
Such conditions as the above cannot help the CSA and we hope that you who do not like the present Organ will at every opportunity fight for the old organ and "The Hired Man".

Delicious Pumpkin Pie

One-half recipe pie crust, 2 cups shredded coconut, 2 cups mashed cooked pumpkin, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon mace, 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon allspice, 1/2 teaspoon mutmeg, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3 tablespoons melted butter, 3 eggs, slightly beaten; 2 cups milk scalded. Method; Line deep pie plate with pastry, rolled 1/8 - inch thick, allowing pastry to extend 1-inch beyond edge. Fold edge back to form standing rim; flute with fingers. Combine 1-1/2 cups coconut and other ingredients in order given; mix thoroughly and pour into pic shell. Bake in hot oven (450 dgrees F.) 20 minutes, then reduce heat to moderate (350 degrees F.) and bake 20 minutes longer. Sprinkle remaining 1/2 cup coconut over top of pie and bake 10 minutes longer, or until custard is firm and coconut is delicate brown.
