All is Ready for Opening of A Thousand Years of Czech Culture

Opening Weekend Events Planned

usic, food, and ethnic entertainment will celebrate nine months of planning and preparations on Saturday, May 24, with the opening of A Thousand Years of Czech Culture: Riches from the National Museum in Prague. At 9:30 a.m. a brief ribbon-cutting ceremony will be the final act before this very special exhibition is opened to the public. Consisting of 205 artifacts from the National Museum in Prague, all woven into a graphically pleasing interpretation, A Thousand Years is one of the finest exhibitions currently traveling in the U.S., and it represents a major step forward for the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library. Cedar Rapids is the second and last venue for this exhibition, which was a four-year collaborative effort between The National Museum in Prague and Old Salem in Winston-Salem, North Carolina. The exhibition will run through December 31.

A three-day event is planned to help celebrate the exhibit opening. Czech music will be ever present on the Garden Stage on the museum's south side. Among the other activities will be nationally recognized ethnic artist Daniela Mahoney doing scratched egg demonstrations and Joe Nolte providing children's storytelling. Sunday's highlight will be a Pageant of Costumes, as owners of kroje (Czech and Slovak

national costumes) will march into the WFLA Heritage Hall.
Food concessions will be provided by Zindrick's. (See this page, right, for the weekend schedule.)
"We are very inter-

ested in creating an atmosphere that is festive and colorful and in keeping with the exhibit," explained Dan Baldwin, the museum's executive director. "But at the same time, this is a celebration for our museum and for Cedar Rapids. We want our public to enjoy the sense of accomplishment that the staff, board of

directors, volunteers, and sponsors feel about this special project. "We also want to provide alternate activities in case there are lines for the

exhibit."

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

here is considerable excitement reverberating through the halls of the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library. The largest and perhaps most significant programmatic event in the museum's history is nearly ready for the public to enjoy. The past months have been filled with details large and small, including making ready the gallery, design of the gallery space, arrangements for the shipment of the artifacts, negotiating contracts, travel arrangements for our colleagues from Prague, and communication with the staff at Old Salem. There have been days of particular excitement: the arrival of the artifacts in mid-April; the arrival of our new exhibit cases, gallery walls, and plexiglass, all of which stay with the museum; seeing the unveiling of our marketing plan; and, watching the faces of the few who have been let into the exhibition space, seeing their surprise at its complete transformation and their sense of awe in the historical and artistic nature of the artifacts. As I write, the exhibit is about 70% installed. The project is on schedule and on budget.

It is not too early to begin thanking those who have played a significant part in making this possible. First, of course, are members of the staffs of the National Museum in Prague and Old Salem. These two institutions are responsible for creating this amazing exhibit. Foremost are Milan Stloukal and Hobie Cawood, the leaders of the museums who generously included the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library in the American adventures of A Thousand Years of Czech Culture, and have afforded our institution tremendous respect during this process. Vladimir Brych of the National Museum and Margaret Vincent of Old Salem were coproject directors for A Thousand Years. It was their drive over four years that allowed the project to reach fruition. They are to be congratulated.

The staff at the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library has done an exemplary job this spring. Our staff size presents extra challenges when faced with a project this large. The only answer is to work harder. Two, in particular, were saddled with enormous responsibility, Judy Ostrander, director of development, joined the museum staff in October 1996. In November we began a \$350,000 campaign to bring A Thousand Years to Cedar Rapids. She engineered the drive that now has us on the brink of successfully attaining our financial goal, having the project 100% underwritten. Carmen Langel is my co-project director for the installation of A Thousand Years of Czech Culture in our facility. She has overseen all the enhancements to the exhibit hall, the deinstallation and storing of our collection, working with the curatorial staffs at Old Salem and the National Museum, working out the logistics of unpacking and processing the artifacts within the gallery while maintaining strict standards, and is now closely involved with the actual installation. Seven-day weeks have been the norm for Judy and Carmen. And while I point out these two specifically, the entire staff has gone well beyond the call of duty so that we can provide the public with something very special. Please remember to thank them for a job so well done.

However, without our donors, we would not be discussing the opening of this exhibit. A Thousand Years of Czech Culture belongs to the community because it is the community that made its trip to Cedar Rapids possible. From our members whose gifts provide important operational support to the designated contributions for A Thousand Years, each show of support has been significant. My thanks is never ending, and my hope is that you will enjoy this exhibit, and the bright future that follows, in ways more than commensurate with your abundant generosity.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

Library News and Notes

t times it feels like the Library is in the calm eye of the storm called A Thousand Years of Czech Culture. While the pace of change may be a bit slower than in the rest of this organization, our library systems and procedures continue to develop at a steady rate.

Since the last report, we have received the complete sheet music collection of the Lyre Society of Chicago. Founded in 1870, the Lyre Society is composed of men of Czech descent who celebrate their Czech heritage through song. The chorus was quite famous in the early part of this century, performing for many Czech and American dignitaries and on tours of Europe and the United States. The sheet music collection consists of hundreds of folders each containing the male vocal parts of a particular

song. Many of the pieces were written or arranged by Frank Kubina who conducted the group for over 70 years. Often Mr. Kubina wrote out the music by hand and duplicated it for each of the men in the chorus. The collection contains the original and the copies. We are very pleased to have the Lyre sheet music as part of our collection. I know that it contains many treasures to be discovered over time.

The Lyre Society no longer performs, but you can still experience a part of their history by visiting the small exhibit in the Library.

Also on display in the Library is the first exhibit in the Archive Exhibit Series featuring the Mitvalsky family of Cedar Rapids. Photos in this exhibit were donated to the NCSML by Richard L. Mitvalsky. The exhibit series will feature

materials from our Archives including photographs, papers, and other graphical materials and will rotate every few months.

These exhibits and the new reference desk and computer have given the library a new look. We plan to have the grand opening of the library this summer. Final date and time will be announced in the next issue of *Most*. In the meantime, the Library is open by appointment. Come by and see it.

Orientation and Training Workshops for Museum Volunteers

he first of four volunteer orientation and training workshops in anticipation of the special exhibit, A Thousand Years of Czech Culture, was held April 21. The morning and evening sessions were conducted by Program Coordinator, Patricia Hikiji, and Curator of the Collections, Carmen Langel. Executive Director, Dan Baldwin, outlined the steps undertaken by the museum to bring this outstanding collection to Iowa. He described the richness, variety, historical, and educational value of the artifacts and stressed the important role the volunteers would play in presenting this major exhibition to the visiting public.

Job descriptions were outlined, emergency procedures reviewed, and security precautions discussed. Museum volunteers will fill the positions of gallery attendant, immigrant home docent, information station attendant, and gift store sales clerk. Five stations will be maintained in the gallery with one roving, relief position. Two attendants will greet visitors and sell admis-

sion tickets in our newly constructed information station. Docents in the immigrant home (one per room) will help to interpret the lifestyle of the immigrant families who settled here in Cedar Rapids. Two sales clerks will be needed, per shift, to wait on

customers shopping for unique ethnic and imported items in the Gift Store,

Seventy individuals participated in the April 21 sessions. Thirty-nine were new recruits to the museum's volunteer program. More than seventy individuals registered for the May 12 workshop. Those who are interested in volunteering (this specific volunteer opportunity), but were unable to attend the scheduled

CURATOR'S REPORT

The Challenges of Mounting A Thousand Years of Czech Culture

he final word that A Thousand Years of Czech Culture was coming to The National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library marked the end of a quiet winter working primarily with the collections. My first opportunity to fully appreciate the immensity of the task in front of us came at the end of January when our exhibit designer, Robert Bodnar, and I visited Winston-Salem to view the exhibition and meet the staff of Old Salem, Inc.

It was immediately apparent that we had two major hurdles to overcome. The first was time. Most museums plan many months or years in preparation for such a large exhibition. The second was staff size. Old Salem has a very large staff, while we have only a handful of full-time people.

Preparing the gallery for the arrival of the artifacts was as much work as mounting the exhibition. All our artifacts and display cases had to be removed from the gallery and put into storage. After the artifacts were removed, all the temporary walls and track lights were taken out. Once the gallery was empty, we had only two weeks to finish the climate control, reinstall the track lights, patch and paint the walls, and install the carpet.

The arrival of the artifacts in mid April marked a new phase in preparation for the exhibition. Over a week was spent unpacking the 50+ artifact crates. Next was the process of actual artifact installation. This phase will take a long time and numerous individuals

(one piece weighs over 880 pounds!). By the opening of the exhibition, we will have been assisted by four curators from the National Museum in Prague and staff from other local museums, including the Cedar Rapids Museum of Art and the History Center.

The opening of A Thousand Years of Czech Culture on May 24 will be remembered as another significant event in the history of the organization. It's our first major exhibition in the new building, it will help lead us into development of our own core exhibition to open in the gallery early next year, and hopefully be the first of many collaborations with the National Museum in Prague.

History of Czechs in America Book Now Available in our Gift Store!



This valuable resource book was written by Dr. Jan Habenicht of Chicago and published by the Hlas Publishing Company of St. Louis in 1910. It was translated

into English by Miroslav Koudelka, a member of CGSI, and edited and arranged by Paul M. Makousky, Publication Chair of CGSI.

The book has 595 pages (8 1/2" x 11"), is bound by a hard cover and features a beautifully finished metallic blue and white jacket containing a photograph of the Dvorak family in their raspberry field in Minnetonka Township, Minnesota on front and the Vasko family on their farm near Sun Prairie, Wisconsin on the back. Additions to the book include an index to the illustrations, a foreword to the English edition by Paul M. Makousky, a list of the Czech fraternal organizations, maps of the 17 states with the largest Czech populations, a complete surname index, a geographical name index, and a biography of the author.

Even if you don't find your family name(s) in this book, it is very valuable in describing the living conditions and experiences of our Czech forebearers from the mid 1800's to 1910. This book provides the most extensive description of Czech life' in religion, among fraternal organizations, in the press, in theater, and in the struggle for maintaining the Czech heritage versus becoming part of the American melting pot.

The History of Czechs In America will provide an excellent education for anyone interested in the history of the United States, whether Czech or not.

ovely items are arriving each day in preparation for the opening of A Thousand Years of Czech Culture including our Royal Czech Lion Broach, the two-tailed crowned lion on a shield. It is a late Gothic variant of the symbol for the Czech state.

Since the Velvet Revolution in 1989, the talents of these artisans, with their new found freedom, have set a new hallmark in mouth blown and hand-cut works of art. The companies include: Karl Anton, Glass Atelier, Mottee, J. Blazek. We are

expecting to host a Trunk Showing of this glass in October.

Our new 53 cm Czech, Moravian, and Slovak dressed dolls have also arrived and would like to find new homes. For the first time we have a Bride doll from Moravia.

Czech, Moravian and Slovak traditional costumes coloring book by Daniela Mahoney has also arrived. You will be able to have the artist/author sign the book for you during the opening of *A Thousand Years of Czech Culture* May 24 and 25 in the Gift Store.

Field Trips and Cultural Experiences

he months of April and May bring showers and flowers and "school tours!"

Schools from the Cedar Rapids area and surrounding communities plan field trips to the Museum as a culminating activity for the school year or for a particular unit of study. Tours are tailored to the age, interest level or subject matter being taught. The restored, 2-room, immigrant home adjacent to the museum gives students an opportunity to learn what life was like in the late 1800's to early 1900's. A walking tour of neighboring Czech Village is often included as part of the ethnic experience.

Students can learn about the hand repair of leather items, discover a 100-year old business that relies on "feathers," find out what the special ingredients are in home-made style, Czech meat products, and cooperate in a "taste test" for the local baker.

Three schools visited the latter part of April for a total of 185 students. Eight more schools are currently scheduled for May with an additional 340.

ajor funding for the exhibit, A Thousand Years of Czech Culture: Riches from the National Museum in Prague, has been provided by the Hall-Perrine Foundation. A grant in the amount of \$100,000 in support of securing the exhibit was made contingent upon matching provisions whereby The Hall-Perrine Foundation provided \$1.00 for every \$2.00 raised from other individuals and corporations. This challenge was met in April. Gifts and pledges toward the exhibition have now risen to \$320,000 closing the gap on the \$340,000 needed to completely underwrite the cost of the project.

This project not only brings to Cedar Rapids a world-class exhibit, but it also provides resources to design and fabricate cases, pedestals, and other design elements that will remain and house our new permanent collection at the Museum after A Thousand Years of Czech Culture has closed. The long-term benefits of this exhibition to the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library will be significant.
