

The Miss Czech Slovak Iowa pageant is rather new compared to the national program. John Fiala, along with his wife, Lois, organized the pageant 40 years ago. John has served as the master of ceremony and director of the pageant in Wilber, Nebraska, for the past 18 years.

John Fiala now retired, lives in Lincoln, Nebraska. Because Nebraska has a large Czech population, Wilber seemed a natural place to locate a Czech festival and host the pageant. The town of Wilber has a population of 17,000 residents and hosts the festival the first weekend of August every year.

John Fiala started the national pageant with entries from 4 states in 1987 and reached a high of 23 state entries. John and Lois spend most of the winter traveling to the warm southern states organizing Czech communities to hold pageants. This winter was spent in Arizona, Nevada, New Mexico, and Colorado. Fourteen states from Florida to California sent queen candidates last year to Wilber..

In 2001, when Iowa's entry, Lisa Volesky, won the national Miss Czech Slovak USA Queen title, John Fiala thought it was time for Iowa to sponsor an organized pageant. Cedar Rapids has a large Czech population and is the home of the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library. John Fiala made a presentation at a board meeting of the Czech Heritage Foundation. The board unanimously voted to sponsor the state pageant in conjunction with the Houby Days Festival.every year in May. John and Lois have visited our pageant twice in four years where he served as master of ceremony.

In 2002, Miss Czech Slovak Iowa, Katie Ziskovsky, won the talent award in the national competition. In 2003, Miss Czech Slovak Iowa, Stasia Krivanek, won the Miss Czech Slovak USA Queen title. This year, Amanda De Hoedt, served as Miss Czech Slovak Iowa. She attended many functions and has represented her heritage and state with poise and pride.

John and Lois keep in touch with the past candidates and queens through the many seasonal greetings, graduations and wedding announcements they receive. There is a bond that develops with the Fialas and the state candidates as they all vie for the national title.

As long as John enjoys good health, he will be working at Wilber. But at age 78 and retired, he is grooming a former Nebraska queen to take over some of the responsibilities and make his load a little lighter. Iowa wants to thank John and Lois for their efforts to perpetuate our Czech heritage through the younger generation. and for their devotion to the Czech culture.

What makes a trip memorable? Is it the places you visit, the new things you try, the people you meet, or the lessons you learned? I think it's all of it. I would now like to share with you why my trip to the Czech Republic is a trip that will last a lifetime.


When I first arrived in the Czech Republic, I couldn't believe how

beautiful everything was. All the old buildings were so majestic and exquisite. I found myself staring at everything. My host family asked me what I was taking a picture of, and when I pointed to it, they laughed because it was just a hotel. Prague truly is one of the most beautiful cities in the world with the amazing architecture in each building, and all the art and music throughout the city. I loved touring the museum in St. Wenceslas Square, listening to a street band and shopping on Charles Bridge, climbing to the top spire in the cathedral in Prague Castle, and standing in awe of the beautiful paintings in St. Nicholas Church. However, the smaller cities were my favorites to visit.

We visited Pisek, and walked across the oldest bridge in Western Europe. I saw the horror of World War Two up close and personal during a visit to a concentration camp and Jewish ghetto in Terezin. Karlstein Castle was a regal Bohemian fortress that never surrendered to an enemy and it had amazing artifacts and paintings everywhere you turned. Cesky Krumlov, Orlik Castle, and Hluboka Castle looked as though they came straight out of a storybook. Dobris Chateau was only 20 minutes away from my house, and had the most beautiful gardens I have ever seen. The home of famous composer Antonin Dvorak was also just minutes away. Kutna Hora was especially interesting becuase it is way out of the ordinary. It's a small church that's actually an ossuary for the bones of over 40,000 victims of plague and disease from centuries ago- the thing is, the bones are the decoration for the church, and in the center is a chandelier made out of skulls, pelvic bones, and femurs.

Pribram, where I went to school, also has a rich history. There's a magnificent monastery, Svata Hora, on top of a mountain that provided a breathtaking view of the town. During the Fourth of July weekend, Pribram was celebrating their strong history of mining. We put on hard hats and took a train down into one of the mine shafts and got to see firsthand how they mined silver and coal. There's also an excellent shopping district and scenic bike path in the town. Even school was fun and entertaining, because all the students and teachers made a special effort to welcome and get to know the Americans.

One thing I loved about my trip was living in a small village, Haje. Everyone really welcomed me into their lives. One night when there was a celebration at the local pub, and I got to talk and dance with many locals who became good friends over the month I was there. Every time I went for a walk around the town, people waved and said hello. It didn't matter that my Czech wasn't that good, they were patient and taught me new words and phrases, and their smiles transcended all language barriers.

I became very close with my host family. My mother, Hana, is a wonderful cook and we would bake Czech or American food and ask the other how to make it and what ingredients to use. My father, Stanistav, would come in and say hmm hmm, or Czech for yum yum. He answered my questions about Czech history and had a great sense of humor. My younger sister, Magda, and I had a great time braiding hair. She brought me up to speed with current Czech culture and I acquired a taste for the Superstar, the Czech version of American Idol. My host sister, Marketa, and I really became good friends. She did the majority of the translating and was great at teaching me Czech. We had fun going to different places and hanging out with friends at the soccer field or by the pond. I keep in touch with my host family and look forward to seeing them again.

Another thing that made my trip extremely memorable was being able to meet many of my host family's relatives. Stanistav's parents hosted 14 people in their small house for the weekend, and I had a blast playing with Marketa's younger cousins and talking with her grandparents, aunt, and uncle. I also got to meet more of the family when we visited Hana's mother's farm. Everyone was exceptionally hospitable and delicious food and lively company were abundant.

My trip to the Czech Republic is a trip that will last a lifetime. The lessons I learned and the people I met have influenced every area of my life and enhanced my perception of the world and my heritage. I am extremely grateful that I had this incredible experience. I'd like to share my thanks to the Czech Heritage Foundation, for creating and giving me this opportunity. Without them, this trip wouldn't have been possible. I would also like to thank my host family, the Jankovsky's, for making my trip in the Czech Republic one of the best times of my life. I can hardly wait to go back.

Keeping the Tradition Alive 135 Years – Ceska Skola 2005

As we pack away the school supplies and class handouts for another year, we recall the rewarding 5 weeks we had with students so eager to learn the Czech Language and traditions. This year marks the 135th year that this Czech School has been in existence continually here in Cedar Rapids. This sets a record for the oldest ethnic school of its kind to continue. We are so proud of this and with all indications, the students and parents will not let this good thing demise.

This five-week program started June 13th and ended with the annual program and ice cream social on Friday, July 15th. The classes were from 8:00 AM to 11:00 AM. School enrollment jumped to 78 students, up from 54 last year. This year, we added a fourth class just for the older first-time students and this worked out very well.

Czech School is in competition with so many summer programs for our youth, through camps, sports, churches etc., that perfect attendance is a thing of the past. We are blessed to have the students attend as much as they can.

To make the 5 weeks enjoyable and different, we schedule something out of the ordinary each week. After studying about their heritage and the meaning of names, the three older Divisions had a trip to the Czech National Cemetery. They had to find answers to questions about Czech words and history, then did paper rubbings on some stones. Pizza and punch followed, which was a big hit. One of the weeks, part of a morning was spent with each student making a beautiful Czech bead bracelet and learning about glass Czech beads from Carmen Langel of the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library.



The students also met a Czech German Shepherd Police K-9 dog, named "MOD" who is on the police force in Hiawatha, lowa. This dog has been in the United States since March

and is a very valuable part of the Police force, according to his handler, Officer Sara Melsa (also a Czech).

Everyone enjoyed meeting the dog, especially the Czech teachers. The Division One students sang a song about a pes (dog in Czech) and Mod got all excited. He knew they were singing about him, so he hasn't lost his Czech vocabulary yet. The students



brought gifts of tennis balls and Frisbees for Mod. He also got a bag of baby carrots, which is his favorite food. His other favorites are strawberries and green apples.

The students sang at the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library on July 9th for the UpBeat! Concert Series and also at the Museum for the National Bohemian, Moravian & Slovak Folk Dance Festival on July 17th. Each Friday, different Czech Lodges bring treats, and the last Friday was a watermelon feed by Sokol Cedar Rapids. We thank all that have helped, both with the treats, money and school supplies to keep us going. Other businesses have helped us with money and supplies that are always needed for projects.

Collecting Books for the Czech RePublic By Barb Edmunds

The Federation of Czech Groups started an educational book drive for the Czech Republic in 1998 as a project to coincide with the Sesquicentennial of Cedar Rapids. The goal of the drive is to send used books written in



English to schools and libraries in the Czech Republic. The first shipments were sent 6 years ago, and ongoing fund raising efforts have allowed us to continue this project. The Federation of Czech Groups was founded in 1936 to promote Czech culture in the area.

Several shipments of hundreds of pounds of books have gone out each year to schools and libraries throughout the Czech Republic. English is taught in the schools, but English books are hard to come by and very expensive in the Czech Republic. The books sent are needed as a source of supplementary reading and story books for entertainment. One known school in the Czech Republic had two English books for all students to share.

Along with individual donors, the Cedar Rapids School System has been very generous to donate books for us to send to more schools in the Czech Republic. This has been a great donation, since there are many copies of each book and all in excellent shape.

We have several schools waiting to receive such books and will start boxing our existing supply shortly. The postage rate is \$1.00 a pound to send these books and because of the heavy weight of books, money is used up very fast. We thank the Lodges, Sokol, and those that have been generous in the past, especially the yearly donation from Lodge Prokop Velky - CSA. - 2003, Aug.: part-time cataloger (Samantha Schmehl) hired with Czech Heritage Foundation support
- 2004, Sept.: Samantha accepts position at University of Montana
- 2004, Dec.: part-time cataloger (Rebecca Bartlett) hired with Czech Heritage Foundation support
- 2005, July: online catalog holds 5,400 book and periodical titles, 3,000 of which were cataloged in-house with Czech Heritage Foundation support
