Guild of NCSML patrons are "crazy about cookies," and our 17th annual Cookie Walk proved this point again Saturday, Dec. 5, during the Old World Christmas Market at NCSML.

Some \$1,857 was earned by the group. Added to that \$571 from our cafe, which featured home made koláče .

More than 4,000 guests enjoyed the holiday two-day event at the Museum, which included specialty imports, handmade gifts, and free family activities and admission to the galleries. What a gift to our community is this holiday event!

Guild provided some 270 baked items, 17.5 pounds of candy, and 13 mini-cakes, for

the Cookie Walk, all lovingly and artistically prepared and presented.

There were 36 volunteer bakers and cooks, and 31 volunteers helped set up and stage the event. Names of all volunteers and donors will be published in the Spring Issue of Guilded Page. Thank you, thank you, thank you, thank you!!!

THE GUILD WRITERS

Members of The Guild Writers share reminisces. Our sessions are a bit like a family reunion, except we do not wait for a birthday, anniversary, or holiday to get together. We meet fortnightly, except between Thanksgiving and the New Year, and over the summer when gardens and travel keep us from our writing.

We write about what strikes our fancy at the moment.
None of us tends to write chronologically. We do not always write about ourselves.
We might write about an event that interests us, or tell the

story of an ancestor who failed to put pen to paper.

Racheal Davis has written about her ancestor William Dawes. Historical records show he was actually the first rider to be sent to Lexington and Concord to announce the British were coming. However, 85 years later, when Henry Wadsworth Longfellow was writing his poem about that Midnight Ride, he discovered a personal account written by Paul Revere. Had William Dawes put his pen to paper, we might have memorized, "Listen my children. It will give you pause; This Midnight Ride of William Dawes."

Some stories fill us with indignation, as when Anita Burke writes about the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers taking her family's century farm to create Coralville Lake. Or when Anneliese Tisdale writes about what it was like to come of age in Hitler's Germany, and later the difficulties she faced as a German war bride in Iowa.

Jeanne Vogt and Marj Nejdl both know how to tickle our funny bone. Their stories are frequently about day-to-day situations; a grandchild's baseball game, a school play, or a weekend family trip. They can have us holding our sides with laughter with most anything they write, even stressful things like failing to get a car license plate renewed on time, or finding a hearse parked in your driveway.

One person's story can trigger another person's memory. It was a big surprise when Suzanne Charipar passed around a photograph of her childhood home and Marj Nejdl exclaimed, "I lived in that house." Research proved that was absolutely correct. What an extraordinary life connection that gave both women.

We invite you to write a paragraph, write a page, write a whole story, and then join us as a guest for a session or two. You may find we're good company. One thing is certain; you will be giving future generations of your family an exceptional gift. NCSML President's Winter Message

Dear Fellow Guild Members,

I want to take this opportunity to talk about our new Strategic Plan 2015-2020. Since we adopted the new mission and vision in 2014, the staff and board have been working on a plan to achieve them. There are several challenges that we face for the future, not the least of which is to remain relevant. We all know that as our children and grandchildren grow up, marry,

move to other cities, often the connection to their heritage is lost. Our mission says it: we need to inspire people from every background to connect to Czech and Slovak history and culture.

Another challenge is to meet the demands of a changing society. Today there are dangers to democracy on the doorstep of the Czech and Slovak Republics that have implications for all of us. At the same time, the focus on American public education has moved away from history, social sciences and civics. How will we develop strong leaders and informed citizens that we so desperately need?

One way we can play an important role is to increase our emphasis on human rights, especially human rights education. This isn't new to us. It's actually one of our strengths. Part of what the NCSML has been doing all along has addressed human rights through exhibits and programs, like the Samizdat exhibit and the Holocaust speakers and Great Author Series. Now we want to add an increased focus on providing children and young adults with meaningful ways to learn about human rights. We are already creating K-12 lesson plans with the Mana project and are formulating a variety of age-appropriate activities, programs and events. Human rights education is a life-long effort that must begin when you are young.

We may have always been doing it, but it's a bold stop to declare that we have a strategic priority to focus on human rights. I'm convinced that it's an important and necessary step for our future and we are ready.

Of course, we also have significant goals to celebrate culture, serve the community and engage families, all parts of the active life of the museum and library, but which deserve to be raised up even more front and center.

Thank you in advance for your continued contributions to achieving our mission and vision, which you do so beautifully every day.
