\$11,500 FLAC

An 11,500 dollar world war service flag hengs in the American Legion Club Room at West Liberty, Iowa.

Looking at the banner you see, a 10 by 12 foot red, white, and blue muslin of good quality and excellent sowing, with the symbolic stars symetrically placed - nothing more.

The only gold about it is the color of live of the stars - two of them mounted on small red crosses.

The flag was made by a farm housewife who had two sons in the scrvice. Into the flags field went 54 blue stars, one for each Wapsininoo and Goshen township enlisted youth. As enlistments increased Mrs. Peters added stars until the finished banner had 99 additional stars along the flag's border.

In spring of 1918 a nationwide cry for more funds for the Red Cro s, was the inspiration for an auction sale in this small community of some 5,000 persons.

At the conclusion of the Auction sale where all the donated articles were sold, the service flag was put up for sale.

James Potter, now dead, "bid in" the banner for \$50,00 and immediately announced he would put the flag up for resale.

In a short time there were 100 sales at \$50.00 each and many at \$40.00. These were followed by sales at \$25.00 then at \$15.00 and so on down to \$2.50. The total amount raided from the sale of the flag was \$11,500.

West Liberty residents say the sale set a National record for such an event conciderating the location and population.

There seems little doubt that Mrs. Peter's flying fingers feshioned Iowa's most valuable service flag.




