New Business: Carmen Langel will write a Thank You note to Pierson's Flower Shop for the beautiful flowers they donated.


Other: More food is needed for the brunch for the entertainers at the Festival.

My Volunteer Experience at the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library Testimonials

As a museum guide, I have met some interesting visitors. Sometimes I have learned a lot from a visitor. Dr. Ivan Dubovický, a professor of Ethnology at Charles University in Prague, was an informative visitor. He talked about the first translation of the bible into the Czech language at Kralice in 1587. He told me that some old Czech traditions are being revived such as the opening of a water well in the spring with a large key. He also explained to me that the Moravian Brethren Church was first established in Germany and that the majority of the members were Germans although some members were Czechs who had emigrated from Moravia. He also told me about Augustine Hermon, who is the first well known Czech immigrant to America. He arrived in 1633 and surveyed the coastal areas of Maryland and Virginia.

Sometimes a guide has the opportunity to establish a friendship with a visitor. In December of 1993 a Slovak high school exchange student visited the museum with her high school librarian. The student's name was Andrea Kubová. She thoroughly enjoyed the museum, but it appeared that she was homesick. At the end of the tour, there was a display, related to the Czech National Opera **The**Bartered Bride. Andrea and I sang

the chorus together in Czech and then she began to cry. It was clear that we had formed a friendship and she was reluctant to leave. Fortunately, my wife Marge was working in the gift shop so she also talked with Andrea and the school librarian. We made plans to meet with Andrea at the home where she was staying in Dunkerton, Iowa. Thereafter, we spent many weekends together visiting and sightseeing. Her friendship was very special and we often think about her.

A VERY HISTORICAL PHOTOGRAPH

(Taken from Ceskoslovensky Tydenik)

Most of you recognize this famous picture from World War II and also the place where it was taken. But you probably don't know the names of the soldiers in the photo.

It may be of interest to know that one of the U. S. soldiers in this group was a Slovak. Michael Strank was born on the 10th of November 1919 in Jarabin in northern Slovakia near the Polish border. He was the son of Karel and Marta Strank who emigrated to the U. S. in 1921. The family settled in Conemaugh, PA, two miles northeast of Johnstown.

Michael enlisted in the marines in 1939, and was assigned to basic training in New River, SC. When the U. S. entered the war, he was a sergeant. He was sent to the Southern Pacific on December 8, 1941. He was awarded a Purple Heart for his bravery in fighting on Iwo Jima. Michael was one of the soldiers from the 2nd Battalion, 28 Regiment, 5 Division who planted the American flag on top of the 600 foot mountain, Surubachi Yama, on February 23, 1945.

Sergeant Michael Strank didn't live to see the end of the war. He was killed on March 1, 1945 while attacking an enemy position in the northern section of Iwo Jima. May he and all our war dead rest in peace.

Phyllis informed us that she represented the Johnson County Extension Service Office. They have a twenty-four hour hot line, and attorney available during the day, a speakers bureau and over 3000 publications available. There is also an extension office under Linn County Extension Service in Marion.
