Obama Backs Pentagon Report

President Obama has issued a statement backing the Pentagon report that repeal of "don't ask, don't tell" would not disrupt unit cohesion.

The statement reads: As Commander in Chief, I have pledged to repeal the "don't ask, don't tell" law because it weakens our national security, diminishes our military readiness, and violates fundamental American principles of fairness and equality by preventing patriotic Americans who are gay from serving openly in our armed forces. At the same



time, as Commander in Chief, I am committed to ensuring that we understand the implications of this transition, and maintain good order and discipline within our military ranks. That is why I directed the Department of Defense earlier this year to begin preparing for a transition to a new policy.

Today's report confirms that a strong majority of our military men and women and their families—more than two thirds—are prepared to serve alongside Americans who are openly gay and lesbian. This report also confirms that, by every measure—from unit cohesion to recruitment and retention to family readiness—we can transition to a new policy in a responsible manner that ensures our military strength and national security. And for the first time since this law was enacted 17 years ago today, both the Secretary of Defense and the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff have publicly endorsed ending this policy.

With our nation at war and so many Americans serving on the front lines, our troops and their families deserve the certainty that can only come when an act of Congress ends this discriminatory policy once and for all. The House of Representatives has already passed the necessary legislation. Today I call on the Senate to act as soon as possible so I can sign this repeal into law this year and ensure that Americans who are willing to risk their lives for their country are treated fairly and equally. Our troops represent the virtues of selfless sacrifice and love of coun-

try that have enabled our freedoms. I am absolutely confident that they will adapt to this change and remain the best led, best trained, best equipped fighting force the world has ever known.

University of Colorado Employees vs. Antigay Coach

A coalition of University of Colorado employees has formed to oppose the rehiring of Bill McCartney as the school's head football coach, alleging McCartney is homophobic and sexist.

Despite leading the Buffaloes to a national championship in 1990, McCartney has drawn disapproval from some of the antigay stances he's taken behind the lectern and inside the locker room. Some 15 to 20 letters have been received voicing opposition to McCartney's hiring, reports the Boulder, Colo., Daily

Camera.

In 1992, McCartney referred to homosexuality as "an abomination against almighty God" and was a vocal advocate of the state's Amendment 2, which specifically prohibited the creation of antidiscrimination laws to protect gavs and was passed by voters but later struck down by the U.S. Supreme Court.



Those opposed to McCartney filling the newly vacant coaching

position also cite his founding of a male Christian group called the Promise Keepers as a violation of a university policy that "coaches should not organize or conduct religious activities. including promotion of prayer or BIble readings by players or coaches." The policy was enacted in response to complaints about team prayers organized by McCartney.





United Nations Advocates Killing of Gays?

Last week the United Nations adopted an amendment striking sexual minorities from a resolution protecting the right to life for a number of minority groups historically subject to execution.

With 79 votes in favor of the amendment and 70 votes against, Human Rights Foundation president Thor Halvorssen (pictured) writes on The Huffington Post that the UN is sending the message that it's all right to kills gays and lesbians.

He writes, "The UN has a remarkable track record of doing virtually nothing when presented with mass killings or genocide. "Never again!" was the cry after the holocaust.



Since then, the world has witnessed a dozen more never agains with strong condemnation from the UN coming after the corpses pile up. A resolution of the sort that was voted on in the General Assembly is significant for its clarity of message: "It's okay to kill the gays."

ACLU of Florida Files Lawsuit Against Police Officers

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. – The ACLU of Florida today filed a lawsuit in federal court against the City of Miami Beach and two of its police officers on behalf of Harold Strickland, a gay former Miami Beach resident who was wrongfully arrested in March 2009 in retaliation for calling 911 to report that two Miami Beach police officers were beating and kicking a man who lay handcuffed on the ground near Flamingo Park.

While the lawsuit focuses specifically on Strickland's arrest and violations of his civil rights by two Miami Beach Police Officers, the lawsuit highlights two systemic issues that reach far beyond this case: the practices of unlawfully targeting gay men for arrest without probable cause and harassing and arresting people who observe, document, and/or report police misconduct.

"For years the ACLU has received reports that Miami Beach police have targeted gay men near Flamingo Park for nothing more than being gay," said Shelbi Day, an attorney with the ACLU of Florida's LGBT Advocacy Project. "When the police become the problem rather than part of the solution, the entire community suffers. It is time for the City to end the discriminatory policies and practices of its police force."

The complaint alleges that the City and arresting officers, Frankly Forte and Elliot Hazzi, violated Strickland's rights under federal and state law. Specifically, the complaint seeks damages for violation of Strickland's First and Fourth Amendment rights and false arrest. The evidence, including the offic-



ers' sworn deposition testimony, the tape recording of Strickland's 911 call, Strickland's cell phone record, and the officers' own arrest affidavits, indicates that the officers lied in their report of the incident in order to cover-up their misconduct. Strickland was charged with "loitering and prowling,"

"The issue here goes far beyond the violation of Mr. Strick-land's rights as a gay man. In addition to targeting gay men, the Miami Beach police have an alarming history of arresting individuals who attempt to document police misconduct." said Ray Taseff, ACLU cooperating attorney. "All individuals have a constitutional right and a civic duty to report police misconduct. When the police arrest people for reporting police misconduct, as they did in this case, they damage the public's faith in law enforcement."

More than six months ago the ACLU gave notice of its intent to sue (as required by state law), and provided the City with detailed information evidencing gross misconduct by the police department and the officers in this case. At that time, the ACLU demanded that the Miami Beach Police Department institute immediate remedial action to halt the harassment, intimidation, and arrest of gay men near Flamingo Park and individuals who observe, document or report police misconduct. The ACLU also called on the City to discipline officers Hazzi and Forte for their misconduct. To date, the investigation remains open and no corrective action has been taken.

"While the Strickland incident has already sparked some reforms by Police Chief Noriega, including improved communi-

cation between the gay community and the police department by the appointment of Sgt. Juan Sanchez as a liaison to the gay community, retaliation for reporting police misconduct prevents civilian oversight of the police and cannot be tolerated" said Howard Simon, Executive Director of the ACLU of Florida.

"Although it was widely reported that, upon receipt of our letter in February, the two officers were placed on desk duty and an internal investigation was launched," explained Day, "it is our understanding that the investigation remains open, the officers have not been punished." Day continued, "With this lawsuit we hope to vindicate Mr. Strickland's rights and send the message to the City and the police that it will be held responsible for misconduct and discrimination."

How the New Foreclosure Scandal Impacts LGBT Borrowers

Taking away someone's home is serious business, and throughout most of United States history the court system has ensured

that borrowers cannot be forced from their homes without a powerful legal reason and an abundance of supporting evidence. But during the past 2-3 years foreclosure courts have been allowing hundreds of thousands of evictions to go ahead based on apparently inadequate documentation which includes such things as fraudulent paperwork and forged signatures. In the offices of some lawyers hired by mortgage companies, for example, a single individual might sign as many as 1,000 foreclosure documents per day. That's an average of about one every 20 or 30 seconds, meaning that they cannot possibly read or scrutinize for accuracy the papers they are signing. The phenomenon has given rise to the moniker "robo-signing" – a term that has become synonymous with this latest chapter in the ongoing foreclosure crisis.

The disturbing lack of legal protocol has tens of thousands of LGBT borrowers wondering what it means to them. The biggest question on everyone's mind is whether or not foreclosures that were allowed under questionable circumstances will now be overturned. As might be expected, it all depends on each individual situation. Many people, including those in high government offices, believe that there is no excuse for sloppy documentation.

"These people think they can play by a different set of rules," said Ohio Attorney General Richard Cordray in an interview with Bloomberg Television, referring to big banks and other major mortgage lenders who cannot produce the required paperwork to validate foreclosure actions. He called the use of flawed affidavits – which have justified hundreds of thousands of foreclosures – a "business model for fraud."

But it still may be quite difficult for LGBT homeowners to get their foreclosures reversed in court. When there is compelling

evidence, for example, that the borrower missed the monthly payments on a verifiable mortgage a judge will be reluctant to overturn the foreclosure. It is highly unlikely in those circumstances that the court will throw out a mortgage company's claim to repossess property in favor of the borrower simply because there are some supporting documents or authorized signatures missing. Required mortgage payments that are obviously unaccounted for will normally carry more legal weight than a few missing loan documents - shifting the burden of proof to the borrower. In some ways, in fact, that legal territory has already been tested. Courts have, for instance, accept-

ed thousands of affidavits that

find all the paperwork required.



These affidavits, signed by the banks themselves, basically say that although some documents are missing the bank still testifies that it does have the authority to proceed with the foreclosure – and that it did at one time have all the proper paperwork. Many judges have ruled that such affidavits are valid, and it is hard to believe that the court system will now do an abrupt about-face at the risk of causing economic chaos and legal pandemonium.

There may be some exceptions, of course, and it is worth it for LGBT borrowers to fight to get their property back if they feel they have been treated unfairly.

Those with the best chance of winning a reversal are borrowers who qualify in two significant ways. First they need to show that the mortgage lender failed to follow standard protocol during the foreclosure process. But it is also just as important to demonstrate that they were never delinquent on their payments. If those two things are true then the mortgage company was clearly at fault and a foreclosure judge may decide to unwind the foreclosure and give the borrower back their property even if it has subsequently been sold to somebody else. Since most people who have been foreclosed on have already moved into another residence and may not be interested in getting their old house back, the majority of these cases are resolved through a cash settlement paid by the lender to appropriately compensate the borrower.

But those LGBT homeowners who are facing imminent foreclosure and have not vet lost their homes may be in the most encouraging position in the midst of all this drama. Before going forward with new foreclosure cases the courts will be much more cautious and strict, and many mortgage companies have already instituted temporary moratoriums on foreclosures until these new allegations are resolved.

The Sheriff of Cook County, Illinois, for example - who has jurisdiction over the entire city of Chicago - stopped serving eviction notices on approximately 1,500 loans managed by companies including J.P. Morgan Chase, Bank of America, and Ally Financial. The sheriff explained his drastic action to reporters by saying, "I can't possibly be expected to evict people from their homes when the banks themselves can't say for sure everything was done properly." He said he will only resume foreclosure evictions when he is assured that the foreclosures

are 100 percent legal.

Antigay Violence on the Rise in Senegal

Antigay violence is on the rise in the western African nation of Senegal, likely the result of political scapegoating in the run-up to the 2012 presidential election, according to a new report by Human Rights Watch.

Beatings, arrests, and lynching's have increased significantly over the past two years in Dakar, the Senegalese capital, according to the New York-based organization.

"When elections are coming up and politicians are under scrutiny, all of a sudden there is more focus on homosexuality, because that's a very easy target," Boris Dittrich, acting director of Human Rights Watch's LGBT rights program, said in an interview with Bloomberg.

DRAMA QUEENS (and KINGS)

In a perfect world, drama belongs on stage, not in your daily life. Don't you agree? Think about it: do you ever find yourself overly reactive, theatrical or emotional? By choice?

By desperation? Unless you have a true personality disorder (see a good psychotherapist if you have questions about this) I'm here to tell you: you DO have control over the drama in your life.

What is your drama doing for you? Where is it taking you? And this isn't just for so-called "hysterical" over-the-top emotion. It's time for that stereotype to die. "Macho" men (and women) do drama too, only they play it out in slightly different ways, e.g., "egomaniac". "power-hungry" or "king of the mountain". Whether it's more "Streetcar Named Desire" or Donald Trump, drama is drama, and it's not good for your mental health.

There is nothing wrong with living large if that's truly who you are. When I lived in Paris (France, not Texas), I noticed that Parisian women often wore large, attention-getting jewelry...and did so quietly and elegantly. They walked softly and carried a big bracelet. Being real doesn't mean being mousy and boring, it does mean being true to yourself...and when you're true to yourself, the drama quotient in your life inevitably goes down. Why? Drama is a cry for help: Help! No one loves me! Help! No one cares! Help! No one thinks I'm hot! Someone pay attention to me, please!

If you're a fabulous drag queen performing at a night club, then drama and hyperbole are to be expected. If you're a "regular" LGBT person living your life and feeling unloved, unappreciated or disconnected, then perhaps you've lost sight of who you are and are focusing too much on your "image". I wish that a buff body, great hair and beautiful clothes would bring happiness. If that was so, we could all be happy all the time, once we found the right trainer, haircutter and wardrobe. Unfortunately, it doesn't work this way.

Drama is not the voice of your best friend, it is the voice of your deepest fears...the ones that plagued you as a child but no longer need to dominate your adulthood. Most of us, as we enter our late 20's or early 30's, start to leave drama behind. The insecurity that gives birth to drama thankfully diminishes as we age. We gain a sense of who we really are, as opposed to who we have been told we should be. Finding out who we really are is no small task; it goes on our whole lives.


Many people in their 70's and 80's are still discovering new and surprising aspects of themselves...and feel more alive than they ever did in their 20's. No one tells us much about this, but if you hang out with LGBT elders, you'll see that we don't all become cynical and bitter. Many of us become happier and more playful! If this were broadcast on CNN - instead of Jessica Simpson's latest dilemma - we'd all have a helluva lot less fear of aging and I'd hear fewer cli-

ents tell me, "I don't want to get old; no one's going to want me". This kind of neurotic self-talk encourages drama... and lots of it.

There's an ad out for a moisturizer whose copy reads, "I'm 40, but I look 10 years' younger." This is the kind of fear that makes us afraid to be ourselves and pushes us toward the drama of panic and insecurity. Is it really a surprise that so many LGBT people today have panic attacks? Never before has the pressure been so intense for us to try to become someone we're not...someone who looks younger, seems happier, has more money than we really do. Ugh.

The antidote: look beneath your drama and see what you're avoiding. Usually, it's a fear of feeling small, unimportant or ignored. Really confident people have less drama; they simply don't need it. They have the strength and power INSIDE themselves. They don't need to proclaim it on the outside. By all means, protest injustice and put your time and energy into causes and activities that are meaningful to you. But if you find you like to be the center of attention – whether you are or not – maybe you're a bit too dramatic.

The antidote to: "No one loves me! No one cares! No one thinks I'm hot!" isn't panic, anxiety or drama. The way to feel loved, connected and attractive is to find it inside yourself. Drama doesn't like a quiet self-confidence. It hates a genuine sense of humility and gratitude. Focus your energy on developing these qualities and watch your confidence grow and your drama lade away. And don't be surprised how easily it may happen: you simply won't need it anymore.

working tools to connect people to the nonprofit causes and charities important to them.

The Advocate interviewed Hughes about his plans for the site earlier this year. Today, as it launches, Hughes tells The New York Times that Jumo.com will "do what Yelp did for restaurants" and extend it to charities "to help people find an evaluate them."

Jumo.com has profile pages for various charities, and users can follow those pages, where relevant news articles and videos about the individual charity's work will be posted. Users can

also utilize the site to learn more about the causes and interests their friends follow.

"The more connected that individual is to an issue they care about, the higher probability there is they will stay involved over a longer period of time," Hughes told the Times.



The Jumo.com launch comes just a day after Hughes and his partner. Sean Eldridge, announced there are matching donations until the end of the year to gay rights causes Freedom to Marry, Empire State Pride Agenda, Gay & Lesbian Advocates & Defenders, and Equality Maryland.

D.C. Marriage Bureau Rejects Skype Wedding

The Washington, D.C., marriage bureau has declared invalid the marriage between two men who wed in Texas last month with help from a D.C.-based officiate via Skype. According to the Washington City Paper, last week the marriage bureau sent Mark Reed and Dante Walkup of Dallas a letter saying their marriage is not legal. Sheila Alexander-Reid of the Washington City Paper officiated the wedding.

"The return is invalid because it has come to the attention of the court that the subject contracting parties to the marriage and you, the officiant, did not all personally participate in a marriage ceremony performed within the jurisdictional and territorial limits of the District of Columbia," said the letter.

After receiving the letter, the couple looked into legal options to challenge the decision, Alexander-Reid said. They were told they didn't have a strong case and will try to fly back to D.C. this weekend to be legally married.

The legislation would provide some of the rights and responsibilities of marriage to both same-sex and unmarried oppositesex couples. Gov. Pat Quinn has already pledged to sign the bill into law.

Rep. Greg Harris, the gay Chicago Democrat sponsoring the bill, invoked past discrimination against women and minorities in urging his colleagues to support the measure.

"Those traditions and those laws have changed. And I think we all believe that it changed for the better," he said, according to the Daily Herald. "Those who stood for justice, for fairness, have been remembered by history as great leaders. They've been remembered by history as being on the right side of justice. Each of us has the chance to be remembered on the right side of justice of justice."

DADT Remarks From Gates, Mullen

In prepared remarks released Tuesday with the Pentagon Working Group study on "don't ask, don't tell," Defense secretary Robert Gates and Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Adm. Mike Mullen praised the report's findings and



pushed Congress to act on repealing the 1993 law.

Below are excerpts from Secretary Gates's and Adm. Mullen's remarks, delivered on Tuesday at a Pentagon briefing with reporters:

Secretary Gates:

This past February, I established a high-level working group to review the issues associated with implementing a repeal of the "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" law regarding homosexual men and women serving in the military and, based on those findings, to develop recommendations for implementation, should the law change. The working group has completed their work and today the Department is releasing their report to the Congress and the American public. ...

The findings of their report reflect nearly ten months of research and analysis along several lines of study, and represent the most thorough and objective review ever of this difficult policy issue and its impact on the American military.

First, the group reached out to the force to better understand

their views and attitudes about a potential repeal of the "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" law. As was made clear at the time, and is worth repeating today, this outreach was not a matter of taking a poll of the military to determine whether the law should be changed. The very



idea of asking the force to, in effect, vote on such a matter is antithetical to our system of government and would have been without precedent in the long history of our civilian-led military. The President of the United States, the commander in chief of the Armed Forces, made his position on this matter clear — a position I support. Our job, as the civilian and military leadership of the Department of Defense, was to determine how best to prepare for such a change should the Congress change the law.

Nonetheless, I thought it critically important to engage our troops and their families on this issue, as ultimately it will be they who will determine whether or not such a transition is successful. I believed that we had to learn the attitudes, obstacles and concerns that would need to be addressed should the law be changed. We could do this only by reaching out and listening to our men and women in uniform and their families. The working group undertook this through a variety of means — from a mass survey answered by tens of thousands of troops and their spouses to meetings with small groups and individuals, including hearing from those discharged under the current law. ...

The findings suggest that for large segments of the military repeal of "Don't Ask, Don't Tell," though potentially disruptive in the short term, would not be the wrenching, traumatic change that many have feared and predicted.

With regards to readiness, the working group report concluded that overall, and with thorough preparation — and I emphasize thorough preparation — there is a low risk from repealing Don't Ask Don't Tell. However, as I mentioned earlier, the survey data showed that a higher proportion — between 40 and 60 percent — of those troops serving in predominantly all-male combat specialties — mostly Army and Marines, but including the special operations formations of the Navy and Air Force — predicted a negative effect on unit cohesion from repealing the current law. ...

In my view, the concerns of combat troops as expressed in the survey do not present an insurmountable barrier to a successful repeal of "Don't Ask, Don't Tell." This can be done, and it should be done, without posing a serious risk to military readiness. However, these findings do lead me to conclude that an abundance of care and preparation is required if we are to avoid a disruptive — and potentially dangerous — impact on the performance of those serving at the tip of the spear in America's wars.

Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Adm. Mike Mullen:

Let me state right up-front that I fully endorse their report, its findings, and the implementation plan recommended by the Working Group.

The Working Group was given a tall order. Indeed, nothing less than producing the first truly comprehensive assessment of not only the impact of repeal of the law governing Don't Ask, Don't Tell, but also about how best to implement a new policy across the Joint Force.

As the Secretary indicated, the Working Group surveyed our troops and their spouses, consulted proponents and opponents of repeal and examined military experience around the world. They also spoke with serving gays and lesbians.

The result is one of the most expansive studies ever done on

military personnel issues, and I applaud the time that was taken to arrive at solid, defensible conclusions.

More critically, I was gratified to see that the Working Group focused their findings and recommendations rightly on those who would be most affected by a change in the law: our people. All of our people.

And so for the first time the Chiefs and I have more than just anecdotal evidence and hearsay to inform the advice we give our civilian leaders. We have discussed this issue extensively amongst ourselves and with the Secretary. And the Chiefs and I met with the President as recently as yesterday. ...

Should repeal occur, I share the Secretary's desire that it come about through legislation; through the same process with which the law was enacted rather than precipitously through the courts.

I further hope that such debate in the Congress will be as fully informed by the good work done in this report as my advice to the Secretary and the President will be.
