HANDY ANDY ANSWERS

Q. How can I remedy soup that is too salty?

A. Add two or three pinches of brown sugar to the soup. This will remove the salty taste, but will not sweeten the soup.

Q. How can I avoid getting rough hands on washdays?

A. Add a few drops of vinegar to the rinsing water on washday, and it will help prevent the hands from becoming rough.

Q. How can I remove water stains from furniture?

A. Use a tablespoon of powdered pumice mixed with enough linseed oil to make a thin paste. Rub on the spots until they disappear. Then wipe off with a cloth dampened in polish.

Q. How can I prevent the hot fat in a frying pan from spattering?

A. Sprinkle a little flour, or salt in the pan before using the fat for frying.

Q. How can I prevent the chipping of dishes, caused by striking them against the kitchen sink faucet?

A. This can be prevented if one inch lengths of garden hose are cut and one of these fastened to the end of each faucet.
