Since living with her host family, Mazanová's had many travel experiences. She's been to Minnesota, Wisconsin, California, and will travel to Florida in February, 2012.

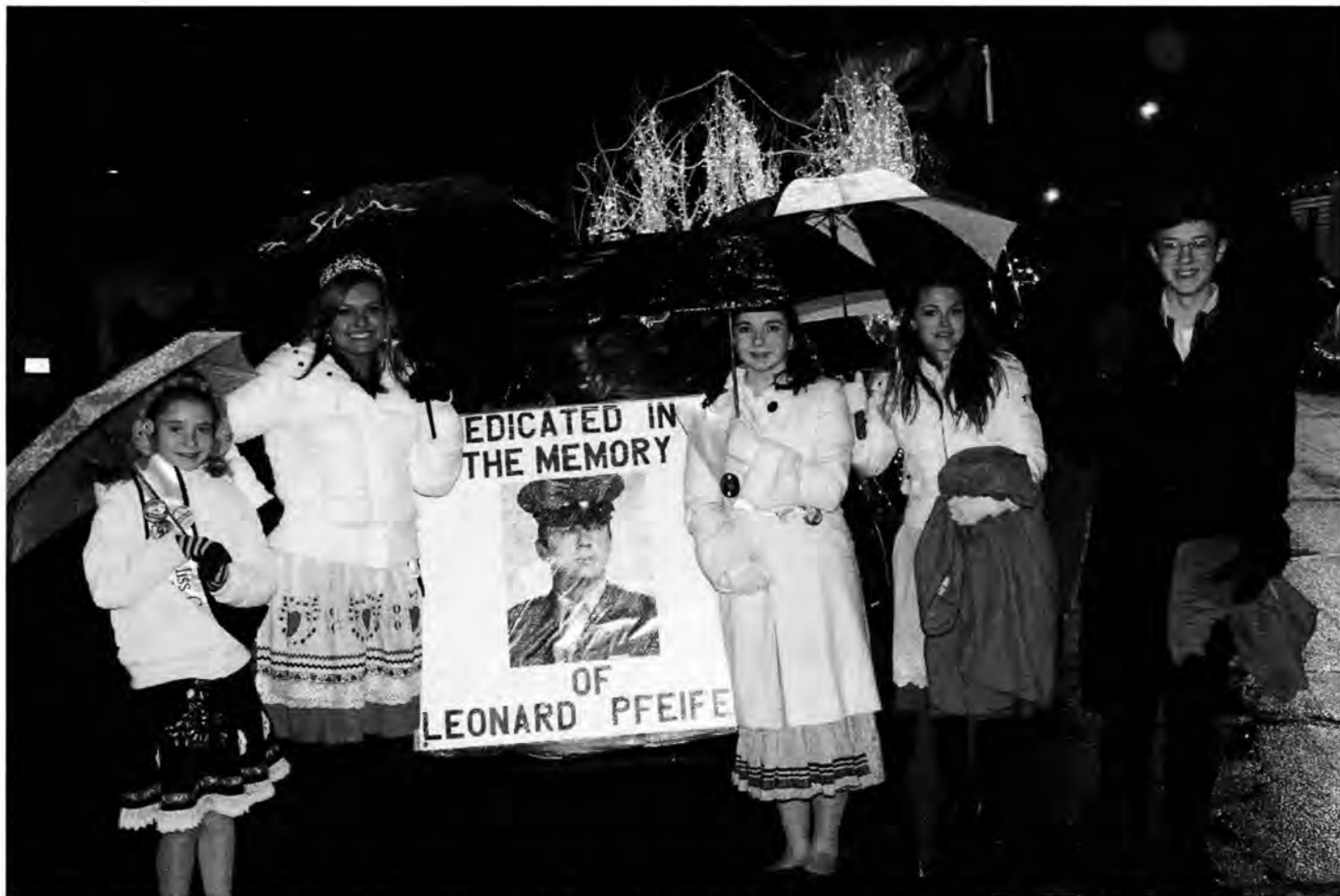
After high school graduation in May, 2012, Mazanová will return to Prague and continue her education and travels.

Holiday Parade Bittersweet

CHF float builder dies days before parade

Leonard Pfeifer's final wish was that his float be finished in time for the Holiday Parade on Dec. 3, 2011. His wish came true thanks to his son, Tim Pfeifer, and friend, Pat Swift.

"That's what he wanted," said his son. The two often helped Pfeifer construct his creations.

Pfeifer, who designed floats for the Czech Heritage Foundation for 23 years passed away November 29, 2011 at the age of 63.

Despite cancer treatments, Pfeifer continued to work on his creations. He transformed Kuncel Mall, 59 16th Ave. SW, into an exquisite winter scene for Sv. Mikuláš

Day complete with glittering snowflakes and a Czech cottage with lace-lined windows. He also designed, built, and almost finished his last float entitled "Stairway to Heaven" before his death.

A self-taught artist, Pfeifer usually produced five spectacular floats a year; all on a very small budget.

Forever thrifty, Pfeifer always had his eye out for discarded boards or awnings that could be used in his designs. He could truly turn trash into treasure.

Leonard's artistic talent and friendly personality will be greatly missed.

It is with deep sadness that we commemorate the passing of our Vice President, Leonard Pfeifer, on November 29, 2011.



Leonard Pfeifer, 63, of Cedar Rapids, lost his courageous battle with cancer Tuesday evening, Nov. 29, 2011, at Mercy Medical Center.

Leonard is survived by his children, Alexander Thomas and wife Priscilla, Gallup, N.M., Timothy Pfeifer, Cedar Rapids, Leonard Pfeifer II and wife Kathy, Laredo, Texas, and Chantelle Kramer and husband Mark and Theresa Pfeifer, both of Cedar Rapids;

15 grandchildren; brothers, Edward Voelpel and wife Joyce, Muscatine, Lee Pfeifer and wife Rosalinda, Menifee, Calif., and Fred Pfeifer, San Diego, Calif.; and sister, Paulina Pfeifer, Cedar Rapids.

He was preceded in death by his former wife, Rose Mae Pfeifer, on July 18, 2011; his parents, Lumir and Margaret (Rook) Pfeifer; and a sister, Paulina Voelpel Ytsen.

Leonard was born Sept. 6, 1948, in Cedar Rapids and lived here most of his life. He met Rose Mae Thomas in Santa Ana, Calif., in 1969 and they were married Sept. 17, 1970, in Hiawatha, Iowa. Their marriage

eventually ended in divorce. Leonard had worked at Wilson's Meat Packing Plant and Iowa Manufacturing. For 35 years until his retirement in June 2010, Leonard was employed as a maintenance engineer at St. Matthew's Catholic Church and

School. He was a Marine Corps veteran of the Vietnam War. Leonard was a member and past president of the Czech Heritage Foundation.

His greatest love was building floats which he had done for 33 years, first with the "Navajo Nightstalkers" and since 1989, for the Czech Heritage Foundation. Leonard also enjoyed helping decorate for St. Matthew's school events, including plays, Mardi Gras fundraisers and dances.

Since August 2010, Leonard had been receiving treatments at the Cancer Treatment Centers of America in Phoenix.

He was very proud of his Czech heritage, always had a positive attitude and was a very generous person, always willing to help people in any way that he could.

Military honors were conducted by American Legion Post 727.

A memorial fund has been established in Leonard's name.

Pulling some STRINGS

Bohemian-style
marionettes
favorite of puppeteer

You needn't travel to the Czech Republic to see world famous Bohemian-style marionettes. Eulenspiegel (pronounced oil-n-speegel) Puppets located in West Branch, IA has been making and performing with Bohemian-style marionettes and puppets for 34 years.

Original founder, Monica Leo, became interested in puppets, particularly Bohemian-style marionette construction, through trial and error.

The daughter of German refugees, Leo received degrees in art and English from the University of Iowa and the Art Academy in Germany.

"When I was coming up, there weren't schools to learn the art of puppetry. I used my sculpting skills to make the puppets and my acting and voice training to master performance skills. It was lot of trial and error," said Leo.

In addition to paddle style marionettes, of which you don't see much of outside of Bohemia, Leo makes multi-

string, hand, rod, and shadow puppets.

"I personally like working with and making Bohemian-style marionettes the best because there's something so charming about them. I like working the marionette from the top of the stage and the paddle gives the marionette really good head movement. It produces a really nice caricature of human movement."

Leo has connections with other puppeteers in the Czech Republic and has studied and performed there several times.

Leo loves the ironic history behind puppetry in the Czech Republic because during the communist years many Czech puppet plays subtly criticized the communist government.

"Communist officials didn't pay any attention to the adults and children lined up around the block to see puppet shows. They thought they were just harmless kid shows. They didn't realize they were being made fun of!"

Today, because of the large tourist industry, puppetry in Prague is still popular. In fact, attending a puppet show at the National Marionette Theatre or Drak Puppet Theatre in Prague are must-see tourist attractions. If you're on a tighter budget, you can find some fine marionette shops in downtown Prague.

Leo's puppet business keeps her busy. Eulenspiegel has performed for several years at Houby Days for the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library. She's has also performed, and taught workshops and educational sessions throughout Iowa, the United States and Europe. Eulenspiegel is Iowa's only professional puppet company.

Blowin' up Czech Village!

A warm glowing light will soon burn brightly in Czech Village. Where is this place? It's the Glass Art Studio and Education Center GASEC being constructed in the old Salvation Army building on 16th Avenue SW, Cedar Rapids.

John Berge, Jr. is owner of the building; Jim Jacobmeyer is project facilitator; Conifer Smith and John Krizan are program directors/instructors. They hope the glow from the glassblowers' flames will attract tourists and students.

A large observation window will grandly face out on to 16th Avenue, the heart of Czech Village. The business will offer glass blowing classes for all ages and levels. It will provide demonstrations and sell studio glassware in the store.

"We believe the concept fit the culture of The Village. There's a long Czech glass tradition. It will be a highlight of tours that are done in conjunction with the museum," said Jacobmeyer. "We'll be able to accommodate about 100 people at a time during glass blowing demonstra-

tions," added Smith noting the 6,000 sq. ft. building will also feature four furnaces in the full service glass studio.

With an MSA in art and over 32 years experience, Smith offers a wealth of knowledge having studied under nationally respected glassblowing experts.

She studied art at Penland College in North Carolina, a world renowned technical arts school. She continued her education at Iowa State University, focusing on glassblowing through the engineering department. She has opened three glass studios, two on the Kirkwood cam-

pus where she is a professor, and one in Seattle, WA. Smith and her student/associate, John Krizan, will teach most of the classes.

"There's no other place to learn the art of glass, outside of Kirkwood and studios in St. Louis, Chicago and Minneapolis. We want to be the glass center for the Midwest," said Smith.

Longtime residents may remember when the building was Kadlec Studebaker Sales and Service from 1917-1980. Keeping the history of the building was important in the renovation noted Jacobmeyer.

"Three generations of the Kadlec family worked in that building. Kadlec family members provided us with photos from the 20's and 50's. We'll try to renovate the exterior as close to the original as possible," said Jacobmeyer.

A July 2012 opening date is the goal. Business hours and class information are pending. For more information please contact Jim Jacobmeyer at: new.

Šibřinky costume ball

Sokol Gymnastics brings back Czech tradition

The usual t-shirts, shorts, and sweatpants will not be seen at Sokol Gymnastics on the evening of Friday, February 17. Instead, costumes and masks will be worn as Sokol Cedar Rapids reinstates the Czech tradition of a Šibřinky, a Sokol masquerade dance. Šibřinky stands for practical joking and clowning around.

The public is invited to join in the spirit of an old Czech tradition by wearing costumes and masks. Šibřinky is Friday, February 17 from 6-10 pm in the Sokol Gym, 5200 18th Ave. SW, Cedar Rapids.

History of Šibřinky

The origin of Šibřinky dates back to 1865 when Sokol Prague decided to hold a Sokol costume ball. Members felt an appropriate name had to be found for the ball.

While searching the Jungmann dictionary for ideas, the verb sibrítí was found which meant practical joking and clowning around. From there it was just a short step for designating the Sokol costume ball Šibřinky.

Invitations were sent out which caused excitement by their unusual form: icon lup o cenok YKNIŘBIŠ 5681 aronú 52 end alokos ohékszarp ěnčivcolět v ěnidoh 7 o ketáčaz (in English: thgindim ta gnidne YKNIŘBIŠ 5681 yraurbef 52 lokos eugarp fo llah eht ni kcolc' o 7 ta gnitrats). Some

were angry and others were laughing that they did not immediately recognize that they must read the invitation from right to left. Some even suggested that it was in Turkish or Hungarian.

In the evening of February 25, 1865, the entire Sokol Hall neighborhood was full of spectators. In front of the Sokol Hall were guards with torches. As the carriages carrying the masked guests pulled up to the entrance, they were greeted by an imposing bear.

The inside was fully decorated and the entire main hall became a mass of whirling masked dancers.

The event was a great success, and the tradition of Šibřinky is being continued to this day. It is also enthusiastically continued by the American Sokol Units, many of which still hold this

dance annually, even though the origin and meaning of the name is not known to most of its members.
