Exhibition Shows Czech Role in Cedar Rapids' Sesquicentennial

HE NATIONAL CZECH & SLOVAK MUSEUM & LIBRARY'S ethnic niche in the celebration of Cedar Rapids' Sesquicentennial begins May 15 with the opening of *A New World Presence: Czech Contributions to Cedar Rapids.* Through this exhibit, which continues through Sept. 30, 1999, the story of the impact of our community's largest ethnic group will be told through dozens of vintage photographs and compelling artifacts, culled from the museum's extensive collections and from the family albums and attics of community members.

A New World Presence reveals the indelible mark Czech businesses, churches, schools, social, artistic and fraternal organizations have left on Cedar Rapids since the late 19th century. In sharp black and white images, visitors will see shop clerks in pressed white shirts and bow ties gaze from behind glass merchandise cases and soda counters of neighborhood grocery stores. Visitors will meet the photo image of Frank Suchý, stern-faced behind his walrus mustache, posing proudly with his family in front of his watch shop on 1006 S. Third Street SE. The exhibition includes a familiar scene — the length of Czech Village's main avenue captured in photos taken from the same angle in three different decades: 1910, 1960 and 1999.

New World Presence artifacts include the wood voting box that W.F.L.A. members used to accept or reject new members with the drop of a plain or black ball, and a turn-of-the-century child-size coffin from Brosh Funeral Homes.

In conjunction with A New World Presence, the museum will offer a web site tour of 20 significant Czech locations in Cedar Rapids. Recent and historic photographs of each site will be included. Summer Learn at Lunch Focuses on C.R. Czechs

The June 16 program takes a look at the Czech School in Cedar Rapids, the oldest continuously operating ethnic school in the United States. On July 14, the Learn at Lunch topic is "Czech Impressions," a look at the Czech language publications printed in Cedar Rapids in the late 19th and 20th centuries. Learn at Lunch programs are free and held at noon in the WFLA Heritage Hall.

Ice Cream Social Marks Opening of Museum Exhibit

The NCSML will re-create an old-fashioned ice cream social May 13 as the opening event for the Sesquicentennial exhibit A New World Presence: Czech Contributions to Cedar Rapids.

The celebration runs from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. and is open to museum members and the media. The official opening date for *A New World Presence* is May 15.

The ice cream social will reflect the vintage flavor of the exhibit. The museum's Grand Hall will be turned into a turn-of-thecentury social scene with albums played on a record player and a menu that includes root beer floats, lemonade and popcorn.

FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

S YOU READ THIS OUR CURATOR, Carmen Langel, is putting the finishing touches on what should prove to be a very popular exhibit, A New World Presence: Czech Contributions to Cedar Rapids. This exhibit breaks new ground in many ways for the NCSML. It is the largest exhibit we've undertaken since the opening of Homelands, our core exhibit. It is the first time the Roman L. Hruska Grand Hall will be used as exhibit space, and,

therefore, the first time the South Hall, Library, and Grand Hall will be linked with one exhibit.

A New World Presence also represents the largest exhibit we have undertaken which is specifically about the Czech experience in Cedar Rapids. That Czechs have made such a strong impact on our community has never been in question; however, it is very compelling to encounter image after image, artifact after artifact, each reminding us of the nature of the immigrant experience, the customs and traditions, the businesses that were started, the size and meaning of the community within

the community. The cumulative effect is profound. Our hope is that *A New World Presence* will remind present day visitors — whether Czech or not, local or not — of the commitment, courage, and ingenuity inherent in the building of the Cedar Rapids Czech enclave. I also hope it will act as an inspiration to those who aren't sure what to do with the photographs, diaries, and objects related to their Czech heritage to remember the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library.

Since I last wrote this column I was able to share in two very special occasions. In March I was present at the historic NATO accession ceremonies at the Truman Library in Independence, Missouri. This ceremony formally brought the Czech Republic, Poland, and Hungary into NATO. The primary speakers were the foreign ministers from each country. Though all of their remarks were dignified in a way befit-

ting the occasion, they were also personal. The possibility, or even impossibility, of the moment was something they had thought about well before the fall of the Iron Curtain. The accession ceremony was led by Secretary of State Madeleine Albright, whose perspective as a Czech American made the day particularly poignant. I look forward to the day when Slovakia will too join the Alliance.

Word of the work that is going on at the NCSML is spreading quickly. I was able to accept many compliments on the museum's behalf.

Museum and Czech Village have Grand Plans for Houby Day

COLLECTIONS UPDATE

A New World Presence Spurs Donations

n the last few newsletters the museum requested photographs and objects related to businesses and organizations in Cedar Rapids for use in *A New World Presence*. Many thanks to everyone who responded to this request.

One individual who came forward was Elizabeth Burianek of Cedar Rapids, who donated a cigar box from the company owned by her grandfather, Joseph Burianek. Joseph was the proprietor of the Great Western Tobacco Works in Cedar Rapids from about 1912 to 1934. One doesn't generally associate cigar manufacturing with Cedar Rapids but there were at least nine such companies in Cedar Rapids at the turn of the century.

Two different individuals, Robert Fisher of Iowa City and Adeline Volesky of Cedar Rapids, donated items from the Waconia Sorghum Company. This company was owned by the Wessale family (originally spelled Vesely) from This sorghum tin is from the Waconia Sorghum Co., which operated just west of Highways 218 and 30 until it was purchased by ADM in the late 1970s.



Moravia. The family-operated business consisted of a sorghum mill in Waconia, MN, in business from about 1910 until it was destroyed by a tornado in 1925. The family rebuilt the business in Cedar Rapids to take advantage of a longer growing season for sorghum. The Waconia Sorghum Co. operated just west of Highways 218 and 30 until it was purchased by ADM in the late 1970s.

Finally, Dorothy Evans and Mary Ann Pochobradsky, donated glasses from Milo Vondracek's dairy business.



This cigar box comes from Great Western Tabacco Works in Cedar Rapids, a company that was in business from around 1912 to 1934.

They read, "Compliments of Milo C. Vondracek, Be Good to the Baby," and were likely distributed to Vondracek's customers during the Depression. They are in pristine condition and will trigger fond memories for many local visitors.

Again, many thanks to the above individuals and everyone else who responded to our request. You can see them all in a few short days with the opening of *A New World Presence*.

Library Acquires Scrapbook

he library has recently acquired a great primary resource of information on the activities of a Czech-American group that helped support the liberation of Czechoslovakia during the Second World War. A member of the Edward Beneš Chapter of the Čzech National Alliance (Ceské Národní Sdružení) preserved the letters, newspaper clippings and photos of this organization's activities from 1938 through 1947 in a scrapbook. These items help to paint a picture for us of the industrious men and women who contributed both time and money to assist the people of Czechoslovakia under Nazi domination. The Edward Beneš Chapter, which was based in Chicago, sponsored many fundraising activities such as benefit concerts, bazaars and rummage sales. The chapter was also active in the American Red Cross with its Edward Beneš Unit.

The Czech National Alliance (CNA) was originally formed during the First World War to promote the cause of Czechoslovak independence from the Austro-Hungarian Empire. The CNA

organized a number of Czech organizations and individuals for the purpose of raising funds for the independence cause. By the end of the war, there were 16 regional districts and 320 chapters. The CNA later operated under the Czechoslovak National Council, which coordinated the efforts of the CNA and two other major Czech and Slovak organizations.

The CNA was relatively inactive during the interwar period, but was reorganized after the Nazi occupation of Austria. Since it was recognized that Nazi aggression would not stop at the Austrian border, the CNA initiated fund drives to support the defense of Czechoslovakia. However, after the western powers capitulated to Hitler's demands to incorporate the "Sudetenland" into Germany, the CNA focused on supporting the liberation of Czechoslovakia. The Czechoslovak National Council was again the coordinator of the efforts by the CNA and two other major Czech and Slovak organizations. The CNA was the largest organization of the Czechoslovak National Council with 14 regional

districts, 213 chapters and some 30,000 direct members. The CNA was also the leading fundraiser within the Czechoslovak National Council, raising more than \$1.3 million.

The CNA leadership changed late in the war, adversely affecting relations with the Czechoslovak National Council. The CNA ultimately dropped out of the Council, which led to the loss of most of the CNA's own member organizations. Upon the communist coup in Czechoslovakia in 1948, it became clear that the new CNA leadership was sympathetic to the communists, who were opposed to the democratic ideals espoused by President Beneš. However, the CNA survived despite vehement anti-communist sentiment in the United States.

PERMANENT EXHIBITION: Homelands. The museum's permanent exhibition, with periodic change of artifacts, tells the story of the Czech and Slovak people from the days of Slavic tribes wandering into Central Europe through the Velvet Divorce in 1993. Homelands features 250 objects that include works of art, a 1935 Czech-made motorcycle and Czech and Slovak folk costumes. Museum hours are Tuesday through Saturday, 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Sunday from noon to 4 p.m. Regular admission is \$5 for adults, \$4 for seniors (65 and over), \$2 for children ages 5-16. Children under 5 with an adult companion are admitted free. Members are admitted free. Admission includes a tour of the Immigrant Home and A New World Presence.

May 15: Houby Day celebration in Czech Village and at the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library. Opening day of *A New World Presence: Czech Contributions to Cedar Rapids.* "Parade of Kroje" costume pageant, 2 p.m. or after the 1 p.m. parade, on the garden stage (or in the museum's Grand Hall if it rains). This narrated pageant will include authentic costumes from the Czech and Slovak Republics, and folk costumes made locally. Pageant is free.

May 19: Learn at Lunch, Cedar Rapids Czechs in the Age of Fraternalism, Rollie Raim. Noon to 1 p.m., WFLA Heritage Hall. Free. Learn how Czech fraternal organizations have contributed to the community and what ties they have to other benefit societies in the area.

Roman Hruska Dies

Retired U.S. Senator Roman Hruska, who died April 25 at the age of 94, left an indelible mark on the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library in Cedar Rapids. The museum's Roman L. Hruska Grand Hall was dedicated in Hruska's honor in October of 1996. A bronze plaque in the Hall reads, "Roman L. Hruska Grand Hall, Commemorating the leadership of Roman L. Hruska, U.S. Senator - Nebraska, 1954-1976. For his dedication in preserving the traditions of our Czech and Slovak Heritage."

Hruska, whose father was born in Tabor, Czechoslovakia, was a major donor to the Museum and Library's capital campaign. The museum's collections include several gifts from Hruska, including a 1972 photograph of Hruska with three Apollo 17 astronauts aboard the USS Ticonderoga following the Apollo 17 splashdown. The photo is signed by all three astronauts. One of those astronauts, Capt. Eugene Cernan, who is of Czech and Slovak descent, came to Cedar Rapids to be the keynote speaker for the Hruska Grand Hall dedication ceremony.

Museum hours are Tuesday through Saturday, 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Sunday from Noon to 4 p.m. Regular admission is \$5 for adults, \$4 for seniors (65 and over), \$2 for children ages 5-16. Children under 5 with an adult companion are admitted free. Members are admitted free. Admission includes a tour of the restored 19th Century Immigrant Home and Homelands, the museum's permanent exhibition, which tells the story of the Czech and Slovak people from the days of Slavic tribes wandering into Central Europe, through the Velvet Divorce in 1993. Homelands features 250 objects that include works of art, a 1935 Czech-made motorcycle and Czech and Slovak folk costumes. The museum is located at 30 16th Ave. SW.
