"Collecting Czech Glassware"

presented by
Joyce Lamparek Anderson

Guild attendees at the May 1 meeting were given an interesting presentation by Joyce. She displayed her varied collection and pointed out that the Czechs were very artistic and used many different designs because materials were available. A lot of history was lost during the war, however, and some items marked Austro/Hungary were actually made by Czechs. As well as glassware, her collection also contained pottery. A popular theme was animals, especially the Amphora and Erphila pieces. Many of the designers were influenced by the Art Nouveau and Art Deco styles in the early 1900s.

Her collection contained old and new pieces of Royal Dux, still being made today in a factory twenty miles northwest of Prague. Their symbol is a pink triangle with an acorn on the bottom of each piece. We were told that glassware made by Loetz between 1890 and 1930 is very expensive. Moser, another great artist, usually uses some gold trim in his designs. We had to agree with Joyce that some of the color combinations in her collection were very unusual and some were more attractive than others.

Joyce ended her presentation by showing us a long string of beautiful glass beads or buttons which was always given to the bride on her wedding day for good luck.




