
THE CANDID CAMERA ROVEALS





It is unlawful to use live minnows as bait until the 15th of May. This has been done to pre-vent the catching of bass and crappies until the season, May 15th, is open on same. But such baits as shrimp night crawlers, worms, chicken livers and patent baits are very good at this time for catfish.
