Museum Guild Program November 5, 2005 "The Tragedy of the Slovak Jews" By Jan Stoffer

The decision to present the somber exhibit of "The Tragedy of the Slovak Jews" showed an element of courage by the staff of the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library.

The history of this particular time is not an easy subject to visit. It is a tribute to the courage of Slovak government officials, in office after World War II, to reveal the sad happenings before and during the war. The people in office after the war, made public information on individuals who were turned over to the Nazi regime by the wartime government. By publicizing the information, families were able to examine documents that helped them find what had happened to their relatives.

Jan Stoffer, Director of Education and Programs, told the Guild members of the care taken to present the exhibit. A full size replica of a box car was built. This type of car was used to transport the Slovak Jews and information with this part of the exhibit helped visitors realize the inhuman crowding of the people being moved. Recordings of the Terezin Camp chamber orchestra were played in the exhibit rooms.

Kathy Ulrich a certified Holocaust Instructor, also spoke to the members. She gave valuable instructions to members who would be volunteering at this sensitive exhibit. An important point she made was that human beings can sink to unthinkable levels and dehumanization can happen very quickly.

2005 Museum Guild Annual Report

Presented by Shirley Alexander, Guild President at the NCSML Membership meeting on January 23, 2006

Adhering to our mission statement kept our group very busy this past year. Indicative of this was continuing our two main fundraisers, The 7th annual Cookie Walk, held just this past month and the Taste of Czech activity held last May. What developed into a third major activity is the about to be released new Guild Cookbook which in addition to authentic Czech and Slovak recipes, includes many pages of family history about local families and gathered from descendants all over the country. Currently it is back from the printers and ready for the committee to proof read, most likely to be released for sale this next May at Taste of Czech.

Success in last month's Cookie Walk was realized by our taking in almost \$500 more dollars this year than last. 40 members baked 80 different kinds of cookies and candy and 95 customers came. Monetary donations were also accepted. 2005 Taste of Czech activity in May displayed 29 different food items on the menu. Needless to say the line is long before the door is opened. Our members are absolute miracle workers to get all that food set up from that very minimal of kitchens. In addition, our members served as docents at the spectacular Garnet exhibit and now also "The Tragedy of the Slovak Jews". Again, they were in evidence supporting musical concerts, the 3rd Annual Dance Festival in July and Brew Nost and several members presented at "Learn at Lunch" programs and "Babi's Kitchen". Just as important was the time spent by members weeding and planting to improve the looks of the lawn, south of the museum, using tools donated by Gary and Evelyn Dvorak.

Patty Hikiji reports member's volunteer hours at each Guild meeting and has summarized the Number of Guild Hours Recorded in 2005 as 7807.5. Using a minimum wage figure of \$5.25 an hour that computes a figure of \$40,989.38. Is this Guild saving the museum some dollars, or what!!

Sadly time has a way of depleting us of very treasured members. However, due to our very active membership committee, we were still able to boast of 109 members this last meeting. Members have also been active in each of the last three "Ask Me" museum membership campaigns with top salespersons coming from our group and more were sold in 2005 than either of the two preceding years.

In summary, I am proud to say that in the last few years that I have been involved with the museum as docent and guild member, I have learned why this group of very dedicated people has been so successful. Not only because of their ethnic background and because of this beautiful building with marvelous programs and exhibits that contribute greatly to our community but also because the fellow docents and members and especially truly dedicated museum staff are so great to work with and for.

Together, may we and you of the board have a very successful 2006.
