OUR FOUNDING FIVE

MARJORIE STONE

This is the third in a series of articles profiling the Guild's five founders and original charter members, whose time and effort made the Museum Guild of the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library a reality, and to whom we owe a deep debt of gratitude.

Marjorie Stone has many significant focal points in her life: her family, her church, her music — her heritage. This energetic and talented woman, who has been so instrumental in the formation of the Guild and the ongoing health of the Museum, is a born leader. And she has devoted a tremendous amount of her energy and her time to the Museum and its supporting Guild.

Marjorie's Musical Journey

Marjorie Frances Lala was born August 25, 1933 at St. Luke's Hospital in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. Growing up in Marion, her childhood and adolescent years were like pearls strung together by the common thread of music. She relates how one day, while in the sixth grade, her sister took her to see the band director at school. He expressed a need for baritone players; the school would provide the instrument. With a child's pragmatism, Marge decided that she would play the baritone — and play it she did! As a student at Marion High School, she eventually participated in every configuration of brass ensemble imaginable, including a brass quartet that received a "1" rating in the Nationals. "Music contests were really important and competition was keen," Marge relates. "The students competed in conferences, just like the athletes of today."

Among her many additional achievements in music were "1" ratings in Iowa's state solo competition for three years. She also garnered the coveted position of first chair in the Iowa All State Band twice — a high honor, to which anyone who has ever been involved in a high school music program can attest. She was utterly dedicated. In order to attend the state competition she and another music student from Marion rode the milk train to and from Des Moines (with stops at every small town along the way to pick up milk!). She showed herself as a high achiever in other areas as well, displaying her leadership qualities early on by her involvement in student government, serving on the student council and as a class officer.

Marge's college career was seemingly predestined. Her parents were both alumni of Coe College in Cedar Rapids, and she had always planned to follow in their footsteps by attending Coe. As a high school senior, the accomplished music student entered and won the 1951 Eastern Iowa Band contest. This prestigious honor included tuition to Coe College.

During her years at Coe, Marge concentrated her educational endeavors on studying and excelling in music. She performed with numerous brass ensembles, and was selected as the featured soloist for Coe's annual spring college band tour. She graduated in 1955 with a Bachelor of Music degree with a focus on public school music.

As an active member of the highly esteemed Delta Delta Delta sorority during her years at Coe, Marge served in various offices for her chapter, including President. After graduation she continued her sorority involvement, serving the "Tri-Delts" as their Alumni Advisor for three years. During her post-college years she also served as a church camp counselor and taught the new church curriculum in the Presbytery and Synod Schools.

A Willingness To Serve

In 1960 Marjorie Lala embarked on a new phase in her life when she became Mrs. Robert J. Stone. She and Robert were married on August 6 of that year at the First Presbyterian Church in Marion, Iowa. The couple has three grown children, all married: Wilford, a lawyer; Diane, a teacher, and mother to their four grandchildren — Mindy, Michelle, Malissa and Marcus; and Jeffrey, a computer programmer. While her children were growing up, Marge was a "stay-at-home Mom" and she put a lot of energy into the job. She maintained a high level of visibility in her children's lives and took a great interest in their activities, often volunteering at their schools and donating time as a Camp Fire leader and a church choir mother.

Marge has always been an active member of the First Presbyterian Church in Marion. Over the years she served on the Christian Education Committee, taught Sunday school and lent her support by counseling communicant members and serving as a Church Elder. Due to her extensive musical background she was able to lend indispensable expertise to the church by chairing the Music and Worship Committee for four years.



In addition to Marge's many Guild and Museum commitments, today she remains active in other community organizations as well. She devotes a good deal of time to her PEO chapter (KJ), is currently serving as the President of the OOP Club, and she sits on the City of Marion Tree Board. Her work with the Komensky Society¹ is important to her. As a non-profit Iowa corporation originated at Coe College in 1909, the Society grants scholarships to worthy high school graduates. For her, it is a sort of commingling of her allegiance to her alma mater and her respect and love for Czech culture.

Marge has always enjoyed myriad hobbies and interests, many of them Czech-related. Needlework — sewing, needlepoint and counted cross-stitch — is one of her favorites. She loves to read and gardens with zest. Cooking is also a favorite pastime — she always makes the traditional Vanocka/Houska for Christmas Eve. Her artistry is evident when she displays kraslice (painted eggs), pomlaska (willow whip) and pussy willows according to the season. She derives great pleasure from making the peroutky and the Slovak apple wreaths for the Museum.

A Stalwart Advocate

Marge has yet to acquire a complete genealogy of her ancestors, but she does know that they came from the Czech Republic, near Prague. As a member of the Czechoslovak Genealogical Society International, based in St. Paul, Minnesota, she has not yet em-

barked on extensive genealogical research, but she and Robert attend the Society's conferences. Educational and informative, these conferences feature interesting lectures by guest speakers from all over the world. Even though details are sketchy on her ancestors, she has several tangible pieces of family history that she cherishes, her great-grandmother's tea pot among them. In June of 1864 Katerina Buresh transported this exquisite piece with her from the Old Country. Her Grandmother's heirloom garnets and several old religious books — the oldest one dating back to 1518 — grace her collection of beloved family artifacts.

Marge has long been a stalwart advocate for the preservation of Czech culture and heritage, as evidenced by her on-going involvements relating to the culture. For many years she served on the Czech Heritage Foundation Board. During this time she worked extensively with Eva and Bob Kouba on the traveling

Museum. She was a charter member of the committee that originated the "Homestay Program." This noteworthy program was designed to underwrite a cultural exchange for students, making it possible for high school juniors to live with families in the Czech Republic for one month every year. Among her many other contributions, Marge has served as a judge for the Czech "Prince and Princess" contest, has chaired the Houby Days Bake Off, and served on the committee that collected and assembled the plexiglas exhibit entitled "The History of the Czechs in Linn County." She served three years on the National Czech and Slovak Museum and Library Board, and for two of those years she functioned in the capacity of Secretary.

Marge and Robert recently had the opportunity to spend fifteen days in the Czech Republic. In June of 1996, as their plane landed in Prague, Marge relates that she experienced a very emotional moment — one that took her by surprise. With tears in her eyes, she looked down on the city and was struck with the realization that "This is where my whole family came from." The Stones had a wonderful and educational time there, experiencing the many fascinations of her ancestral country.

To Preserve, Protect and Teach

As a Guild volunteer at the Museum, Marge always meets interesting individuals. She and husband Robert have hosted several visitors from the Czech Republic and Slovakia, including the wife of the current ambassador of the Slovak Republic. They both feel that this has helped them gain a deeper appreciation and understanding of these people. Their aim is to teach. "We try to show our guests that we do not live like the stereotyped people that they see on 'Dallas,'" Marge says. At the same time, they try to re-educate Americans about the Czech and Slovak peoples. They have observed that some Americans retain a stereotyped image of the Slovak peoples as well, and they feel that this must be addressed so that there is increased awareness of the truth — that there is much more to the culture, heritage and character of these people that must be preserved.

Marge thinks back to the days when the Guild Steering Committee was meeting in the "office" of the old Museum. Rather rustic surroundings, there were no chairs to sit on, so they sat on various boxes. Mae Novotny, functioning as secretary at the time, barely had room to record the minutes. "Now I look at the beautiful Museum building and compare . . . we've come a long way," she says with a bit of wonder — and a lot of pride.

She often thinks of Mae and others who are no longer with us, and Marge feels extremely grateful for their influence in her life. It is her deep belief that the activities of the Guild should continue to be educational and social in order to provide the best volunteer support for the Museum and Library. She realizes what a sacred trust it is to continue to preserve, protect and teach the rich heritage of the country of which we are all so proud.



Dear Marilyn and Members of the Guild,

Thank you very much for the opportunity to address your group last evening. It was a treat for me to share some of the progress and goals of the library with you. "KOLYA"

... a film review by Betty Truesdell

When I discovered that the long awaited Czech film, "Kolya" was appearing in Iowa City and would be gone in two days, I rushed down for a Matinee showing. This is the film that was the recipient of the 1996 Golden Globe and Academy Award for best foreign film.

It is so artistically crafted that one may find it a little tedious at times, but when the heart and soul emerges out of its simplicity, one cannot help but be enamored by it.


We are given a look inside the life of a single, middle-aged musician, beautifully played by Zdenek Sverak, who is struggling to earn enough money to buy a car. When an unorthodox scheme presents itself, he consents, only to be confronted with the task of temporarily caring for a small angelic looking Russian boy named Kolya. Reluctantly he and the boy slowly bond together.

There is humor, there is spice and there is grandeur in this film whether in the light of a soaring hawk, or in a rooftop view of majestic Prague.

I was a little surprised as to how the Czech women were depicted in this film, however. They were all free spirits, shall we say, and our main character seemed to have a steady supply of lovers.

This was definitely worth a trip to Iowa City. What a shame Cedar Rapids wasn't able to obtain this film. It would have been a nice accompaniment to the new "Thousand Years of Czech Culture" exhibit presently being shown at the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library.

I have heard it may be shown again in Iowa City so you may want to be mindful of that and check the movie schedule.



ELECTION OF NOMINATING COMMITTEE AND ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Please be thinking about who you would like to have serve on the Guild Nominating Committee. The election of this committee will take place at the October 4th meeting.

Also think about who you would like to elect to serve on the Executive Board of the Guild. You will be electing your 1998 officers at the November 1st meeting. It is important that we think about this important event before we come to the November 1st meeting.

The Guild Bylaws state: "No member shall serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office." The current officers and years served in their respective offices are:

GUILD BYLAWS ...

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Guild shall be President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Museum Guild Representative to the Board of Directors of the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library, and any other officers the Guild shall deem necessary to achieve the goals of the Guild. These officers shall perform the duties prescribed by these Bylaws.

Section 2. At the meeting held in October, an Auditing Committee shall be appointed by the President, and a Nominating Committee shall be elected by the Guild. It shall be the duty of the Nominating Committee to nominate candidates for the offices to be elected at the November meeting.

Section 3. The officers, with the exception of the Museum Guild Representative, shall be elected by secret ballot to serve for one year. The Museum Guild Representative shall be elected by secret ballot to serve for three years. The officers' terms of office shall begin at the January meeting. No member shall serve more than two consecutive terms in the same office.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE


A nominating committee of three should be ELECTED by the vote of the membership one month prior to the election of Guild officers. Nominations are to be made from the floor by any Guild member. The Guild President is not eligible to serve on this committee.

DUTIES:

- a. Select a slate of one or more eligible candidates for each of the six Guild offices.
- b. Report the slate of candidates at the election meeting, and give a written copy of the slate to the presiding officer.

Rhubarb Bars from ... Hermina Rigel

2 C. flour
1/2 C. Sugar
1 C. margarine


for the filling:

4 C. finely chopped rhubarb
2 C. sugar
1/2 C. flour
4 eggs

Mix flour, 1/2 C. sugar and margarine together and press into ungreased 10 inch x 15 inch pan. Bake at 350* for 15 to 20 minutes.

For filling, mix ingredients together and pour over hot crust. Bake at 350* for 40 to 45 minutes. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.

Apples may be used in place of rhubarb.



Poppy Seed Squares from ... Olga Naxera, Sedenka

1 pkg. yeast
1/4 C. luke warm water
pinch of salt
4 C. flour
1 T. sugar
2 sticks butter or margarine (1 cup)
2/3 C. scalded milk (cooled)

Mix all together. This needs no raising. Roll 1/2 of the dough & place on greased jelly roll pan. Spread with 2 cups of poppy seed filling. Roll out other 1/2 dough & cover. Bake at 400* until brown (about 30 minutes).

Cool & ice with:

- 2 T. butter
- 2 T. hot milk
- 1/4 t. baking powder
- 1/2 t. vanilla
- 1 1/2 C. powder sug


