



ECHO PANTRY

2 c rhubarb diced 1 tsp. lemon juice 1 c sugar 1/4 tsp. salt

1 c milk

2 eggs 2 thsp. flour Pie shell 6 tbsp. sugar for

meringue

Cook rhubarb and 3/4 c of sugar until soft; cool, add milk and yolk of eggs beaten with 1/4 c of sugar, the flour and salt, mixed together. Add the lemon juice. Pour into uncooked pie crust. Bake at 450 deg. F. for ten minutes then at 325 for 25 min. Cover with meringue and brown.

HANDY ANDY ANSVERS

- Q. How can I treat old handkerchiefs that have become very flimsy and as a result look soiled before they really are?
