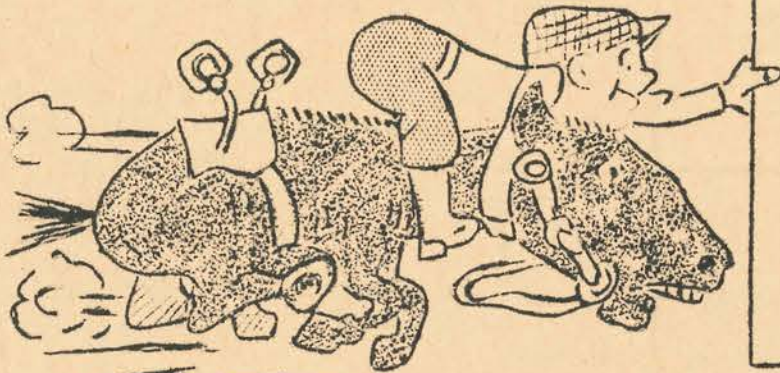

is called, the bank night will be \$4.50 in August.

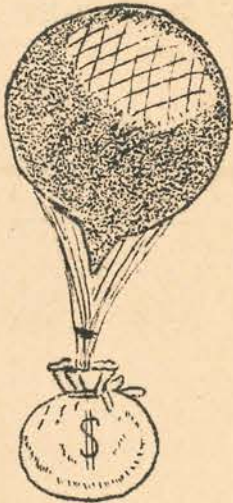
## BURNING UP

Possibilities are that the August meeting will be devoted to the entertainment of the Juveniles which will be in the form of a picnic supper at Millers Park.

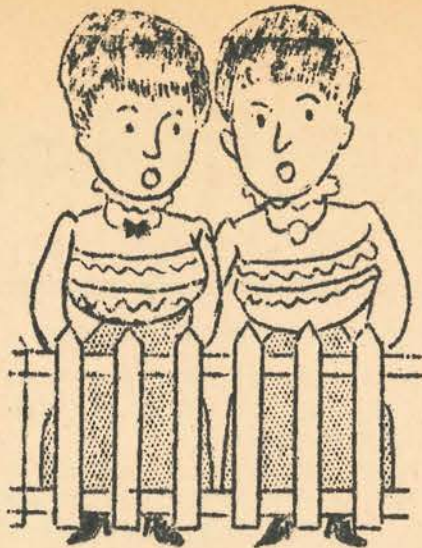
