The Museum Guild of National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library met at NCSML on Saturday, February 3, 2007 at 9:00 a.m.

Shirley Alexander called the meeting to order and JoAnne Neff led the Pledge of Allegiance. 39 members attended. Three visitors attended.

Program:

Gail Naughton shared the Annual Report. Some of the highlights were that the garnet exhibit was a peak year. November and December were record-setting with the Warhol exhibit. 175 programs and events were held last year. School tours were up 35%. Jan completed an important curriculum project for 3rd graders visiting the Homelands exhibit. Over 300 volunteers volunteered almost 22,000 hours. Meeting budget continues to be a challenge. Our endowment is almost \$2,000,000, allowing 5% of interest earned to be used by the museum. Currently two estate gifts are in probate and will be put into the endowment. The 2007 priorities include operation support to help with cash flow, sponsorship of programs and events, a capital campaign feasibility study and support for our CEO, Board and staff.

Mark Stoffer Hunter presented a slide show on the Holy History of Cedar Rapids.

"Our Treasured Textiles"  
By Guild Members

Beautiful textiles and beautiful memories were shared by Guild members at this meeting planned in conjunction with the Museum textile exhibit.

Gary Dvorak showed a counted cross stitch in shades of tan done by his sister for him. The design was taken from a photo of the two of them. Evelyn Dvorak showed a counted cross stitch piece Gary designed and made for her. The words "Vitame Vas" were surrounded by flowers with leaves in three shades of green. Gary said he used techniques he learned in porcelain painting classes.

Milly Ortner showed a splash cloth she especially treasures because it was given to her by Pauline Jasa. The cloth was done in blue embroidery with a blue border. Splash cloths were used by early immigrants to protect the walls above sinks.

King Tut done in cross stitch was a gift to her father by the late Cynthia Tucker Shaffer. Her mother, Marilyn Tucker, expressed that she was especially proud of things done by those who are no longer here.

Andrea Siebenmann showed an example of the familiar Modra type of design in dark blue on a cotton square. She said older women in the villages of Slovakia wore blue or black designs with doves on their aprons. The country is sometimes referred to as the Dove Nation because of its "peace loving people".

A crocheted doll's dress in variegated pastel colors was shown by Fern Fackler. Her mother made it for her favorite doll in the mid-1930's. The tiny buttons were blue elephants with shiny eyes.

Shirley Alexander thanked the participants and gave this advice to everyone: "Label your precious things with the instructions on who should receive them".

February 3, 2007  
"Holy History"  
By Mark Stoffer Hunter

Following the first settler to our community in 1838 was the first preacher who came in 1844. The minister was the Reverend Issac Searles who was associated with the Searles and Baxter Monument Works.

Mark stated that the congregations of the first churches met in homes. The first group to organize was St. Paul's Methodist Church.

Most churches began on the east side of Cedar Rapids but they did not want to have presence on the west side, so many established chapels in that part of town. The Wesley Chapel was begun by St. Paul's Methodist Church in the Czech Village located at the present day site of the Saddle and Leather Shop. Many of the chapels became full blown churches.

The original "church row" was on Third Street SE. The First Presbyterian Church was organized in the building that is now the Witwer Senior Center. The next churches of that denomination were the Second, Third and Fourth Presbyterian Churches with the names changed at a later date. Another church in this area was a small wooden building on the site of the present Guaranty Bank at Third Street and Third Avenue. This was the First Lutheran Church.

Later, another unofficial "church row" was named when First Presbyterian was built on Third Avenue and additional churches moved away from the downtown. Peoples Unitarian at 600 Third Avenue SE was originally a red brick building and later was covered with stucco.

One hundred and two years ago, Westminster Presbyterian was built at 1285 Third Avenue SE "way out in the country". The streetcars were coming out that far at the time so parishioners could get to church in that manner. Bethel A.M.E. was built in 1868 at 512 6th Street SE which is close to the Main Post Office.

St. Patrick's Church on First Avenue NW was built in the 1880's for the Irish population. The parish used the old wooden building until 1902. St. Ludmila's was started as a mission by the St. Wenceslaus Sisters of Notre Dame.

The first synagogue was built on First Avenue SW on the site of Salem United Methodist Church. In the old telephone directories, the Freethinkers Societies were apparently treated as a belief system as they were listed with the churches. This group had members of the Czech community and the listing may indicate that they had their own places to meet.

The history of religions in Cedar Rapids is a fascinating story and was brought to life by Mark's interesting presentation.
