Muzika! A Celebration of Czech and Slovak Music

Special Exhibit in the Robert J. Petrik Exhibit Hall Open through October 17, 2004.



We've lost count of the number of people who have asked when we were going to feature music more prominently, why don't we mention the Beer Barrel Polka in the permanent exhibition, or why Czechs and Slovaks are so musical. Muzika! A

Celebration of Czech and Slovak Music is finally here to answer all these questions and many others.

The National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library reveals the long tradition and beauty of Czech and Slovak music in the original exhibition, Muzika! A Celebration of Czech and Slovak Music. Muzika! is a journey through time that explores the history and development of this expressive art form as it examines the musicians, instruments, and the composers that inspired generations. This dynamic exhibition features Gregorian chants of the 9th and 10th centuries, Czech and Slovak instruments from the 16th through 21st centuries, and Czech and Slovak music ranging from classical and folk recordings to rock and jazz. Visitors will see and hear unique instruments used in traditional Czech and Slovak ensembles, discover Iowa's connection to the most famous Czech composer, learn why the communists banned one Czechoslovak band, and experiment with instruments to discover new sounds.

Muzika! draws upon the diverse sheet and recorded music archives of the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library. Highlights also include original 16th through

20th century Czech and Slovak instruments from the National Music Museum at The University of South Dakota, Vermillion (go to http://www.usd.edu/smm/gall eries.html#Muzika for virtual exhibit of instruments on loan to the NCSML from the National Music Museum); new woodwind, brass and string Amatiinstruments from V.F.Cervený Denak, and companies; Strunal and original manuscripts from the Czech Music Museum of the National Museum in Prague.



When you visit, be sure to bring the kids and grandkids! Do you remember experimenting with triangles, tambourines and the glockenspiel in school? Look for our play corner in *Muzika*!, where adults and kids alike can try a variety of modern and traditional rhythm instruments made in the Czech Republic and Slovakia.

If we still haven't piqued your interest, consider these questions: Why would the communists have banned a music group in former Czechoslovakia? What is Iowa's connection to the most celebrated Czech composer? Who was Slovakia's most famous composer? What is a schediphon? Have you heard of a clumsy foot? You must tour the exhibition to find out!



Be sure to plan a visit soon to see *Muzika*! The exhibit will be on display through October 17, 2004.

Museum Guild Prepares Cookbook

Excerpts from Letter by Beula Dvorak, Chair of Cookbook Committee Andrea Siebenmann, Guild President

EDITOR'S NOTES: The Museum Guild of the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library provides volunteer and financial support to the NCSML. They have recently embarked on an exciting project to develop a national cookbook, with more than just recipes. It promises to be a little slice of culture too. Although the final product won't be available until next year, I'm always excited to hear about a cookbook with good old Czech and Slovak recipes, and I thought you might be too.

The Guild is beginning an exciting, significant, and unique heritage preservation project – the publication of a national cookbook, filled with history and recipes of the Czech- and Slovak-American communities. Proceeds from the sale of the cookbook will help support the activities of the NCSML.

The Guild has gathered stories and recipes for the first national Czech- and Slovak-American cookbook. They have collected:

- family histories and remembrances, including photographs and documents;
- recollections and recipes pertaining to holiday or family celebrations; and
- stories and recipes of favorite dishes passed down generation to generation.

All submissions, including photographs, are being donated to the NCSML library to continue the NCSML's efforts to document Czech- and Slovak-American heritage. The committee hopes to provide a comprehensive collection of recipes and stories, along with interesting antidotes about Czechs and Slovaks in the United States, without duplication of recipes.

The cookbook will be available for sale in May 2005. In 2006, the NCSML opens an original exhibition about Czech and Slovak immigrant communities in the United States. This cookbook will be a key component in the promotion of this exhibition and serve as an excellent resource to those who can and cannot visit the NCSML.

May 27th, 2004, the Cedar River next to the Czech & Slovak Museum & Library rose to 18.3 feet, more than 6 feet above flood stage. IV. Historic Perspectives:

Guess the Name of this Polka

Excerpts from the Vienna Free Press

A survey was conducted at the beginning of the year 2000 to determine the top hit of the century. In the National Home (of Brass Music) on Smichov street in Prague #5, the polka composed by the King of Brass Band music of Zbraslav was so selected. Judges of the hits were Marcela Holanov and Karel Gott. The (magnificent) leaded crystal trophy was accepted by the descendants of this famous musician with the intention of installing the trophy in memory of Jaromir Vejvoda in Zbraslav.

Jaromir Vejvoda came from a long line of musicians. His father and grandfather were bandmasters in Zbraslav. At a very early age he learned to play the violin, later the trumpet and at the age of fifteen he became a member of his father's band. Shortly after he returned from military service, where he played with an army organization of ten members in Brno, he took over the leadership of his father's band. He was in his early twenties and (at that time) his organization, as well as other bands (in the area), had a very small repertoire of music. Perhaps for that very reason young Jaromir Vejvoda began to try his hand at composing. He was successful. In 1927 there emerged a polka which he called Moranska Polka. It was without the characteristic bass configuration.

The Modranska Polka he then played only with his own organization, later he lent it to other band masters for copying. The first recording of the Modranska Polka on gramophone records was done by the Esta Benes band. In 1929 Jaromir Vejvoda wrote the completed harmony for the bass instruments and the polka got its present appearance. But the interest in it had already jumped across the borders of the Zbraslav region and it had begun to be played in Prague.

Requests for the polka were impressive and in 1934 Jaromir Vejvoda received an invitation for its publication with the J. Hoffmann publishers in Prague. There he became acquainted with the lyricist, Vasek Zeman, and a long collaboration followed. Zeman provided the words, named the polka Skoda Lasky (Sorry I loved you) and the song flew out into the world.

Its first American recorded debut was with the accordion band of Willa Glabe in 1938 at which time the Vejvoda polka was sold to the firm Sharpior /Bernstein, a large American publishing house. Within five years the polka sold over a million copies and became the thirty second record to receive "Gold Record" award. (Enrico Caruso was the first "Gold Record" achiever in 1903 with his Vesti la giubba" from the opera Pagliacci.)

During the Second World War the polka was sung in every European language on both sides of the front. It nestled in so well, that everyone thought it to be their own. But these developments were unknown to us here at home. Not until at the end of the war, with the arrival of the joined armed forces and with the return of the Czechoslovakian soldiers and the returning war emigrants did Jaromir Vejvoda learn about his little song.

The polka Skoda Lasky has emerged under many different titles all over the world. The most familiar in English speaking countries is the "Beer Barrel Polka" otherwise known as "Roll Out the Barrel". During the war in the USA it even became "Here Comes the Navy" and was considered the theme song of the navy. In Germany it is popular as "Rosamund", in France "Frida oum Papa", in Sweden "Ut i naturen", Denmark "Dags for en polka", in Finland" Hvor er min Kone", in Italy "Rosamunda," in Brazil, "Barril de chapp", in Hungary, "Sej-Haj, Rozi". One could continue to enumerate further even though it is difficult to ascertain in how many languages it truly exists, in how many different arrangements it was and continues to be played.

Just the "Beer" Facts

According to the "Beer Consumption Calculator" on Prague TV's web site, the people of the Czech Republic have already consumed over 1 Billion liters of beer this year. For an up-to-the-minute count, go to http://prague.tv/toys/beer/. That breaks down as follows:



- 187,280.14 liters per hour
- 52.02 liters per second
- Every man, woman, and child each has drunk 100 liters so far this year!

A variety of sources identify the Czech Republic as having the highest per person consumption of beer of any nation. On the average, every man, woman and child consumes 160 Liters per year. Given that some children are most certainly well below that average, it takes some significant consumption to make it to that average. Here are some examples of other nations of interest:

- Czech Republic 160
- Germans 131
- Australians 109
- Belgians 99
- British 97
- US 83

Here are some more Czech firsts:

- · First Beer Museum in the world
- First beer brewing textbook
- First Pilsener
- First Budweiser

If you'd like to "dive" into this topic in more depth, I suggest you start at the following web site for Prague TV: http://prague.tv/toys/beer/. From there, select the highlighted links (History of Beer, Czech Beer Culture, History in a Nutshell, and Czech Breweries) in the article to get more details.

For those of you not wishing to take that journey, I'll summarize some of the more interesting points and provide some excerpts from those articles.

There is evidence that hops were already being cultivated in the Czech region 859 and were being exported in 903. It seems that the agricultural conditions are ideal for growing hops. Bohemian hops were so prized that King Wenceslas ordered the death penalty for anyone caught exporting the cuttings, from which new plants could be grown.

In early days, only citizens in the Czech lands had the right to brew beer - and that for their own consumption - so most citizens had a microbrewery in their home. In the 13th century, King Wenceslas convinced the Pope to revoke an order banning the brewing of beer, which may explain why he's called Good King Wenceslas.

The beer industry grew from that point, and ultimately the Czechs were exporting their beer, most notably the beer they brewed in the town of Ceske Budejovice in south Bohemia. The Bavarians who were importing this beer understandably had a hard time pronouncing the name of the town, and so they referred to it as "Budweis," a place name that is still associated with great beer today - as is Pilsner, which is derived from the place name of the west Bohemian town of Plzen.

Following the 16th Century till the 19th Century, the Czech beer industry was devastated. The Czech nation - and its beer - did not begin to recover until the "national awakening" movement of the 19th century, when the Czech language, Czech culture, and Czech beer were reinvented after centuries of Germanization and decline.

Under the Communists, beer was very cheap - and it was legal. This helped establish beer drinking as perhaps the single most popular hobby among Czech men. One of the Czech Republic's most famous beer drinkers, the protagonist of Jaroslav Hasek's novel "The Good Soldier Svejk", said that the government that raises the price of beer is destined to fall within one year". The Communists almost doubled the price of beer in 1984 (from 1.70 to 2.50 crowns per half-liter), so it took 5 years instead of one for the prophecy to come to pass.

President Vaclav Havel may be the best spokesman beer has ever had in the Czech Republic, at least in public office. In 1995, he was quoted as saying "I suppose that drinking beer in pubs has got a good influence on the behavior of Czech society, because beer contains less alcohol than for example wine, vodka or whisky and therefore people's political chat in pubs is less crazy."

Library Cataloguing

Czech Heritage Foundation members recently received a letter from our President, Arlo Netolicky, introducing you to a fund drive that the Foundation has initiated to aid in cataloguing the NCSML's library collection. Our organization feels a keen commitment to that collection. In fact, it was a similar fund drive several years ago that provided the kick-off funding to establish the permanent position of Museum Librarian. You might say the Library is one of our pet projects.

The National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library preserves and protects more than 18,000 books, periodicals, and archival materials about Czech and Slovak culture. However, it is not enough to house a large collection of materials. Scholars, students, historians, genealogists, and the general public must have easy access to them. That's where this massive cataloguing process comes in.

We would like to take this opportunity to show you a sample of the good work that has started as a result of gifts such as yours.

Cataloguer On Staff

Samantha Hines has been hired to provide part-time cataloguing assistance over a two year period. That assignment is now half over. Samantha has a Masters in Library Science, and worked as a cataloger at the University of Illinois prior to coming here. Under the direction of Dave Muhlena, Samantha has first focused on cataloguing English language items first, then items they feel will be of the most general interest (such as cultural materials and photographs).

Catalogue Examples

As items are catalogued, the catalogue information becomes available over the Internet, through the

Library's web site. Thus, scholars all over the world can search our collection for works of particular interest to them.

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From this page, you can select to search by keywords, title, author, or subject. Once search results are returned, highlighted phrases themselves are links. For example, if you found an item you liked, you could simply "click" on the author's name and you would see all the items in the collection by that author.

I tried searching for "Charles Bridge". I found 3 items, one of which was written by a follow with my last name. I clicked on his name, and found he only had one item in our collection, but there were several other Novotny's listed as well.
