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#### Museum Guild Program May 7, 2005 "Marion Historical Society"

Presented by Pat Klopfenstein

Marion's sacred and sordid past will be the subject of an August exhibit of the Marion Historical Society. Pat told Guild members that this display will give visitors a glimpse of the city's church history, tavern history and other fascinating stories of previous residents and incidents. One story to be related regards a man who had a very checkered past and then became a minister. The show will be titled "Heaven and Hell".

The Historical Society has The Marion Heritage Center and Granger House Museum. The Center is a former Methodist church built in the 1850's. The building originally had "his and hers" doors when it was used as a church. Later the main floor was used as a basketball court and another time as a sales floor for a business. Now the restoration of the building provides an excellent place for the popular exhibits of the Society.

Pat showed the group some of the artifacts owned by the Society which included a Marion tailor's book. This was a record for the businessman where a customer's measurements and their previous purchases were recorded. She also showed a copy of a last wallpaper edition of a Marion publication. During the Civil War when paper was scarce, newspapers were printed on wallpaper as a conservation measure.

An active group of volunteers offers Marion residents and visitors two wonderfully restored buildings and an ongoing program of exhibits and activities to illuminate the history of their community.

# Museum Guild Program June 13, 2005 "Shrine Childrens Hospital"

Presented by Dean Redmon

After being introduced by Lavanda Woosley, our speaker gave us some basic information regarding the hospitals which number 22 general, 18 orthopedic, and 3 for burn patients. Then a video was shown spotlighting two patients, one a girl from a Russian orphanage who was born with a birth defect and the other was a boy who needed heart surgery. The viewing was emotional and we were happy to find that both were treated successfully without any cost to their families. The first Shrine center opened in 1922 and mainly treated polio victims. To date, 735,000 children have been treated, and there are 190 active patients at this time.

Housing, food and transportation is also provided. "The Flying Fez" is made up of pilots who transport children to their destinations for treatment. Funds are raised through dues, golf tournaments and other fund raisers, as well as gifts. Mexico City and Montreal also have hospitals and we were informed that Minneapolis is our closest center.

It was certainly an enlightening presentation, we enjoyed hearing about the Shrine Childrens Hospital.

July 11, 2005
"Czech School"
Presented by Radka Horakova

For 135 years, members of Cedar Rapids and surrounding communities have had the opportunity to attend Czech School. Milly Ortner, president of the Czech School Board, reported that this year 78 students are being taught by four teachers during the first weeks of summer.

Milly introduced the Guild members to Radka Horakova, a native of Slovakia, who teaches the class of ages 11-13. Radka is a student at Mount Mercy College and is using part of her summer break to teach her students the language and culture of the Czech & Slovak Republics.

Radka uses a variety of techniques to make learning challenging and fun. She does include a grammar component in her lesson planning and although it is not the favorite part of the students learning, most agree that it is necessary. Radka learns of her student's likes and dislikes by an envelope system she devised. Each student and the teacher have personally designed envelopes available for short messages to comment to each other and their teacher on happenings in the classroom.

The students in Radka's classes have impressed her with their interest and intelligence. She was especially impressed with their discussion and writings on the subject of virtues. Occasionally the students are treated to a session under a shade tree out of doors as Radka feels the change can enhance the learning process.

In her home town of Olomouc, Radka attended the university where she is majored in the Czech language. Journalism and Leisure Studies. She hopes to pursue a Master's degree in Journalism at a US school.
