Cedar Rapids Couple Leaves Profound Legacy

George and Louise Kalous donate \$3.4 million to NCSML through estate

ongtime friends George and Louise Kalous have donated a total of \$3.4 million to the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library through trusts in their estates.

George Kalous, a World War II veteran, died in 2006. Louise died in 2012. The Cedar Rapids natives loved to travel internationally, including the Czech Republic, to visit relatives.

Louise learned about investing from an employer in the 1940s and the couple began creating a portfolio which they nurtured for over 60 years.

"George and Louise were wonderful, practical people," said NCSML CEO Gail Naughton. "Louise and I would share a little evening toddy on occasion and talk about her charitable intentions. She was adamant that she wanted the museum and library to stay strong and succeed."

George worked as a mail clerk with the U.S. Postal Service for 34 years, and Louise worked for the Iowa/Illinois Gas and Electric Co. They had no children.

A portion of the estate is in a permanently endowed fund at the Greater Cedar Rapids Community Foundation. Investments from the fund will come to the NCSML annually. The balance is invested with the NCSML endowment. The gift is unrestricted, meaning the Museum will be able to utilize the money to fit its needs.

"It goes without saying that we are immensely grateful for the generosity of George and Louise. Their belief in the mission of the Museum is inspiring to us all," said Gail. "Louise attended the opening Gala in July 2012 and enjoyed herself immensely. As a permanent memorial to them, we named the entrance in front of the Museum, the George and Louise Kalous Plaza."

education." We were both speechless.

These types of gifts are transformative, and the effects will be measured in decades and even centuries!

The timing couldn't be better. With our new facility complete, our focus now is to significantly expand education and programs, both locally and nationally. We are heading into a new exciting era in our history.

It may sound counter-intuitive but right now, new members and donations are more important than ever. Now is the time for more investment in the NCSML's annual operations, so we can make the most of these new assets. When the year-end appeal letter arrives, be generous. With strong annual support, we will be able to move forward with developing an education initiative that will involve the generations of today and influence those in the future with the profound lessons of Czech and Slovak history and culture.

Each and every gift matters as much as Louise's and CHE's, and we are equally grateful.

Oral History Booth Lets Visitors Leave Their Own Mark

The NCSML has concluded the second phase of its oral history project. However, thanks to the library's new Oral History recording booth, visitors to the museum can now leave their own mark by recording stories about what their ethnic heritage means to them.

From the outside, the booth is designed to reflect the architecture one might find in Bratislava or Prague. Once visitors step inside, they will find a touchscreen computer that prompts users to respond to a variety of questions about their ethnic heritage. They can then choose to share the recordings online.

Visitors can also view others' stories from within the booth. No reservations or tickets are required.

Chicago's CHE Establishes \$2.7 Million Endowment At NCSML

n January 1, 2013, the NCSML finalized an agreement with Chicago's Council of Higher Education (CHE) to establish a \$2.7 million endowment for educational programming.

A 110 year-old nonprofit organization, the CHE's mission is to promote Czech, Slovak, and Ruthenian heritage and culture through the encouragement and support of higher education in the United States and Canada with scholarships for college students.

"The CHE Board of Directors decided to broaden the reach of our mission and found a partner in the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library," said Chicago attorney and former CHE President George Drost. "We identified the NCSML as a vibrant organization that has the capacity to continue to support Czech, Slovak, and Ruthenian culture through its education programs. The CHE board visited the NCSML campus, and we were fully and duly impressed. As stewards of this endowment, we could imagine no better organization to take on this responsibility."

While the NCSML already offers substantial educational programming, this agreement provides a steady source of income to support and increase those efforts.

"This is a transformative agreement," said NCSML President and CEO Gail Naughton. "With this endowed fund we can confidently plan and provide even more robust educational offerings to serve people of all ages."

The Spiritual Dimension In Czech Printmaking

pening at the NCSML Nov. 16, *The Spiritual Dimension in Czech Printmaking* features 33 exquisite works by renowned Czech printmakers from the HOLLAR Association of Czech Graphic Artists in Prague.

The exhibit offers a meditative insight into the soul of Czech artists while showcasing the beauty of craftsmanship and tradition in Central European printmaking.

Eleven artists present etchings, drawings, drypoints, lithographs and mixed media works with different approaches to spirituality. Some artist are direct, relating to Biblical themes, while others dwell deep in the realm of the inner self, drawing inspiration from nature.

The HOLLAR Association of Czech Graphic Artists is a non-profit organization located in Prague with a long tradition of fine art printmaking. It was founded in 1971 and is named for 17th century engraver and printmaker Václav Hollar.

The Spiritual Dimension in Czech Printmaking is on loan from KADS NY. It will be on display in the Petrik Gallery through February 9, 2014.

Starting in December, the NCSML's Smith Gallery will host Written in the Czech Landscape, a retrospective of the Czech landscape studies carried out from 2003-2009 by graduate students at Pennsylvania State University.

Sponsored through the Department of Landscape Architecture at Penn State, students and faculty in the university's summer academic programs collaborated with a variety of Czech agencies to study growth and development impacts on heritage sites.

While a sizable body of work in the form of reports and

recorded community meetings and presentations were the primary outcomes of these studies, program participants also formed profound impressions of Czech places and people. The images here express the connections to and insights about the many inspiring landscapes that were studied and visited.

The multi-media exhibition includes photographs, drawings, collages, and design plans.

Written in the Czech Landscape will be in the Smith Gallery from December 21, 2013 to March 23, 2014.




To recognize the organization's most committed individual donors, the NCSML has created the President's Society. Members of the new society will be feted at the inaugural President's Dinner in March.

Cedar Rapids to Czech Republic Flood Relief

Giving Back

Local Organizations To Present \$50,000 Donation To Flood-Damaged Library In The Czech Republic

edar Rapids has successfully raised \$50,000 of flood-relief funds for the Czech Republic.

The Cedar Rapids Public Library Foundation, Sokol Cedar Rapids, the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library and St. Wenceslaus Church have jointly announced the successful completion of CR2CR, a fundraiser for Děčín's flood-ravaged library in the Czech Republic. The CR2CR campaign kicked off in August and successfully concluded at the NCSML's BrewNost event Oct. 11, reaching its \$50,000 goal.

"The campaign was a huge success," says Committee Co-Chair Steve Groner.

The Czech Republic suffered catastrophic flooding in June of this year, with the cost of the damage estimated at more than a billion Czech crowns. Děčín was one of the hardest-hit Czech communities; more than 1,600 of its 50,000 residents were evacuated, and many lower-lying buildings were ruined when water levels went up by 10 meters. Images of Děčín's waterlogged library painted a dramatic portrait of the devastation - one that was eerily similar to Iowa's own flood damage in 2008.

CR2CR originated early this summer during a friendly golf game between Groner and Tom Hansen of Cedar Rapids. Both recalled how, in 2008, the Ambassador of the Czech Republic delivered a flood-relief donation to Cedar Rapids of more than \$500,000.

It was among the first major contributions to the city, said Hansen, who had been serving as President of the Cedar Rapids Public Library Foundation at the time. Groner agreed that

Cedar Rapids needed to repay that kindness.

"All of the citizens of Cedar Rapids have benefited from the Czech Republic's generous gift five years ago," says Hansen, who became one of the organizers of the project. "This is a great opportunity for our city to show its appreciation and friendship to the Czech people."

A contingent of donors and campaign organizers will journey to the Czech Republic in early December, where the donation will be presented at the Děčín library in person.




