

#### NEW CZECH PASSENGER LISTS AVAILABLE

Never before published, Czech Immigration Passenger Lists, Volume IV, is now available. After years of painstaking research, over 20,000 Czech immigrants who arrived in New York between 1847 and 1869 have been identified. This was done by reviewing and abstracting over two hundred and fifty (250) rolls of National Archives microfilm. This book includes an alphabetical listing of these Czech immigrants, giving their names, age, place of origin, date of arrival, name of ship, and destination. There is also a discussion on sources of immigrant ship data and pictures.

#### ANNUAL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Cold weather plagues our meeting annually and this year was no exception. In spite of Mother Nature's attempt to dampen our spirits, we had a large turnout.

Officers and committees turned out report after report. Every year our agenda grows, every year we participate in new and exciting projects. There isn't a day that goes by when the Czech Heritage Foundation isn't "up to something."

We have seven new Board Members to introduce. Joining us are Elaine Brejcha, Karen Cichowski, David Faltis, Quinn Novak, Fran Novotny, Leonard Pfeifer, and Lynette Stejskal. All are to be congratulated on their new appointment, and deserve our appreciation for the time and effort they will each donate.

Lynette Stejskal, our guest speaker for the evening, brought to life how Czechoslovakia has changed since her first trip there in 1986 when she was one of our Homestay Ambassadors. She returned from her second and extended visit to Czechoslovakia last December, where she taught English and studied the Czech language.

Two Slovak businessmen, Vlado Petraš and Luboš Valašek, were guests of the foundation and addressed the audience, giving us an even deeper insight into life in Czechoslovakia from an economic standpoint. They are based in Iowa City, took some English language courses at the University of Iowa, and are touring the midwest in an effort to gain knowledge of business operations within a free market economy.

Following our Annual Meeting the Czech Fine Arts Foundation held their meeting, and reports outlining the year's activities at the Czech and Slovak Museum & Library were given. Major changes including the newly arranged office space and storage area, library categorizing effort, new exhibit areas; and several new community involvement projects were explained.

Over 6,900 individuals visited the Museum in 1991, 2,000 more than in 1990. Since 1978, over 62,800 people have registered as visitors, and this is only the beginning.

A brief report by the Building and Planning Committee outlining advancements in the new building project was given. The project is on schedule and 1992 promises to be a most exciting year.

#### BRIDGE OF LIONS NOMINATED FOR AWARD

In the July 1991 issue of *Civil Engineering* magazine, there appeared an article announcing the nominees for the 1991 Outstanding Civil Engineering Achievement Award. The l6th Avenue Bridge was among the nominees. The following is the copy as it appeared in the magazine, together with a 4-1/4 by 3-1/2 colored picture of the bridge.

"The 16th Avenue Bridge in Cedar Rapids, Iowa has a prestressed, reinforced concrete girder superstructure hidden behind in disguise. Arch-soffited prestressed concrete facia panels with concrete handrails hide the modern structural elements, giving the bridge a look similar to that of the 1910 bridge it replaced. The new bridge, designed by Shive-Hattery Engineers and Architects, Inc., Cedar Rapids is topped by eight decorative concrete lions, a salute to the city's large Czech community. District 16 Director Ted Johnson nominated the project."

Czecho-Slovak Writing from the New World



## KOMENSKÝ (COMENIUS) 400 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

Jan Amos Komenský, also known as Comenius, was born 400 years ago in southeastern Moravia on the 28th of March, 1592. The great scientist, philosopher and educator is known as the "teacher of nations" because he established modern educational systems in several European countries.

An international scientific conference, entitled "Comenius Heritage and Education of Man for the 21st Century," including an international exhibition of school aids, is scheduled at the Palace of Culture in Prague, March 23-27th, 1992.

If you are planning a trip to Czechoslovakia, visit at least one of the Komenský museums. One museum is located at Přerov where Komenský attended the school of the Unity of Czech



Brethren and later served as its rector. Another museum in southeastern Moravia is at Uherský Brod where Komenský spent his childhood and began his education. The third museum is at the Wallenstein palace in Prague.

As a part of a modern educational system, Komenský advocated advanced education for women, and physical education. One of his maxims was "a sound mind in a sound body," a motto adopted by the Sokol Gymnastic Organization about 200 years after his death. #### MAKING A DIFFERENCE

After an unplanned hospitalization in Prague, Czechoslovakia last year, H. Douglas Lemons of Lakewood, California, made a promise to himself — a promise to himself and to those concerned that he would do all that he could to right a terrible wrong.

Regarding his hospital stay, Mr. Lemons tells us in his own words, "They did their best for me with the limited equipment they have, apologized for their inability to do more, and advised me to immediately return to the U.S.A. for proper treatment in an American hospital... That Prague Hospital is the same one which has been used for hundreds of years, and now, in its rundown condition, it is a national disgrace! If it were in America, it would have been destroyed years and years ago! After talking with the doctors and some architects, I promised them that upon my return to America, I would do everything within my power to organize American support to provide the necessary funds to construct a new hospital in Prague."

It is wrong that our Czechoslovak friends and relatives should be subjected to these conditions. Most of us take our excellent level of medical care in the United States for granted.

Thank you Mr. Lemons for "making a difference" in the lives of thousands of Czechoslovaks who will one day benefit from your thoughtfulness. A thank you also goes out to Czech Heritage Foundation member, Don DeFore. Mr. DeFore is serving an important role on the finance committee for the new medical facility in Prague, and brought this situation to our attention. On February 1st, under warm sunny skies, the Czech Heritage Foundation won first prize in the 1992 Winterfest Snow Sculpting contest for its elaborate recreation of Hluboká Castle. An ambitious project, the team reproduced the front facade and clock tower of one of Czechoslovakia's best known castles. Located in South Bohemia, Hluboká is one of the most ornate and dramatic of the hundreds of castles that dot the Czechoslovak landscape.

The finished project, complete with detailed brick work, painted windows, and a watery mote was awarded top honors in the Business/Organization category.

The team was made up of Czech Heritage Foundation members John Rocarek and Lynette Steiskal, Carrie

Hammond, F. John Herbert of The Drawing Legion, and Pavel Melcak, a visiting student from Palacky University, Olomouc, now studying at Mt. Mercy College.

Working only with pictures, and some of Pavel's childhood memories, the group dug in with mittened hands making the best use of a grab-bag of tools. Pails, shovels, plastic cups, and snow scoops were the instruments of the day, but proved to be more than adequate in creating the winning entry.

## Czech Egg Decorating

Demonstrations in the art of decorating Easter eggs will be presented at the Czech and Slovak Museum & Library, from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., on Saturday, April 11th and Saturday, April 18th. Youngsters will have the hands-on experience of making a pomlazka (willow whip) and learn of its significance in Czechoslovak Easter traditions. Pieces of a "lamb cake" (a type of pound cake baked in a lamb-shaped mold) will be available for tasting. On display will be eggs decorated in the seven distinct styles created by Czechoslovak folk artists, as well as some recent innovations created by local artists of Czech descent. Museum visitors will also be given the opportunity of learning about some springtime customs that celebrated the passing of winter.
