LARGER MUSEUM SOON A REALITY !

The Czech Fine Arts Fdn.has received approval on its bid to lease the former Dowie Outdoor Advertising Bldg. at IO -16th Ave., SW.between the Wareco Service Station and the Cedar River. The lease is for ten years with rent to begin when the City Building Department issues an occupancy permit. The building needs much repair and remodeling work. We are, therefore, launching a fund drive to raise \$30,000.00 for the renovation of the building and for purchase of display cases, shelves, and items display.

We are in need of assistance with carpentry, plumbing, heating, electrical and general labor for clean up and all of those little jobs that are so necessary.

A"Founders Group"is being considered to give special recognition to those who make substantial donations of sums of money, labor, or materials for the initial remodeling and set up of the new Czech Museum and Library.

We are also in the process of establishing categories for donations to be recorded in our special Gift Book.

EXHIBIT AT KIRKWOOD COMMUNITY COLLEGE

An exhibit of 19 items filled the display cabinet at Kirkwood Library for more than two weeks in February. Exhibited were: toy, fez, booklets, 1855 prayer book in German print but Czech words, fancy work, doll's quilt, perotka, shepherd's flute, Old Lady Winter, doll, Domazlice porcelain, cup for drinking mineral water, ruby red garnets, cut glass, colored eggs, and Marge Nedjl's fancy cut lace work in a large goose egg. Our thanks to Mrs. Florence Masters for inviting us and to Ms. Hanson at the Library for her help in arranging the display.

The MUSEUM IDEA. The setting up of a Museum was an idea that started in 1975 at a meeting of the Czech Heritage and Fine Arts Foundations. And so a committee was appointed and work started in earnest.

By September 1978 the doors opened into scrubbed and cleaned floors, curtained windows, dressed manikins, hung pictures and well placed china, glassware and many other items. The Library collection is not yet fully organized or open to the public.

In 1979, more than 2,100 visitors registered at the Museum and we are sure many more did not register. Visitors came from 27 states and 10 countries. One distinguished visitor was Bruno Bělčik, violin guest soloist, with the C.R. Symphony, and his son from Colorado. They seemed impressed with our early efforts and we were indeed honored by their visit. Bělčik Iives in Praha.

We are especially grateful to the many who have made large and smaller donations at the Museum, to the many volunteers who spent countless hours conducting tour groups, maintaining the up keep of the place, to Pat Martin who has conducted the many special tours at the Museum, and to those who speak at many gatherings about Czech culture.

Substantial donations have been made by not only individuals ,but from lodges , businesses, industries, and families, and estates of deceased members.

Much of our work will continue to depend upon volunteers to be on duty at hours that the Museum is open, and to those who offer their skills and services for special events and projects.

FARMING in the EARLY 1900's

Come visit with Mr.William Falltis (age 94) and Mrs.Faltis(age 89), the former Olga Dobrovsky, at their home on 18th Avenue S.W.

CONGRATULATIONS to Mr.& Mrs.Faltis on their 64 years of wedlock! Heremembers the 4th grade McGuffey's Reader. Mrs.Faltis attended 9th grade at high school. The Faltis and Dobrovksy families lived to the southwest of Cedar Rapids, both families farmed. Dances at Western were a popular meeting place for young folks.

The young couple farmed 120 acres for 50 years. In 1978 a part of the land was acquired for the Cedar Rapids Municipal Airport.

To them were born three children:
Mae Faltis Novotny(Frank W.), Viola
Faltis Zahradnik(Lumir), and a son,
William J.

Listen to them tell about farming in the early years of this century, and up to the 1950's. In the early days corn was llc/bu., with yields 30-40 bu./acre when using stubble and manure for fertilizer. When commercial fertilizers came on the market, yields were 50-60 bu./acre. Recently, their son-in-law had close to 200 bu./acre and placed in a contest. Today, corn is around \$2.50/bu.

Oats were 10¢/bu.or even less some times. Yields varied from 40-50 bu./ acre to 60-70 bu./acre which was very very good return. Today oats runs \$1.50 bu., more or less.

Mr.Faltis was one of the earliest of farmers to raise alfalfa. He said that he got more tons per acre than from timothy hay crops. The alfalfa was of better quality of feed, more nutritious, & high in protein. Three cuttings a year were a real advantage. The crop of loose hay was then hauled in the hay racks and stored in the hayloft part of the barn. In later years, hay was pressed into rectangular bales, tied with wire.

On the 120 acres, no wheat was grown and only occasionally some barley.

Mrs.Faltis took care of some 200 Rhode Island Reds, then later White Rocks. At first, setting hens were used to hatch the chicks, then came incubators, and eventually chicks came from a hatchery.

Every week, riding in a spring wagon drawn by horses, Mrs.Faltis sold eggs to stores @ 9¢/doz., in winter for 20¢ -25¢ dozen.

The I7 dairy cows, milkedby hand, were Holsteins, some Brown Swiss and few Guernseys. At first cream was sold to the creamery to made into butter. Later bulk milk was delivered by a truck from the farm in IO gallon cans to Vondracek Dairy. Later on, milk tank trucks took the milk to the Sanitary Dairy Co.

The pigs were Duroc-Jersey, Chester Whites, Berkshire, and spotted Poland China. Mr.Faltis raised 30 to 40 hogs. When the meat supply was low a pig was butchered, hung out of doors overnight to cool off. Then Mrs.Faltis would "fry down" the fat and meat, storing it in large stone jars or crocks.

To cure hams and bacon, a brine of salt peter, brown sugar, and a little pepper was boiled & cooled before the hams and bacon were packed into the brine in stone jars. It took six weeks to cure the meat. From time to time, the brine was drawn off, heated and cooled and poured over the meat.

Piggies went to market at 200-250 pounds, taken by wagon or bobsled, according to the season.

Mr.Faltis had a hobby - - horses!
live ones-as many as 16 at a time,
some were part Belgian. Most machinery
required four horses to a hitch. In
1921, he bought two strawberry roan
broncos from a Texas rancher. At
only 700# each, they were a carriage
team, or for light work in fields.

In 1913 the family had their first automobile - an OVERLAND! 4 door. No worry about miles per gallon then. There are 8 grandchildren, 7 of whom are college graduates. There are 7 great-great grandchildren. MEMBERSHIP as of March 1,1980, is 755. As expected Cedar Rapids has the largest number of members, and 44 other Iowa communities rank next. Seven states have from 4 to 14 members; 19 states have 1,2,or 3. The distribution extends from Alaska to Texas and from east to west coast on the Mainland.

At this time, 441 members have paid dues for 1980. We are certain that those who have not yet paid dues wish to remain affiliated with the Heritage Foundation and to con-

tinue to receive your copy of the "DEDICTVI" as only in this way will you know what is going on and what will take place during the year.

We have a long ways to go to attain our goals. If you retain your membership, we can be assured of continued success in our undertakings.
