(Zdar is a quaint mountain village in Moravia. All houses are wooden and the site itself is a "museum" and set aside by the government as a national historic site. I was there in 1966 but since we did not see the museum, maybe it is a new project. MMS)



CECH DAYS na SESTNACTO

The 4th Annual Czech Days were really a daze on September 9-10,1977. From a survey the editor made with the merchants the following remarks resulted:

"Sunny skies brought hundreds of people, looking, visiting, buying and selling .. It really was nice .. The Flea Market attracted many of our visitors. . Much better than last year..a happy atmosphere . . . Merchants participated in gifts and attractive mechandise.'

More than 8000 kolaches were sold! That was not enough to supply the demand. Kolach producers were the Sykora Bakery, Dostal Catering, and Tabitha Circle of the Hus Memorial Presbyterian Church.

The Children's Parade had a modest number of "floats" and costumed marchers. They showed a lot of originality and also creativity! Let's have more taking part next year.

"The activities at the BAND-STAND added to the festivities. Also the Boddicker accordian students & dancers gave color and music for all to enjoy. "

" In some stores, the clerks and also merchants wore the Czech national costumes. That was nice. '

"Business at the Czech Fine Arts Tent selling Klobasy was GREAT. The service included sauerkraut, a soft drink, and potato chips. "

" Cars from other parts of Iowa were in evidence.

Saw many people who were strangers so shows that word got around what was going on. Lots of new faces in my shop."

"Even though closing time was 5 o' clock, some shops were open until 10 P.M. "We finally locked the doors."

"People were elbow to elbow along the Avenue! Food served inside and outside kept many people busy."

"Maybe Saturday and Sunday would be a good time to have this sort of thing."

One merchant estimated that over 5000 people were around on Saturday evening to dance, visit, listen to the music and just look around.

RELIGIOUS GROUPS IN EARLY CEDAR RAPIDS

Early Czech settlers were Protestants, others Catholics and the liberals who were called Free-Thinkers.

The first St. Wenceslaus Catholic Church was ready in 1882 but within 20 years it was too small for the rapidly growing parish. The present Gothic edifice was dedicated 1905. Imagine! it was built at a cost of \$49,000. Over the years the church founded recreational clubs and also insurance groups. By 1927 some of the services were conducted in Czech and some in English. Now services a are in English unless some special vigitors or event takes place.

St.Ludmilas Catholic Church started a school in 1914 in a house on the property that was purchased by the parish members. One room served as a chapel. The church was erected in 1926 at a cost of about \$27,000. The church has a fun carnival, big kolach festival and bazaar every summer.

In both of the above projects, it is likely that labor and even some materials were donated. Imagine trying to build those structures nowdays for that small sum of money.

The Hus Memorial Presbyterian Church started as a group of Evangelicals of the Reformed Church and met in homes. Once in a whilte, the pastor of the Ely church (1858) walked to Cedar Rapids or people here walked to Ely to attend services. The church is unique because it was the first Czech Protestant Church in the United States.

Mr. Sinclair let the group use a room at the packing plant for the services. Mission status lasted for some years. Both the First and the Second Presbyterian Churches the city helped the Czech group. Finally a church at the corner or 9th Ave.,7th Street SE was dedicated in 1916. The edifice cost \$ 24,000. The new Hus Memorial Church is on 29th Ave. and Schaffer Drive.SW.

There was also a Jan Hus Methodist Church, once a Mission of St.Paul's Methodist Episcopal Church. The Czech Church was located on 14th Ave. and 2nd Street, SW. Later the church members became the present Asbury Methodist Church 29th Ave., 3rd St. S.W.

The Czech Reformed Church was built on 2nd Street ,15th Ave., SW and dedicated in 1911 with all debts paid. By 1942 the membership dropped to 62 and the congregation was then dissolved.

This will be the last of the brief reports on the early history of our Czech Community. Now that the story of those years (1852-1942) is available in the publication, The History of Czech Settlement in Cedar Rapids, written by Martha Griffith, there is no need to tell the story in our newsletters. The booklet of 96 pages has been only recently published by the Czech Heritage Foundation. It sells for \$3.00 postpaid. Write the Foundation if you wish copies.
