
Ample parking is in the area and at rear of all shops and stores in Czech Village.

MUSEUM AND SPECIAL SHOWING. On the 5th Anniversary, May 1, the Museum and Library held its annual reception to present recent acquisitions.

The dozen decorated eggs donated by Marge Kopeček Nejdl were displayed. Marge uses several techniques: the traditional folk designs penned on a few eggs; others painted and still others colored by the elaborate batik process. The painted goose egg with delicate lace pattern is a gem of artistry. The lithograph of young Andrew Polehna in the young boy's kroj (costume) brought from Czechoslovakia by great-grandfather Andrew (Ondrej) Polehna is on loan to the Museum on a long term basis. Young Andrew's portrait is the fifth and last of a series of Cedar Rapids people in kroje. The first one of Patty Konecny in a Piestany (Slovak) kroj represents the present generation. Young Amy Novotny's dress is a Moravian kroj and now Andrew Polehna's represent the future. Seniors are Melvina Svec in a Czech kroj and Frank Novotny in a south Czech kroj. Artist Rich Kasparek was pleased with the reception of his works by the many people who attended the event. All of these fine lithographs can be purchased in the Museum Gift Shop: \$25.00 for the large size and \$15.00 for the smaller size. The people in attendance were much interested in preserving the cultural heritage of the Czech Community and its century old arts.

MUSEUM AND HOUBY DAYS. May 17-18, our Houby Days in Czech Village were somewhat rained out. Saturday was indeed weepy. On Sunday, clear and bright, there was a steady flow of visitors to admire the costumes, glassware and other artifacts. The 4-H group, the Putnam Slick Chicks, headed by Sylvia Rohlena, were voluntary guides, charming and competent and willing. They seemed to be enjoying themselves. We appreciate your help and THANK YOU ALL. Across the avenue were exhibitions and demonstrations of (1) Czech and Moravian embroidery by Sally Kriz, (2) quilting by Adeline Volesky and Lillian Čuhel, (3) fashioning of peroutky by Gus Pesek and Pauline Jasa, (4) crocheting by Tillie Rohlena and (5) spinning by Rosena Whitson. Maybe next year the sun will shine both days! *

CZECH MUSEUM AND GROWTH. Until Nov. 15, the Museum will be open Tuesday through Friday, 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and on Saturday, 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Guide tours are provided. The Museum houses the largest collection of Czech, Moravian and Slovak costumes (kroje) outside of Czechoslovakia itself. The Immigrant House has been completely restored and draws many visitors who often view it with some nostalgia.

Year by year visitors to the Museum have increased -- they come from Iowa, many states and from foreign countries. Donations are asked of visitors -- \$2.00 or \$3.00 if the tour should include a walking trip of Czech Village. The Gift Shop has been expanding its offerings, such as Christmas cards with Czech greetings and envelopes (\$2.75 for 10). The Immigrant House interior is featured on the card. The advertisement (at first considered too expensive - \$600) placed in the Iowa Department of Tourism brochure brought almost 1,000 requests for more information during the first 12 days of its publication! All requests have been answered.

The Museum's fame is indeed spreading much to the gratification of the Czech Community of Cedar Rapids.



"CZECHING IN". Receiving my first newsletter from Czech Heritage Fdn. was a real treat, bringing me a real "touch of home". I grew up in southwest Cedar Rapids, the heritage of Czech ancestry and it gets a bit strange being surround ed by the French here in Beaumont, Texas. My phone book pages have replaced the Sojka, Havlicek or Becicka with Junot or Thibodeaux or Kwodeaux. During football season, bumper stickers boast "Geaux, Team, Geaux!" (Go, Team Go!). Even the name of "Fido" on the doghouse verifies that the occupant of the house name is "Phydeaux". I have contemplated giving the name of Drahos a French flare! I could spell it Drahouxs or Drayhoux but it just makes it harder for me to write. Maybe some one would eventually pronounce it right! Missing your heritage days, customs, foods and celebrations can be tough at times. "Houby Days" will be coming soon and my mouth waters for freshly picked houby, deep fried till goldenm-m-m. I have found plenty of mushrooms in my tree-covered yard but am afraid to touch them. They look unfamiliar and so all I can do is rely on the memory of those tasty morsels. One of the strangest culture shocks for this "Bohemie" was watching people in restaurants devour platters filled with boiled crawfish! I had always used these ugly creatures for bait! Crawfish are served everywhere and raised as a second crop after the rice harvest. Finally we felt we were ready to explore this Cajun (Acadian-French) delight. Within minutes my plate was full of mutilated skeletal remains and I never did get those rewarding strings of meat off the tails! The Cajuns remove the head and suck out the interior. It's very difficult to be seated next to "head suckers" but we're getting better. Here is a Southwestsider encountering a "cultural shock" on relocation. So much for an insight into this French culture as I live the similarities but always keep my Czech heritage alive in our home.

from Evelyn Langlas, Thousand Oaks, California A FAMOUS MAN WHOM I ADMIRE. Jan Amos Komensky is a famous Czech educator and philosopher whom I admire. He was born March 28, 1592 in the Moravian village of Nivnice. He is best known by the Latin form of his name which is Comenius.

After the defeat of the Czech army at the battle of White Mountain Nov. 8, 1620, he had to go into hiding -- to save his life. After several years, in February 1628, he left his beloved homeland and lived the remainder of his life as an exile.

He established modern educational systems in several different European countries. He planned the curriculum, wrote the text books and demonstrated teaching techniques.

During the "Thirty Years War", 1618-1648, his library of valuable books were burned by an invading army, first in Bohemia and again years later at Lezno in Poland. But he never stopped writing educational and philosophical works or promoting a system of universal education for all people in every country.

He died at Amsterdam Nov. 15, 1670. He passed on to posterity over 250 books, covering practically all areas of human knowledge. His maxim was: "The life of action is life indeed, idleness is a grave closing on man while he is yet alive."

MEMORIAL DAY of 65 years ago ... are the memories of a then 9 year-old ... today sketchy but memories one does cherish. In those days, The Czech Memorial was the Sunday following our National Memorial Day, May 30th. On Czech Decoration Day, the Czech Community took part. The procession started at the Sokol Hall with Jansa's Band and later the Kubovec Band furnishing the music. The Sokol men followed by the Sokol Women were followed by the Praha Rebekah Lodge and the Odd Fellows in their Drill Team outfits. The march continued south of 3rd Street to 10th Avenue where the Reading Society (Ctenarsky Spolek) and the Czech School Children joined the line of march. The girls were dressed in Czech costumes or white dresses and the boys in white shirts, black ties and black knickers or pants.

One block south, the members of the C.S.P.S. Lodges (now C.S.A.) with their ceremonial badges and the Jednota Českých Dam (Society of Czech Ladies) fell into the line of marchers.

One more block south at the Z.Č.B.J. Hall, members of the seven lodges joined in also with their ceremonial badges. Across the street, the dignitaries of the Iowa State Savings Bank fell into the line. All of this time, the Band played march music. The parade then crossed the 14th-16th Ave. bridge. Many Czechs joined their group and all proceeded up the C Street hill to the Bohemian National Cemetery.

Upon reaching the gates, the parade marched to the shade of trees in the undeveloped part of the cemetery. People were sitting on the grass waiting for the program. Names of two speakers I do remember were Joseph Měkota and J. J. Hayek. The program included singing by the pupils.

After the program, an inspection of the cemetery was made. People slowly wended their way to the front gate, visiting old friends and stopping to pay homage to dear departed ones. The parade is but a memory, a tribute held each year at the Soldier's Field where a monument has the names of the fallen with an eternal light and a nitch for flowers placed there by the Federation of Czech Groups. Some of the fallen are buried there, others elsewhere and at sea.

The Bohemian National Cemetery was organized in 1895 and in the mid-1940's the name was changed to Czech National Cemetery. Later on the processions started from Riverside Park. Nowadays there is no procession but the ceremony continues to be on the Sunday designated by the Czech Federation. May 25, 1986 was the event with the Czech Plus Band furnishing the music and Theodore Hlubucek as speaker.

She was with the Metropolitan Opera, Covent Garden in London, Berlin Royal Opera and elsewhere. She appeared in 80 different opera roles. "The Divine Emma" is a movie, 1983, United Artists Classics, 107 min. color, filmed in Czechy. People who have seen the movie were thrilled. DR. ROSE WISTEIN:
(1867-1937) daughter of
Felix and Františka Řehoř
was born near České Budějovice in (the Province of) Bohemia.

When she was only 3 her parents emigrated to the United States in 1870. Love of her country was so instilled by her grandfather that she never forgot it and it was always with her. Her father died when she was 14 and it was up to her to support the invalid



mother and her brothers. She took on various jobs. She married Dr. Joseph L. Wistein and studied medicine, receiving her diploma in 1904. She practiced in Chicago until she moved to Cedar Rapids, Iowa, 1914. During the WWI years she was one of the most active workers, giving lectures, leading drives, writing for newspapers: on projects pertaining to the War effort.

She wrote of her memorable trip to the old country in 1909 when she not only saw her birthplace but also met famous Czech authors and professors. A promised return visit was not to be. She not only suffered with her health but also financially. She died Feb. 23, 1937. She will be remembered as a service worker and faithful Czech-American by all who knew her. Růžena Řehoř (Wistein) (Rose Gregory). Her
mother was a guest of Countess Swartzenberg
at the Castle Hluboká when the baby daughter
arrived! When the family came to Chicago,
Rose's father tutored her and she graduated
from the 8th grade at age of eleven! After
father's death, she held various jobs, one was
Department Manager in a Chicago store. Her
salary was \$1,500/ yr. In 1892 she married
Dr. Wistein. He died in 1903, a year before
she graduated in medicine.



The years 1909-1910 in Europe were spent in study and travel. She even read a paper before the International Medical Congress in Budapest. Upon her return to Chicago, she resumed private practice but failing health and a heart condition took its toll. She moved to Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and as she improved in health, resumed medical practice. The big Depression of 1930's took its toll in health and finances.
