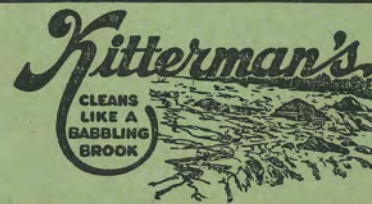

A figure of a man strolls by, the lens of my camera clicks and I have a picture of a man familiar to everyone in our lodge. Although he is not a member of Junior American Czechs, he is known to us as the "Hired Man".

The "Hired Man" was born May 12th, 1878 at Vranov, Bohemia, to Barbara and Jakub Janda. He attended five grades of school in Stupno, Bohemia. These five grades are equivalent to ten grades in our public schools. Brother Janda admitted he shared many innocent flirtations in dancing schools popular in Chicago at the time of his youth. Innocent as they were, they were very happy.

Our subject was married June 30th 1900 to Mary Kátrba. He spent his honeymoon with his first bride at Cary, Ill. On February 7th, 1920, he was married to Gladys Lukes, his present wife. 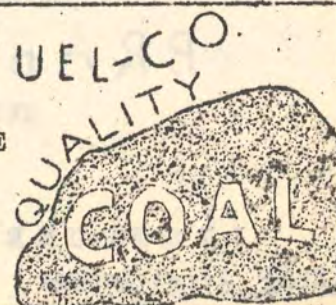

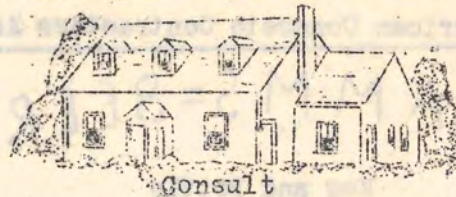

Having three of our active members in the Executive Staff of the Iowa National Guard, we feel that some information regarding the National Guard would be welcome.

Dr. Leo. B. Sedlacek is Commanding Officer of Company "H" Hospital Company of the 136th Medical Regiment now located in Cedar Rapids.

The personnel of this unit includes two other of our members beside Dr. Sedlacek, Dr. H. Jirsa, and Dr. Leo Severa. The entire personnel of the company include; Captain Leo Sedlacek - commanding officer. First Lieutenant R. Chapman, executive officer. First Lieutenant H. Jirsa, executive officer. First Lieutenant K. Woodhouse, executive officer. First Lieutenant L. Severa, dental officer.

This company will be composed of 6 commanding officers and 66 enlisted men. The company will be in charge of the field hospital. It will have complete equipment to maintain a 250 bed hospital. This is not a permanent hospital but an emergency hospital for field work only. The unit will be completely motorized. It will have 15 - 2½ ton trucks, 3 - 1½ ton trucks, 2 officer's station wagons and 3 motorcycles with side cars.
