Apple strudel and coffee completed the dinner. Wine and beer were available at a cash bar. There was even an edible orchid garnish on each plate.

Advance reservations were required, the price at \$25 per guest. Czech & Slovak dinner netted \$2,000. Expanded advertising resulted in 112 reservations, including people from California and Texas! Guild of NCSML logo recreated

The former Guild logo included both traditional folk art and a "key to success" design that was a silhouette of NCSML as it looked before the Flood of 2008. Our museum edifice is different today, and therefore not recognizable as the building in the previous logo. Thus, membership voted on and approved the Guild logo. Marj Nejdl was asked to recreate/freshen up the folk art motif, representing heritage, to comprise the new look. Here is our logo!



'The Librarian' book sculpture honors Sis' illustration

"The Librarian" book sculpture that adorns the Rozek Grand Hall at NCSML is inspired by a character from illustrator Peter Sis' book THE THREE GOLDEN KEYS. The original "Librarian" Sis adapted for his book was an oil on canvas entitled "The Librarian," by Giuseppe Arcimbldo. Thought to be a portrait of Wolfgang Lazius, humanist and historian, the original was painted in 1562.

This representation has become a feature in the visual history of the library profession. The painting was taken to Sweden following looting of Prague Castle during the 1648 Battle of Prague.

Fast forward to today at NCSML and the book sculpture featured with a current exhibit there. In Sis' 1994 book THE THREE GOLDEN KEYS, he recaptures the wonder of his own childhood in Prague. While the reader is at "the library,"

there is a shift in the walls and The Librarian magically emerge from the wall of books.

In the story, The Librarian unrolls a scroll and a golden key is attached to it. In order to learn the rest of the story, you may purchase the book and other Sis favorites at the Museum Gift Shop!

When the Peter Sis exhibition at NCSML was finalized, Guild of NCSML members collaborated to produce our own version. Grant Smith, director of facilities, created the metal framework and platform onto which books were attached. This platform is on castors, which allows the sculpture to be moved. It will be permanent even after the Sis exhibition moves on, according to Dave Muhlena, director of Skala Bartizal Library.

Next, Dave selected books, many of which were duplicates or, although decorative, were not suitable for the museum library collection. For instance, the two dramatic "legs" are not Czech or Slovak literature. Guild member George Hill provided valuable assistance in construction of the book sculpture.
