Museum Move Postponed Due To Wet Weather



The National Czech & Slovak Museum and Library has been lifted off it's foundation and is awaiting its move across the street and up 11 feet onto an above ground parking garage. The April 26, 2011 move was postponed due to very wet soil conditions. Several days of dry weather are needed before Patterson Structural Moving of Washington, lowa will move the building. Once secured, an additional 30,000 sq. ft will be built onto the existing museum. Finished size will be 50,000 sq. ft.

Museum Fast Facts

Fact 1. It will be moved 480 feet.

Fact 2. It weighs 1,400 tons.

Fact 3. When the move is complete, the structure will be 11 feet higher and 3 feet above the 2008 flood level. Fact 4. Cost of the move is \$713,000.

Fact. 5. Move will be completed around the end of May 2011.

Fact. 6. The addition of another 30,000 sq. ft will result in a new 50,000 sq. ft. building. More space for offices, a boardroom, a theater and other space for exhibits, programs, meetings and more.

Fact 7. Expected to open the summer of 2012.

Fact 8. The heaviest points of the building exert 4,000 to 5,200 lbs. per square inch of pressure. Hydraulic jacks will make light work of the lifting process.

Fact 9. Webcams for viewing the building move and progress may be found at www.NCSML.org.

Fact 10. The building will move up to ¼ mile per hour. Fact 11. The moving company will have 9-14 workers on site to operate the hydraulic moving equipment and manage the moving process.

Fact 12. The move is a big deal because it will be the largest museum building ever moved.

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Czech Family in Marion

Vaclav and Martina Kaspar along with their two children moved to Marion from the Czech Republic a year ago. They are now settling into American life.

The Kaspars were able to immigrate here through a Diversity Visa (DV) program. In the U.S., the program makes available up to 55,000 DVs annually for people from countries with low rates of immigration to the U.S. - the Czech Republic being one such country.

Vaclav, has a Masters Degree in sociolgy and works as a construction foreman and Martina has a Masters Degree in pharmacy. Both were successful applicants for the visa based on many criteria including their education, job skills and ability to speak English. However, they say their 7-year-old son, Vincent, speaks English best in the family.

In fact, the main reason they left their old lives in the Czech Republic was for their children.

"We had a good living standard there (in the Czech Republic). We had to decide if it would be reasonable for us to move here. We thought it would be a good start for our kids," said Vaclav.

Eventhough they knew they'd miss the European cuisine, culture and their family and friends, they immigrated to the U.S. in 2009. They sold their house, car, furniture, everything they had in the Czech Republic and moved to Maine for Vaclav's job in construction.

In 2010 they moved to Marion where Vaclav now works for Kirk-Gross Construction Company as a fore-

man. He travels throughout Iowa building credit unions and banks. Martina, a trained pharmacist, is currently working at Whirlpool and pursuing pharmacy positions.

Martina is originally from Silesia in North Moravia and Vaclav is from the foothills of Krkonose Mountains in East Bohemia. Their main place of residence was in Olomouc in Central Moravia.

"For us there's no big difference between living here and the Czech Republic except here the people are speaking English," said Vaclav. Another difference he added is, "In Europe everything is older and more crowded."

In their free time the Kaspars enjoy cooking, hiking, swimming and skiing.

'Bridge of Lions' to open Saturday

The lions are ready and so are the people of Czech Village.

The new 16th Avenue Bridge opens Saturday, giving the Czechs a good reason to throw a party. The event will be marked with a dedication ceremony, parade, food and dances.

"It's a happening that comes along every 75 years. We should acknowledge it in a big way," said Ed Kuba, chairman of the bridge dedication committee.

Eight concrete lions have been placed at the ends and in the center of the bridge, maintaining the character of the Czech Village area. "The lion has been a symbol of the Czech people way back through the centuries," Kuba explained.

The lions were donated the the Czech Heritage Foundation and the bridge has been nicknamed "The Bridge of the Lions."

The style is reminiscent of the Karl IV bridge in Prague, Czechoslovakia. It has decorative light posts and seating areas that extend over the river.

The new bridge cost about \$2 million and replaces a bridge built in 1910. After severe deterioration was detected, the old bridge was closed to automobiles in May 1987 and demolished last summer. Closing the bridge cut direct access between Czech Village, along 16th Avenue SW, and 14th Avenue SE across the Cedar River.

Festivities begin at 1 p.m. Saturday with a dedication ceremony in the center of the bridge. Among the dignitaries who have been invited are President George Bush and Miroslav Houstecky, the Czechoslovakian ambassador to the United States. There has been no response from them, Kuba said.

Gov. Terry Branstad was invited but will not attend because of a previous commitment. However, Cedar Rapids Mayor Don Canney and other city officials have promised to attend the ceremony.

Local clergymen also will be there. "We thought it wouldn't hurt any to get the Lord's blessing on the bridge and those that use it," Kuba said.

Two limousines, one carrying representatives of eastside businesses and the other carrying people from the west side, will be the first vehicles to cross the new bridge.

Throughout the day, sandwiches, drinks, popcorn and candy will be available from vendors in the area. Souvenir buttons, post cards and dedication certificates also will be sold.

Restaurant and Bar Opens in Village Bank Building

Capones Restaurant and Bar recently opened in the old Village Bank located at 1201 3rd St. SE, Cedar Rapids. Owners Ray and Arielle Pierce and Dave and Diane Fountain extensively remodeled the 16,000 sq. foot restaurant and bar staying true to the bank's history.

The 1917 bank building was ravaged by the flood of 2008. With 8-10 feet of water in the building, it temporarily relocated to 860 2nd Ave. SE and then sold its consumer and commercial accounts to Cedar Rapids Bank & Trust Co. in 2009.

The empty bank building was purchased by the Fountains and Pierces in March 2010. Remodeling began in September 2010.

"When we bought it, the bank had already been completely gutted down to the bare walls by Neighborhood Development, however interior brick vaults had to be demolished before we could begin remodeling in September of 2010," said Diane Fountain.

They chose the name Capones because it went along with the bank theme and the 1920's era when Capone was famous.

"This was the kind of establishment Capone was likely to frequent in Chicago. He had two very different personas. On the one hand, he was a very high class person who mingled with politicians and donated to charities. But on the other hand he conducted illegal bootlegging," said Fountain.

Capones is the restaurant side and The Hideaway is the bar side of the establishment which has a combined seating capacity of 400.

Capones, which maintained Vil-

lage Bank's original tall ceilings, marble floors, teller's windows and vault, features American food with a little Italian slant. The 1920s art deco decor featuring pendent lighting, columns, and cherry wood accents

make this a beautiful family friendly atmosphere for lunch or supper.

The Hideaway side is a contemporay bar with live entertainment every Saturday night featuring country or classic

80's rock bands. "We are working on constructing an outdoor beer garden also," said Fountain.

We hope to appeal to downtown business clientelle with reasonalbly priced lunch specials Monday-Fri-

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The interior of the restaurant is decorated in a 1920's Art Deco theme with the bank's original teller's windows, marble floors and vault.


Finding Morels Can Be Difficult


