complete success.



The couple went to Cone's studio hoping to buy "an Iowa barn painting."

"Cone said he didn't have any barn paintings he could offer us," Kouba recalls, "but he brought out 'Rolling Hills.' We liked it and decided to buy it.

"Then Cone brought out some of the doorways and ghosts he had been doing. I remember that he showed us how you could hang Four Exits' right side up or upside down.

"We decided to buy that one, too. He was very pleased that the paintings would be going to New York."

An unfavorable response earns a lump of coal from the Devil. this day gingerbread cookies are handed out, sometimes in the shape of St. Nicholas, the Angel, and the Devil, or in the form of hearts, birds, or other interesting shapes.

JOSEF LADA dropped out of college living could be made by selling his cartoon creations to newspaper and magazine companies. He is best known as the illustrator who conjured-up the unforgettable image of Svejk.

Lieutenant Dub figures from the well-known novel "The Good Soldier Svejk" Jaroslav Hašek, author of the character Svejk, at one time shared an apartment with Lada. It was during this period that the two Czechs teamed up to chronicle the Good Soldier's activities which appeared in serial form in the magazine Karikatury. Lada's characterizations and drawings are timeless and have graced hundreds

of volumes for over sixty years. Children from all across Czechoslovakia are familiar with his books. Two favorites are Moje Abeceda (My ABC), and Svět Zvířat (The Animal World) . His popular

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animal portrayals depict members of the animal kingdom in humanlike roles, playing musical instruments, eating at the table, etc ...

Aside from his light-hearted work with cartoon characters and the hundreds

of animated barnyard inhabitants he drew for his young followers, Lada found time to produce several important works of art. The artist's landscapes and rural scenes have appeared on many picture postcards, and his rare talent has earned him the title in Czechoslovakia of "National Treasure."



Josef Lada was born in Hrusice, a small village about thirty Kilometers southeast of Prague. In his autobiography, "Kronika mého života" (The Chronicle of My Life), Lada admits to having led a charmed life. It's the story of a poor cobbler's son who goes on to widespread recognition in his field. It's the story of a man who truly loved what he did for a living, and derived great pleasure from being able to share the results of his talent with those around him. Josef Lada died on the day before his seventieth birthday, on December 14, 1957.


WON'T YOU JOIN US?

ALICE MICKISH HENDRICKSON has spent over sixty-five years in the kitchen. Truly a labor of love. Three hundred and seventy-five of her time-tested, easy to read recipes are featured in a new book.



A PRAIRIE KITCHEN SAMPLER, written by Alice's daughter, is "More than a Cookbook... More than a Storybook." This four hundred thirty-five page, hard cover delight captures a giant slice of Americana. It combines kitchen classics with priceless stories about barn dances, chivarees, and down-home family gatherings. Glimpses of life on a Nebraska farm are offered, remembering occasions such as lilac day on the family homestead, electricity coming to the house, and the advent of running water in the kitchen.

Just before she married, Alice learned to bake and cook with a corncob-fired cookstove, using recipes handed down from her mother and future mother-in-law. A combination of three ethnic heritages make up the basis of

Down-home goodness blended with straight-forward instructions, and all are guaranteed winners. The Special Tips section is especially useful for novice bakers of cakes, pies, and breads.

twenty-five letters tell of John's travels during the war.

John was twenty-three years old, an immigrant from the Province of Bohemia. Company K was mustered in Iowa City and sent to Davenport. They trained at Rolla, Missouri. In the spring of 1863 the Company moved south, were in two battles, and with General Grant at Vicksburg which fell July 4th.

Then the company went down the Mississippi River by steamboat, around Florida, and on to Fort Monroe near Norfolk, Virginia. Next stop Washington, and then marching onward to the Shenandoah Valley to join General Sheridan. By 1865, the regiment went by rail to Baltimore after the events at Appomatox. From there they marched to Augusta, Georgia and were mustered out at Savannah, Georgia. Finally they returned by ship to Baltimore, and by rail to Davenport, Iowa.

Final figures for the 1,084 men in Company K: 60 killed in action, 55 died of wounds, 276 wounded, 128 died of disease, 187 discharged for wounds, 29 captured, 42 transferred to other units, 78 buried in national cemeteries.

The letters, written in the Czech language, are now over one hundred years old, faded, and not easy to translate.

Joseph Pospishil of Ely, Iowa, was remodeling the family home when he found the letters written by his grandfather to his great-grandfather. They are addressed to Joseph Pospishil, Banner Valley Post Office, Linn County, Iowa. From a 1966 C.R. Gazette news item

was established in 1853 on what was then the Stream family farm. farm, south of Ely, was purchased by Christopher Fuhrmeister shortly after the Civil War. It is still known as the Fuhrmeister Place to the local residents.

THE UNITED NATIONS CHILDRENS FUND received a thank you note from an eight-year-old Czech girl shortly after the second world war. From this single small act by a grateful young recipient sprang the idea for UNICEF's major fundraising efforts. Each year the organization sells millions of dollars of greeting cards, calendars, and other seasonal items. These efforts amount to as much as one third of UNICEF's yearly operating budget. At the Fall Festival parade, dressed in Czech costumes Kim Fisk, a student at Kennedy High School, and Todd Slezak, a student at Prairie High School, commemorated the event by carrying a banner topped with flags of the United Nations, U.S., and Czechoslovakia.

* * * * * * * * * * * * * BOHDAN TREFNY traveled all over Bohemia and the European continent with the Sokol organization. The Sokol philosophy was in his blood. He had three brothers, and they all were very active in the Sokol movement during the final quarter of the last century. One brother even lost his life due to an accident on the parallel bars. Bohdan was born in Prague on July 1, 1875, and went on to become a jeweler and watchmaker there. He moved to České Třebové to go to work for another jeweler, Marie Poldouf. It

wasn't long before employee and

employer became husband and wife. Frank Filip Sr. was a close friend of

the Trefnys. He also was from České

Trebové, born within a few months of Bohdan. Filip came to Cedar Rapids

with his family in 1887. In 1906 the Trefnys accepted Filip's invitation to Cedar Rapids and Bohdan became the new Physical Instructor for the Sokols. Bohdan, now thirty years old, came to the U.S. with his wife Marie, step-son Fred, their two sons Milo and Charles, and their daughter Mary. Marie made the long oceanic journey safely in spite of being pregnant at the time with their second daughter, Vlasta. Their sons, Theodore and Louis, were born later.

Trefny arrived just in time for Cedar Rapids' semi-centennial celebration. The Sokols came out in record numbers to commemorate the city's first fifty years. Trefny was placed in charge of the Sokol exhibition at Riverside Park, instructing and coordinating the entire gymnastic effort enjoyed by thousands. The newcomer didn't disappoint the Czech element here. many attended the June 14th celebration in 1906, that two performances were scheduled - a morning and afternoon show. Just two and a half years later, Trefny's skill as a physical education again put to instructor was January 17, the test. On grandest 1909, the

HALL DEDICATED WITH INTERESTING SERVICES - With an athletic exhibition given at the auditorium in the afternoon, participated in by members of the local society and by teams from the Bohemian athletic organization from a number of other cities, and a program given in the new gymnasium that was attended by as many people as could get into the hall, the magnificent new Bohemian gymnasium was formally dedicated yesterday. It was without a doubt the greatest day for the Bohemian Sokols in the history of Cedar Rapids, and it was a day that will be long remembered as marking the completion of one of the greatest achievements ever undertaken by the local officers and members of the order. That the work that is being done by the society is appreciated was

evidenced by the fact that the new gymnasium was packed to the doors last -14evening, and scores of people who wanted to attend were unable to get There were people present from a number of nearby cities, including a large delegation from Chicago, at both the afternoon and evening programs, and it was one of the most enthusiastic crowds ever seen in Cedar Rapids... The athletic exhibitions given under the direction of Prof. B. Trefny, physical director of the Sokols, was one of the greatest exhibitions of the kind ever given in the city ... The work of the Cedar Rapids Sokols on the parallel bars and the Chicago athletes on the horizontal bar was of a startling nature and showed in a convincing manner the high state of physical development to which the men have been brought. The flag and wand drills given by the boys and girls were especially good, the youngsters going through different exercises in a manner that brought forth storms of applause."

Trefny offered much of his time to the Sokol organization and was at one time an executive director of the Sokol

Union of America. He left his position as instructor (náčelník) at the Sokols and was replaced by Frantisek Machovsky. It was time to go back into the jewelry business full time, first locating in Frank Muzik's Cigar Store on 16th Ave. S.W., later moving across the street into the old Bulicek building. The jeweler then moved his bench to the rear of the A.C. Fisher Jewelry Store, on 3rd St. downtown, where he taught the trade to his son Theodore. Now Mr. Trefny, mainly in the wholesale watch repair business relocated to Boyson's Jewelry Store in the Kimball Building, which is now Merchants National Bank. Before retiring, he moved the business one more time, upstairs above Klinger's Paint Store on 2nd Ave. downtown.

At age sixty-seven Bohdan became ill from cancer and passed away on September 7, 1942. His wife, Marie, born on September 25, 1870, passed away eight years after her husband, on July 28, 1950.

Other favorites include kolacky, rohlicky, and strudl. Arlene is our newest Czech Heritage Foundation member and below shares with us an award winning recipe of hers recently published in the Suburban LIFE Citizen Newspaper's cookbook:

Bohemian Stew 2 to 3 pounds beef stew cut in chunks 2 cups chopped carrots 2 cups chopped celery 3 onions quartered 3 tablespoons tapioca 1 tablespoon sugar 1 22-ounce canned whole tomatoes 1 tablespoon salt (opt.) 1/2 tablespoon pepper Combine all ingredients. Bake covered at 250 degrees for five hours stirring occasionally. Makes 10 to 12 servings. Serve with dumplings, boiled potatoes, or buttered egg noodles. Dobre chutnani!
