HANDY ANDY ANSWERS

Q. How can I clean off grease that has spattered over an unpainted floor?

A. Pour kerosene over the spots then scrub thoroughly with a scrubbing brush. After a few days, both the grease and the kerosene will disappear.

Q. How can I freshen shoes quickly and easily?

A. Rub them with a little orange juice, or with the orange peel before it has dried.

Q. How can I make my pictures washable?

A. Give them a coat of white shellac.

Q. How can I make candles antique?

A. Brush brown floor stain over white candles to obtain an antique effect.

ECHO PANTRY

When cream will not whip add the white of an egg to it that has been soaked in cream. Chill both then it will whip.

When filling gem pans leave one of the small sections empty, fill with water and gems will not burn.

A few cloves added to vegetable soup will give a delicious flavor.

When frying fish dip in milk instead of egg before rolling in crumbs or meal. You will be delighted with the results.

Delicious Pumpkin Pie

One-half recipe pie crust, 2 cups shredded coconut, 2 cups mashed cooked pumpkin, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon mace, 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon allspice, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3 tablespoons melted butter, 3 eggs, slightly beaten; 2 cups milk scalded.

Method; Line deep pie plate with pastry, rolled 1/8 - inch thick, allowing pastry to extend 1-inch beyond edge. Fold edge back to form standing rim; flute with fingers. Combine 1-1/2 cups coconut and other ingredients in order given; mix thoroughly and pour into pie shell. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 20 minutes, then reduce heat to moderate (350 degrees F.) and bake 20 minutes longer. Sprinkle remaining 1/2 cup coconut over top of pie and bake 10 minutes longer, or until custard is firm and coconut is delicate brown.

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

The CSA Cardinals won their final game of the season when they nosed out the ZCJB team 5 to 4.

John Feiereisen pitched good ball and kept the ZCJB hits well scattered.

Earnest Rejsa, John Lana, Lad Hamous, Wes Dvorak, and George Svec, lead the attack with one hit a piece.

CSA Finish in 3rd Place.

The CSA Cardinals finished the season in third place in the Fraternal League winning eleven games and losing four against some of the toughest teams in the city. This makes the third straight year that the cardinals have finished among the first three teams.

The team scored 113 runs against the opponents 76 and finished the season with a team batting average of .332.

The team played in four tournaments during the season winning the tournament at Monticello and taking second money at Happy Valley, but failed to place in the Hills tournament and the CSA tournament.

Ed Horak star short stop for the CSA Cards nosed out John Lana by 4 pct. points to win the CSA trophy for high individual batting average with an average of .409 while John Lana finished with .405.

Missing The Sun's Brightness

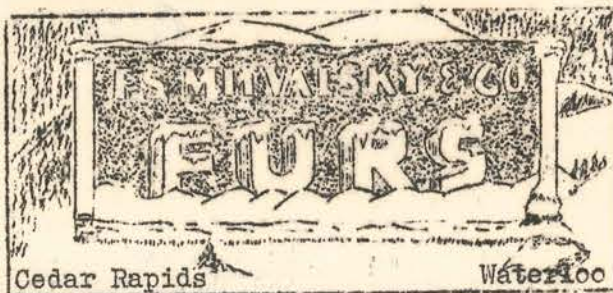
One evening a gentleman called on an
