I'M BACK...

How honored I am to be selected your NCSML Guild President. I am enjoying the challenges of helping our organization with the important mission of supporting our National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library. It is exciting to help members plan the staging of our 10th annual Taste of Czech & Slovak, which will kick off Houby Days May 15. It is important to be involved in the recovery of our Museum and Czech Village. Thank you for your confidence. I am on an upward learning curve with our Guild, but my enthusiasm has never been higher.

Some 30 years ago, before there was NCSML, I was the first Czech Village Coordinator. I was hired by Czech Village Association in the fall of 1977. There already was a Czech Village Festival in September, and we held our first Houby Days "the weekend after Mother's Day," in May, 1978. We began to build a Village and concentrated fervently on building a Czech Museum. After eight years as Coordinator, I re-entered the field of public school education. I spent 20 years at Metro High School, and when I retired I joined the Guild and also re-forged friendships with Village merchants and guild members who were pioneers in Czech community efforts 30 years ago.

At our February membership meeting, it was *deja vu*, meeting with George Joens (who was Czech Heritage Foundation President when I was hired), Bob Schaffer (who was President of Czech Fine Arts, the organization that preceded the Museum), Al Zindrick, and others. And in the Guild I am working again with current Guild members who were pioneers in Czech culture promotion 30 years ago. I want to acknowledge them.

*Irma Kelly, who baked kolache for the first Houby Days with St. Ludmila baking crew.

*Marge Pace, who helped with Marj Nejdl's booth during festivals...and both of their husbands tirelessly worked in



the breakfast tents or bingo.



MUSEUM GUILD OF THE NATIONAL CZECH & SLOVAK MUSEUM & LIBRARY Annual Report January 26, 2009

It is my pleasure and honor to give the Museum Guild Report to the Board of Directors and members of The National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library at the Annual Meeting.

The Museum Guild was founded in 1994 by Patricia Hikiji, Evelyn Lamparek, Mae Novotny, Sylvia Rohlena and Marge Stone. Each year the Guild has endeavored to carry out the purpose our founders envisioned.

The purpose can be summed up as stated in the Mission Statement. The Mission of the Museum Guild of the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library is to support the activities, programs and facilities of the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library by providing unpaid volunteers and other financial and charitable support and to serve as an educational service and social organization for persons interested in the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library.

The Guild started the year of 2008 with high hopes and great anticipation. In May the Museum Guild had its first entry in the Annual Houby Days Parade. Mel Holubar chaired this function and it was a great success.

That same weekend the Museum Guild hosted our Eighth Annual Taste of Czech & Slovak which was held in Heritage Hall. There were 224 tickets sold to this event with an income of \$1,768.00; \$1,633.00 in ticket sales and \$135.00 in donations.

The summer of 2008 brought our community, and our Museum some unexpected challenges. The flood of 2008 was devastating and inspired Guild members to even higher levels of volunteering. We organized an event, "Save The Museum" which was a bazaar and we had something for everyone . . .Kolache and Bakery, Brats and Sauerkraut, Music by Leonard Reyman and his band, a farmer's market, Museum Gift Store Items, Handcrafted Items, a wonderful Silent Auction and of course our cookbook "Czech and Slovak Heritage...Family Stories...Traditions and Recipes" was for sale. The total income was \$11,261.70 from the Bazaar.

In the year 2008 . . . our total cash disbursements to the Museum was \$19,072.20 which consisted of

\$11,072.20 - "Save the Museum" Bazaar

3,000.00 - for Equipment and Supplies

3,000.00 - final payment on pledge of 2003 for Exhibit Fund

2,000.00 - undesignated for operating expenses

In addition 63 of our 90 members volunteered 6,090.75 hours. If one were to translate this into a monetary benefit, 6,090.75 hours times only the minimum wage of 7.25 = 44,157.93, by adding to that the \$19,072.20 it brings the Museum Guild's contribution to the Museum \$63,230.13.

Our most recent fund raising event was our Annual Cookie Walk in December. Our income from that event was \$1,449.50.

The Museum Guild also serves as an educational service and social organization for persons interested in the NCSML. We have monthly meetings, usually the first Saturday morning of each month, at which we have a variety of speakers on our culture, our community and other subjects of interest. At these meetings we conduct our business, have refreshments and also a door prize; our member Czech Artist Marj Nejdl has donated the decorated gifts for most of these meetings.

The Museum Guild owes its success to the foresight of our founders, to the efforts of the many members who have volunteered in the past, and to the many dedicated Guild members who are currently working to assist the Museum in any way that we can. On a personal note I would like to say that I treasure my membership in the Guild. It has been the vehicle for me to connect with my Czech culture and make some of the most wonderful friends that I have ever had. Also, it needs to be said . . . Gail Naughton is a superb leader and treats us all with great respect and appreciation.

Pat Martin was elected 2009 President of the Museum Guild and she has some exciting ideas and we are all so pleased that she is our president. OUR BEST DAYS ARE AHEAD OF US!

Museum Guild Program October 4, 2008

"Granger House" By Barb Feller, Director

The Granger House Museum, located at 970 Tenth Street in Marion, is owned and maintained by Marion Historical Museum, Inc. Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, it opened to the public on July 4, 1976, to coincide with the Bicentennial of the United States.

The original part of the home was built in 1848 by a family by the name of Shedd and has the distinction of being the oldest building in this area. It was a simple brick house that has been enlarged and altered over the years to meet the needs of the family. The brick Carriage House, next to the home was built in 1879 for the family's personal horses.

In 1856, Samuel Granger, of Vermont, purchased 500 acres north of Marion, site unseen. He sent his nineteen year old son, Earl, to Iowa to establish a farm and sell Morgan horses to the farmers. The farm economy soon soured and when gold was discovered at Pike's Peak, Earl sold horses to the gold seekers and headed west himself in 1859. After staking a claim, near Cripple Creek and barely surviving a winter, for which he was not prepared, he came back to Marion in 1861.

Earl became a successful business man, managed the family farm, raised Morgan horses and invested in real estate. He married in 1869 and his wife died in childbirth. In 1872, he married Dora Krouse of Toddville and they moved in the house. Six children were born to the Earl and Dora, however, only two lived to adulthood.

Arthur graduated from Cornell College and worked for the U.S. Postal Department. He was the Assistant Postmaster in Marion for many years and it is said that he delivered mail until 1940. He built the house next door on Central Avenue in 1912. Alfred managed the family farm and operated a dairy. He lived in the house until his death in 1969.

Because the Granger family owned this property and lived in this home for almost 100 years, the museum has many of the original furnishings, diaries, photographs, letters and family papers. The house has been restored to its appearance in the late 1870s and is meant to depict the life of a prosperous middle-class family in the late 19th century, a family who migrated to Iowa and made the most of opportunities found.

The Granger House has programming for adults and children which includes tea parties, ice cream socials, holiday musical events and Halloween (this year with Usher's Ferry). It is open for individual or group tours.

Museum Guild Program January 3, 2009 "Update on the NCSMLFlood Recovery" Gail Naughton

President and CEO, Gail Naughton, presented encouraging information to the members regarding the future of the NCSML. She reminded the group that there are many ways we can fulfill our mission and operate as a national museum.

The Museum purchase of the Kosek building exemplifies the goal to have a presence in Czech Village and help in the revitalization of area. The building will be a permanent part of the Museum campus.

The main floor of the building will house an exhibition on Cedar Rapids Czech and Slovak heritage and history. As Gail said "we are living in a very historic time" so the exhibit will include the time of the flood. The Museum Store will be in the front space of first floor.

Precautionary measures for the structure include installing furnaces and mechanicals on the second floor and planning moveable exhibits Offices will be on the second floor and meeting space in the basement.

The main Museum building is presently used for storage. A solution for the building must be approached with caution and the flood wall plan must be evaluated in relation to the future usage of the building.

Many damaged artifacts from the collection remain in the hands of preservationists and will be returned after the time consuming process of recovery is complete. The library was especially hard hit and all order was lost. Over 600 boxes on pallets are back from the preservation process conducted in Chicago

An environmental engineer has evaluated all of the buildings associated with the Museum and steps will be taken to eliminate the mold found. The future of the Babi Buresh house is still uncertain as all mechanicals are gone. Special consideration is being given to this home as it is only building remaining in the Village that was used as a private residence.

Gail indicated that the organization "Main Street-lowa" is probably going to accept the Czech Village as a project. This would be their first district program in an urban area and consultants would help with economic development and historic preservation.

After a lengthy process, word was received that the Museum has received accreditation as a National Museum from the American Association of Museums. The staff has put forth much effort to meet the criteria for this designation and is to be congratulated.

Gail told the members that the staff and the board are resolved to protect the Museum investments and the donor commitments. She feels the future can be stronger and better.


