Recipe: Prage Štrůdl

Yield: 8+ servings

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For the pastry: 1/2 cup (125 grams) all-purpose flour 1/2 cup (125 grams) semolina (or coarse flour if you can get it) Pinch of salt 3.4 oz (100 ml) lukewarm water 1 egg 3 tablespoons oil 1 teaspoon vinegar

For the filling: 3-4 apples, thinly sliced Raisins and walnuts to taste 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon Icing sugar for decorating before serving

Mix both types of flour (or just use two cups of all-purpose flour) and a pinch of salt. Gradually add the water, egg, vinegar and most of the oil while kneading the dough on a flour-covered table. When you get a very elastic dough with a silky shine, form a ball, oil the surface, wrap the dough in foil and, let it rest for at least half an hour in the fridge.

When rested, start stretching the dough with your hands until it is very thin. The perfect thickness is achieved when you can see the lines on the palm of your hand through the dough. The dimensions should end up being around 20 x 30 inches (50 x 75 cm). Spread the pastry on a kitchen towel and spread out the thinly cut apples, raisins and walnuts into a consistent layer on top; keep about an inch free on 3 sides for easy wrapping. Spice with cinnamon, and start wrapping using the cloth as support on both sides.

Create a spiral and tightly form a roll; wet your fingers in water and moisten the edges to make them stick better. Gently press and wrap both sides. Wrap the strudel in the cloth and transfer to a baking tray. Place in the oven pre-heated to 350 F (175 C) and bake for 50-55 minutes until lightly golden. Sprinkle with icing sugar before serving.

Announcing the new Royal Court

The Cedar Rapids Czech Heritage Foundation's Royal Court has doubled in size, with the announcement of a new position and dual titles. Two young men and two young women will share the duties of Czech prince and Czech princess in the coming year, and for the first time ever, a "Little Brother" will serve on the Czech Royal Court.

"As one of the judges, I know what a difficult decision this was," said Janna Waters, Miss Czech-Slovak Iowa 2014-2015, who served on the Czech prince and princess judging panel.

Waters said both candidates for Czech prince and both for Czech princess did an excellent job of researching their ancestry, writing essays and answering questions about Czech culture and traditions in front of the panel of judges.

"Because it was such a tough choice, the Czech Heritage Foundation voted to expand this year's Royal Court," she announced during the crowning ceremony May 17 at Houby Days in Czech Village.

The new Czech princes for the coming year are: Branden Knight, the son of Tom and Karen Knight of Hiawatha, and Bryce Buresh, the son of John and Jennifer Buresh of Ely. Branden, 14, an eighthgrader at Harding Middle School, served during the past year as Mladší Princ, which translates to "younger prince." Bryce, 17, an 11th-grader at College Community Schools, wore the kroj (ethnic folk costume) that his father wore as Czech Prince from 1986 to 1987. The new Czech princesses are Hannah Emrich, the daughter of Tiffany Morgan and Michael Becker of Cedar Rapids, and Rachael Brandon, the daughter of Jeremy and Jennifer Wills and Jason and Andrea Brandon of Cedar Rapids. Hannah, 13, is a seventhgrader at Prairie Point, and Rachael, 13, is a seventh-grader at Oak Ridge Middle School.

The new Little Sisters also were announced during the ceremony. Victoria Knight, 11, the daughter of Tom and Karen Knight of Hiawatha, will serve her third year as Little Sister. She is a fifth-grader at Pierce Elementary. Aislin Andrews, 8, the daughter of Chad and Danielle Andrews of Lisbon, and Ingrid Landa, 7, the daughter of Craig and Christine Landa of Toddville, are the new Little Sisters. Aislin is a second-grader at Lisbon Elementary and Ingrid is a first-grader at Alburnett Elementary School.

For the first time, the Czech Royal Court has a "Little Brother," bestowing the title on Lars Landa at the crowning ceremony. Lars, 9, is the son of Craig and Christine Landa and is a third-grader at Alburnett.

Outgoing Czech Prince, Sam Uthoff, and Miss Czech-Slovak Iowa 2015-2016, Ashley Pudil, assisted at the crowning ceremony. Miss Czech-Slovak Iowa 2015, Megan Lehmann, was also present at the ceremony.

Janna Waters also was recognized at the ceremony for serving as a role model for the younger members of the Royal Court, and for giving her time and talents on countless occasions during the past year to spread the message about the program.

Boys and girls between the ages of 12 and 18 compete for the title of Czech Prince or Princess by researching their Czech heritage, writing an essay and being interviewed by a panel of judges. The winners serve as young ambassadors by representing their Czech heritage and the Cedar Rapids area in parades, festivals and other events throughout the year.

The 14th Annual Miss Czech-Slovak Iowa Pageant was held on May 16, 2015 in conjunction with the Houby Days Festival held in Czech Village, Cedar Rapids, IA. This is a change from the previous year when the pageant was held with the St. Joseph's Day Dance in March. The pageant kicked off with a parade at 10:00 AM with nine convertibles carrying Miss Czech-Slovak queens and contestants.

Two excellent contestants vied for the crown of Miss Czech-Slovak Iowa. Ashley Pudil is the daughter of Kevin and Denise Pudil of Cedar Rapids, IA. She is a student at Loras College at Dubuque, IA, declaring a major in English-Creative Writing as well as Spanish. Ashley served as the Cedar Rapids Czech School administrator this past summer. She performed an ethnic dance that was performed by the Omladina Dancers at the Czechoslovak Genealogical Society Conference in St Louis, MO. Hannah Van Deusen is the daughter of Ray and Terri Van Deusen of Cedar Rapids, IA. She is a student at Coe College, planning to major in music education. She is also taking Suzuki teacher training to be a better qualified Suzuki violin/viola teacher. For her talent, she performed a violin piece composed by Miloslav Gajdos, called Zingaresca.

The judges for the pageant were: Kathy (Roushar) Jorgenson of Minnetonka, Minnesota; President of Czechoslovak Genealogical Society International, Michael Klimesh of Spillville, Iowa; and Sandy (Benak) Schnackenberg of Gretna, Nebraska who is a Past Nebraska Czech-Slovak Queen Pageant Chair. The judging events were held at the National Czech & Slovak Museum & Library with the kroj modeling, oratory and talent presentation open to the public in the Mitvalsky Room.

Visiting queens included: the national queen Morgan McMichen, 2014-2015 Miss Czech-Slovak US; Gaby Salva, 2014-2015 Miss Czech-Slovak Missouri; Sara Vytlacil, 2014-2015 Miss CzechSlovak Kansas; Meagan Kurmel, 2014-2015 Miss Czech-Slovak Nebraska; and Julia Ourecky, the Wilber Czech Queen. Ethan Jobman, the Nebraska Prince, rounded out the visiting out-of-state royalty. Past royalty in attendance were Lynne Marie Nedjl Erger, 1980-1981 Czech Princess, and Holly Stepanek, 2012-2013 Miss Czech-Slovak Iowa.

The pageant featured a social reception 5 to 6 p.m. at the Avacentre in Cedar Rapids to acknowledge and greet the Czech Royalty, parents, and attendees. This was followed by an ethnic dinner of pork, dumplings, sauerkraut, cerna kuba, green beans, salad, rohlicky, poppy seed hoska, kolacky and poppyseed cake.

Before the crowning of the new queen, Janna Waters spotlighted her reign as outgoing Miss Czech-Slovak Iowa in her farewell speech saying, "It's been a really fantastic learning experience." The royal court assisting with crowning the runnerup and Miss Czech-Slovak Iowa 2015-2016 included 2015 queen Megan Lehmann; Morgan McMichen, Miss Czech-Slovak US; Sam Uthoff, Czech Prince; Brandon Knight, Mladší Prince; and Victoria Knight, Little Sister. Hannah Van Deusen was crowned Miss Czech-Slovak Iowa Runner-Up 2015-2016, and Ashley Pudil was crowned Miss Czech-Slovak Iowa 2015-2016 Queen. Both Pudil as queen and Van Deusen as runner-up will serve as ambassadors for the Czechs and Slovaks of the state by attending parades, festivals and other events with the royal court. The goal is to represent the culture and share it with communities around the state.

The reigning Miss Czech-Slovak Iowa Queen 2015 is Megan Lehmann, daughter of Steve & Karen Lehmann of Cedar Rapids, IA. The outgoing Queen for 2014-2015 was Janna Waters, daughter of Pat & Joan Waters, of Marshalltown, IA. She served as the Master of Ceremonies for the pageant judging events and evening banquet.
