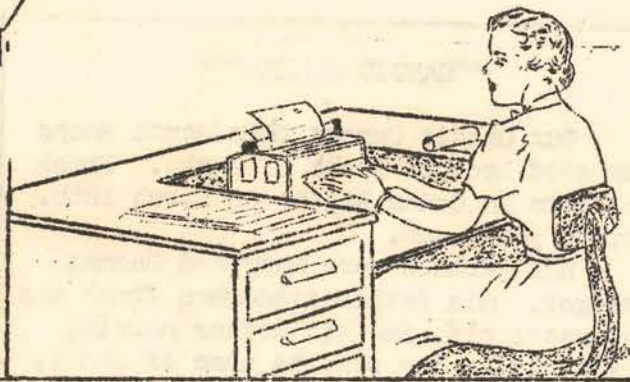




We hope that mothers night will be a yearly event in the Junior American Czech lodge and that next year more mothers will be present.

STRAWBERRY JAM.

Wash and stem one quart of strawberries, add one quart of sugar; alternate the berries and sugar. Let heat slowly and boil five minutes, be careful not to burn the berries. Stir carefully and sparingly. Pour on platters rather thinly, and place in hot room for from one and one half days to two and one-half days until thick. Stir carefully about once a day. Jam is now ready to be placed in glasses or jars.

CANNING STRAWBERRIES.

Strawberries do not have to be boiled when being canned. Here is a quick way. Prepare the strawberries as for cold packing, that is, pack the clean fruit into hot sterilized jars, pour a boiling syrup of 3/4 cup of sugar to one cup of water over them. Seal immediately and place jars into vessel of almost boiling water. When water is cool the jars are removed. The water must be deep enough to almost cover the jars.

HELPFUL HINTS.

If you seorch clothing when you are ironing, ring a thin cloth out of peroxide and put over the scorched spot, then iron. This will remove the spot.

A tablespoon of sugar in the water in which cauliflower is cooked will keep it white.

Tomatoe soup will not curdle if the tomatoe juice is first thickened and then added to cold milk.

In making coffee, tea or chocolate to be served iced, double the strength to allow for the ice used in cooling.

Ladies, never hang silk hose over hot radiators or next to hot surfaces.

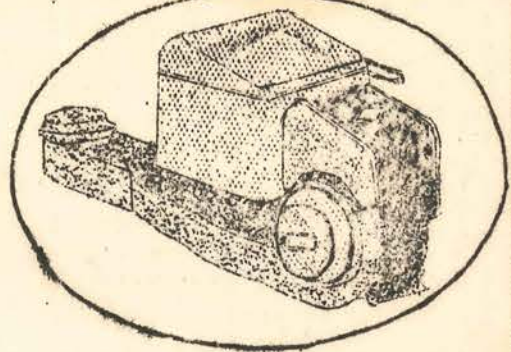
