Mr. Davison founded the center, which is located next to the White Elephant, in 1997. He felt there was a need in the community for a place where young people could gather in a safe place for recreation, study and an opportunity to interact with others.

The Youth Center also offers a hot meal on Thursday nights, an annual trip to Adventureland, which this summer provided for 212 children, a "Back to School" fun day and Thanksgiving and Christmas Dinners.

Having been homeless himself at one time, he feels compassion for the local homeless and provides a breakfast for them and others in need each weekday. The morning that he spoke to us 176 people arrived for breakfast. Since 1997, 9,038 young people have used the Youth Center. There is a great need to expand and Mr. Davison is hoping to acquire a larger building across from The White Elephant.

Mr. Davison is present at the Center each weekday and relies on help from volunteers.

We are in awe of his energy and enthusiasm and we wish him well in his future endeavors.



Solon meets Tinseltown

Hollywood hits home run on Holubar farm

SOLON—The family of Ron and Mary Holubar has already experienced an above-average season this summer. Their farm was chosen as the perfect spot to shoot portions of "The Final Season," a film based on the true story of the 1991 Norway, Iowa baseball team, the last of a legendary string of state championship baseball teams produced in the tiny Benton County school that lost its independence to consolidation that fall.

Early this spring, location scout Steve Moes and his wife were cruising the Iowa countryside, looking for a site that epitomizes rural Iowa life, a setting for teenaged character Mitch to learn some not-so-gentle lessons about honest work and respectable values.

"My wife gave me the elbow," said Moes, "and pointed to this farm. As soon as I saw the lane that leads up to this beautiful house, I knew it was the place."

"The place" is the Holubar farm, in Ron's family since 1941 when his grandparents purchased the 300-acre property. Ron's father Melvin was encouraged to attend college, where he earned a mechanical engineering degree from the University of Iowa, and went on to work at Collins Radio (now Rockwell Collins) instead of returning home to run the farm. When it was time for his grandparents to retire in the 1980s, Ron put to use his agricultural studies from Kirkwood Community College and Iowa State University and answered the cattle call.

He married Mary Pisarik in 1984. The couple and their five children, ranging in ages from 2 years to 16, now operate the farm, raising cattle, pigs, rabbits and lambs, and growing beans, corn and hay. Their commitment to the homestead is obvious in the immaculately kept outbuildings, the well-manicured lawns, gardens and fields and the welcoming five-bedroom house they call home. It was these details that drew Moes to the site. After a visit with the Holubars, he was even more convinced.

"They are absolutely great people, and have been very accommodating," Moes commented.

The Holubars opened their home to a crew of dozens of people– from producers to set dressers, production managers to technicians– who turned their home into Grandpa and Grandma Akers' farm, one setting for the movie written by Art D'Alessandro.

The crew was six days into their shooting schedule when they appeared on the Holubar farm with trucks, costume and make-up trailers, a catering van, tents, a great deal of high-tech equipment and their own generator station to power it all. To get the home Hollywood-ready, the spacious first-floor interior of the Holubars' home underwent significant changes, orchestrated by a Los Angeles interior designer, to make it look more dated and humble. Chandeliers were replaced with less-flashy light fixtures, all of their furniture was placed in a moving van, to be substituted with bargain finds from area

second-hand stores, and one room even had wallpaper removed to be repainted a neutral color. Several of the Holubars' personal items were used as props during filming. "They put a photograph of my grandparents right here," Ron Holubar said as he pointed to a spot on the living room wall, "and our wedding picture went here. On a table next to the grandpa's chair was a photograph of Mary's parents. They used our piano and a few other things from our house. It will be fun to watch the film and actually see them in the scenes." The crew took nearly a week setting up the home for two days of shooting, and they are still in the process of putting everything back the way it was when they arrived. Director David Mickey Evans, whose many film credits include writing "Radio Flyer" and directing and narrating "The Sand Lot," another family-friendly baseball film, led everyone through two successful days of shooting on the farm. Evans, the producers and the film crew quickly developed a good rapport with the Holubar clan; Ron and the director exchanged inside jokes about farming, one of the camera operators befriended 7-year-old Kylie through frequent games of "Guess the Animal," and the Los Angeles folks shared stories of their own children with the Holubar kids. "I expected them to be all business," said 16-year-old Courtney Holubar. "They were all so friendly and nice to us." Twelve-year-old Ashley agreed.

"I would do it again in a heartbeat," Ashley enthused. "They became almost like family, and I didn't feel like an extra, I felt like part of the crew."

In fact, each of the Holubars did officially become part of the crew. One highlight for Kylie was sitting in the director's chair to yell "Cut!" and director Evans insisted that they all serve as extras in several scenes. The older kids were put in a high school scene, and the family attended the filming of a parade scene that depicts the Norway crowd—actually shot in Shellsburg, dressed up to look like 1990s Norway—supporting the team for their 19th state championship.

"The director got right in front of us, and said, 'I want closeups of all these people," Ron recalled. "He told the cameraman, 'Start from a second-storey window and pan right down to end up on these baby-blues," indicating the bright azure eyes of young Kylie.

Mary Holubar was cast as a teacher in the Norway school district in scenes that involved several of the film's stars. At the Norway location, actors James Gammon and Brett Claywell, both of whom also did scenes at the farm, approached Mary and struck up conversations with her, which she said is a testimony to the down-to-earth nature of all involved with the film.

"Everyone was so friendly," Mary said. "It's just such a top quality group. We met everyone from grips to leading actors. They all showed interest in Iowa and asked questions about the farm. The director was very hands-on and flexible, a real personable guy."

For a couple of scenes, Courtney and Ashley auditioned at a casting call at Lindale Mall.

"You had to stand in front of a camera and talk about your acting experience," Courtney explained. Auditioning wasn't unfamiliar territory for the Holubar kids, who have given many 4-H presentations and have often been involved in other school performances. Even so, Courtney said she is no longer enchanted by the thought of becoming a leading actor.

"You spend a lot of time waiting, then you are on for five minutes to do your scene, and then you wait some more. I'd rather be busy all the time."

Tom Holubar, 15, said the once-in-a-lifetime experience brought its own brand of 15-minute fame.

"Everyone was saying how cool it was that our house was used to film, and everyone kept asking me what it was like to be in a movie," Tom remarked. "It is hard for people to understand what it takes to make it all happen, and it's hard to explain. I can't wait to see the movie," he added. For Ron Holubar, the experience was even more special because of his family's long connection with the farm. "I am glad my grandparents had the vision to buy this dilapidated old farm," he said, relating that his grandmother used to say the farm wouldn't even grow good popcorn. "Through their hard work, they brought it back to be this beautiful place. I am proud that (the film's producers) thought it was nice enough to be in the film, and humbled that they picked our farm out of the thousands they had to choose from."

One of the film's five producers, first-timer Terry Trimpe, former implement dealer from Lisbon, was also pleased with the Iowa locations chosen for the film.

"As a producer, I get to see the dailies," Trimpe said, describing the process of reviewing scenes that are shot each day. "I have been looking at those, and I am extremely grateful to be with David Evans and (cinematographer) Dan Stoloff. We have footage that is absolutely going to show off the state of Iowa."

Trimpe especially praised Evans' vision for the movie. "David understands what this movie is all about," said Trimpe. "One of the underlying themes is we are slowly losing a slice of Americana, with kids moving from the rural communities into suburban areas.

"This film depicts how a small community reacts when it gets something very important wrenched right out of its soul," Trimpe continued, in this case, the local high school, especially important to the community of Norway, population just under 600 in 1991.

The Norway baseball team, from the school of under 100 students, won 19 state championship titles in 23 years, 13 of those with coach Jim Van Scoyoc. Sixteen Norway players went on to play some level of professional baseball, and many more played at the college level. However, a declining school enrollment and decreasing state funds brought to Norway the same vulnerability experienced by many small Iowa schools, and forced it to merge with another district. The film tells the true story of how the town, school and team struggled to maintain identity, despite a series of curve balls thrown in their last at-bat.

Trimpe is the lone local producer of the small, independent film, along with co-producers Steve Schott and Tony Wilson of Des Moines, Carl Borack and Michael Wasserman. The

production company, The Final Season, Inc., is producing the film on a relatively low budget, approximately 10 percent of an average studio budget, and has a shooting schedule of just 32 days. Shot exclusively in Iowa, including Kennedy High School in Cedar Rapids, the town of Shellsburg, rural areas around Solon and the Sutliff Bridge and, appropriately, in Norway, production of the film follows its own message. "This is a movie that is about family and community," Trimpe remarked. "One quote in the movie is, 'Baseball is the only game where the object is to get home." It has a G-rating, no sex and no violence. It's just a great story."

Final Season, Inc. continues its schedule with another call for extras to film scenes at Veteran's Stadium in Cedar Rapids this Saturday, June 24. Trimpe said they are looking for "family types" wearing clothing that is free of logos or other datable signatures. Interested parties should contact Eric Freese at

"The Final Season" is expected to be released to theaters in the spring of 2007.

As the Holubars return to their already hectic schedule, with Courtney and Tom ready to fly to Washington, D.C. for a 4-H leadership conference and the rest of the family preparing for the Johnson County Fair, they all agree this summer's experience was an unforgettable one.

"These kind of opportunities don't happen very often," Mary commented. "From what we have seen, and after hearing the actors talk, it seems everyone has a good feeling about this movie.

"Big movie or small," she added, "it was still a great experience."

And that's a wrap.
