a "popular Scientific Geographical Travelogue Monthly, 1982, 31st year" published by Academia, Praha, is a magazine 5 x 8 inches with a 5 x 5 1/2 inch picture of the lead article in the issue.

A wide variety of travel reports and scientific findings fill the 45 pages of each issue. Titles of a few of the articles are: Mountain Climbing in Tatra Mts. (Slovakia)., Train Trip from Bangkok to Chieng Mai (Thailand), Maya Ruins in Yucatan (Mexico), Blue Mountains (Australia), Trinidad (Cuba), Aswan (Egypt), Great Wall of China, Amur RRy. cut-off (USSR), Winter in the Far North (Canada), Castle of Chillon (Switzerland). Truly the magazine is the "national geographic" of Czechoslovakia! Some colored photos are used but B-W predominate along with small maps to pin-point the place. There are brief reports from Uzbek, Aral Sea area, Jugoslavia, Great Britain, Poland etc. etc.... "Space filler" topics are: New Books, India, Spanish RRys., Romania, Mongolia etc. etc.

The magazine comes to George Swab in exchange for his sending our "National Geographic" to a friend in Czechoslovakia. The friend reported that some complete articles are cut out by the censors before the copy comes to him. Larry Vavra received the copies from George Swab and thence to the desk of the co-editor.



CSA CONVENTION MEETS IN CHICAGO. The sum of \$150,00 was donated to the Czech Heritage Fdn. Scholarship Fund. We are appreciative and most grateful of this gift that helps to support our participation in the International Living "Home stay" project. Cedar Rapids is the only city that has students on a four-weeks summer stay with a family behind the "iron curtain" in Czechoslovakia. Often students meet their relatives or visit the place from where the family emigrated. In this way they better relate to their own heritage and culture.

LINDEN TREE 600 YEARS OLD! Yes, the favorite tree of Czechoslovakia is the linden (lipa) with its small-long long leaves from



which projects a stem of the flower used for tea. Later, seeds will develop. The larger heartshaped leaves have serrate edges. Honey bees feast on the

nectar of the flowers. A tree at Bojnice, Slovakia (some 40 feet at its base) is some 25 mi. southwest of Trencin which is sort of a suburb of Prievidza. The linden is also called basswood, a light and fine-grained used in woodenware, cabinetwork and toys.

Janaček's opera "The Cunning Little Vixen" - 7 of the adventures of a little fox "Sharp Eyes" was written by author Rudolf Tesnohlidek in a Moravian dialect. Set to music in 1920's by Janacek, the translation appeared in 1985! Two women took on the task. Tatiana Firkusny, wife of the world famous pianist virtuoso who appeared as soloist with our Cedar Rapids Symphony in 1981. Then Maritza Morgan a former Jugoslav, started the task. Both women knew Czech but had some problems with the dialect used by the author. The literal translation was adapted by Robert T. Jones for publication. All of you readers know that the flavor of a foreign language is lost when translated into English. which lacks the subtle implications and nuances of other languages.

Maritza Morgan is a writer, critic, volunteer fire fighter, artist and associated with the news--in Chautauqua, New York, during the summer season of activities.

Returning from Czechoslovakia on a plane in 1978, Maritza Morgan was seated next to Robert T. Jones, an editor, journalist "and of all things a specialist in Janacek's music". In their conversation, references were made to the VIXEN. Mr. Jones remarked that he



so wanted the story translated but did not know anyone fluent in both Czech and English. Since Maritza had lived in Brno during teen-age years, she was familiar with the language and said, "I will do it!" Every week a chapter was sent to Jones. Her Eng-

lish was "too European" so Mrs. Firkusny converted the "dialogue into contemporary English".

Janacek made some changes in the final scene. The premiere of the opera was in Brno in 1924 but the translation appeared 61 years later. The drawings by Stanislav Lolek in the Czech edition were replaced by those of Maurice Sendak who also designed the stage sets. Some of you readers recall seeing the opera at Hancher Aud. (Iowa City) a few years ago. The gorgeous costumes had been rented from the Santa Fe Opera. One is moved by

- the life-like story, music and ideas of the foxes and other animals and the people.

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LEOŠ JANAČEK wrote two operas in his later years (1854-1927): KABA KABANOVA (1921-22) often appears in the opera news and "Z MRTVEHO DOMU" (From the Home of the Dead) (1927-28) is based on Dostoyevsky's



four years of exile in a Siberian penal colony. He had been sent there because he was working with a "radical" group who operated an illegal printing press. Since this opera is one of the last that Janacek composed, he never made any corrections or changes in the copy. There are adaptations of it. What a pity that many of us live far from the places operas by Czech composers can be seen and heard!

Sir CHARLES MACKERRA is a United States born Australian conductor who studied in Czechoslovakia and guest conducted there. He said, "Janacek is a particular concern of mine". Sir Charles' interest in Janacek concerns the interpretation of a composer's works: shall it be the way the composer expected or the way it appeals to a conductor? Conductor Mackerra presented Janacek's "JENUFFA" from the manuscript copy with changes brought to light as more material is found. However, the changes made by Kovarovic are more popular with Czech audiences.



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ALICE MASARYK, Nov. 29, 1986 marked the 20th anniversary of her death - a very special woman. She was the eldest of the children of Thomas G. Masaryk and Charlotte Garrigue Masaryk. At the age of 32. Alice came to study social welfare at the University of Chicago Settlement House. Then she returned to Prague. W. W. I broke out. Her father, often referred to as T.G.M. escaped from Austria to organize a worldwide movement to liberate the Czechs and Slovaks and Moravians. One must remember that at this time the "Province of Bohemia" was a part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire. Alice was "imprisoned on charges of complicity" in her father's plans. Alice's death sentence was revoked "mostly because of American intervention".

After the war, Alice Masaryk founded the Red Cross in Czechoslovakia and devoted 20 years to that work.

WW II found the family again seeking refuge. Alice came to the United States while brother Jan Masaryk went to London with the Czechoslovak Government in exile.

Here in United States, Alice organized many Czech branches of the Red Cross. Very likely the reader of this newsletter may have been active in that program of relief as were many Czech women in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

Sister Olga, wife of Dr. Revilliod in Switzerland, and he had 2 sons who had volunteered to help the Czechs and Slovaks operating out of Great Britain. Both died in "bombing runs" on the continent.

WW II came to an end and the Yalta Agreement brought Czechoslovakia to an end as well. Brother Herbert had died in the typhoid



epidemic and brother
Jan met his death by
murder and defenestration in Prague. Now
alone, she returned to
the United States. For
some 10 years she
lived with a friend in
Miami. Often she visited Masaryktown,
Florida which had been
founded by Slovak

Americans in the 1920's. In April, 1966 Alice

Masaryk moved to the Bohemian Home for the Aged in Chicago. She died some 7 months later. Altho she had failing eye sight, at age 87 she retained her "selflessness, brilliant mind, flashes of humor and keen grasp of world events."

Thus comes to an end that line of the Masaryk Family.

NEBRASKA: Bruno (Brno), Jelen, Kowanda, Loučky, Prague, Janousek, Tabor, Touhy. .

TEXAS: Bíla Hora, Dubuna, Frydek, Holub, Frenstat, Hegar, Holik, Kovar, Krásná Lípa Marak, Mikeska, Nechanitz, Novohrad, Rosanky, Roznov, Pisek, Prague, Praha, Tabor, Vsetin, Vokaty, Žižkov. . . .

And there are today names of towns and cities without a Slavic "flavor" that have from 30% to 90% Czech, Moravian or Slovak communities. Some examples of these places are: Crete and Wilber, Neb., Wilson, Kan., Yukon, Okla., and in Texas - Temple, West, LaGrange, Richardson, Ennis, Caldwell, Beaumont, Harlingen and many others since Texas has the Hispanics as the 2nd largest group and the Slavs as 3rd largest in its population.

A SPECTACULAR EVENING on Oct. 27th was to see and hear The Slovak State Folk Ensemble from Bratislava, Czechoslovakia. Audience appreciation of the precision of the rhythm of dancers' movements, the spectacular leaps, jumps, twists and turns in a variety of formations and the uniformity of their "footwork" was greeted with bursts of applause, shouts and whistling! The costumes were colorful and represented the theme of the dance or region of Slovakia. For example, a long black cape covered a "Hussars Uniform" of bright red of the 17th century "rebels" of Slovakia; in Spring Dance, the young women wore long white full-skirted dresses with white aprons edged with eyelet embroidery and a crown with streamers of pink, green and yellow ribbons. In addition to the dancers, a bagpiper (schwanda) held the stage alone and later, an accordion player appeared. The "virtuoso stage orchestra" of 10 musicians played melodies from Horehronice region. The leading violinist directed with verve and flourish. In a solo part he produced the "moo-moo" of a cow and the twitter of birds! The music on the cymbarin (?)-hammer dulcimer -- was played by that musician using two small hammers or plucking the strings. On such a short keyboard -- the instrument was like a miniature piano on four legs and box some 24-28 inches in length -- the "cymbalnik's" hands and fingers moved with unbelievable speed over the keyboard.

Following the program, a reception was held in the foyer of Hancher Auditorium, University of Iowa. The Czech Plus Polka Band of Cedar Rapids entertained--a large crowd milled about. The Slovaks joined in the exchange of greetings and welcome to Iowa. The Czech Heritage Fdn. arranged for two buses for transportation to Iowa City. Many people drove their cars, too.



KAREL HUSA was honored at several events on his 65th birthday, Aug. 8, 1986. The newest composition of the composer-conductor had its world premiere in September when Zubin Mehta directed the New York Philharmonic concert. Husa received the Pulitzer Prize in 1969 for his Third String Quartet. He has been associated for many years with the Ithaca College (Honorary Doctorate) and Cornell University. There was a Husa Festival for the 65th birthday! The Board of Directors of the Czech Heritage Foundation, Inc., recommends the adoption of the amended By-laws as set forth below, for your consideration, to be voted on at the Annual Meeting, Jan. 19, 1987.

ARTICLE IV. Election of Officers.

Section 1. The Nominating Committee shall consist of one member of the Board of Directors and two members-at-large. The Committee will designate the chairperson.

ARTICLE V. Officers.

Section 1. The officers of this Foundation shall consist of President, Vice President, Secretary, Financial Secretary and Treasurer.

ARTICLE VI. Duties of Officers.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all monies concerned with the operation of this Foundation. The Treasurer will be assisted by the Financial Secretary.

Section 5. The Financial Secretary shall collect membership dues and shall keep an up-to-date file of all members, their address and dates dues are paid. He shall issue a membership card each year to each member whose dues are current. Delinquent members shall be contacted and an attempt made to obtain payment of dues to date. All funds collected shall be turned over to the Treasurer.

ARTICLE VIII. Board of Directors.

Section 2. Whenever a Director fails to attend three meetings in a calendar year without a valid excuse for his absence, submitted in advance of the meetings, the office shall be declared vacant only after a majority vote of the Executive Committee. The name of the Director shall then be deleted from the record of the list of Board Members and the position shall be vacant.

ARTICLE IX. Standing Committees.

Section 3. The Auditing Committee shall consist of three members who shall audit books prior to the Annual Meeting in January.

Section 5. The Newsletter and Publication Committee shall develop no less than four issues of the newsletter to the membership during the year. It shall be responsible for additional printing of materials as needed.

Section 6. The Program Committee shall plan and provide periodic events that keep Czech heritage before the Community. When more than one Annual Meeting is held, provide for the program and events.

State Agriculture Commissioner, Jim Hightower, invited Jaroslav Urban Director of a 10,000 acre Collective Farm with over 1,000 cattle, 1,000 people employees and some 4500 acres of forested land, much of the rest in pasture. "Marie Černý is in charge of poultry division and her brother, Karel Picka, Director of Cattle Breeding."

The guests were really astonished to see so much unproductive land and variety of implements. Some of their comments were:
"...material possessions...technical advances...high productivity....all of the implement dealers..." Most of the "cattle"

are dairy breeds and later used for beef so quality of meat is lower.

Mrs. Černý remarked on the "lucky house-wife"... appliances, Microwave oven, dishwashers, air conditioning.

The visitors were on a ranch and farm.



The population of Czechoslovakia is over 15,000,000 with 64% Czech and 30% Slovak, 6% others.
