22¢/llb. So, like the \$732 Chevy
in 1934 is today 7 to 9 times that
price of long ago.

The Association meets every Thursday to consider the many details of projets underway and work on long range plans. MUCH IS HAPPENING in the VILLAGE
This spring, beautification projects will be in full swing. Plans
are to add IO3 new parking spaces
to the Shopping Area.

According to City Planning, two new parking lots will be underway this spring with funding by Community Development monies. The lot

on 15th Street S.W. will then accommodate 37 cars and the lot to be constructed on 17th Street S.W. will have spaces for 66 cars. The spaces will be unmetered. Both parking

areas will provide large service and stopping lanes.

New sidewalks between A Street and C Street S.W. on I6th Avenue are a Czech Village Project. Now settled is the Rapoport Transaction. And so leveling and seeding the park area along the riverfront should be done this spring. Another spring project is the development of B Street between Sykora Bakery and Ernie's Avenue Tavern.

In addition to the two new lots to be constructed, Joens Brothers Interiors-Old Town Inn now supply some 40 spaces for parking, and Wenceslaus Square Resturant some 25 spaces, the Roundhouse some 60 spaces and Czech Cottage will enlarge its parking lot this spring to accommodate about 10 cars. Soon, then, some 238 parking spaces will be svailable 1

The following story was told to Mrs. Vlasta B.Fajmon by her father, Karel Bezdećny, age 97, about his early days in Cedar Rapids.

"Narodil jsem roku 1882 v Podebradech a do této zaslibené země a do Cedar Rapids jsem prijel v roce 1908. Presdent Theodore Roosevelt právě dokončoval lhůtu.

Muje první bydlení bylo na 16 avenue, zapadní, u bratra Stepána, který bydlil v domku na tom miste kde se nyní nachází Koškův obchod.

Mám různé vzpomínky na ty tak dávné časy. Když jsem odpočinul si po té daleké cestě přes moře na německé lodi"Kaiser Wilhelm" ,bratrova žena mě vodila při mén hledání nového zaměstaní. To trvalo několik dnu. Protoze jsem byl vyučen jako řemeslnik v zpra covavani dreva, nasel jsem konečné práci v továrně u Cedar Rapids Sash and Door.

Pracoval jsem pilne abych dosahl vyššiho platu. Dostával jsem peuze 4 dollary na tyden. Pomatují ze tam byl hlavni riditel který měl na starost výkon práce. Byl Českého původu a též ovládal Českau řeč. Když jsem tam pracoval 4 mésice, ptal jsem se o prídavek, a on mě řekl," Můžeš být rád ze máš práci. Jsi ještě greenhorn - a neumiš řeć, a jestli se Ti to nelíbí, tamble jsou dvere."

ENGLISH

To America !

To help the reader follow the Czech words more readily, this translation is not in the best literary style but rather stays close to the words in Czech. The editor thought it would be helpful to those of you wanting to follow the text more closely.

"I was born in the year 1882 at Podebrady (Bohemia) and came to this land of promise and to Cedar Rapids. I came in the year 1908. President Theodore Roosevelt was just completing his term(in office).

My first home was on 16th Avenue with my brother Steve who lived in a house at the place where now stands Kosek's store.

I have rosy memories of those long ago times. When I had rested after my long journey over the ocean on the German ship "Kaiser Wilhelm" my brother's wife accompanied me in seeking new work. That took several days. Because I had been trained in woodworking, I finally found work at the factory of the Cedar Rapids Sash and Door.

Work I (did) diligently so that I'd get higher pay. I was receiving there only \$4.00 a week. I remember the head supervisor who had the responsibility for (the) performance of the work. He was of Czech origin so likewise spoke fluently the Czech language. When I had worked (there) 4 months. I asked for a raise, and he said to me, " You can be glad you have work. You are still a"greenhorn" -and you do not know the language, and if you are not pleased, there is the door."

At this point ,it would be wise for the editor to take full responsibility for whatever errors appear on



Recent Arrivals

boxes of books for our Library. Soon we will unpack them and are sure to find many treasures. Thank you ,Mr.K.

Only the other day, a new volume off the press was sent by Mrs.Stanley Greene of Denver, Colorado. The book, "The Czechs and Slovaks in North America-a Bibliography" by Esther Jerabek, is a comprehensive listing of scores and scores of references.

And from Mrs.Robert Burrows (Catherine Herejk), Belle Plaine, two large, heavy volumes "Letem Českym Světem", literally "A flight over Czech Land" tho we might say "An Overview of Czech Lands".. Five hundred photographs of views in the 1890's of cities, towns, villages, rural and mountain scenes and the text are a gold-mine of information.

The gratifying reaction in seeing these pictures is that those of you who have been in Czechoslovakia will recognize the very same buildings-baroque, renaissance, Gothic, neo-Gothic, Roman, architecture of the structures -many dating back to the 13-14 centuries, still intact and there. Of course some have been renovated and the facades kept in condition. The only difference between the pictures and today's views, tho the cobblestones remain, is that the modes of transportaion differ. Oh yesclothing styles and sizes of trees are also different!

You will recognize the Old Town Square with the famous clock(damaged during WWII), huge statue of Hus and Tyn Church of 14-15 century. .at Olomuc the St. Wencil cathedral(1305) with its tall, TALL spires in all their glory. Karlovy Vary nestling in the valley ..the castle Hluboka. the chapel at Karlštýn. .and the Špilberk castle at Brno where Hitler had dungeons, torture chambers, master phone switchboard to run the affairs of invasion and occupation.

The views are from all over Čechy, Moravia, Silesia, and Slovakia.

is also from Mrs.Burrows. The events were held in St.Louis. Pictures of members from Iowa, Ill., Ohio, Penna., N.Y., Md., Mich., Wis., Minn., Mo., Tex. give an idea of the spread of Czech lodges.

A picture of Prof.Bohumil Shimek, famous botanist at Univ.of Iowa, and a brief story of his accomplishments are of interest. Many of you remember him or even may have known him in his time.

On June 21-23,1891, the CSPS Hall in C.R.was dedicated and opened for events. Recently the building was recognized as an historic site.

The advertisements in the book recall many places and people of those years at the turn of the century: F.Cervena, pekař a cukřář, (baker-confectioner); same for C.K. Kosek; Tichy a Skvor, lékárna (pharmacists); same for B.O.Jandera; Jos. Mekota, právník (lawyer); Dr. Jan C. Petrovsky, lékař: Jan Vosmek, krejči (tailor): A.Nemec a V.Divisek, obuv (shoes) same for Jan Krall whose name is still on a shoe store! and P_Matyk a Syn, dry goods; Kouba a Syn leather goods, harnesses; Jos. Hruska, pivo(beer); Jos.Pták, toombstones; Frant. Dostal, resturance; Dr.W.F. Naibert zubni lékar(dentist); same for Bratri Hašekové; J.Vesely, J.F. Kofron, C.Laubek at C.R.Dílna kolar a kocary, vozý (carriage works, wagons). Grocers were Emil Pazdera; and V.E. Váně: and Kašpar, Vondraček, Krejči, and Bartos. .
