

VANILLA PUDDING
(four servings)
One Pt whole milk
1 cup sugar
2 tblsp slour
1 tsp salt
2 egg yolks
1 tsp vanilla

Scald milk in top of couble boiler. Add sugar, flour and salt thoroughly mixed. Stir until smooth and thickened. Cook several minutes until pudding is shiny. Combine small amount with beaten yolks and add to remainder in double boiler. Cook several minutes until eggs set. Remove from fire. Add vanilla. Stir occasionally, while cooling to prevent skin from forming on top.

THE CANDID CAMERA

Calls our attention, quite appropriately for the "get-together" issue of the Echo, to Milo F. MITVALSKY, the charter president of the Junior American Czech lodge. Milo was born on Feb. 6, 1908, in Cedar Rapids, to Frank S. and

Catherine Mitvalsky.
Mr. Mitvalsky Sr. owns one of the largest raw fur dealing and manufacturing establishments in the

country.

Milo was educated in public schools in Cedar Rapids, attended Western Milita ry Academy in Alton, Illinois in 1924-1925 and came back to Washington High School to graduate in 1927. From there he went to the University of Iowa, getting his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1931 and hisJuris Doctors degree in 1933.

At the University he was a member of the Sigma Phi Epsilon social fraternity and Phi Delta Phi legal fraternity. In 1933 he was president of the Student Council, the student governing body, composed of representatives from all the colleges on the campus. He was a member of the U of I swimming team and a major letter man. In 1928 he qualified to the finals of the Olympic selections for the swimming team to go to Europe to represent the U.S., but as he states the competition was so fast that the only was he could have crossed with the swimming team was to hold the tow-line on Johnny Weismuller.

At the University in 1928, he met Orpha Schuppert through fraternity and sorority open house gatherings and they were married in 1931 at Plattsmouth, Nebraska.

Having worked from the age of ten, and being able to boast of holding as many as four or five different jobs at the same time, he became much interested in law and made up his mind to become a lawyer. In 1933 he opened his office in the Merchants National Bank Building and practised by himself until 1935, when a partnership was formed with B.B. Hickenlooper, who was at that time and still is a representative from Linn County to the state coupled with his public speaking legislature. He has specialized in ability, we know that he will have corporation insurance and banking law, little difficulty in attaining his havind had considerable experience in these fields, far beyond the usual experience gathered by a person his age. However, he is never too busy to assist any person who may need help in the legal field, no matter what the difficulty may be.
