


This coincides with the Czech Republic's own 2004 Year of Music and the Slovak Republic's ongoing musical heritage focus.

FROM OUR PRESIDENT



Welcome to 2004 – a Year of Music celebrating our 30th anniversary. This issue of Most describes the special exhibit, events and programs that pack this exciting year. There will be

music filling the air almost every weekend from April through October, as well as at evening concerts and dances. In addition, our dance festival is growing by leaps and bounds. In this, only the third year, we will welcome a dance troupe and band from Moravia, plus artists, artisans, food and drink, for a great festival weekend.

Even though our focus is 2004, I would like to report on the activities of 2003. According to our careful statistical records kept by Patricia Hikiji, 32,748 persons were physically here or reached by the NCSML in 2003, including 1,704 persons whom we met through outside presentations at meetings, programs and the like. This total doesn't begin to include the 92,314 distinct visits to the NCSML Web site throughout the year, resulting in 422,676 hits on NCSML Web pages, plus persons who stay in touch through publications, mailings, and just plain old personal contacts. Outreach was a focus for us as we raised awareness of our history and programs, and we were honored by the State Historical Society of Iowa at that organization's annual award program in May, receiving the Loren Horton Community Education Award. The extent of the communication among the NCSML and its many constituents provides evidence of the continually growing importance and recognition of your NCSML for its work preserving and educating about Czech and Slovak history and culture.

From visitor surveys we know that persons from at least 33 states and five other countries came to the NCSML in 2003, 98 percent of them rating their experience as very good to excellent. We hosted 60 different school tours and fielded 909 visitors to the library. Our two largest events, the History & Culture Conference and the dance festival, both more than doubled attendance over previous years. The Museum Guild and volunteers continued to provide invaluable service – 12,885.75 hours this year that would require more than \$66,000 in compensation at just minimum wage.

It was the many gifts of time, talent and treasure from members, friends and businesses that helped make the year 2003 a success. With generous support in contributions, memorials and sponsorships, we were able to balance the budget, no small feat for a non-profit organization these days. The NCSML is an organization founded on generosity – generosity of spirit and generosity of resources. Thank you to all who supported us this year!

Offers Unique Experience at the NCSML This Summer

We've lost count of the number of people who have asked when we were going to feature music more prominently, why don't we mention the *Beer Barrel Polka* in the permanent exhibition, or why Czechs and Slovaks are so musical. *Muzika! A Celebration of Czech and Slovak Music* is finally here to answer all these questions and many others.

The core of the exhibition is a loan of exquisite Czech and Slovak instruments from the National Music Museum at The University of South Dakota, Vermillion. With thousands of instruments in its collection, the National Music Museum owns some of the earliest, best-preserved and historically most important musical instruments in existence today. Their loan to the NCSML includes woodwind and brass instruments from the 16th through 20th centuries.

What is a music exhibition without the sound of music? The exhibit will draw upon the NCSML's vast holdings of recorded music to offer several listening stations where you can hear songs played on the unique Czech *dudy* and Slovak *fujara*, enjoy a performance by violin virtuoso Jan Kubelik, or hear examples of early religious music, polka, jazz, brass bands or contemporary music.

When you visit, be sure to bring the kids and grandkids! Do you remember experimenting with triangles, tambourines and the glockenspiel in school? Look for our play corner in *Muzika!*, where adults and kids alike can try a variety of modern and traditional rhythm instruments made in the Czech Republic and Slovakia.

If we still haven't piqued your interest, consider these questions: Why would the communists have banned a music group in former Czechoslovakia? What is Iowa's connection to the most celebrated Czech composer? Who was Slovakia's most famous composer? What is a schediphon? You must tour the exhibition to find out!

Muzika! opens to the public on April 17 and runs through October 17, 2004. Plan to join us for the opening weekend festivities (see below).



New Donations on Exhibit

The National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library received several exceptional gifts to the collection in 2003. If you toured the museum recently, you may have seen some of these items. Others will be on view in the months ahead. For example, this past winter, elements from a set of 17 complete Slovak kroje, donated in 2003 by John and Catherine Postemski of Willington, CT, were exhibited in the Laska Gallery. Also featured was a collection of red Egermann glassware donated by William Whipple in memory of his wife Gayle. Ten pieces of exquisite Czech and Slovak art glass (promised gift from Don and Carol Wiiken) graced the Laska Gallery and Homelands.

Visit the Laska Gallery this spring to see a set of 45 modern prints donated by Gerald Cerny of Washington, D.C. Most of these prints were prepared as New Year's greetings and are just a few square inches in size.

Measured by sheer bulk, the largest gift in 2003 was a set of ornately carved oak furniture designed and made in Chicago in 1899 for a Czech immigrant family and donated by James Verunac of Skokie, IL. Look for pieces of this furniture on

exhibit in 2004.

The 2003 donation from Don Schumann of the 1935 JAWA motorcycle, currently on exhibit in *Homelands*, ensures this historic machine will have a permanent home in the museum.

Library Update

The NCSML continues to catalog its backlog of library materials with the help of a two-year grant from the Czech Heritage Foundation. The grant has allowed the NCSML to hire a part-time cataloging assistant who is responsible for managing cataloging-related activities. Our cataloger, Samantha Schmehl, is a 2003 graduate of the library science program at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champagne. Samantha worked in the UIUC cataloging department as a graduate assistant, where she learned valuable cataloging skills that she is putting to good use at the NCSML. Since coming to the NCSML in August, she has set up a cataloging department and has been entering books and periodicals held by the NCSML, reaching 3,250 records. The conference was a great opportunity to highlight what the NCSML has to offer and to network with archival professionals from other institutions with significant Czech or Slovak archival materials.

- Dave Muhlena and Carmen Langel participated in the January 2004 Coe Forum at Coe College. Dave used a map presentation to explain the geography and history of the Czech and Slovak lands. Together, Carmen and Dave gave a lecture about modern Czech and Slovak history, with Carmen focusing on World War I and formation of Czechoslovakia. Between 175-210 people attended each session of the four-part forum.
- Gail Naughton represented the NCSML at Cultural Advocacy Day at the State Capitol in Des Moines on February 11. The event was sponsored by the Iowa Cultural Coalition, a group of organizations dedicated to adequately funding all cultural and historic preservation programs in the state of Iowa.
- Jan Stoffer Tursi spoke to Mt. Mercy and Kirkwood Community College students on February 16 about immigration and Cedar Rapids' Czech heritage.
