PLANS FINALIZED


The new National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library of Cedar Rapids, Iowa has moved a step closer to reality with completion of the final design and architectural plans developed by Stephen Felix Gula Associates, of New York City, and Leo C. Peiffer & Associates, of Cedar Rapids.

While utilizing the best of contemporary building methods, the new facility will exhibit a strong ethnic character through the use of towers, arches, and recessed areas which can be embellished with specially commissioned art work from the Czech and Slovak Republics.

The new 15,000 square foot museum and library well be five times the size of the current facility. This will allow for the additional feature of a large festival hall for meetings, museum-sponsored programs, and to accommodate special ethnic events.

Construction is expected to begin in October, with completion of the building slated for the fall of 1994. Upon completion of the exhibit work and the transfer of artifacts, the museum planning committee is anticipating a grand opening next year.

A special showroom highlighting details of the new museum and library is located in Czech Village. To arrange a viewing, or to discuss a family memorial, you may contact Development Director, John Rocarek at



NEW MUSEUM PLANS



SITE PLAN

The site plan shows the location of the new National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library. The new facility will be situated on the west bank of the Red Cedar River between 12th and 16th Avenues S.W., in the Czech Village. The main entrance will face A Street S.W. The Immigrant Home, as shown above on the right, will be connected to the main exhibit hall by an all-weather corridor. The present museum building will yield to parking area and green space. The one-level building will be handicapped accessible. A recessed area, in front of the building will accommodate several motorcoaches for unloading and loading of passengers.



FLOOR PLAN

The floor plan shows the allocation of space within the museum and library structure. Visitors will enter through the Grand Hall. Doors at the opposite end of the Grand Hall will allow access to a lovely terrace overlooking the river, and Masaryk Park, on the opposite bank.

The Exhibit hall (Museum) will feature displays relating the history of the Czech and Slovak Republics. The story of the immigrants' experiences will be told, and recognition given to well-known Americans of Czech, Moravian, and Slovak heritage.

Three-dimensional dioramas will showcase the spectacular national costumes in the Museum's collection. Other artifacts will be displayed in four dioramas representing the four seasons of the year and the seasonal traditions associated with them.

GENEALOGICAL/ CULTURAL CONFERENCE

The Third Czechoslovak Genealogical/Cultural Conference will be held October 29th and 30th, at the Sheraton Inn & Conference Center, in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. Here is your opportunity to learn about your Czechoslovak heritage. Experts in several fields of Czech and Slovak genealogical and cultural research will be speaking on a wide range of subjects, from the availability of records and sources, to customs and crafts of Bohemia, Moravia, and Slovakia.

Featured speakers include Charlotta Kotik, Curator of Modern Art at the Brooklyn. New York Museum. She is the great granddaugher of T. G. Masaryk, first president of the first Czech Republic. Also speaking will be Ivan Dubovicky, member of the Department of Ethnography, Charles University, Prague, and Felix Gula, designer/ planner for the new National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library. Registration begins at 8:00 a.m. on Friday, October 29th, with the keynote address at 9:00 a.m.

Friday evening a pork, sauerkraut, and dumpling dinner will be available at the Sheraton Inn. Following the dinner, the "Parade of Kroje," a fashion show of national costumes, will be held at Poolside. Helene Cincebeaux, director and founder of the Slovak Heritage and Folklore Society of North America, will narrate the show. Adjacent to the exhibit hall will be expanded Gift Shop space and a storage and work area.

Across the Grand Hall from the Museum, will be the Assembly and Festival Hall. This large space can be divided into as many as four different areas. This will allow groups of different sizes to make use of the facility, as well as accommodate events occurring simultaneously.

A residential-size kitchen may be used in conjunction with the use of the Festival Hall for small gatherings, or as a facility for specialized cooking classes.

The new library will enable visitors to access materials for educational, research, or leisure reading purposes. Development of a multi-media use area is also being incorporated into the plans for the library space. Plans for the future include story hours and puppet theater workshops for children.

Staff office and work space will occupy the area adjacent to the library. The building will not only be attractive, but efficient and functional, as well.

With everyone's help, we will meet our goal. The challenge is to raise an additional \$300,000. It's going to take all of us. Let's make history.



"MOST"

The National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library is located at the west end of the Bridge of Lions in the Czech Village. With its outstanding collection of national costumes, fully restored immigrant home, demonstrations of Old World arts and crafts. and celebrations of ethnic customs and traditions, the museum serves to "bridge" the gap between the culture of the Czechoslovak homeland and the culture of the Czechoslovak immigrants in America.

For those of European ancestry, a visit to the Museum is like a walk across the "MOST," that imaginary bridge that leads back to the land and culture of their ancestors.

CULTURE

.... is the means by which a community defines itself, understands its past, and envisions its future.

With the vision in mind, of a downtown in which business and cultural elements intertwine, enrich, and support each other, the Cedar Rapids Downtown Cultural Alliance was formed. Its mission is to promote cultural development in and around downtown Cedar Rapids, encourage cooperation between member organizations, and act to enrich the quality of life for area residents.

One of the organization's first projects was to proclaim the month of March, 1993 as "Culture's Alive! Month". Attention was focused on all the cultural activities and events occurring in the city within this time period. October 1993 is "Family Month" with special emphasis on family-oriented programs and events taking place at the various cultural facilities.

SPECIAL CULTURAL EXHIBIT

In conjunction with the 3rd Czechoslovak Genealogical/Cultural Conference, a special exhibit of more than 100 pieces of Czech, Moravian, and Slovak folk dress and folk art will be on display October 6-31 at the Cedar Rapids Public Library. The artifacts are from the Baine/Cincebeaux Collection, one of the finest known private collections. The pieces on display represent thirty years of study. The entire collection numbers well over 1000 pieces and includes folk costumes, wedding headdresses, batik printers, lace-making bobbins and pillows, decorated shuttles, and other textile related implements.

Helene Baine Cincebeaux and her mother, Helen Zemek Baine, have made 22 trips to Slovakia and have visited two-thirds of all the towns, cities, and villages. They have visited hundreds of villages in Cechy and Moravia and have traveled extensively in all corners of the Czech and Slovak Republics documenting the crafts and skills of folk artists and artisans.

This collection is especially valuable because the artifacts were given to Helen and Helene by the people who made, used, or inherited the articles. They are careful to gather as much information as possible as to why an article was made and worn or how it was used. Each piece is dated and carefully documented. The collection includes a substantial number of men's items, rare since men gave up wearing traditional folk dress earlier than women.

Motifs have become a strong interest of Helene's and she has done a great deal of research on motifs and ethnographic history. Explanations of the various motifs used by the artist/craftsman and the symbolic meanings of various traditionally used design elements are an important part of Helene's gallery talks and programs.

Joe Lacina, syndicated radio personality, will be master-of-ceremonies for the evening and entertain us with songs from the old country, as well as contemporary hits.



JOE LACINA







PAULINE

A friendly and familiar face, at the Museum, is that belonging to Pauline Horaček Jáša. Pauline began her association with the museum as a volunteer in 1980, when the exhibits were housed in three rooms of a small, wood-frame house in the Czech Village area of Cedar Rapids. When the museum collection out-grew its display space and was moved to its present location, on the west bank of the Red Cedar River, Pauline moved along with it, becoming one of the Museum's first tour guides.

Her talents have not been limited to exhibit interpretation, however. Pauline reads, writes, and speaks the Czech language and is often called upon for language interpretation and translation assistance.

Pauline graduated from Grant High School, in Cedar Rapids, and did some additional course work in tailoring. Her work experience included secretarial work for the ZCBJ fraternal organization and the Mutual Fire and Automobile Insurance Company, and bookkeeping work for her family's businesses.

Pauline's home-making skills have captured particular attention at the Museum, where she is well-known for her baking and hand-work talents. The traditional Christmas vánočka and Easter mazanec are brought warm and fragrant from her oven to grace the table in the Immigrant Home as these holiday seasons are celebrated. In between these times there might be strudl for an organization meeting, koláce for a special reception, or a beránek to highlight a display table. Homemade rye bread and Pauline's marvelous red raspberry jelly have been treats for staff events.

Pauline began demonstrating the art of peroutky-making (making pastry brushes from goose feathers) and the handwork skill of tatting, for special events held at the



Museum. But it wasn't long before she began "taking her show on the road" as well. Pauline has demonstrated in the Tourism Building, at the Iowa State Fair (in Des Moines), in the Ethnic Pavilion, at the National Cattle Congress (in Waterloo), at the Dvorák Centennial Celebration (in Spillville), at the Johnson County Historical Society's Heritage Museum (in Coralville), and at Ushers Ferry Historic Village (in Cedar Rapids).

Pauline and her daughter, Venda, help to promote the Czech culture by modeling folk costumes that Pauline has made, in special Style Show programs sponsored by the Museum, and by serving as ushers for ethnic programs and concerts. Pauline has derived special pleasure from dressing dolls in traditional ethnic costumes that she has created.

Her other interests include participating in various adult groups at Jan Hus Memorial Presbyterian Church, gardening, canning and preserving, quilting, and singing the folk songs of her parents' homeland with the Czech Heritage Singers. Her memories and observations are recorded on both an audio and a video cassette as part of the Museum's Oral History collection.

In November, Pauline will celebrate her birthday.

PRAGUE CHILDREN'S CHOIR

The rain came down in buckets and huddled under the big canvas tent were well over a hundred pairs of ears. Ears straining to hear over the sound of pouring rain, the thirty-five beautifully trained voices of the Prague Children's Choir.

This, their first engagement in Cedar Rapids, lasted only about ten minutes before the weather became so unbearable that the performance was cut short.

Spirits weren't dampened however. This was also the choir's first visit to the United States and a little rain (5 inches in as many hours) wasn't about to spoil this very special trip.

Prši, Prši jen se leje, (Rain, It rains so heavily) was the most requested song during the choir's stay in the midwest.

The singers were accompanied to the U.S. by seven chaperones. Among these, Director Cestmir Stasek led the group in song, while Jitka Rezna, the choir's manager coordinated preparations for the two week visit.

In the week prior to coming to Cedar Rapids, the choir participated in the Des Moines International Childrens' Choral Festival. In Des Moines, the group performed, trained alongside other children's choirs from around the world, and competed in the international competition. In May, Museum representatives met with Dagmar Hupková, of the Slovak Republic. Ms. Hupková, as U. S. Desk Officer for the Slovak Ministry of Culture, was in Iowa as a participant in the International Visitor Program sponsored by the United States Information Agency. Her mission was to promote the arts of the Slovak Republic. Her purpose in Iowa, was to offer advice in the planning of the 1993 "Celebration of Czech & Slovak Culture" activities and the "Dvořák Centennial Celebration" events scheduled for August 4th to 7th in Iowa City and Cedar Rapids, and August 6th to 8th in Spillville. Arrangements for her visits in Iowa City and Cedar Rapids were made by the Council for International Visitors to Iowa City.

Ms. Hupková thoroughly enjoyed her visit to the Museum, the walking tour of the Czech Village, and her briefing on the Museum foundation's plans for the new national facility scheduled for completion in 1994. She delighted in seeing greetings on signs and store fronts and the business names on some of the shop windows, in the Czech Village, written in the Czech language.

In April, a colleague from Ms. Hupková's office in Bratislava visited the Museum. Mr. Marián Lucký, an arts administrator, was being hosted by The Drawing Legion (CSPS), an Alternative Arts Center, located in the Czech Village area. Mr. Lucký has made possible a special exhibit of "Theatre" art, opening at CSPS in October.

Visitors from both embassies of the Czech and Slovak Republics toured the National Czech & Slovak Museum, in August, and reviewed the plans for the new facility. Inka Vostřezová, First Secretary to the Ambassador from the Czech Republic was pleased to see an effort of such magnitude taking place in Iowa. She stated that with the expansion of the new facility, plans to begin cultural exhibit exchanges between our countries could be made.

Equal space has been reserved for the Slovak Republic, in the new museum's exhibit area, although fewer people of Slovak ancestry live in Eastern Iowa. Monika Nemcoková, Press Secretary for the Slovak Republic, was very happy to see this, noting that Czechoslovakia may have split into two republics, but their cultures remain one. "The country could be divided, but never the culture", she said.

Nemcoková and Vostřezová were visiting Iowa with Iowa Senator Charles Grassley's 1993 Foreign Ambassadors Tour. The side trip was arranged to acquaint embassy staff with the Czech community in eastern Iowa.
