The Czech Heritage Foundation Prince & Princess competition dates back to 1981. In January they are introduced to the Czech community at the annual meeting of the Czech Heritage Foundation and the NCSML. They introduce their parents and present an oral biography of themselves.

The Prince and Princess are expected to participate in all Czech activities which are supported by the Czech Heritage Foundation. In March they participate in the St. Patrick's Day parade and St. Joseph's Day parade. In May they are at the flag raising ceremony during Houby Days and the Memorial Day Service at the Czech National Cemetery. June finds them riding on a float in the Freedom Fest Parade, and in July they lead the opening ceremonies of the Annual Czech School Program at Grant School. In October they attend the NCSML annual banquet. They ride on a Czech Heritage Float in the November Downtown Merchants' Holiday Parade, and participating in the Svaty Mikulas activities at the Museum and in Czech Village.

The program is a great opportunity to honor youth

interested in preserving their Czech Heritage. These posts have served as great learning experiences and stepping stones for the youth. We generally continue to see these same youth as they participate in our Homestay Program, NCSML activities, and often become recipients of our Czech Heritage post-secondary scholarships.

Meet Rachel Lehmann, 2005 Czech Heritage Princess

Dobry den! Dovolte, abych se predstavil: ja jsem Rachel. Je mi ctrnact. Bydlim v Cedar Rapids, Iowa. (Good day! Let me introduce myself: My name is Rachel. I am 14 years old. I am from Cedar Rapids, Iowa)

My Czech heritage is very important to me. I try to embrace my heritage by incorporating it into every aspect of my life: my role models, my beliefs, and my moral values.

The first time I attended the National

Bohemian, Moravian and Slovak Folk Dance Festival, I fell in love with everything Czech. Since then I have attended many other celebrations of the Czech culture, such as Kolacky Days in Montgomery, Minnesota. Montgomery is the Kolacky Capital of North America. It is my mom's hometown and where my ancestors settled over 100 years ago when they immigrated to the United States.

The town of Montgomery, Minnesota, is a tiny one, but it is still very important to me. In June, 1891, my Great-Great-Grandfather, Andrew Kolars immigrated to the United States from Klikov, Czechoslovakia. He chose to settle in what is now Montgomery, Minnesota because he knew a lot of people there from Klikov. He found employment there and a year later sent for his wife, Theresa, and infant daughter.

Because of my background in Bohemia I have designed my kroj similar to the ones my ancestors would have worn. The kroj has a white blouse with large sleeves, a black vest with the Montgomery emblem. The design of the emblem that represents Montgomery and Klikov is complex and beautiful and means a lot to the people that wear it. The red bird embroidered on the back of the vest is a bird found in Klikov. Also the flowers and ivy on the hem of the skirt are like the ones that were all over Klikov. Incidentally, the names of the sports teams in Montgomery are the Redbirds.

Even though I had been looking forward to running for almost a year, when I first told my mom that I wanted to run for the title of Czech Princess her immediate reaction was, "Why?!?" After thinking it out I responded, "Because, I love Czech School so much and I don't want it to end." Of course Czech School did end and this past year I graduated. This is one of the reasons I decided to run for Czech Princess. After only three years in Czech School I had already fallen in love with everything Czech.

The past three years I have spent the summer in Czech School and I can only say that it was one of the greatest experiences of my life. The only regret is that I didn't find it sooner. My greatest fear about Czech School is that it may end due to falling attendance. Without the Czech School so many students wouldn't get the chance to experience their culture. As Czech Princess I would make it my main goal to keep the school alive by helping to increase attendance.

Although my reasons for wanting this title are selfish in that my main reason for wanting the crown is based on how I love my ethnic roots, my intentions are good. As Czech princess I would strive to show my peers how great it is to celebrate your heritage.

School: I attend Secondary Grammar School(in Czech "Gymnázium Příbram") and this school is in Příbram. I am a senior this year, I will graduate in May 2005.

Parents: My father's name is Stanislav Jankovský and

my mother's name is Hana Jankovská.

Siblings: I have one younger sister, her name is Magda, she is 15.

Host family: Russ, Zelda, Amanda and Elizabeth DeHoedt from Cedar Rapids.

U.S. School: I attended Kennedy High School in Cedar Rapids together with Amanda and Elizabeth, I was surprised a lot because American school system is very different from Czech school system. It was great experience and I have learnt a lot about the way how you educate your students. It was rewarding for me.

Interesting Czech Republic experiences: It is difficult for me to answer this, but I would like to recommend you to visit the Czech Republic and spend some time here. I think that spending some time abroad can give you a lot and you can find something valuable in yourself. After my stay in the U.S. I am proud of being Czech more than before.

Interesting U.S. experiences: I had plenty of interesting experiences during my stay, because there were too many strange things in common life, which were different from the Czech ways and it is very difficult for me to pick only one. But I would like to tell you about my first and strongest impression from Iowa. When we went out of air-conditioned airport building in Cedar Rapids, I felt like having my head in a box of hot sweet popcorn. The Iowan air smelled sweet, it was so heavy and motionless. Host Family Experiences: My host family was very hospitable and I am glad to meet them. I spent really great time in the U.S. and I am appreciative for everything they did for me. They took me to many places not only in Iowa and they were very patient with me and my English. They taught me the traditions and rules in the U.S. and explained me everything when I was confused. My stay in the U.S with De Hoedt family was very enjoyable and it was definitely the best trip I have taken. I would like to visit the U.S. again.

Bohemian Garnets: Exquisite Artistry from the National Museum in Prague. Special Exhibit Opens March 4

The National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library in Cedar Rapids, Iowa is proud to present the exclusive American showing of the stunning exhibition Bohemian Garnets: Exquisite Artistry from the National Museum in Prague. The National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library is the exclusive U.S. venue for this unprecedented display of garnet jewelry and adorned objects – the largest selection of garnet antiquities ever loaned by the National Museum. This is the first exhibition of garnets to travel abroad from the National Museum of the Czech Republic, whose collection is renowned as the largest and most comprehensive in the world.

The once-in-a-lifetime exhibition features thousands of garnets set in 370 pieces of jewelry, personal accessories, religious objects, souvenirs, and sentimental objects, accompanied by period paintings, drawings, prints, statues and period clothing. Thousands of dazzling garnets adorn gorgeous earrings, rings, brooches, necklaces, and bracelets as well as picture frames, goblets, chalices, medallions, and paintings depicting people wearing their beloved gemstones. The gallery sparkles. The brilliant craftsmanship, array of items, and creative settings are nothing less than spectacular.



Garnets mined in Bohemia are of the variety called pyrope (from the Greek words pyr for "fire" and ops for "eye"). Of a rare high quality found in Central Bohemia in the north of the Czech Republic, the Bohemian garnet's color ranges from fiery-red to ruby-red, and its deep coloring is not lost even in the smallest, two-millimeter grains. This semi-precious gem is well known as the January birthstone.

The most valuable and rare object in the exhibition is on loan from the Archbishop of Prague. A sensational discovery from the vaults of St. Nicholas Church in Prague, it is a Baroque monstrance made around 1722 that is encrusted with 386 garnets, 19 diamonds, and 135 rock crystals.

Thanks to restoration funded by the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library, the monstrance, which is used in special Roman Catholic ceremonies, will be on display to the public for the first time since the National Slavonic Exhibition in Prague in 1895. At nearly one meter tall, the curator from the National Museum, Dr. Dana Stehlíková (Stehlikova), believes it is quite likely the largest existing object decorated with Bohemian garnets. National Auseum goldsmith Vladimir Cizkovsky completed the restoration work in Prague. Both Vladimir Cizkovsky and Dana Stehlíková will

travel with the collection and be present to help install the exhibit at the NCSML.

In addition, the NCSML is planning a related exhibition of heirloom garnets owned by members and friends of the museum, as well as educational programming for the duration of the exhibition.

The exhibition opens to the public on March 4, 2005 and closes on September 25, 2005. Gallery hours are Tuesday through Saturday, 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Sunday, noon to 4:00 p.m. After May 1st, the exhibit will also be open on Mondays, 9:30 – 4:00. The Czech and Slovak 20th Century in Retrospect: Czechoslovakia Behind the Iron Curtain, 1948 – 1970

In the years that follow, privatization becomes a thing of the past, freedoms are curtailed, and the vibrant Czechoslovak people are repressed. Years pass, communism has a human face. Then, an invasion, Prague Spring ends, Normalization begins. This is Czechoslovakia Behind the Iron Curtain, 1948 – 1970.

The Czech and Slovak History and Culture Conference examines this tumultuous period in world history. Featured are a keynote address by **Dr. Jaroslava Moserová**, former senator in the Czech Parliament, and

 socialization of Czechoslovakia in 1948.
- Sunday, Mar. 6: The Joke (1968) Jaromil Jires.
 Based on Milan Kundera's novel of the same name, this film is a stunning visual of life in Czechoslovakia during the Stalinist 1950s.

Thursday, Mar. 10:children at Theresienstadt: Hoskova, Voices of the Children (1996) Zuzana Justman. Profiles three people imprisoned as Helga Kinsky, and Michael Kraus. Blends survivor interviews with excerpts from their diaries and drawings from the wartime years. Produced and directed by Zuzana Justman, another Theresienstadt survivor. Won an Emmy Award in 1998 for outstanding historical programming.

V. Feature Article:

Library Cataloguing Update

The Czech Heritage Foundation is currently in a multiyear project to help fund cataloguing of the NCSML's library collection. Our organization feels a keen commitment to that collection. In fact, it was a similar fund drive several years ago that provided the kick-off funding to establish the permanent position of Museum Librarian. You might say the Library is one of our pet projects.

The National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library preserves and protects more than 18,000 books, periodicals, and archival materials about Czech and Slovak culture. However, it is not enough to house a large collection of materials. Scholars, students, historians, genealogists, and the general public must have easy access to them. That's where this massive cataloguing process comes in.

Not only is the cataloguing information being captured, but it is being entered into an automated system that is available through the NCSML web site. Appropriately enough, this on-line catalogue is being called "Komensky". Researchers should understand that Komensky contains only a part of the cataloged library collection (currently approximately 4,000 items). The online catalog is a work in progress, and it will be updated as the NCSML continues to document their holdings.

All items have catalogued in accordance with accepted cataloging standards. The library is a member of the Online Computer Library Center (OCLC), a cataloging cooperative, and their holdings also appear in OCLC's WorldCat. As items are catalogued, the catalogue information becomes available over the Internet, through the Library's web site. Thus, scholars all over the world can search the NCSML collection for works of particular interest to them.

With the help of the funding being provided by the Czech Heritage Foundation, the NCSML is now in the second year of this most recent cataloguing project. Cataloguers have been hired to provide part-time cataloguing assistance over a two year period.
