyable — sex. Something, as a bottom, I've noticed is that I can rarely feel the difference as to if the guy is wearing a condom or not, and it turned out, that in this circumstance, he wasn't, and he actually came inside of me. Aside from feeling very violated and pissed, I was less worried than I feel I would've been, because I was on PrEP, and wasn't as concerned about HIV, while still knowing I needed to get checked for everything else."

Ferrell's experience is just one example of how the one who is at risk is often left without control in a situation of protection. The use of Truvada as PrEP, the HIV prevention pill that is 99 percent effective at eliminating the risk of HIV infection when taken correctly, has the potential to revolutionize the gay sexual experience. Now, a bottom has the option to enter into the intercourse that he chooses with the knowledge that he has taken action to protect himself from HIV, regardless of the top's preferences or agreements. Furthermore, he is involved in preventative care with his healthcare provider and engaged in his own sexual health.

But most importantly...he is allowed to enjoy the pleasures of sex without experiencing any added shame for his preferred position or fear of a possible HIV infection.

"I think I can sum up how PrEP has changed the way I feel about sex in one word: wow!" said Collins. "I've personally never been that adherent with condom usage and I would always feel very guilty and irresponsible. I've had many a time I'd nervously awaited an HIV test result hoping and praying. With PrEP, I don't worry about it anymore and just enjoy the moment. Now I let my sexual partners know I'm on PrEP and I've had some really great experiences with guys who are positive and who I probably wouldn't have approached. I would say I'm a lot more aware of my sexual health now because I get tested every three months."

So what does PrEP mean to the empowered bottom? It means living in an environment where the fight to stay sexually healthy is held on more of an equal playing field. It means less shame and fear and a greater sense of self worth and sexual pleasure.

"I'm a child of the 1980s," said Eric McCulley, a PrEP advocate. "And for the majority of my life, all I've heard about sex is that it is dangerous and that it might actually kill you. So it's nice to not be afraid of sex anymore. And to be in control of my own sexual health is empowering and affirming."

As the arguments over the use of PrEP continue to dissipate and the science and validity of the HIV prevention pill continues to increasingly resonate within the gay community, it is now a matter of accessibility and affordability for those who need it so that more bottoms become empowered by the other little blue pill.

Here's to a new kind of sexual revolution.

Closeted Married Men Are Keeping Relationship Counselors Working 24/7

A sexologist in Winter Park, FL says he could "literally work 24 hours a day, seven days a week" because of all the people cheating on their significant others thanks to websites like Craigslist and Ashley Madison.

"The volume is that great," Michael Rothenberg, sexologist and owner of onlinesexualaddiction.com, tells the Orlando Sentinel. "It's becoming easier and easier to find a sexual partner."

Rothenberg says many of the patients he works with are closeted married men who use the internet to find other guys to hook up with on the DL.

"I've had closeted gay men go on there," he says. "Some people are on there because they're curious, or curious to see if there are people on there that they know."

Considering that a recent survey found 78 percent of Americans identify as heterosexual, but only 4 percent of that 78 percent said they were "100 percent heterosexual," this doesn't totally surprise us.

Relationship counselor Tim Tedders agrees that these days it's

Life Beyond Therapy

Dear Michael:

I am a 27-year-old gay man who only recently came out. I was married for a few years and that was just to shut my family up. My problem is that my dad is a minister and I was raised in the church from childhood on. I used to play the organ every Sunday (no pun intended).



I have found a wonderful boyfriend and am discovering what real love and sexual connection is all about. I can't let go of the idea that God hates me now and that I am now a disappointment to Him. When I have an orgasm with my boyfriend, I feel incredible guilt and shame, like I'm "dirty". Can you help me?

Confused child of God

Dear Confused:

Thanks for your letter and your honesty. I appreciate your dilemma. It brings up some fundamental questions: Does God love everyone, or is Her/His love conditional? Is it true, as Pastor Charles Lanier of Unity Fellowship Church used to say, "God has no respect of person. God is love and love is for everyone"? Or is it true that "God hates fags" as those religious extremists so tastefully point out every year at Pride. If your childhood concept of God is a punishing one, why hold onto it as an openly gay man?

Easier said than done. Luckily, you don't have to tackle this alone. Metropolitan Community Church (Clairemont), Unity Fellowship Church (Hillcrest), Universal Spirit Center (Hillcrest) and the Unitarian Universalist Churches (Hillcrest and Solana Beach) are San Diego churches who welcome LGBT members with open arms. You might call one of these churches and ask to have a talk with the minister/pastor. Get spiritual support from someone who knows what she/he is talking about. Don't listen to ignorant religious extremists as you explore how to be a joyfully gay child of God. Go to people who have scholarly knowledge (of the Bible, Koran, etc.) and learn from them. In addition to churches themselves, there are LGBT groups like "Dignity" for gay Catholics. For more resources, look in Gay San Diego, call The Center or use Google.

How do you keep your faith and drop the guilt? I strongly recommend the book "Coming Out Spiritually" by the brilliant Christian de la Huerta. De la Huerta is the founder of Q-Spirit (www.qspirit.org), an international network of LGBT people of spirituality.

In his book, de la Huerta explores spiritual roles/archetypes that LGBT people have often assumed and continue to enact today, e.g., creator of beauty, consciousness scout, mediator, shaman and healer. The book may open your eyes to the many possibilities that we as LGBT people have for spiritual happiness.

Consider the Men's Coming Out Group at The Center. You'll likely find that you are not the only newly out gay man to experience the guilt of a God who allegedly hates you now because you're a happy, loving homosexual.

Don't do this alone: you've had 27 years of anti-gay conditioning. It will probably take you a while to "de-program" yourself of your internalized homophobia. Talk with your boyfriend and supportive friends, read up on queer spirituality, and consider connecting with a spiritual/church community whose fellowship will be a loving and nurturing one.

While I am not an overtly religious person, I am a gay man whose connection with God is important to me. My own experience is that being gay, lesbian, transgendered or bisexual is a GIFT from God...a blessing, a privilege and an honor. I don't think God gives these gifts out haphazardly.

My experience is that She/He bestows these gifts on souls that are ready to take them on and use them in this lifetime. The awareness, intelligence, sensitivity and strength that are born of being gay, lesbian, transgendered or bisexual are not known by most heterosexual folk...we have special gifts, and like any gifts, they come with obligations and responsibilities.

I believe we are here to TEACH heterosexual folks about love, tolerance, kindness, forgiveness and unconditional positive regard. To quote gay literary icon Paul Monette:

"Gay and lesbian people who have fought through their selfhatred and their self-recriminations have a capacity for empathy that is glorious and a capacity to find laughter in things that is like praising God. There is a kind of flagrant joy about us that goes very deep and is not available to most people."

You might consider brief psychotherapy to help you with the guilt you experience after orgasm. Cognitive therapy could be useful in replacing the guilt-based thoughts with neutral or supportive thoughts...the logic here being that guilt is an emotion caused by distorted thinking (i.e., "God must hate me because I'm having an orgasm with another man.")

If you can change the thoughts you're having during sex to something like "God loves me and I love my boyfriend" or "Loving my man is an expression of God's love for me", your guilt over orgasming is likely to dissipate fairly quickly.

Does all this sound like too much work? I encourage you to flip it and see it differently: integrating your happy new life as a gay man with your previous religious conditioning can be seen as a troubling burden, or as an amazing adventure. Because there are so few guidelines for living our lives as queer children of God, we get to make it up as we go along.

Churches and organizations can be helpful, but, ultimately, it's an individual decision how you choose to live your life: spiritually, sexually, etc. The possibilities are infinite...may you enjoy the journey.


Sprinkle with remaining cheese. Top with bell pepper and green onions. Bake for 15-18 minutes.



Caleb from Texas writes, "I feel terrible, but I cheated on my boyfriend when I was traveling for a conference last month. It didn't mean anything, but I feel like I have to tell him. What do you think I should do?"

Yikes. There is never a right answer when it comes to these things. Most people might think the only answer is yes, you should tell him. And if you were unsafe during your sexual transgression and could potentially place him at risk for a sexually transmitted infection, then telling him is exactly what you should do. But if it is not his health but his trust in you that is at risk, the answer is not so simple.

If you feel that this truly was a onetime thing, then disclosing

your indiscretion would only serve to relieve your conscience. After all, the guilt you are carrying is a great burden to bear, and by revealing your act of infidelity, you are unloading the burden onto your significant other. The guilt you relieve yourself of often transforms into pain that he may never be able to fully quell.
